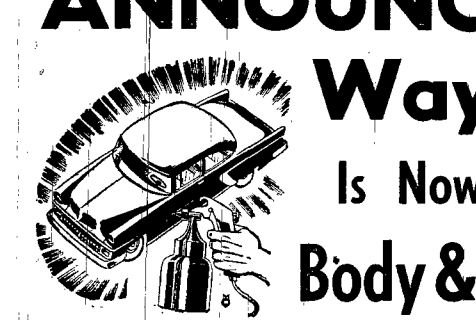



## Insulation Keeps Homes Comfortable All Year 'Round and Reduces Fuel Bills

### Owner Can Do the Job Himself

You can keep your home comfortably cool in summer, cut your winter fuel bill as much as 40 percent and save yourself from \$30 to \$100 on the job in the bargain by insulating your attic yourself.

Two people can usually complete the project in a single afternoon. You may choose from among several different types of insulating materials, as follows:

"Fill-type" insulation is loose material that comes in bags or bales and can be rapidly be poured into place. If you will give your building supplies dealer an idea of the size of your attic he can tell you what quantity of material you will need.

If your attic is unlofted, pour the "fill-type" material directly from the bags into the spaces between the joists. Floored attics can be insulated by removing one or two floorboards and pouring the material under the floored portion.

**Three-Inch Depth**  
Even off the material to a three-inch depth with a cardboard rake, which can be obtained from your building supplies dealer. For floored attics, the cardboard is nailed to a wooden handle for smoothing the material under the floored portion.

Another popular insulating material for do-it-yourself application to attics is the "flexible type." This is produced in the form of "blankets" or "quilts" and comes

in long rolls, as well as in "batts" or pre-cut sections. It is made wide enough to fit in the hollow spaces between studs, rafters and joists in walls or ceilings or under the roof.

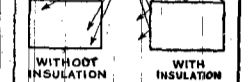
The "batts" or pre-cut sections are simply placed between the joists of unlofted attics. In the case of floored attics it will be necessary to remove the floorboards. If purchased in long rolls, these can be cut to the desired dimensions, as installed.

The insulating material is enclosed in heavy paper covering with one side impregnated with asphalt to serve as a vapor barrier. This barrier should face the inside (or downstairs) area of the house. It prevents vapor from passing through the ceiling and

reducing the effectiveness of the insulation.

#### Under-Roof Insulation

If your attic is used constantly for storage or play, the "flexible type" of insulation should be placed between the rafters under the roof.



Summer sun's heat penetrates uninsulated home, creates oven-like conditions. Insulation keeps much of this heat out, keeps folks much cooler inside.

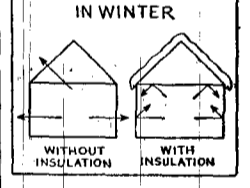
Insulation should be placed between the rafters under the roof.

If you are finishing off an attic, you can insulate at the same time by using "insulating boards" which have sufficient structural strength to use as a base for plaster. Or they can, themselves, serve as a decorative finish.

"Reflective" materials afford another type of insulation which functions by turning back heat, much as a mirror reflects light. Aluminum foil is bonded to heavy building paper or wallboard.

In applying foil backed board, the continuous sheet of aluminum foil is placed against the stud on the warm side of the wall. The same procedure (foil side up) is followed when the board is applied to the joists or rafters in the top-floor ceilings.

Like regular wallboard, the foil-backed variety lends itself to any decorative treatment—paint, wallpaper, fabric or texture.

### Low Slope Roofs Need Beauty, Says Magazine

You may love your low, modern home, but are you happy with the roof color? Low-pitched roofs, a feature of much contemporary architecture, are the latest part of the house to benefit from technical advances in building materials, according to Small Homes Guide.

The reason is explained in the magazine, "is the introduction of a roofing application method that for the first time permits desirable, colorful roofing material to be used on a house of this style."

Before this development, a house with a roof that sloped between 2 and 4 inches to each horizontal foot was in a roofer's no-man's-land. Application methods which were technically suitable had been adapted from the flat roof used on industrial and commercial structures, and generally were unattractive.

"The range of colors was particularly limited. This was in contrast to the wide variety of solid and blended colors of asphalt shingles used on homes with more steeply pitched roofs."

