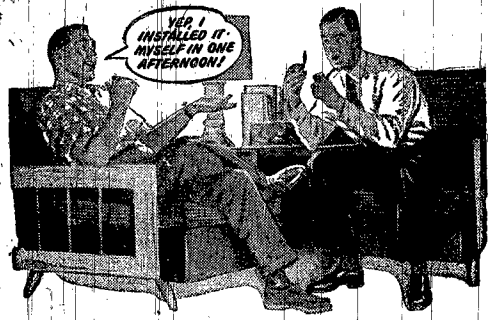

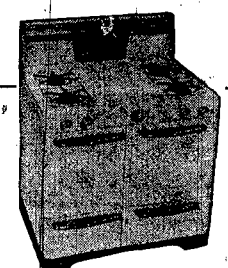

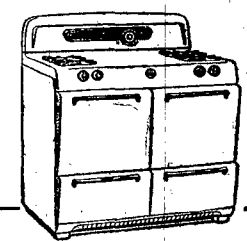

CAPITOL NEWS

Lincoln The State Board of Equalization this week took up the disagreeable task of equalizing tax assessments between the counties. Also, it was scheduled to finish setting assessments of railroads, trucks, and airlines. Automobile assessments were set a month ago with an average 6 percent increase.

But it is the equalizing of real estate assessments between the counties that has created all the turmoil for the State Board the past two years.

This year may prove different. There were indications the Board may have smoother sailing. Members are Gov. Victor Anderson, State Auditor Ray Johnson, Secretary of State Frank Marsh, State Treasurer Ralph Gill, and State Tax Commissioner Fred Herrington.

The major reason is that county assessors and county boards apparently have "held the line" on real estate assessments. Since real estate now comprises 66 percent of the taxable property of the state, keeping this classification stable will help a lot.

The first county abstracts received by the tax commissioner's office indicate that there will be less livestock and grain in many areas. But cattle were only 5.7 percent of the total last year; corn 1.8 percent; and wheat .9 percent. So a loss here wouldn't affect the total too much.

Of course, a drop in livestock or grain in some areas would throw a greater load on real estate. In some cases this may be offset by new construction in the towns.

There is every indication that the totals of houses and goods reported will be much higher in most

localities. Partly this is because Gov. Anderson had a "hand off" policy this year which apparently suited the taxpayers better than former Gov. Robert O'Connell's Operation Honest effort last year. But a good deal of credit could also be given to a new tax form and to the way the assessors used it. In the past many taxpayers have ducked reporting any household goods at all by stating everything they had would come under the \$200 exemption allowed by the constitution.

This year's form included a "catchall" item. The assessors decided to use this item to cover the \$200 exemption. From this point they were able to ask specific questions about refrigerators, stoves, and other items and get them on the tax rolls.

Battle Won

But if this year's assessment proves easier, it will make crystal clear that the equalization battles of the past two years have been won.

Two years ago Nebraska was a crazy patchwork quilt of varying assessments ranging from 13 percent to 75 percent on different types of property in different areas. The state Supreme Court ordered equalization and Gov. Crosby and the board took the courageous steps which brought all kinds of trouble on their head.

The picture is far from perfect even yet. But the principle has been established that all property should be assessed near the 50 percent level. And the principle has been established that the state should be assessed somewhere near parity.

The peacefulness of this year's equalization hearings will only emphasize the victory for principles won in hard-fought struggles the past two years. Nebraska has accepted the ideal of equalization.

New Chairman

Tom Dredla, Crete attorney, took over as chairman of the State Board of Control. Retiring from the board after 8 1/2 years was William Diers of Gresham, whose replacement is William Hulsizer of Omaha. Diers, who had to weather a number of storms as chairman, including last year's Penitentiary probe, said that he thought the most important of his term of office was the improvement of the mental health program. Since he came to the board, the practice of being sure hot meals were being served to mental patients was started.

