

Community Chest Tops Goal; Campaign Total Near \$8,000

75 Firms to Get 100% Certificates

Wayne's third annual Community Chest drive passed its quota Wednesday by more than \$300, Dick Wilson, Chest secretary said. Total cash collected by Wednesday noon was \$7,777 with an estimated \$200 in pledges yet to come.

A breakdown of the figures show \$3,434 collected from firms, \$1,656 from employees, \$1,322 from institutions and \$1,955 from residential contributions.

These returns are not complete, however, for some isolated contacts remain.

Quota for the 1956 drive was \$7,250 and included 11 agencies participating as compared to nine agencies last year. Total contributions will be about \$8,000 as compared to \$5,900 last year.

Pledge totals include those local firms having regional offices.

Board Chairman Rev. C. B. Proett commended the more than 100 workers who gave voluntary assistance to the drive.

Firms getting 100 percent contributions from their employees this year will be awarded certificates of community service from Community Chest.

Postoffice Urges Patrons to Buy Early-Mail Early

Patrons of the Wayne postoffice were urged this week to cooperate with the department in its "buy early-mail early" campaign by Postmaster D. S. Wightman.

The move is intended to give maximum service to local patrons during the holiday season. According to department figures, mail volume increases 300 percent during this period while the staff advances are increased only five percent.

Overseas mailing should be made by Nov. 15. The postal department has just issued a small folder on packaging and wrapping parcels for mailing. It is available for the asking at the local postoffice.

Wightman pointed out that the local office now serves 6,500 patrons and averages over 13,000 pieces of mail daily. Incoming mail at the local office has increased 25 percent since 1952 and parcel post has jumped 85 percent over the same period.

Lambert's Report on Russian Agriculture

From the standpoint of the sheep, it is a reserve food supply during the dry season.

Poultry in Russia is largely an enterprise of the individual farmer. At the state farms we did see some chicken production. They had layers and were raising broilers and doing forced feeding. But there was hardly any specialized poultry production in the entire nation.

Looking at the livestock picture as a whole, I would say the Soviet Union has a long way to go in improving their cattle. Their swine production on the whole is fairly good, but they produce fat on a rather expensive basis. I think they could do much better by producing more oil crops. Their sheep program is progressing, but here again they are behind us. And with chicken production, they have hardly made a beginning, at least commercial-wise.

In Central Asia, the fat-tail sheep is very common. I expect it is the basis for most of their sheep. A fat-tail sheep has a tremendous accumulation of fat in the tail. Tails will probably be about a foot to 15 inches wide and six inches in height. The Russians use this fat for cooking and eating. And

The Russians take great pains with their cattle. The cats are kept in barns, mostly except in summer when they are put out to pasture. The farmer's rule is to graze them six to eight hours per day in summer.

Swine have an important part in Soviet agriculture. The Mini-

didn't see any strictly beef cattle, such as our Herefords, Angus or Shorthorns. We did see some oxen, but not too many.

As I remember the figure, the average milk production for the Soviet Union is quite low; about 1,000 liters (approx. one quart per liter) per year. However, we did see some excellent herds.

I remember one herd in particular located near Moscow. It was a dual purpose herd of black and white cattle. I believe they were Holsteins, at least descended from Holsteins. It was about as good a herd as I have ever seen.

The livestock which we saw in the Soviet Union included cattle, swine, sheep, chickens, a great number of geese and in Central Asia, some camels which are used primarily for transportation.

Their cattle did not resemble too closely any of our breeds. The nearest resemblance would be to the Milking Shorthorns and the Red Poll. But this actually isn't too strange since their cattle are dual purpose, milk and beef. We

Five Groups Oppose Drop Of Randolph-Wayne Spur

A hearing on the proposed abandonment of the Wayne-Randolph section of the C. St. P. M. & O. railroad line and extension of the leased 21-mile section of the Burlington line between Randolph and Laurel was completed in the district courtroom at Wayne Tuesday.

John Bradford, Interstate Commerce commission examiner, heard testimony. A decision will probably be announced after he files his record and recommendation.

The Wayne-Randolph line has not been used since May, 1953 and the section was damaged by floods. The railroad has used the Burlington line between Laurel and Randolph to give service.

The abandonment is opposed by Nebraska Railway commission and Nebraska and Northwestern Lumberman's associations. Other delegations opposing the move were

headed by Charles Whitney, Carroll, W. J. Berlin, Bloomfield, and Dr. Ben Johnson, Wauson.

The railroad contends traffic does not warrant rebuilding the line and use of Burlington sector enables the railroad to serve the area.

Rail officials testified Monday that the 1953 flood damaged 36 culverts and bridges, washed out 1,000 feet of track off the grade, scoured the road grade and washed some 100 feet of track into fields. Estimated cost of rebuilding was \$17,000.

