

An 'Wayne County Fair to Open Sunday; Expect Record Entry List

Thrill Show Parade Set Downtown

Exhibitors and fair board members are working feverishly this week in addition to 3,000 programs were distributed by the fair board in the surrounding territory.

With the fair opening Sunday exhibitors have been asked to have all exhibits in place by 9:30 p. m. Saturday.

Sunday's grandstand program will open at 2 p. m. with a concert by the Wayne County Fair Band (or Six or Seven) German band under the direction of Pat Atkins.

Aut Swenson's Thrillcade is slated for two performances Sunday afternoon and evening.

A big parade of Thrillcade performers, trick riders and stuntmen is on tap for downtown Sunday at 1:30 p. m. Thrillcade officials said 10 to 15 cars, three large trucks and "many" motorcycles will be seen.

One feature of the parade will be a juggler performing atop a car while bicyclists do trick and fancy riding.

Thrillcade performances are slated at 4:30 p. m. and 8 p. m. at the fairgrounds, their only showing at a county fair in Nebraska this year.

Judging of domestic, agricultural, women's open class and 4-H exhibits will be Saturday with open class show judging Sunday.

Midway's program calls for judging of 4-H and open class swine and sheep.

Windsie's band will furnish the grandstand concert at 2 p. m., followed by stock car racing and a full afternoon of entertainment by performers from Marlo shows.

Windsie's band will repeat for the evening performance at 7 p. m. New and different acts for grandstand patrons will follow the concert.

Children's Day Tuesday will be Children's day with all rides on the midway operating for 10 cents during the matinee.

Open class beef cattle and 4-H beef cattle will be judged Tuesday. The 4-H style review is slated for 1:30 p. m. in the 4-H building.

Afternoon entertainment will begin at 2 p. m. with a band concert, followed by another afternoon of thrilling stock car races and stage attractions.

Highlight of the grandstand show Tuesday evening will be presentation of the 4-H grand champion beef and parade at 7:30 p. m. Following the band concert. A full evening of stage entertainment is on tap after the parade.

The big WHO Barn Dance frolic will be the feature of Wednesday's entertainment. This show will have only one performance, starting at 8 p. m.

Guernsey Show A free Guernsey parish show and milking demonstration will be before the grandstand in the afternoon.

Most county implement and appliance dealers plan exhibits at the fair, showing latest developments in their respective lines. One feature of the exhibits will be a walking talking refrigerator in an appliance dealer's booth.

Fair board members, Chamber of Commerce members and fair boosters have worked diligently to make the 1955 fair an outstanding success.

Two booster trips covered 300 miles and 21 Northeast Nebraska towns. First section of the boosters covered towns east of Wayne Friday, followed by a tour of the western part of the area Tuesday.

Nearly 500 man-hours by 60 workers went into the two-day project. Distributed on the trips were 5,000 advertising items promoting the fair, including window cards, programs, bumper signs, fair books, balloons, counter signs and bicycle cards.

Wayne's Hungry Six band, directed by Pat Atkins, accompanied the first section of the booster trip, playing for crowds in every town hit.

Highlight of the Friday trip was participation in the Wisner Horse show parade and a street concert by the Hungry Six for more than an hour.

White hats worn by the boosters made them stand out in the crowds.

Tuesday 15 members of the Wayne High school band provided music under Atkins' direction.

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Start Canvassing Wayne for Experimental Station Funds

Ak-Sar-Ben Gives \$1000 For Project

Solicitation of Wayne business to purchase memberships in the Northeast Nebraska Experimental Farm association will start today, with members of the Chamber of Commerce agricultural committee and directors of the farm group, taking part.

Businessmen will be asked to purchase the \$25 memberships to help finance purchase of the farm site.

No state experimental station has soil and climate problems peculiar to those found in Northeast Nebraska.

Explaining the urgency of the situation, Albert Watson, acting head of the organization, said that such a project must receive the support of the whole area in it is to succeed. Experiments at the farm would be of value to all farmers and businessmen in this section of the state, he explained, and would help.

