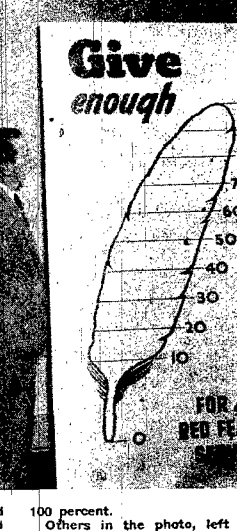

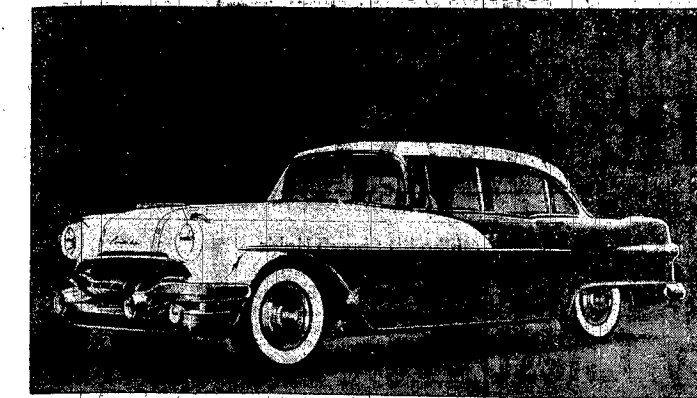

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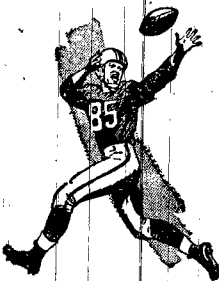
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## Wiring In Many Older Homes Now Out-Dated

### Old Wiring Can't Handle Current Load

If your house wiring is like that of four out of five of your neighbors in pre-1940 houses, it's wearing high-buttoned shoes to-day.

An electrical system can be installed in a home that is a lifetime of use, according to the National Adequate Wiring Bureau, an electrical industry educational organization.

Such experience has already convinced many a home owner that his residence is not adequately wired for the number of appliances he has bought.

Blow fuses, fuzzy television pictures, half-burned toast, lights that dim suddenly, and inability to operate an air conditioner are beginning to persuade Americans to re-wire the homes they live in.

Wiring capacity and design that would do a service are inadequate to provide sufficient wattage for the multiplicity of electrical devices and equipment owned by the average American family.

The electrical capacity built into the pre-1940 house depended on the amount of current that could flow through two 120-volt wires, known as "conductors" which enter the house from the utility company's service drop. These feed through the fuse cabinet or circuit breaker equipment, and on through a series of branch circuits to lights and appliances.

But when wires are small, small current flows. The voltage which provided enough "push" for the current, when the average home had only lighting and a few small portable appliances, does not provide

enough "push" for the versatile, wholly-automatic kitchen and laundry equipment of today.

Some improvement in the household's electrical lot came in 1946 with the adoption by the electrical industry of a "standard" requiring a larger service entrance to give the home electrical plant twice the capacity it had before.

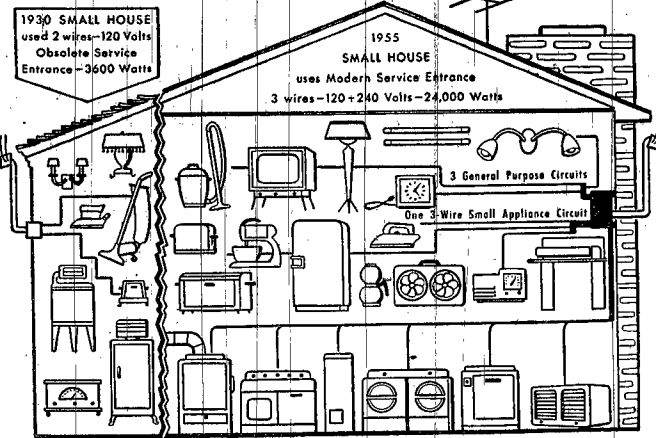
A service entrance with three wires leading in, instead of the former two-wire system, was required before a house could be called adequately wired. What the householder could take from such a system is 14,500 watts to power his equipment.

