Carl O. Sundell, Wakefield, was re-elected chairman of the Wayne County ASC committee at the annual county convention Wednesday morning at Wayne.

Luther Bard, Wakefield, was re-elected vice chairman. Third member is Lloyd Morris, Carroll, who succeeds Harry Heinemann, Wakefield. Alternates are Otto F. Gerleman and E. P. Cascoe, Wayne.

A total of 12 delegates attended. Hoskins was the only precinct not represented. The new committee will officially take office Saturday.

A reminder on corn deliveries was also issued by Sundell Wednesday. He said all 1953 and 1954-crop corn under CCC loan or purchase agreement should be delivered or resold by Friday. He added that farmers will not receive additional storage payment if the corn is not delivered by that date through some unavoidable circumstance.

Farmers who decided to re-plant their farm-stored corn will receive a 15-cent per bushel if it is stored until July 31, 1955.

Crops - Weather

Automatic furnaces began popping on with regularity last week as Northeast Nebraska was cooled by cold winds and rain.

High temperatures took a decided downward trend over the weekend as Sunday's top reading was a cool 50 degrees, recorded in a heavy drizzle. Low reading for the period was 41 degrees registered Tuesday night.

The slow rains deposited 70 inch of moisture in fields, greening pastures as it soaked in. Last Thursday's rain amounted to .04 inch and Sunday's accumulation was .66 inch.

Starting this week, the weather report will carry degree days as well as temperature and rainfall records. Degree days indicate the amount of heat required to heat a house when the average mean temperature for the day falls below 65 degrees. As the weather gets colder, degree days mount.

Degree days are obtained by adding high and low temperatures for the day, dividing by two and subtracting the answer from 65.





Lincoln There were signs this week that sales tax advocates were cranking up the engine well in advance for a major effort in the 1957 Legislature.

Nebraska Farm Bureau federation is a strong advocate for a sales tax for years. The Citizens council, a tax research organization, has been considered by informed observers to be somewhat a center of anti-sales tax activity.

Farm Bureau called the Citizens council off-base for using per capita figures in describing taxes in Nebraska and in comparing them with taxes paid in other states.

The Farm Bureau said, "Nebraska has a few more than 1.3 million citizens. Not all of these 1.3 million Nebraskans are property owners. Not even all of them own personal property which is taxed."

"When the Citizens council speaks of a per capita tax, it is implying that every man, woman and infant is contributing a share of the tax. With that sort of subterfuge the implication is that every one of the 1.3 million Nebraskans is a conscious taxpayer," said the Farm Bureau in a statement.

The farm organization's statement indicated it found particularly galling the assertions by the council that New Jersey is the only state in the Union which has lower property taxes per capita.

Hybrid Sorghum

On the basis of experimental field trials hybrids have a potential for increased yields of 20 to 40 percent over those varieties in use, a gain at least equal to that which farmers obtain from hybrid corn.

Hybrid grain sorghum seed is expected to be available to growers in limited quantities for the first time next spring. In the next five years USDA plant breeders anticipate that most of the more than 10 million acres now annually planted in open pollinated varieties of grain sorghums may be planted with hybrid hybrids. Hybrid grain sorghums have an important future on semi-arid lands that now are producing other crops, including corn, on a marginal basis.

Recently scientists of the Agricultural Research Service believe there may be several million additional acres planted to the hybrid grain sorghums as this crop advances into present day corn-growing regions. Hybrid grain sorghums are being grown in a test plot on the Richard Baker farm northeast of Wayne for the first time this year.

Fall Lawn Care

October is a good month to fertilize and to kill weeds in lawns. When the heat of summer is past, nitrogen fertilizer and water will combine to make good fall growth and store up root reserves, ready to green up early next spring.

The more concentrated fertilizers, containing 30 to 45 percent nitrogen, should be applied at the rate of one pound per square foot (15 1/2-foot square). Fertilizer containing 13 to 20 percent nitrogen should be used at the rate of two pounds per square foot. If the nitrogen content is six to twelve percent, use four or five pounds per square foot. Special lawn fertilizers usually carry instructions on the package.

If you like or don't mind clover in the lawn, it is all right to use mixed fertilizer, containing phosphorus and potash as well as nitrogen. If you object to clover, avoid the clover strains; nitrogen fertilizer rather than mixed goods.

The fertilizer will take effect more quickly if the lawn is watered thoroughly after the fertilizer is applied.

Late September and October is an ideal time for the control of many troublesome weeds in lawns. Field bindweed, juncelion, chickweed, henbit and other broadleaf plants respond equally well to either fall or spring applications of 2-4-D.