The new arrangement, which necessitated building a connecting line between the two company's lines at Randolph, is sufficient, rail officials contended. They said it gives Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday service on the branch line to Bloomfield and daily service to Wayne through Norfolk.

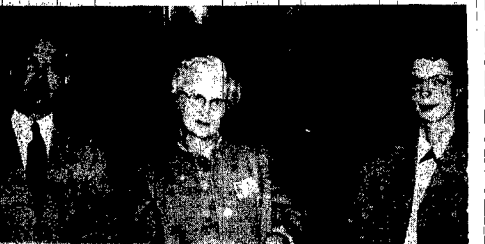

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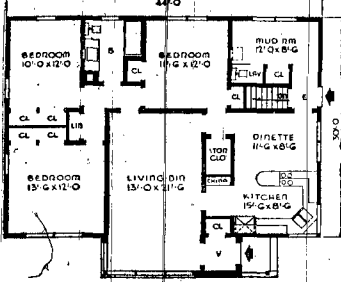
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Roomy Plan for City or Farm

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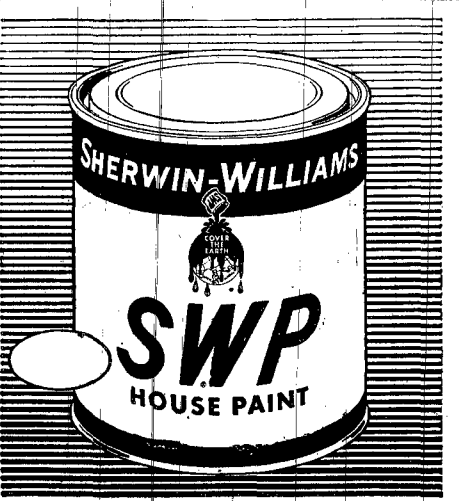

CAPITOL NEWS

Lincoln Nebraska's mental health program again is in the spotlight after a flurry of developments. . . The developments began with the Lincoln Journal obtaining a copy of a 1951 report by the American Psychiatric association on Nebraska's mental hospitals.

Dr. G. L. Sandritter, resigned head of the Hastings State hospital, had charged the board of control, which governs state institutions, "suppressed" the four-year-old report. . . Sandritter charged the board failed to meet the need for psychiatric care. He said the board set its requirements too high and pay scale too low to get any qualified persons and as a result patients are not being released from the mental hospitals like they should.

This, Sandritter said, forced superintendents to hire more non-qualified mental type employees to take care of the persons who normally would have been released. . . Sandritter said, "We are running a glorified jail." . . Board of Control Chairman Thomas Dredia vigorously defended hiring policies of the board. He said the requirements were set by Dr. Cecil Wittson, Omaha, state mental health director.

Dredia said the board had met the major points of the report, but agreed the states does not have enough psychiatrists. Neither do other states generally, Dredia said. . . Wittson disagreed with one re-

commendation in the report. It called for a 1,800-bed new mental hospital in the Omaha vicinity. Wittson said the answer is not new large mental hospitals, but psychiatric clinics in private hospitals.

Meanwhile Sen. George Syas, Omaha, outspoken critic of the board of control system of running state institutions, said a move to abolish the board as a system will be made in the 1957 legislature. . . Syas said he thinks the effort will succeed in view of the dispute over mental hospital administration, and handling of the penitentiary and reformatory incidents.

Power Meet

Governor Anderson said he believes a meeting of state senators and power district officials to progress reports on Nov. 1 would be "premature." . . Anderson made the statement in a letter to Amos Morris, Mitchell. . . The governor said he would determine a future date for the progress report.

Meanwhile, the power problem looms large in the background. Lloyd Neil, president of the Nebraska Rural Power association, wrote a letter to the governor. . . Neil said Consumers Public Power district, Columbus, appears set to block all power developments in the state unless it gets its way, and it wants to set itself up as a "super power" agency.

R. L. Schacht, general manager for Consumers, said the statements by Neil are not true. Schacht said an effective consolidation of major Nebraska power facilities is necessary "if the best interests of the majority of east-ern Nebraska's electric users are to be served."

Schacht said "It should be obvious that the present arrangement cannot meet today's needs and a better one must be developed."

Polio Shots Urged

Dr. E. A. Rogers, state health director, has urged parents to make arrangements "as soon as possible" to have their children inoculated against polio. . . Children should have their first and second shots soon "if they are to have maximum protection against the disease next summer," Rogers said.

The third "booster" shot of the vaccine must be given to persons within seven months after the second inoculation.

