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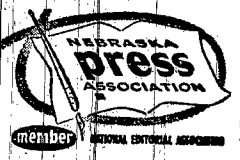

Aug. 20, 1925: Shingling of the educational exhibit hall at the Wayne county fair grounds is being completed this week under the supervision of Henry Korf. The new horse barn which will be erected this summer has been staked out a few feet east of the building used by the women's art work.

25 Years Ago

Aug. 21, 1930: Four persons were injured, none of them seriously, Sunday afternoon when a Ford car driven by Clarence Beck of Wayne, collided at an intersection with the Chevrolet driven by "Andy" Peterson, Winslow. Miss Edith Granquist, who was riding with Beck, suffered a broken collar bone, several bruises, but no cuts. Reduction in the Wayne county tax levy and the county high school

levy made Tuesday by the board of equalization and a reduction of \$1,255,000 in valuation, on land and improvements this year will make the tax less and by far the lowest of any county in this section of the state. The county general tax is fixed at 2.66 mills as compared with 2.80 mills last year. The county high school levy is .40 of a mill as compared with .30 last year.

20 Years Ago

Aug. 22, 1935: The new WPA set-up, planned to replace FEPA work which will be completed this September, will do away with the need for direct relief in the county. All those giving work under the new set-up will be paid in cash and not in credit, as under the FEPA. Wakefield's record of rainfall for this month is nearly double that in Wayne, the total being more than six inches.

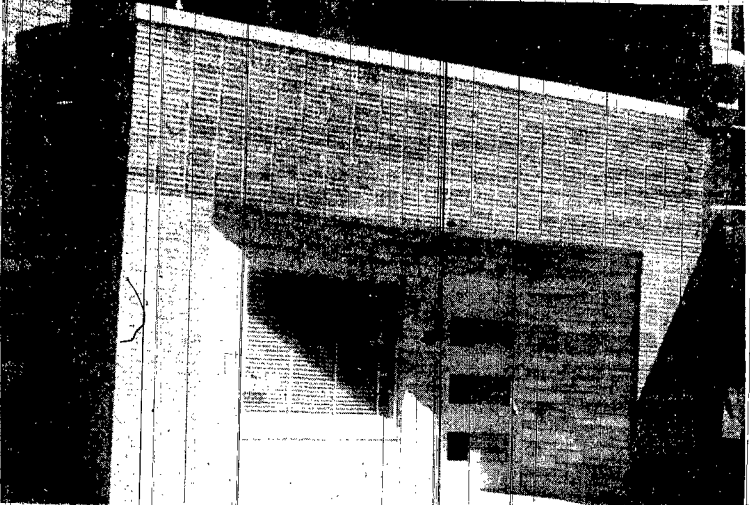

Gumwood Panels Highlight Charles McDermott Building



Newest addition to Wayne's business district is the office of County Attorney Charles McDermott on West Second. The modern one-story building is pictured above.

Stacked red Roman brick banks the recessed front of Mankato stone. The air conditioned building has a reception room, two inner offices, library and cloak, supply and rest rooms. There is a basement under the rear half of the building.

A particularly outstanding feature of the offices and reception room is the gumwood paneling. This unique wood is noted for its many different grain designs. Other walls throughout the building are grey, stoked plaster.

Floors are covered with asphalt tile which appears to be cork. Woodwork is driftwood-stained oak while doors are birch.

Ceiling ventilators are used in

the inner offices and reception room to keep air moving. An inter-office communication system is still to be installed.

A long hallway from the reception rooms opens into the inner offices and the library.

Offices of both Mr. and Mrs. McDermott are finished very similarly. Ceilings are plastered with a sunburst stroke emanating from the bronze, bowl-shaped light fixtures.

Mr. McDermott has a green desk and office chairs. Mrs. McDermott's are tan. Oak and metal bookcases on the east and north walls of the library stock the complete file of law books and references. Lighting in this room, the hall and reception room is fluorescent. A door off the library leads to the cloak, supply and rest rooms.

Today, however, units have been developed specifically for the home, conforming better to the limited space available, suited more to home needs and, what is most important, easier on the home pocketbook both in first cost and in operating cost.

There are two main types of air conditioning systems which a home-owner may buy—the room cooler, for one or two rooms and the whole-house system.

Most room units are mounted in a window and are popular wherever one room is to be cooled. But people who have learned to enjoy whole-house winter living since the stove gave way to the furnace do not want to go back to one-room living.

As a consequence the big trend is to combination heating and cooling forced air systems, because they provide whole-house year-round air conditioning in a single system.

In the combination heating and cooling forced air systems, the ducts that carry the heated air from the furnace into the rooms in the winter serve to carry the cooled and dehumidified air in the summer.

Such year-round units may be installed all at once in a new or old home or some may be installed as heating systems first and cooling added later. Or, in some cases, existing heating systems may be converted to year-round air conditioning by the addition of cooling sections.

If an air conditioning system is out of the question, the home-owner still has many ways to beat the heat to some extent.

One of the most effective ways is to insulate and ventilate the attic. Large louvers in the gable ends and a good blanket of insulation over the ceiling will prevent heat accumulation in the attic and transmission of any heat to the living quarters.

Record Year Seen for Air Conditioning

This year promises to set a new record in the installation of residential air conditioning.

Two factors, working together, have set the stage for this sharp upsurge in activity. Housewives shopping in air conditioned stores and bread-winners working in air conditioned offices have begun to feel more keenly the discomfort of their own homes.

Manufacturers have followed through with an all-out effort to develop practical, low-cost air conditioning systems for the home.

Just a few years ago, residential air conditioning installations were nothing more than cut-down versions of commercial units.

Attic fans to get rid of heat accumulation also are effective. They may be used to blow heated air out of the attic by pulling in outside air in a louver at one end and expelling the attic air out of a louver in the other end. Or mounted in the ceiling between the living quarters and attic, air can be pulled up through the house, through the windows and doors, and into the attic, whence it is expelled through the louvers.