A \$1,000 check from Ak-Sar-Ben Banker the treasury of the Northeast Nebraska Experimental Farm association last week. Announcement of the donation was made at a meeting of the association directors Friday night at Hotel Morrison.

Albert Watson said Tuesday that experimental books are planned to operate at county fairs in the area. Here members may be purchased and arms of the group explained.

Watson recently met with Carroll Lions club to explain the purpose of the farm and enlist aid in raising funds for purchase of land.

He also is seeking a meeting with Winesie Community club for the same purpose.

Watson Tuesday emphasized the importance of getting sufficient funds for the farm in this current campaign.

"If the people miss this chance, few persons living here today will ever see an experimental farm in Northeast Nebraska," he said.

He also said that many persons had the mistaken idea that such farms are purchased by University funds.

This is not true, he explained, saying that some of the farms were acquired by donations, lease or subscription.

Alliance experimental station was a county farm donated to the state for experimental purposes. Scottsbluff farm is land donated to the University by the federal government.

The sandy land experimental farm at Pierce, however, was purchased by funds raised through subscriptions then turned over to the University Extension service or operation and experimentation.

The farm now being sought by the Northeast Nebraska group would be purchased by funds raised through memberships selling at \$25 each. Once purchased, the farm would be operated by Extension service personnel.

No farm has been purchased for this purpose. Present directors of the experimental farm association have no authority to See EXPERIMENTAL—page 2

Kiwanis Hears Yankton Man

Wayne Kiwanis Monday heard part of the problems and assets Gavins Point dam and Lewis and Clark lake have brought to Nebraska and South Dakota.

Eugene H. Stearns, manager of Yankton, S. D., Chamber of Commerce, told the service club members that a reciprocity agreement between South Dakota and Nebraska is a must.

As it now stands, he said, no Nebraska can legally fish or hunt from the South Dakota bank unless he has a South Dakota license. A non-resident Nebraska license is required for a South Dakota license to fish or hunt from the Nebraska shore.

With the added recreational use expected of the Missouri river and Lewis and Clark lake, reciprocity agreements are necessary.

Stearns also said about 350 applications had been received from Nebraska residents for cabin sites on the South Dakota side of the lake.

The stable water line of the lake is its greatest recreational asset. Stearns told the Kiwanis a fluctuation of three or four feet is the maximum change anticipated.

Stearns also showed maps of the area and distributed pamphlets explaining the Missouri river project.

Relocation Opponents File Lincoln District Court Suit

High Court Refuses to Take Case

Wakefield opponents of the relocation of Highway 35 between Wayne and Wakefield took another step Tuesday to try to prevent the project.

Lancaster district court was asked Tuesday for a declaration of judgment on the constitutionality of LB 187, establishing a state highway system, which was passed by the 1955 Legislature.

When the State Supreme court refused a petition from the Wakefield group as an original action Monday, opponents then took their suit to district court.

In addition to having LB 187 and a state highway map adopted with the bill declared "null and void," the suit seeks to enjoin Gov. Victor Anderson and State Engineer L. N. Riss from making, altering or abandoning any highways or roads, especially Highway 35, or spend any money on any highway purposed to be created by the LB 187 map.

Plaintiffs are: Merle Hazen, South Sioux City mayor; William Fawcett, Knox county board chairman; Doyle Hanson, Dixon county board chairman; John Kinney, Wayne; Joseph Beckenhauer, Wakefield; City of Wakefield and Northeast Nebraska Rural Public Power district.

Named defendants were Gov. Anderson, Riss and Attorney General Clarence Breck.

The suit charges the "amended highway map" on which relocation of Highway 35 is proposed has never approved by the advisory Highway commission and was filed with the Legislature "by an unknown person."

Gov. Anderson told the relocation opponents last month that he would hold up the relocation until there has been a chance to settle the issue in court. He said that he was thought the decision could be secured "within a very reasonable length of time."

Gov. Anderson is in Chicago this week attending the annual governor's conference and could not be reached for comment.