Pheasant Luck

Sportsmen will probably have to work harder to bag the game this year, but they should have better luck stalking pheasants. . . That's the belief of Paul Gilbert, secretary of the state game commission. Gilbert said there appears to be an "abundant" pheasant population that is widely scattered over the state.

"Many birds," he said, "probably will be resting in thickly vegetated areas rather than out looking for food, which they do primarily during the morning hours."

White House Conference

Governor Anderson has named 11 civic and church leaders as Nebraska's delegation to the White House conference on education Nov. 28-Dec. 1. . . Anderson said finding persons

to serve as delegates was "one of the most difficult appointments I've had." He said his final selection was based on what "would reap the most benefits" in terms of Nebraska school progress. . . Delegates are: Mrs. J. F. Lucas, president of the Omaha board of education; Rev. C. H. Lemon, Lincoln, executive secretary of the Nebraska State Board of Education; Rev. A. E. Egging, superintendent of schools of the Grand Island diocese; Richard Johnson, Lincoln, public relations director for the Nebraska State Education association; Morris Jacobs, Omaha, president of the State Board of Education; Sen. Glenn Cramer, Alliance, past chairman of the legislature's education committee; Mrs. Hazel Abel, Lincoln, former U.S. Senator; Sen. Kathleen Foote, Omaha, member of the legislature's education committee; Mrs. LeRoy Hannerman, Lincoln, former president of the Nebraska Congress of Parents and Teachers; Dr. Earl Wittse, Grand Island superintendent of schools, and Dr. Frank Agler, Lincoln, chairman of the Nebraska Committee for Youth.

HERE AND THERE . . . With Your County Agent By Harold Ingalls

Yields Vary Widely
We have observed surprisingly good corn yields in some fields in spite of extremely dry summer. Estimates of yields on a number of fields have ranged up to 50 bushels per acre while adjoining fields were almost a total failure. . . It is difficult to determine the reason for this with so many factors involved. Past cropping history, method of planting, planting rates, variety, date of planting, use of commercial fertilizer and many others have a bearing on crop yields. One thing about which we are sure is that a few inches of extra water at the right time from rain, irrigation or previously stored in the soil, makes the difference between failure of a fair crop. . . Three of the most important items mentioned by farmers discussing this year's corn yields are these: (1) Many stands were too thick; (2) Corn planted deep with furrow openers or listed with too dry weather best; (3) Corn rows and terraces which aided in storing water which normally runs off was an important factor for higher yields. . . One farmer who was pleasantly surprised with this year's corn yield is Percy Christiansen who is farming for the first time in Wayne county this year. . . He reports an average yield of better than 40 bushels per acre on his entire corn acreage. . . Christiansen recently purchased this farm 4 1/2 miles north of Wayne from Jerry Allvin. One of his neighbors told me that this farm was notorious for its fine stand of

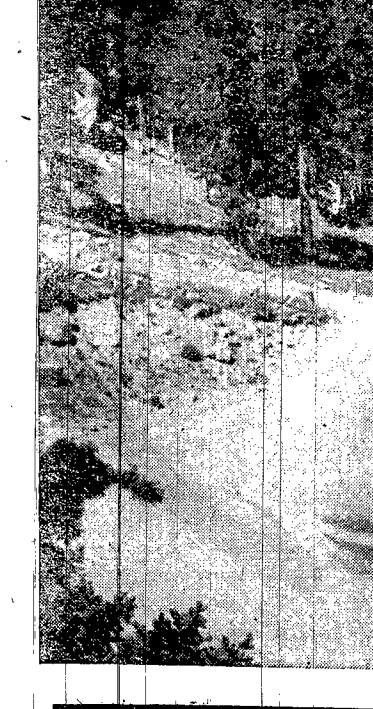
bindweed and low state of productivity before Allvin introduced efficient methods to improve farm. Its appearance and productivity today certainly shows the results of Allvin's good care and good management. . . **New Assessment Plan**
New assessment law passed by Nebraska legislature went into effect Sept. 19. This low would have assessment of farm crops and livestock, including breeding stock, feed and seed as well as production for sale, on average monthly basis. Exact procedures to be followed haven't been announced yet but farmers should start this month and each month keeping records of crops and livestock on hand. It is better to keep this record currently than to try to remember when assessment date rolls around. . . **Mar. 1**
Ground Electric Waterers to be installed at all units in your livestock waterers to keep them from freezing, by putting ground the units to prevent shock damage to animals or yourself. . . You can make a good ground by driving a 3/4-inch x 1/2-inch rod about eight feet into the ground. Connect this to the waterer with No. 6 wire. It is advisable to ground the electric unit, the frame of the waterer contains and any other conducting material such as stanchions or feed racks. Grounding is especially important if the waterer is supplied through plastic pipe. . . Use Wayne Herald Wantads