That electrical capacity did not remain adequate for long. As the

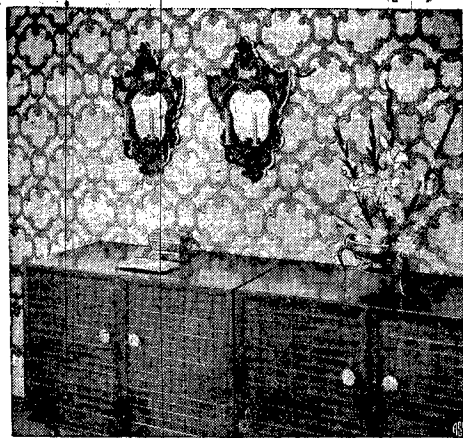
range and water heater use about 12,000 watts between them, the home owner who expected to have a clothes dryer, an ironer, a toaster, a broiler, room air conditioning and dozens of other refinements of electrical living, was stymied.

The National Adequate Wiring Bureau holds that the answer is not an increased wiring planned for equipment which the householder expects to own within a few years. He actually needs about 25,000 watts available if he is to have a modern house that is good electrically for years to come.

## You Can Do Wonders with Wallpaper



This season's wallpapers are so highly imaginative, it would seem they could solve almost any decorating problem.

With the homemaker's need for more space, light and a feeling of wide-openness, wallpaper patterns now do much more than make a room lovelier. They do special "jobs" within a room or from room to room.

As shown above, the traditional-in-feeling papers can soften the severe lines of modern furniture and give warmth and drama to a dark foyer area.

To give light to small dark rooms, there are increasing numbers of open-spaced patterns on light backgrounds. And, some of

the new "trollis" designs create a feeling of infinite space. Scenic patterns such as lightly sketched bridges, courtly buildings, trees and foliage carry the eye far into the "beyond."

There are patterns with rich color accents on softly textured light backgrounds for "blended" room schemes. Also these papers can be used to set apart a special area in the living room for television or for dining.

The tricks with wallpaper are endless. There is so much that wallpaper can do for the homemaker, and so inexpensively that one well-known home furnishings stylist remarked, "Nothing in the world decorates like wallpaper."

## Foot Trouble Is Traced to Floors

When your feet get tired you get tired all over, a leading chiropractic reports.

Dr. W. Stuekel, executive secretary of the national association of chiropractors, says, housewives can prevent much of their foot trouble by having their homes floored with wood.

Wood floors have give and resilience, so result in less foot comfort all the year around, he says, but especially in the hot summer months. Walking on wood cuts down the danger of hyperhidrosis — excessive perspiration — often a forerunner of athlete's foot.

Popular, easy-on-the-feet soft-wood flooring, like fir or hemlock can be used under linoleum, cork or tile or wall-to-wall carpeting. Many of the new sealers and finishes add long life to these floors and the natural colors, texture and grain thus left to view aid greatly in the decorative plans for each room.

## Home Fire Alarm Systems Provide Low Cost Safety

The first five minutes of warning are worth the next five hours in fighting home fires. That is why low cost home fire alarm systems have been perfected. And they are so simple the average man can install them himself.

The new alarm systems, packaged with complete instructions for installation, include a signal unit with a loud, clear bell, a transformer and a test button, all enclosed in a shallow decorative box for mounting on the wall.

Thermal detector units are supplied. They set off the alarm when temperature reaches 140 degrees and provide protection for areas up to 400 square feet. Additional detectors are available as needed. They operate on low voltage, armored cables or conduits.

## No Moisture Here

One reason wooden sash maintains its high popularity with home builders, believe Judd Greenman, president of the National Lumber Manufacturers' association, is that condensation does not collect on wood which has good natural insulating properties. It is especially important in modern homes with many appliances using large quantities of hot water which keeps moisture content of the home at high level.

## Fish Ponds Can Be Had at Home

Many farmers are interested in fishing. Many would like to have a good fishing pond nearer home rather than spend the time on a hurried weekend trip north in order to get in a little fishing.

Technicians of the Soil Conservation service often meet farmers interested in constructing a dam for ponds carrying a heavy load of silt have the same effect the country over.

"Good fishing and muddy water don't go together. Nebraska pond owners can benefit by a study now being carried on in Oklahoma to determine the effect of muddy water on fish, fish food and fishing, for ponds carrying a heavy load of silt have the same effect the country over.

