Crops - Weather

Still the rains come! Total rainfall during the past week was 1.43 inches, putting Wayne well ahead of normal for June but still leaving a deficit of .81 for the year. Total rainfall for the first six months of 1955 to date is 10.07 inches. Average rainfall for the first six months is 10.88 inches. Crops are responding well to the rains but sunshine for faster growth. County Agent Harold Ingalls said in his weekly crop report. Some farmers are finding it difficult to get their corn plowed between rains and others are having trouble getting hay dry enough to stack or bale. Pastures, however, are once again in top condition, growing thick and lush. Ingalls also reported alfalfa in almost top condition with rainfall and surface moisture ample, but a slight deficit in soil moisture. Corn borer infestations are showing up heavily in early planted corn. Damp weather has aided borer populations and many farmers are planning spraying operations. Rains over the last week amounted to .49 inch last Wednesday, .72 inch Friday and .22 Tuesday. Temperatures during the week reached generally in the 70's and 80's during the day and dropped to as low as 50 during the night. High reading was Saturday when the thermometer hit 84 degrees. Herewith - Temperatures and rainfall records for the period Tuesday, June 28, through Sunday, June 29.

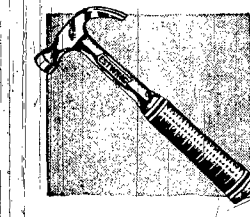
