

## Wayne National Guard Armory Approved

### 300 by 300 Site Sought For Project

Plans for construction of a National Guard armory at Wayne were revealed to the city council at a meeting Tuesday night by Guard Commander Kenneth Whorlow.

He told the council the project has been approved by the Defense Reserve Facilities board and can get underway as soon as a tract in the city is made available for construction.

Whorlow told the council a parcel of land containing 75-90,000 square feet is necessary for the proposed building. Cost of the armory would probably be between \$140,000 and \$200,000. It would be similar to those already constructed at Fremont and Norfolk.

Facilities in the building would include an auditorium, garage and office space.

Possibilities of sites for the armory are now being considered by the council.

Discussion of the proposed expansion of the city light plant occupied most of the council's time Tuesday. They heard representatives of six engine manufacturing firms describe their wares.

J. M. Thorburn was hired as special engineer for the \$275,000 project. His fee was set at three percent of the contract with a maximum of \$5,000.

Manager Don Kollmorgen was authorized to close the swimming pool after Monday.

20 New Businesses Sprout In County in Five Years

New York, N. Y. - New businesses are being born at a steady rate in Wayne county as local residents, with the urge to be on their own, are embarking on new ventures.

The story is told in a report just issued jointly by the Department of Commerce and the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. It is based on tax reports submitted by employers under the social security program.

While the mortality among new projects is large, about a fourth of them survive and flourish after the difficult first five years.

Wayne county has, by virtue of this net growth, a total of 181 business enterprises in which there are one or more employees. This marks an increase over the 161 recorded by the same agencies five years earlier.

The gain, 22.4 percent, was more than that noted generally in the U. S., 9.9 percent, and than that in the West North Central states, 7.6 percent.

## Outline Procedures for Start Of Driver's License Renewals Must Secure New Permits By Nov. 1

Renewal of driver's licenses for Wayne county residents will start today. County Treasurer Leona Bahde announced this week.

Present licenses expire today and must be renewed before Nov. 1. Renewals for two years will be issued at the treasurer's office for \$2.

Several rules were outlined governing renewal procedures. One was of particular notice to teenage drivers.

Beginning Sept. 18, persons who are under 20 cannot secure a regular license. Instead they will be issued a special probationary permit good for one year only and costing \$1.30 per year.

Thus drivers who are 16 but under 20 have two choices:

1. If you apply for your renewal before Sept. 18 you will receive the regular license good for two years.

2. If you apply after Sept. 18 you can be issued only the one-year probationary license.

Miss Bahde also cited rules which apply to all drivers. Present licenses must be surrendered to secure a renewal. Persons who have lost their present license must secure a duplicate from the county treasurer who issued the license. Fee for this is 50 cents.

Persons who do not secure the duplicate must take the driving examination to get a new license. If your license is under suspension for any reason it cannot be renewed.

Renewals can be secured by mail. All drivers need do is send in their present license and the \$2 fee.

A new regulation concerning servicemen is also important. Persons in the service should mail their licenses for renewal.

A regulation permitting renewal of licenses for persons in the Armed Forces at the time of discharge is no longer in effect.

Servicemen who wait until after discharge to renew will be required to take the driving examination.

### Chest Drive Set; Ask 10 Agencies to Join Action

Wayne's third annual Community Chest drive has been tentatively set for Oct. 21. Chairman J. B. Probst announced this week.

Chest directors met with Rev. Probst early this week to outline plans for the 1955 drive.

The budget committee headed by Dr. John D. Rice has sent letters to 10 agencies, inviting them to combine their drives in one united campaign.

Agencies contacted included Red Cross, Salvation Army, Boy Scouts, Wayne Recreation Committee, Remedial Speech Clinic, Cancer, Heart, Arthritis and Rheumatism and Multiple Sclerosis, United Service organization and other service-connected agencies have requested inclusion in the drive.

The budget committee will meet Sept. 13 to consider requests and set a tentative quota for the drive. Other committee members are Roy Christensen, Herb Killmorgen and Henry Ley.

C. N. Olson was named drive chairman for this year. He will be assisted by Adon Jeffrey, Clarence Kuhn and Mrs. John N. Elmung.

Warren Ruskell will be in charge of the children's division. Ruskell said Wayne Boy Scouts and other youth organizations are invited to take part either as organizations or as individuals.

No window unveiling is planned for the 1955 show but merchants have been asked to have windows displaying fall merchandise. Some stores plan to use live models to display merchandise. They have been requested to build runways beyond the curb line to permit more persons to view the showings.

Last year's showing with live models brought record crowds to the event.

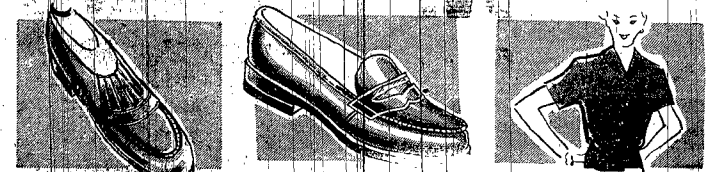

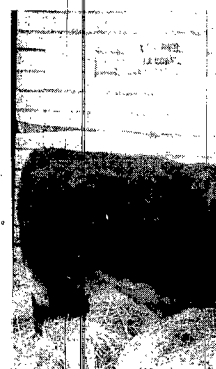