The development of the "early cure" method of treating these unfortunates also commenced in Diers' time. Dredla, who has been on the board since 1951, indicated few changes except possible appointment of a personnel director to take some of the load off the Board's shoulders. This may be a partial answer to the criticism that the Board has busied itself with too many details.

Approval

The State Board of Health gave approval to going ahead with the use of the controversial Salk polio vaccine.

Had the board voted "No" it would have been a major development. The board also found itself with the unhappy task of trying to figure out ways of continuing Health department functions in view of the drastic cuts in the

budget by the Legislature. The department got \$180,000 in its main budget account two years ago. It asked \$218,000 because of sharp cuts in federal funds. But the Legislature gave it only \$170,000. This will mean slashing hospital inspection services, laboratory testing, and general disease work. Board Chairman J. E. M. Thomson of Lincoln quipped, "Maybe we need a standing job by committee." Member Mrs. Fred Herrington of Lincoln said a job of selling to the public the importance of the Department's health work is necessary before the next Legislature.

Salary Check

The State Board of Education, facing a somewhat similar problem, decided to look at some proposed salary increases within the Department of Education. The board also had some harsh things to say about an accreditation handbook used by the department. It was called "gobbledygook" and "going around the mulberry bush." However, department officials said it has been used since 1949 and has helped improve standards in many Nebraska schools.

Res Stays

State Engineer L. N. Res decided to keep his \$12,000 job, turning down a \$15,000 a year offer to head a national highway research project at La Salle, Ill. It was a hard decision because there was a great amount of prestige connected with the proposed post. At one time reportedly Res told Gov. Anderson he was going. But Anderson asked him to hold off a final decision. The fact that a number of close relatives live in Nebraska is believed to have influenced his decision in the end.

Editor's Death

The death of Vic Turney, editor of the Wakefield Republican, brought to an end a great oceanic crusade to keep State Highway 35 from being relocated between Wayne and Wakefield. Mr. Turney kept in the hair of the State Highway department for years with front page articles and editorials in which he condemned the department, state officials, metropolitan newspapers, or anyone else he felt wanted the road changed. Regardless of the merits of his effort, it was striking proof that a small town weekly can be an effective force in the affairs of a state.

HERE AND THERE... With Your County Agent By Harold Ingalls

Bob Roselle has this to say about the corn borer situation this week. Egg deposits increased during the past week. Counts of over 400 egg masses per 100 plants have been reported from Northeast counties. Borers from earlier eggs have hatched, and are beginning to bore into tassels whorls and mid-ribs. Cool weather in early June is responsible for this spread of stages. With normal weather fields requiring spraying in Northeast counties should be sprayed this week. All fields should be observed closely. Heavy egg deposition is observed on small corn. Likely, these fields will require spraying. Treat immediately when 75 percent of plants show leaf feeding by little borers.

Spray with 1 1/2 pounds of actual DDT (3 quarts of 25% emulsifiable concentrate) per acre. Use ground or aerial sprayers. Most ground sprayers can run at 40-80 pounds pressure, delivering about 10 gallons per acre. Aerial sprays should deliver 3-5 gallons per acre.

Sweet corn will likely be heavily infested with European corn borers. These plots should be sprayed about every 7 days with a 1.25% DDT spray, or dusted with 3/4 or 1 1/2% DDT dust.

Livestock Circulars Available A new circular published by the Agricultural Extension Service of the University of Nebraska, tells about how to use top-quality lime on your farm.

Wilbur Klingler, assistant extension agronomist in soils is the author of the popular publication. He points out that the value of liming material for correcting soil acidity depends on purity, fineness and moisture content.

The publication describes these three factors and also lists liming recommendations. Copies of the circular are available from your Extension office. The number of the publication is CC-424.

Spraying Sorghum Sorghum is generally tolerant to 2.4-D when 4 to 18 inches high. Severe injury may occur when 2.4-D is applied to sorghum less than three inches tall. Sorghum should not be sprayed from just prior to heading through blooming stage. Rates of 1/4 to 1/2 lb. of 2.4-D per acre are suggested.
