Helter-Skelter, Willy-Nilly Wayne's current building boom is a reminder that there is no zoning ordinance to control or regulate types—or locations—of structures with

As it stands now most any kind of building could be built wherever there was room and no one could do anything about it.

A creditable zoning ordinance was adopted in 1942 but was repealed in 1945 because it contained a few errors. (How much better would be our position today had it been amended to correct the mistakes.)

Regulation is a must for any growing city it re is to be any semblance of order in the growth if property values are to remain reasonably

Property owners in the new housing additions somewhat protected by covenants filed with r deeds. These covenants provide that houses In Somewhat protected by Covenants into with houses their deeds. These covenants provide that houses must meet certain minimum size requirements; of scan be used only for residential purposes; no 'fauliding of a temporary nature, or troiler, basement, shack, garage, barn 'or other authuildings shall be used at any time as a residence, 'either temporarily or permanently,'' only single dwellings are allowed; location of the house with respect to lotlines is regulated.

All these requirements provide for an attractive, well-planned area in which there is little danger of having property values fall because a non-conforming or undesirable building is erected adjacent to it.

Let's look at some situations that could arise because no zoning ordinance exists:

Suppose you have completed a new house in a very desirable neighborhood and adjoining your lot is a vacant lot which, you presume, will somelate the control of the business. Now you can see from the walk whether or not it is worth your while to the lot is a vacant lot which, you presume, will some

day be occupied by a house as attractive and as expensive as yours. Seems an ideal situation.

One morning you look out to see a truck moving equipment in to start a cannery or alfalfa drying plant. What will happen to your property values? They will ga down along with all other values in the neighbarhood.

What recourse do you have? None. The city has no zoning ordinance to prohibit businesses in the residential district and as long as the business is legitimate it can be operated any place.

Another example: You have built your house and there are vacant lots on either side of you. To have a well-balanced yard your house has been set back 30-35 feet from the front lot line.

Then houses on either side of you are It very near the front lotline, blocking off r view. What happens? Value drops, your ne becomes unattractive.

We have no complaint to make against any of legitimate business. We do know, however, t ynless a zaning ordinance is in effect, resi-ce and business districts become a hodge-

dence and business districts become a hodgepodge.

The former ordinance outlined districts for residence, business and industrial purposes, defined types and uses of buildings for each of the districts and set restrictions governing maintenance, remodeling and altering buildings.

Thus property value was protected, the public was better served and a better-planned, more attractive town was in the making.

Many will argue that Wayne is too small for such an ardinance. At what point does a town reach the size requiring a zoning ordinance?

Many of our larger cities are experiencing growing pains because they failed to enact zoning ordinance serly. Because they waited until the town was "big enough" they found themselves in such a muddle that a zoning ordinance was well-nigh impossible to write or enforce.

An engineer doesn't wait until the business and the second to the

An engineer doesn't wait until the building is done before he plans the locations of factory machines, nor does a carpenter erect the outer walls of the house before he knows where the partitions will be placed.

A zoning ordinance is merely a long-range plan that will serve as a guide and control for future developments. Certainly few persons run their own affairs in a haphazard manner without some thoughts for the future.

Such an ordinance need not affect any existing business in its present location. Even though the use of a building at the time of adoption of the code does not conform with regulations, that use may continue. Once that use is abandoned, however, subsequent use would have to conform to regulations.
