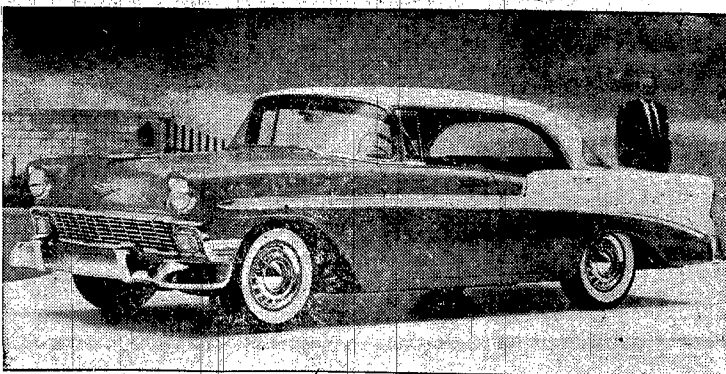

Bruceellosis Law
The new law concerning Bovine Bruceellosis enacted by the Nebraska Legislature this year became effective Sept. 18. Most important provisions of the law are for county-wide testing and calf-hood vaccination without cost to cattle owners. However, counties must petition for such service with 75 percent or more of the breeding cattle in favor of the organization. Tentative plans have been made to hold information meetings in Wayne county during the winter months. **Military Service** Many farm boys who feel that they cannot spend the two years tour of duty can benefit from the Armed Forces Reserve act of 1955. Instead of waiting until they are drafted, they can sign up in the reserve program and go on active duty for only six months. After that the boy can return to the farm and finish his military obligation by going to night meet-

Power Obligation

Public power development in Nebraska is not an obligation of the state, according to Atty. Gen. C. S. Beck. Beck made the ruling in answer to a query from Sen. Amos Morrison, Mitchell. Beck said there is nothing in the Constitution, however that would prevent such development from being an obligation of the state. The question of the obligation, Beck said, is purely a question of policy to be decided by the people or their legislature. Answering Morrison further, Beck said it is a function of individual power district to furnish electricity. And, said the attorney general, public power districts are governmental agencies and their affairs are in the hands of the directors who are elected by the people. Morrison has been pushing for a special session of the legislature to iron out power problems. But he called a halt to his plans temporarily to give districts more time to work out their problems.

Mental Health

Interest in Nebraska's mental health program has mushroomed. And the State Mental Health Director, Dr. Cecil Wittson, says this is a "very healthy thing." Wittson said he is "very pleased" with the concern shown recently, "especially by the governor." Gov. Anderson urged the board of control to bring about a complete mental health program "without delay." "One of the biggest things we in mental health program have had to overcome is a public apathy about the problem," Wittson said. The mental health director also came up with some startling facts. He said there are 14,000 hospital beds in Nebraska and about half are filled with persons who are mentally ill. And, he adds, one in 12 Nebraskans will need mental treatment during a lifetime. Wittson says state institutions need to be drastically supplemented by psychiatrists working in private offices and general hospital clinics. He wants to see 140 in private practice and 60 in the mental hospitals. Now the totals are 25 and 19, respectively. Under the timetable, Wittson said, the state in three years,

with the same backing as now, "will be as far along as any" in its mental health program. In 10 years, he said, Nebraska, like the nation, will "no longer be in retreat but will be holding its own."

Wittson said in the overall plan, "large mental hospitals are no answer to the problem. If we fully staff the three mental hospitals (at Hastings, Lincoln and Norfolk), we would not have answered the problem." Meanwhile the board of control, replying to the governor's letter, said it is pushing improvements at the mental hospitals. And, said the board, it is going to do all it can to "help with the further development of private facilities in this state." The board told the governor: "It is the belief of the Board of Control that with the improvement of psychiatric treatment techniques more and more people can be treated privately."

Highway Commission

The Advisory State Highway commission has slated a hearing at Lincoln Nov. 28 for persons interested in the proposed relocation of U.S. 281 south of Grand Island. The highway department wants to relocate the 10-mile stretch of road two miles west of its present location. State Engineer L. N. Riss said this would eliminate the necessity of widening the road and five bridges. Only three bridges would be required on the new route.

CAPITOL NEWS

Lincoln—A move by the attorney general apparently put a damper on much of the expected fireworks over the dismissal of Men's Reformatory Supt. George Morris.

Frederick Wagener, Lincoln, attorney representing Morris, actually caused the Board of Control to hire a referee to take testimony in the case.

Wagener, late on the day before the scheduled hearing for Morris, asked permission to call 41 witnesses, including Gov. Victor Anderson and several state prison inmates.

Upon checking the lawbooks, Asst. Atty. Gen. Robert Nelson, who is inmate for the board, discovered inmates cannot testify at a hearing unless it is before a court. Then came the idea for a referee. Nelson told the board this would make for economy, speed and "orderly procedure." Wagener objected strenuously, but to no avail. A referee, Lincoln Attorney Jack Devos, was named by the board. The theory was that an impartial attorney would force Wagener to stick to the issue in the case—whether or not Morris made statements that constituted misconduct. Wagener said he may go to court after the board makes its final decision. Although law permits no appeal from the board decision, there may be other statutes applying to the situation. The mechanics of a referee taking testimony involves submission of transcripts to the board. Then the board will permit final arguments by the attorneys. Its decision will be whether it was right in firing Morris in the first place. After the board's decision was