For best results, fertilize and liberally water the lawn two weeks to 10 days before applying the weed killing chemicals. Good growing conditions are essential for good results with modern hormone-type weed killers such as 2-4-D. Avoid mowing 10 days to a week prior to and after 2-4-D applications have been made. Follow the manufacturer's recommendations at all times. Spray when the wind velocity is down to about five mph or less so as to avoid drift on nearby susceptible

ornamentals or gardens.

The general public is invited to watch the barbecuing process. A hearty welcome is extended to everyone to participate in the barbecue meal Tuesday evening.





Kitchen Has New Built-in Appliances

A basket-weave redwood fence and poplar trees surround the outstanding feature of the new home, built by Mr. and Mrs. Don Denbeck at 1005 Sherman. That feature is a 25 x 40-foot swimming pool in the spacious back yard.

This rear area is completely equipped for outdoor living during the warm summer months. Beach chairs and a picnic table are stationed on the flagstone patio.

An outdoor den has a plate glass front with sliding glass door. Walls are painted beige. The work unit has marble counter-top built around the grill and barbecue pit. The room is also equipped with a red Roman brick fireplace and a juke box. The floor is covered with asphalt tile.

Exterior of the 82 x 38 home, including the double garage, is lavender painted siding with a Texas white stone front facing west. Mortar on the stone is black. The roof is white chipped marble.

Woodwork on the main floor is natural finished birch. Walls throughout the house are colored plaster.

A gold colored suite and pine green carpeting brighten the study rose walls of the living room. Other furniture is limed oak and birch. The corner fireplace was built from the same stone and mortar as the house front.

A cabinet-style television set is built in with a drawer unit. The large picture window on the west wall has both daytime and nighttime drapes. Those for day use are sheer.

Blue tangerine walls make up the 17 x 19 master bedroom. Multi-colored drapes over the corner window have a leaf design. Furniture is birch. Highlight of the four-sliding-door closet is the television set on top of the two-door middle section wardrobe. This can be viewed from the bed.

Denbeks also have here a chocolate colored, extension telephone and swinging wall lamps.

Closet in the 15 x 15 guest bedroom is like that in the master room except a pullout for skirts and sheets replaces the television.

Bedrooms also have here a chocolate colored, extension telephone and swinging wall lamps.

Nursery room for Debbie has mint green walls with birch furnishings. Drapes have a nursery pattern on rose background. The double closet has sliding doors.

The hall opening to the front door, living room, bath and bedrooms has birch paneling. Hallway features a chime door bell with clock and clothes and linen closets on the east and west walls, respectively. A large Texas stone planter box rests on the south wall at the entrance.

Ceramic nutmeg floor tile in the bathroom trimmed the ceramic tiled wall trimmed in cinnamon. Chime wall of walls is sand colored. Cabinet with built-in double lavatory has storage space below.



Green figured drapes accent the brown toned room. The room is furnished with towel closet and heater, fan and lighting on the ceiling.

Avocado telephone matches walls in the kitchen-dining room. Ranch style oak floors blend well with the bronzed birch furnishings. Charcoal and pink terrazzo linoleum cover the work area of the floor. Wall tile is pink ceramic with gray figured trim.

Cooking facilities include a four unit surface stove with broiler unit between, barbecue pit in wall and wall oven with storage space below. White designed Formica counter tops show off the natural birch cabinets. The yellow double-door refrigerator is recessed in the wall. Snack bar divides the kitchen from dining area.

Plastic glass doors lead into dining area from back door and laundry, which is equipped with washer and dryer. Cupboards and sewing space will be built later. Walls are painted flashy rose with linoleum same as kitchen.

A small washroom is between the laundry and kitchen. Fixtures are yellow against gray walls with maroon figured trim. Floor is ceramic tile.

Living in the completely finished basement are Dick Wilson, John Hansen, Paul Rockwell and Norman Ellis. Walls are feather streaked, colored plaster. Floors are covered with asphalt tile. Ceilings are acoustic tile with doors and woodwork of oak.

Corkstone floor tile is in the living room and hall to den, bath and bedrooms. Walls are mist green except for the east wall which is red roman brick. This wall features a built-in fireplace and brick flower box along the floor.

Green and tan were used on the kitchen floor with green terrazzo linoleum on walls and cabinet work surfaces. Birch cabinets are on the east wall with cabinet style sink.

Den and two bedrooms are plastered blossom pink. Den has tan floors while bedrooms have pattern worked up in two shades of tan. Bedroom closets have sliding doors. Flamingo trim show off the

beige pearl plastic tile in the bathroom. Fixtures are sand colored including the blocked off corner shower. Upper walls are turquoise. Denbeks have occupied their home since June.