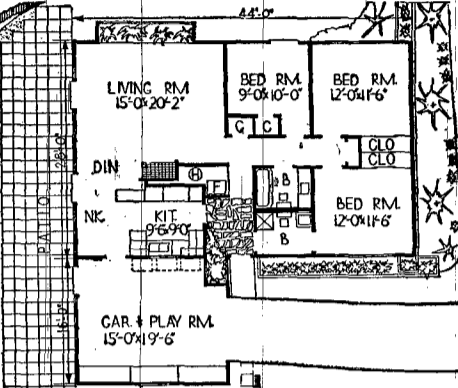
The new application method results in a waterproof roof which is the most economical of several possibilities considered by the technical research staff in charge of the work. Panels of asphalt shingles applied according to the specifications passed violent and rigorous tests in a specially designed storm machine.

### Toughens With Age

One of America's unique commercial species, west coast hemlock, found principally in Washington, Oregon and Alaska, gets harder as it ages. This makes it one of the most sought after flooring lumber used in gymnasiums, schools and rooms where there is much traffic and wear.

A dollar may not go as far as it used to, but it's still much easier to get one to replace it.

### Luxury Ranch on a Budget



From front to rear, this three-bedroom, two-bath ranch home has a luxury custom-built look, but the architect has shaved construction costs by blueprinting it for modern labor- and material-saving methods. Low maintenance and economical operation are assured by good construction and quality materials.

The plan is No. AB215N, American Builder magazine, 79 West Monroe St., Chicago. Ceilings in all rooms are sloped to follow the roof line. The wall running along the living room, dining area, and breakfast nook consists entirely of floor-to-ceiling fixed sash window units. For the awning, and sliding windows elsewhere on the house, stock wood windows in modular sizes are specified. The architect specified silver-gray, fire-resistant asphalt shingles for the low-sloped roof.

### Home Owners Can Now Easily Finish Floors

Floor finishing, heretofore largely in the province of the professional, is fast becoming one of the most popular do-it-yourself projects.

Unless floors are warped or buckled or the old finish is extremely dark and thick, the homeowner can refinish his own floors successfully with the new floor finishes.

The first step is the proper preparation of the wood surface. All previous finishes must be completely removed and the surface must be bare, clean, smooth, dustfree and dry.

Power sanding is by far the most widely used method of preparing wood floors. Many dealers are prepared to rent a sander in good operating condition, along with an ample supply of sandpaper and instructions for use.

Old floors require three sandings with sandpapers of progressive degrees of fineness. After

sanding, it is important to remove all dust from floor with a vacuum cleaner, dry cloth, or dry mop.

When the floor surface has been prepared, 90 percent of the operation has been completed. The modern surface coating flows over the pre-sanded surface and requires no wood filler.

Within one hour after applying the first coat is dry. The floor should then be hand sanded before the second and final coat is applied.

If a brilliant high gloss is desired, a third coat can be applied, after allowing the second to dry at least four hours, preferably overnight.

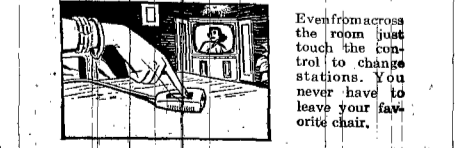

## Building Boom . . .

The thumping boom in home building, the brightest spot in the economic picture, continues full speed ahead, spearheading the sustained upward surge of general industrial activity.

This mounting demand for new houses follows logically the rapidly accelerating and increasing birth rates in recent years. Even more significantly, it reflects a growing emphasis on the home and family as the keystone of our American way of life.

The urge to really sink down roots in a community, the desire for more living space both inside and outside the home, the need for permanent protection against rent increases, a keen awareness of the sound economics of home ownership have all played their part in zooming to new highs the erection of new homes.

The desire for more space is perhaps the most important spur to home-building. Whereas rented apartments in most areas will be found to average three to four rooms, owner-occupied homes in the same localities will average five rooms plus, with the average still mounting.

Another strong incentive to home-ownership is the desire to "belong" to a community, to be a participant in civic interests and responsibilities to a degree seldom, if ever, possible to a renter.

From the dollars and cents point of view, the advantages of home ownership are equally gratifying. The home buyer's monthly payments (on the direct reduction mortgage plan) may be comparable with what he would pay in rent—give or take a few dollars one way or the other.

The important difference (in the home buyer's favor) is that an ever-increasing proportion of what he pays on a mortgage to reduce the size of his mortgage, becomes part of his equity in the home. At the end of 15 or 20 years he owns the house free and clear and thence-

Correct calking is easy if you follow these three easy steps: (1) Make sure the surface is dry and free from dust, putty, paint, etc.; (2) Rub linseed oil over the surface to be calked; (3) Apply calking compound with a putty knife.

**Foundation Cracks**  
Cracks in foundation walls can be filled with ready-mixed cement. Cracks should be cut to V-shape with a cold chisel, cleaned thoroughly with a brush, well wetted down before filling.