State Engineer Riss said that the Wakefield group said Tuesday he interpreted the governor's remarks as meaning a final court settlement, not a ruling that by the Supreme court Monday.

It might take many months for the suit to be decided, though appealed to the Supreme court.

The Supreme court gave no reason for rejecting the proposed lawsuit. But it was pointed out. See RELOCATION—page 2

Two Ask Council Planning on Northwestern Residential Area

Plans for housing expansion in the northwest corner of Wayne posed problems for Wayne's city council at its regular meeting Tuesday night.

Don Emery and William Finn appeared before the council to ask what the council planned for the one-half block west of Douglas street between Twelfth and Thirtieth.

Bulk of the lots in the area are owned by Emery and Finn. A single lot is owned by Merle Lessman. Emery and Finn expressed their desire to make the area a residential area. They said Lessman had signified his intent to erect a commercial building on his property.

After considerable discussion the council granted a building permit to Emery for a \$14,000 residence on his 23x150-ft. lot on the northwest corner of Twelfth and Douglas. He said he was planning to build a 191-x80-ft. residence on the lot.

The council advised Emery to try to work out an agreement with Lessman so he could secure adjoining lots. Emery now owns five lots in the area but four are separated from the other by Lessman's property. Emery said he plans to build on the isolated lot.

Two other permits came in for consideration Tuesday. Paul R. Mines was granted a \$13,000 permit to remodel and add a 38x49 extension to the Safeway store.

A request for a \$10,000 residential permit at West Eleventh by Robert Goodell was held until a drainage problem can be worked out. The council advised Goodell that he and Don Denbeck, owner of the other lots in the block, would be required to pay the cost of a drainage tube to a nearby storm sewer.

Mayor Glen Hundersheid was authorized to contract with the Zigg's company, York, for painting and cleaning the city water tank. Cost was set at \$900. Zigg's will also move the overflow pipe on the outside of the tank for an additional \$250.

Building committee members were authorized to investigate possibility of an air conditioner for the city clerk's office.

The council also heard a representative of the Northern Manufacturing company explain recent power equipment development.

Engineer J. M. Thornburg is currently preparing a survey which will make recommendations concerning expansion of the current city light plant facilities.

Urge Farmers to Return Ballots On Wool Payment

County ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell this week urged all Wayne county wool growers to return their ballots on the marketing agreement referendum.

Sundell said ballots were mailed to county sheep and wool growers July 14. Deadline for marking and returning ballots is Aug. 19.

If the agreement is favored by the producers of at least two-thirds of the sheep and lambs owned by those voting, one cent per pound would be deducted from each grower's 1955-clip incentive payment. This fund would be used for advertising and sales promotion programs conducted by the American Sheep Producers council.

Deductions for the same purpose in an amount to be determined, but not exceeding one cent per pound, would also be made from wool payments for 1956, 1957 and 1958 clips.

A favorable vote would also authorize deductions, at the rate of five cents per hundredweight, from the 1955 crop on lambs and yearlings moved to slaughter with the wool on.

The National Wool act of 1954 provides for incentive payments to wool growers to encourage increased domestic production of wool. Payments will be based on a percentage of the average price growers receive for their wool.

Amount of the payment will be such as to bring the average return to growers to 62 cents per pound.

Actual ownership of lambs and yearlings at least 30 days before slaughter is required for the payments, Sundell said. Application for payment and necessary ownership certification must be sent to the county ASC office. Application forms are available at the county office.

Payments will be made after all records of 1955 wool sales made in 1955 are filed.

Stronger Steer Market Forecast

Thirteen percent more cattle were on feed July 1 as compared to last year, reports USDA.

This situation should be considered very carefully by cattle feeders, according to T. W. Fife, Manager of Producers Commission association, Sioux City.

Fife also pointed out some other important factors:

The large total meat supply and reduction of money spent for meat has hurt the steer trade.

Actually, six percent less steers have been marketed than last year, but 17 percent more heifers and 12 percent more cows, has increased total beef output. Floor slaughter is up 18 percent and lambs up five percent.

