County Board Sets 1955 Levies; Majority Boosted

Sundell Urges Farmers to Decide on Resealing Corn

Suits Withdrawn On School Site

Litigation between the Wayne City School board and Mr. and Mrs. Lyle Peterson has been settled out of court, it was announced this week.

After agreeing on a purchase price of \$15,000 for the one-acre tract, the interested parties agreed to withdraw suits pending in county and district courts.

Petersons agreed to withdraw their suit for partition in equity in district court. The school board agreed to drop condemnation proceedings in county court.

Board President Paul Mines said the board has no immediate construction plans but was merely acquiring the site for anticipated future expansion of facilities.

Wayne Levy Jumped to 44.94 Mills

Wayne county's 1955 tax levies were announced this week by County Clerk C. A. Bard after they were approved by county commissioners. With few exceptions the levies are increased because of lower valuations.

Commissioners set the county levy at 5.18 mills. This compares with 5.52 in 1954. Increases were necessary in levies for county bridge and roads funds because balances on hand were considerably below those of a year ago.

State assessment will take nearly \$500,000 more from county taxpayers (than it did in 1954). State levies is 9.20 mills as against 7.71 a year ago. This means the state will receive about \$267,000 in county tax money.

Rural taxpayers will pay about \$140,000 in tuition for free high school students at county high schools. About 350 students receive this tuition.

This is an increase of about \$33,000 over the levy last year. A raise in the tuition rate to \$10.50 per student per week caused the boost. The old rate was \$9.

Wayne Taxes Up \$15,000.

Wayne taxpayers will pay about \$15,000 more in taxes this year, despite an increased valuation. This was brought about by the increases in state, county and city levies.

Wayne's levy is \$44.94 per \$1,000 of valuation. Last year it was \$42.97. City taxpayers will pay \$1,000 over 1954's \$21,000 as compared with \$196,000 in 1954.

Biggest levy in the county is at Carroll with a valuation of about \$250,000. Taxpayers there will pay \$85.60 per \$1,000 of valuation. This is an increase of about \$8 per \$1,000 over 1954's \$77.60.

The table below gives a comparison of combined levies for county towns and villages for the two years. Combined levies include state, county, city and school district levies.

The governor had agreed earlier to halt any work pending application for a hearing on the highway law before the Supreme Court. The court refused to hear the proposed suit to declare the law unconstitutional.

Wakefield opponents to the relocation have since started an identical action to delay the project in Lancaster county district court.

Lincoln news sources said Wednesday the governor indicated that he "does not feel bound to his promise pending outcome of the second suit."

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Time for Decision

Discussions in the Highway 35 relocation squabble have brought out some of the most ridiculous statements made in many a moon.

Either by accident or design Gov. Victor Anderson has set himself up as a highway construction expert along with those opposing relocation.

Early in August Gov. Anderson said, "I do not believe that this (awaiting a court decision on the constitutionality of LB 187) will delay any construction plan for this season."

That means one of two things. Either there are no construction plans for this season or a quick decision was expected. State Engineer L. N. Ress told the Herald several weeks ago that his department is ready to start work immediately.

A short while later Gov. Anderson said, "It will be impossible to let any contracts for work to start this year regardless. The Highway Department will not permit the construction of a bituminous mat after Sept. 15 because of winter weather conditions."

APPLICATION OF BITUMINOUS MAT IS ONE OF THE LAST PHASES OF HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION

and usually comes a year or more after preliminary work of grading, pouring concrete structures, installing metal culverts and building bridges. This preliminary work is done any time in fact it was so done on the Hoskins-Norfolk section of Highway 35.

Back to the governor's statement regarding no delay in construction. All the governor's actions to date have served only to delay construction. What else could it be when work is held up pending an entirely unnecessary decision?

Allowing himself to be bullied by a dissident group of objectors into being "courteous" and wait for this court decision smacks of weakness. Going ahead with some projects allowed under

the law in question while deferring work on another project under the same law is certainly delay as it affects Highway 35.

The governor said at one time, "It has been my policy to not hold hearings or change decisions which were made by the previous administration."

AND IN THE NEXT INSTANT SAID: "THE GROUP THAT CALLED ON ME FROM WAKEFIELD REQUESTED THAT NO ACTION BE TAKEN UNTIL A DECISION COULD BE SECURED FROM THE SUPREME COURT."

Did the governor mean that he did not hold hearings at all . . . or that he did not hold hearings for both sides of the question? Doesn't deferring action accomplish the same purpose as reversing previous decisions?

The group objecting to relocation found no trouble getting an audience with the governor, yet he specifically asked that no delegation call on him from groups favoring relocation.

