

## Anderson Defers No. 35 Relocation Action

### Commissioners Set 1955 Budget Meet

#### Valuation Drop Forces Levy Boost

Wayne county commissioners will hold a public hearing on the 1955 budget on Wednesday at the 1955 building.

A tentative levy of 6.28 mills has been set in the budget summary issued by the commissioners today. This represents an increase of .66 mills over the 1954 levy.

Part of the increase was forced by a \$200,000 drop in the county's valuation. The remainder was necessary to make up for decreased balances in the county bridge and road funds.

This year's total valuation is \$28,300,000 compared to \$29,300,000 in 1954. Thus, each mill levied in 1955 will bring about \$300 less than last year.

Final adoption of the budget will probably follow Wednesday's hearing. Clerk A. B. Bickel reported a 1955 budget requirements total about \$1,100,000, a drop of approximately \$80,000 over a year ago. There is a possibility another \$3,000 might be dropped from the total if savings can be effected in election expenses.

General bridge, road and special mill route funds take the biggest requirements. Only increase in these four was in the general and this could be cut if the election costs are saved. The mill route fund requirements were cut about \$9,000 over last year.

This levy for the general fund will remain the same as last year, 2.30 mills. Bridge fund levy was increased from 1.35 to 1.60 mills because cash on hand is about \$9,000 less than last year.

An increase from 1.10 to 1.65 mills was made in the road fund for the same reason. Here the decrease in cash on hand is about \$4,000.

A drop of .17 mills was made in the county relief levy since about \$3,000 more is on hand than a year ago. A .03 increase was necessary in the county fair because of the decreased valuation.

Persons who wish to enter objections, suggestions or corrections to the budget are urged to attend Wednesday's hearing. A detailed statement of the 1955 budget and announcement of the hearing will be found on page 6 of this section.

### County Bond Sales Near Halfway Mark

Wayne county savings bond sales for the first six months of 1955 totalled \$367,368.75, Chairman Henry E. Loy reported this week. This represents 46.6 percent of the county goal for the year.

Percentages for the year: North-west, Nebraska counties are: Pierce, 53.5; Cedar, 52.0; Dixon, 44.3; Columbus, 42.2; Stanton, 42.1; and Thurston, 37.4.

### File Damage Suit For \$15,000 in Car Death Case

The suit asks \$15,000 for the youth's death, \$545 for funeral expense and \$5 for medical expense. The defendants have until Aug. 5 to answer the charges.

Otte was taken to Sioux City Wednesday for surgery to correct the depressed cheek bone he received with the fracture.

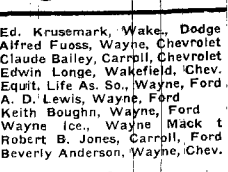

Entries will start Friday. Specific deadlines for divisions are listed in the fair book. One of the general rules specifies that all entries must be made by 6 p. m. Saturday, Aug. 13 and in place by 9:30 p. m. the same day. All live stock is covered by this provision. The secretary pointed out.

### Warn Farmers of Corn Delivery July Deadline

County ASC officials are taking grade and moisture samples of seeded corn now for farmers who plan to deliver to satisfy crop loans. County ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell said today.

Farmers have until July 31 to decide whether to redeem or deliver their 1952 stored corn. Crops from 1953 and 1954 may be redeemed, resorted or delivered, Sundell said.

### Warn Farmers of Corn Delivery July Deadline

If corn is resorted and kept on the farm, CCC will pay a storage fee of 15 cents a bushel providing it is kept under loan the full 12-month period. If the loan is repaid before the year is up, the storage fee will be prorated for the time the corn was under loan.

If the decision depends on storage space, Sundell said, storage facility loans are available to cover up to 80 percent of the storage facility.

### Crops - Weather

Warm, muggy weather the past week, aided by 1.36 inches of rain has boosted Wayne county's crop outlook. The weather is helping up fast and small grains are ripening well.

