At Last - The Rains Come To Area; 2.23 Inches Fall

Ahhh... the million dollar rains came! Almost two and a quarter inches of rain fell in Wayne the past week, restoring life to tinder-dry pastures and crops and bringing out corn planters, hurrying to take advantage of the new moisture.

Many farmers had held off planting corn until rains fell. The biggest part of the month's rainfall came last Thursday night, as 1.75 inches fell accompanied by a tornado striking farms south and east of Wayne.

Last Wednesday, .28 fell followed by .12 Thursday. Rains were general throughout the county with many areas reporting locally heavy downpours up to nearly three inches.

May's rainfall totals 2.64 inches, leaving a .6-inch deficit for the period. Total accumulation for 1955 stands at 4.66 inches, 2.17 inches below average for the first five months of the year.

Temperatures have remained generally cool since the rains began. High for the past week was 80 degrees recorded Tuesday. Other daytime highs were as low as 56 degrees. Sunday night the thermometer dropped to 44 degrees for the week's low.

Tornado Damages Five Farms In Thursday Evening's Storm

Strikes Farms Near Wayne; No Injuries

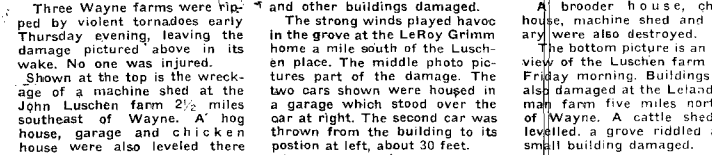
A brooder house, chicken house, machine shed and granary were also destroyed.

Prospects Improve
Recent good rains have certainly brightened the farm outlook. We are still far short of normal precipitation for the year. Sorghums and Sudan grass are still good bets to insure adequate feed and forage. They can be seeded throughout the month of June. Many old fields show no prospect of producing a crop worth harvesting. Best use would be to pasture for about ten days and then put at least a part to sorghums.

Best Protein Level
The best protein level in feeds for baby pigs starts at about 20 percent. Much better gains and use of feeds were obtained at this level than with 15% in tests at Iowa State college. The protein level should be progressively decreased as pigs reach eight-week weaning weights. A 12 to 14 percent protein level is adequate for hogs nearing market weight.

4-H Swine Project
Wayne is one of several Nebraska counties selected for a special 4-H swine project. Eight purebred Hampshire weanling gilts have been purchased to be placed with as many 4-H members. Those receiving these gilts agree to give them good care, exhibit them at the county fair and to turn back to the supervisory committee a gilt from the first litter produced. These will then be assigned to other 4-H members.

4-H club members selected to receive these gilts are Larry Wacker, Larry Warrelman, Lonnie Ehrhardt, Jesse Milligan, James Sloan, Leon Voecks, Dan, win Peterson and Gary Grandquist. Supervisory committee includes Carl Bronzowski, Walter Peterson, Everett Rees and county agent. Funds for this project are provided by the Sears Foundation.

Stay Alive
Farm tractors are a major cause of farm accidents. In 1954, 16 Nebraska farm people were killed as a result of tractor accidents and 10 or 12 more were killed by the machines used in conjunction with the tractor. These accidents do not have to happen. In fact they won't happen if tractor operators would follow a few simple safety rules.

1. Be sure the gear shift lever is in neutral before starting the engine.
2. Always use proper shields on the power take-off.
3. Hitch only to the draw-bar. Never to the axle.
4. Always stop the power take-off before dismounting from the tractor.
5. Never allow riders on tractors or machines.
6. Reduce speed when on rough ground, steep slopes or when turning, especially when going down grade.
7. Never refuel the tractor when it is running or when it is extremely hot.
8. Remember a careful operator is always the best insurance against an accident.

CAPITOL NEWS

LINCOLN—The Legislature recalled this week from the Memorial Day recess with consideration of the proposed \$220 million state budget. The main item of business left to be done.

But everyone also expected more debate on who was going to pay the costs of the proposed interstate route across Nebraska. Few expected an uneasy settlement made just before the recess to stand unmolested.

This is the proposed 400-mile defense superhighway the federal government wants built from Omaha past Lincoln, Grand Island and North Platte to the Wyoming border west of Kimball. The state's share of the cost would be \$16 million a year.

This would be about one-fourth the amount of money the Nebraska State Highway department expects to put on all of its roads each year. So if the four-lane superhighway is to be built, it would either mean cutting down on other road construction or else providing new revenues.

The legislature tied itself in knots last week trying to decide what to do. By the time members went home for the Memorial Day recess the legislature had taken only two definite steps toward raising revenue:

1. Voting a 16 percent increase in the cost of commercial truck license fees. Increases ranged from \$2.50 to \$125 and were expected to bring in \$625,000 a year.
2. Increasing the fee for automobiles weighing less than 3,000 pounds from \$6 to \$8. This would bring them even with the fee for heavier weight automobiles, which has been \$8. This would garner another \$200,000 a year.

But along the way was strawn the broken wreckage of a number of proposals. Here is a blow by blow account of what happened.

Crunched Legislation
When debate opened there were these revenue-raising proposals facing the legislature:

Proposed license fee increases for all trucks—both commercial and farm, LB 519. The automobile fee increase was in the same bill.