Consumers have not crowded the meat counters as much as last year. Proportionately, less money was spent for meat by a consuming public with a near record large income. People like meat and this situation should reverse there is some indication that it has already started.

Furthermore, steer marketings should decrease seasonally from now until next year. This indicates a stronger fed steer market.

The increase of nine percent in spring pig farmings and 11 percent increase intended for this fall points to an abundance of pork.

Hog producers will likely not carry hogs to as heavy weights, as last year. It didn't pay then. This will start the movement earlier, so that supplies of pork will increase gradually from now on.

Heavy steers, which have plagued the market recently, are still numerous enough, but should let up before too long.

How to Keep Cool in Summer

Is your home a hot trap or a haven from summer heat? There's no substitute for your-round air conditioning, but if your budget isn't quite ready for it, here are some interim measures you can take to keep cool:

1. Insulate walls and ceilings (this is the first step and a must for efficient and economical air conditioning, anyway). In a house already built, this means blowing in enough mineral wool to fill up the hollow spaces in the walls. In an attic floor, pour or blow in at least four inches of mineral wool, or install batts or blankets. If you plan to convert the attic to living space, insulate between the roof rafters.
2. Ventilate the house with an attic fan. Early in the evening turn on the fan, open the attic passageway, and the windows.

One in Five Title 1 Loans For Insulation

Despite a near-record year for new home construction, 1954 saw even greater activity in the improvement of existing houses. More than a million and a half property improvement loans \$891,000,000 worth, were insured by the Federal Housing Administration under its Title 1 program against an estimated 1,000,000 new housing starts. Loans not insured by FHA brought the home improvement total still higher.

Home insulation was the most popular type of project financed with FHA property improvement loans. One out of every five loans paid for an insulation job in New Hampshire and Vermont, over half of all loans insured by the FHA were for home insulation. In Virginia, two out of five FHA loans were for insulation, with Tennessee, Georgia, and Alabama following among the Southern states.

These figures accord with a consistent rise in sales reported by the National Mineral Wool Association. Sales of insulation batts and blankets and loose mineral

HERE'S HOW...

MAKE A BICYCLE RACK

A designated place for the child's bicycle encourages care of the vehicle.

First, make the two sides, B and B-1, from 1 by 8-inch lumber, each 72 inches long, rounded at one end. Then cut a 2 by 4 to make post D, notching the lower end to accommodate the two sides, and rounding the top.

Bottom members, E and E-1, are ripped to fit snug with D and between B and B-1, approximately 2 inches.

Supports A and A-1 are cut to match in outline, Notch A, at center, 3 1/2 inches wide and 6 inches deep.

Then fasten the rack together using No. 10, flathead wood screws, countersunk. Try the bicycle in the uncompleted rack to determine the placement of braces C and C-1; these must allow for the front axle. Cut the braces to fit and fasten them to D and E.

All exposed edges should be beveled or rounded. Paint or enamel rack to match bicycle.

Ready-Mixed Easy to Handle

A lot of the grief encountered in plastering walls and ceilings is reduced by a new ready-mixed lightweight gypsum basecoat plaster. American Builder magazine, light construction industry publication, observes that only water need be added to the packaged plaster at the job site.

The material, which has a mortar weight less than half that of wet sanded plaster, is easier to handle, and gives joints less weight to carry.

It eliminates the necessity of mixing aggregate with the plaster. Thus, American Builder says the hazard of bad sand and over-sanding is avoided, at the same time assuring a strong plaster.

The gypsum plaster mix is also more fire-resistant than sanded plaster.

Sliding Window Lifts from Frame For Easy Cleaning

Until someone invents a window pane that stays clean without washing, window manufacturers are concentrating their attention on making their products easier for the housewife to clean.

Many wood windows now are made with sash that slip easily out of the frame so they can be washed easily and conveniently inside the room. The latest is the sliding window, the kind which slides from side to side, instead of up and down. The sash fits right out with a slight pressure applied at the top.