Oats harvest has started and yields in many cases are running above expectations, Oscar Johnson, who farms north of Dixon, reported a yield of 88 bushels per acre on a 10-acre field.

Temperatures have remained in the 80's and 90's during daytime hours, reaching the week's high of 94 last Wednesday. Nights have been warm, with lows ranging from 62 to 68 degrees.

A hard rain last Wednesday afternoon and evening soaked the Wayne vicinity with 1.36 inches of moisture and traces were recorded at other points.

Temperatures are recorded 8 a.m. to 8 a.m. and rainfall from 5 p.m. to 5 p.m.

### Wakefield Opponents Ask Supreme Court's Decision

Wednesday noon—Gov. Victor Anderson, in an exclusive interview with Wayne Herald editors, said he will ask the State Highway department to defer any work on the proposed relocation of Highway 35 between Wayne and Wakefield until a Supreme Court judgment on the constitutionality of LB 187 is obtained.

"I feel this is the fair thing to do," Anderson said. "Now is the time to test the law and settle the question before we start shifting equipment to maintain the additional mileage of state highways included in the law. We don't want to start maintaining these highways and then find they are county roads."

Attorney Frank Merrison, who represents the relocation opposition, told the governor he will make every endeavor to present the question to the Supreme Court by next week.

No actual suit can be brought before the high court until Sept. 18 when the bill becomes law, but the declaratory judgment can be obtained sooner.

### Controversy over the relocation of Northeast Nebraska's Highway 35 raged on this week as opponents of the move signified their intention to carry the battle before the State Supreme Court.

In a meeting with Gov. Victor Anderson Monday, the opposition asked that action on relocation be suspended until the Supreme Court decided the constitutionality of a section of LB 187 adopting an Alternative Highway commission map as the state highway system.

Gov. Anderson told the group he would confer with the attorney-general and announce Tuesday whether the relocation would be held up. His reply had not been made public Wednesday morning.

The Supreme Court will be asked for a declaratory judgment on the proposed relocation between Wayne and Wakefield. An original action opinion will probably be asked by the opposition before the high court settles the next week, Frank Merrison, Lincoln attorney for the group said.

Morrison said his clients felt the state constitution prohibits the Legislature from adopting a detailed highway map. He cited Article 3, Section 16, which says the Legislature shall not pass "local or special laws" laying out highways.

Statehouse attorneys said the Legislature's adoption of an integrated, statewide network of highways, the highway act, would be "local or special" highway law. They declared themselves ready to defend the revamped state highway system adopted by the Legislature. Optimism was expressed that the new system would stand up against the court attack.

If the bill is found unconstitutional by the court, the state would find itself without an official highway system. Some officials expressed the opinion that a special session of the Legislature would be almost unavoidable in such a situation.

State Engineer L. N. Ness, present at Monday's meeting, pointed out his department is now negotiating with various counties for the maintenance of the 404 miles of additional roads the state will take over when the contested bill becomes a law Sept. 18.

All these carefully-laid plans would be useless if the bill is unconstitutional, Ness said.

## Quality, Temperature Vital Elements in New Egg Rules

### 60 Attend Meeting at Wakefield

About 60 interested Northeast Nebraskans attended a meeting at the Wakefield high school auditorium Friday night to discuss and hear explanations of the state's new egg quality law.

Conducting the meeting were Glenn Thacker and E. Win Schultz. University extension poultrymen, and Wyatt Cannady, department of agriculture inspector, who will administer the new law.

The new law, which takes effect Sept. 18, is aimed at assuring better quality for the housewife when she purchases eggs. Thacker said. He said it is also hoped it will encourage the farmer of a stabilized egg market.

Proper handling will be a prime requisite under the law, Thacker said. He said it is hoped the average of 49 days between hen and housewife can be reduced to keep quality high.

Cannady went through each section of the new law and explained it to the audience.

One of the main provisions of the law is that it is illegal to sell eggs below grade B quality at retail or to food purveyors.