Now that the State Supreme Court has refused original jurisdiction on the constitutionality of LB 187 Gov. Anderson has to decide whether he will block further delay by waiting for a district court decision and possible appeals to the Supreme Court or stop the delay and start relocation.

Litigation starting in district court often lasts for years. A good case in point is a suit in Wayne where court battles were fought for 15 years! The same case was brought before the high court four or five times. Does Gov. Anderson expect the Highway Department to mark time for 10 years on relocating Highway 35 because of selfish interests of a small minority?

Brick Fireplace With Three Sides Gives Modern Touch to G. Criswell Home

Wall Colors Used to Tint Room Ceilings



It is not in use during the winter months, the fireplace is the outstanding feature of the home of Mr. and Mrs. George Criswell at 1099 S. 17th St., Lincoln, Neb.

Constructed of the same buff brick used for facing the exterior of the home, the fireplace extends full from the south end of the living-dining room and is open on three sides. Mrs. Criswell pointed out this design eliminates intense concentration of heat in one direction.

Whether its color scheme or the 13 x 29 linoleum floor never changes. Criswell found the ribbon window on the west wall afford ventilation and utmost privacy.

Decorative bottom carpeting was used to contrast with the floor. Further contrast is given by the 20-foot north wall, which is covered with a small pattern in a busy background design.

Throughout the home is oak woodwork with natural finish. The patio at the front is bordered on the north by a flower box. A Colorado blue spruce near the front is planted singly and three blue spruce in their front yard.

A small hallway at the front entrance has a cloak room. It is painted a deep mauve color and has a deep mauve shade of rose colors in the room. The wall of the living room is covered with a striking pattern and white marbled rubber tile.

The 11 x 12 master bedroom is

furnished with a white, heavy ash two-piece suite. The red carpet on the floor is a deep red color. Mrs. Criswell called attention to another feature of the decoration of her home. All ceilings in the home are painted with bone white which has a bit of the wall color mixed in it. This eliminates the harsh break in color otherwise noticed when plain white is used. Green, predominating color in the drapes, gives additional color to the room. The closet has sliding doors.

A second bedroom is spiced with color. The rug is a deep red. The walls spray blue and the floor is persimmon. The modern abstract design of the drapes repeats the color of the carpet.

Walls of the den are mist green. The casual design of the beige background drapes is of a different color. Their accessories according to color in the room.

White rubber tile in the bathroom floor. White plastic wall tile has chocolate feature. Bath fixtures are sand, as are the upper walls. Storage of towels is in a small closet next to the lavatory.

Bookcases made by Criswell line the north wall of the hall which leads from the dining area to the bedrooms and bath. Linen closet is on the south wall. Scatter island cabinet and a leather wallpaper set all the color one could ask for in the kitchen. Work surface of the natural finished birch cupboards are blue skylark formula. Stove is a built in surface unit with wall oven.

Criswells fenced their backyard with pine finished India rod. The fence is basket weave. They plan to build a patio in the future.

1. Have cabinet doors sandblasted at a local monument work.
2. Clean off dust with cloth dampened with solvent or thinner.
3. Apply stain. Stain should be thinned somewhat because the sandblasted pine absorbs more stain. Apply finish to a sample piece before proceeding with the job.
4. After stain has dried, sand lightly with a block of wood and sandpaper. This removes the stain from the high points of the wood and thus highlights the grain.
5. Apply one or two coats of dull-finished non-yellowing varnish or clean lacquer.

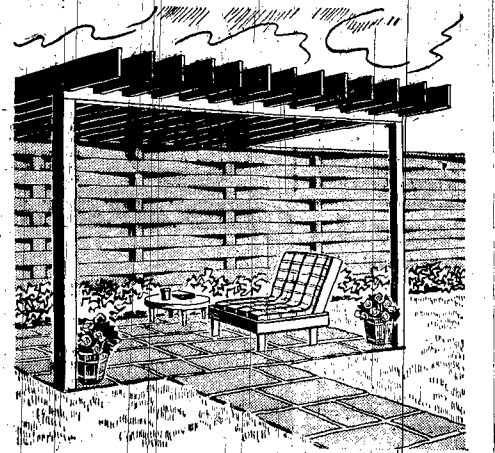

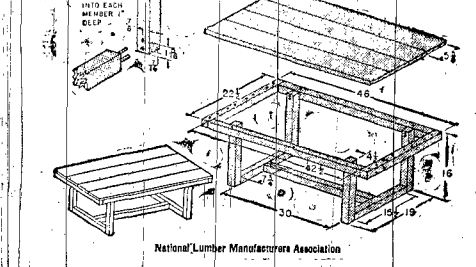
MAKE A COFFEE TABLE