Ponds are selected for the study, some muddy, some silt free. More food was produced in the silt-free water. This would account for the bass weighing six times that of bass taken from muddy ponds. It was also found that reproduction of bass was absent or very low in the muddy water.

"The growth of bluegill, redear sunfish, crappie and channel catfish was less bothered by presence of silt. The yellow catfish seemed more at home in the muddy water for they were making a satisfactory growth.

Ponds are similar to a pasture, both have a carrying capacity. The number of pounds of fish or beef that can be produced is governed by the amount of food present. There will be fewer fish to catch in muddy water due to the lack of food to support many fish.

To have good fishing in a farm pond, the treatment should be directed at the source of the trouble. Good soil and moisture conservation on the land above the pond would do just this. Keeping the soil on the fields and out of the water is all-important for better crop yields and good fishing.

## Air Space Key To Better Heat, Cold Controls

Did you owners of wood frame houses know that your homes are naturally weather-conditioned? Some people who should know—the American Society of Heating and Ventilating Engineers—say so.

This group of experts declares that a one-inch thickness of ordinary lumber will keep out as much summer heat as six inches of ordinary brick, or fifteen inches of sandstone, or concrete. And what's more, heat will pass through steel about four hundred times faster than through wood, through aluminum nearly eighteen hundred times faster.

Tough, resilient fir framing provides dead air space between outside sheathing and inside wall, and even without bulk or blanket insulating material the dead air

space itself is a good heat barrier. On the other hand, walls that don't pass heat will do a lot to keep heating bills within reason in the winter, too.

Wood siding of fir or cedar or cedar shingles give you an added bonus in beating the heat—or heating bills.

Paint Iron Furniture Outdoor furniture made of iron should be painted when it is new and then repainted regularly to keep the metal from rusting. American Builder magazine says that if rust gains a foothold, it should be removed entirely with steel wool or a wire brush before refinishing.

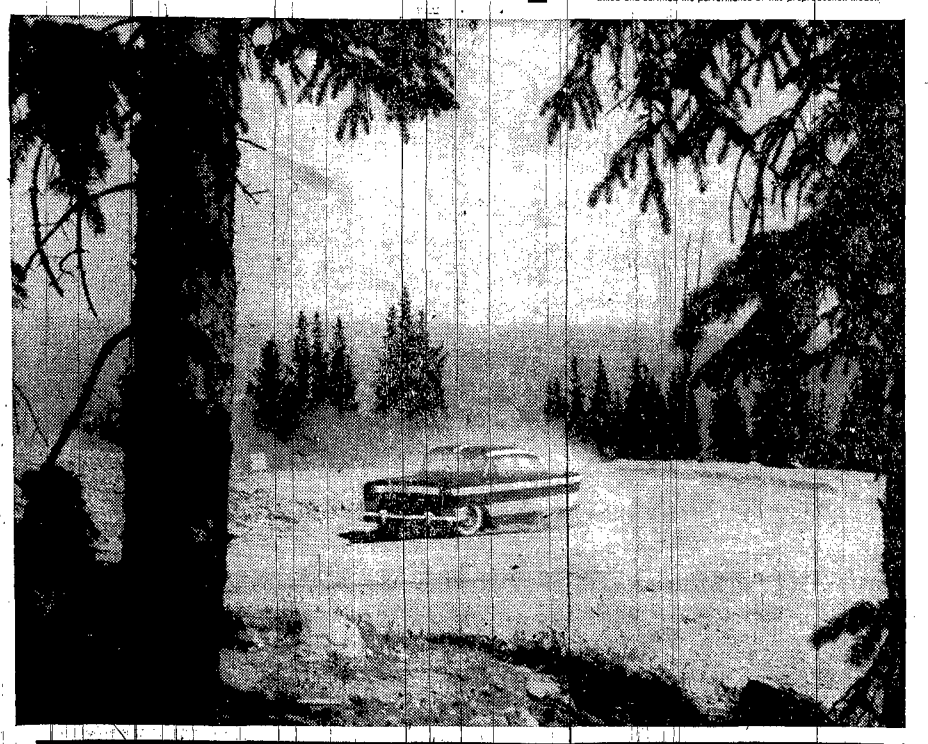