This does not apply to sales made by producers from eggs produced by their own flocks. Thus a farmer can still sell directly to the housewife.

Another provision is that it is illegal to sell eggs below grade A quality advertised as fresh eggs, ranch eggs or farm eggs or to represent the same as fresh.

Of main interest to wholesalers is the provision that all eggs for human consumption shall be held at a temperature not higher than 60 degrees with 70 percent humidity after being received at the point of first purchase.

Cannady explained that this will not force refrigeration of route truck since costs for such measures would be prohibitive.

He added that the new law would cause the egg buyer to buy more carefully, if the producer doesn't bring in good marketable eggs, the buyer will have to turn them down.

He also said that with the pro-

ducer marketing eggs often and keeping them in a cool place, the price that which eggs offered for sale without denoting the quality and size on the advertisement.

All cartons or containers of eggs offered for sale must bear a label denoting quality, size and name of the producer, dealer, retailer or agent by whom the eggs were graded or marked.

A series of license fees was also specified, varying from \$2 to \$200 depending on the size of the dealer or wholesaler.

Quality Measures

Schultz described means for producers to keep quality high before eggs are marketed. He listed time, temperature and humidity as the three vital elements.

He urged gathering of eggs several times daily and storing them in a cool place. He also suggested

## Wool Producers Get Ballots for Referendum

Ballots have been mailed to 51 townships in Wayne county for their vote on a referendum to decide whether or not deductions will be made from wool payments to finance the wool marketing program, County ASC chairman Carl O. Sundell said today.  
Sundell said all ballots must be returned to the County ASC office by 5 p. m. Aug. 19.  
Results of the vote will be based on the number of sheep represented by the growers. Outcome of the voting will be available about Sept. 1.

Wool growers will decide if they should put into effect a recent agreement between the Secretary of Agriculture and the American Sheep Producers council providing for deductions from wool incentive and leasing and yearling sheep (pulled wool compensating) payment made to producers under the National Wool Act of 1954.

These deductions would provide for advertising and other promotions to entangle and improve the lamb and wool market.  
Before an agreement can be put into effect producers owning at least two-thirds of the lambs represented by those voting must approve.

Producers owning sheep six months or older for at least 30 days since Jan. 1, 1955 will be eligible to cast individual votes.  
If the eligible owner is a member, stockholder or has a contract with a cooperative association of producers that will cast votes for its members, the voter should not cast an individual ballot, Sundell said.

If the referendum is approved deductions from payments of the 1955 incentive program made in 1956 will be one cent a pound from wool payments and five cents a hundred pounds live weight from lamb and yearling payments.

more frequent marketings.  
Incubating eggs, he said temperature should be below 60 degrees but above 29. It is advisable to rotate heat out of the eggs rapidly he added. Humidity should be high, but not to high, he said. He suggested ample circulation around cases. Caves and basements are ideal storage places, he stated.  
In conclusion he said fast time to market should be substituted for slow time to market. He controlled. When time can't be controlled, he suggested adding extra temperature controls.  
Use of these practices, he said, will mean more AA and A grade eggs for the housewife.

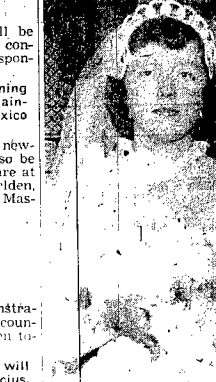

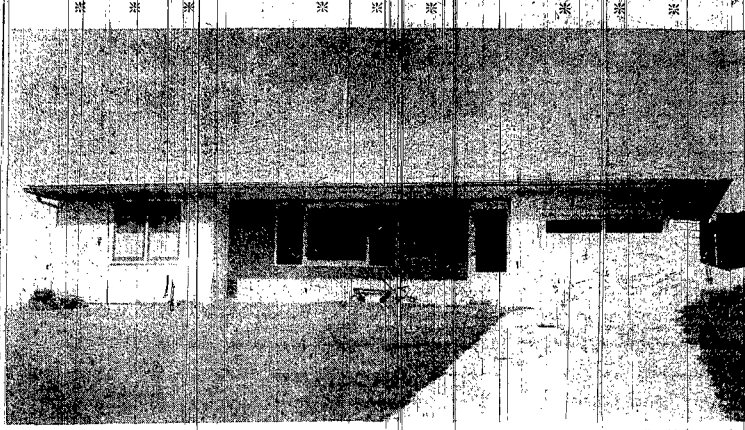

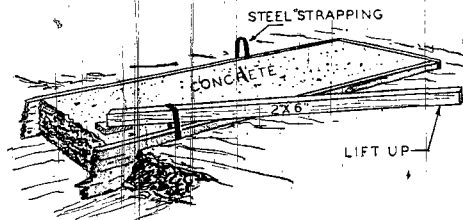
## Historic Mansion Protected By Fire-Resistant Roof



Historic Blount Mansion in Knoxville, Tenn., stands as one of the oldest examples of colonial architecture away from the eastern seaboard. ### Strip Concrete Forms

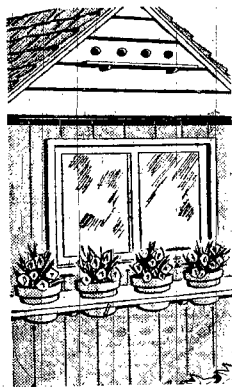


The uses of concrete are endless—and so are the handyman tricks that go with it. One trick is to lay a concrete walk so that the wooden forms around it can be stripped up afterwards without gouging the soil. To do this, American Builder magazine suggests nailing steel loops to the forms beforehand. Then, once the concrete hardens, the worker can quickly remove them by placing a pole through the loops and lifting, as in the illustration. The forms will come up without trouble, particularly if the steel loops have been greased on the inside of the forms.

Your own sweet comfort is one of the best yardsticks for judging fuel savings resulting from a home insulated with mineral wool. ## 'Built-in' Sun Filters Protect Roof

The hot summer sun can be an enemy. Without protection from the sun, each can be harmed considerably.

Sunbathers protect themselves with a lotion, which helps them gain a golden tan, and yet prevents the sun's rays from driving natural oils out of the skin. Depletion of these oils causes the skin to dry out, burn, and blister.

If the sun becomes too strong, sunbathers can always pack up



and head for the nearest shade. Houses can't do this, though. All summer long they must bake in the sun without relief. If it were not for the protection offered by today's building materials, they might be damaged beyond repair within the space of a few seasons.

Asphalt shingles on the roof, for example, have their own "built-in" sun filters in the form of opaque mineral granules embedded in the asphalt. These form a protective coating and prevent the active rays of the sun from evaporating the oils out of the asphalt. The granules seal in the oils and lengthen the life of the shingles.

The mineral granules, moreover, give asphalt roofing its colorful beauty. They are manufactured in a wide variety of solid and blended colors, made permanent because the color pigments are "fired" into the granules by a process similar to ceramics.

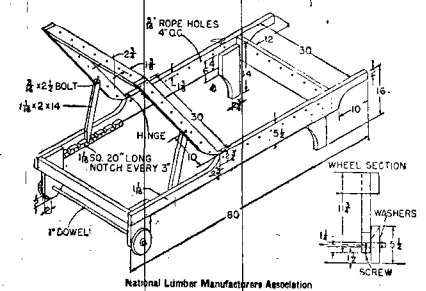
### MAKE A CHAISE LONGUE

A wheel-barrow chaise longue for the lawn is easy to make into sun or shade.

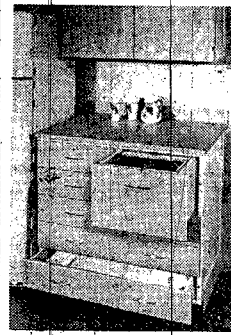
