


10 Leave for Service



Northeast Nebraska's fall weather continues dry. Only .02 inch of moisture fell in Wayne during the past week, coming as mixed rain and snow last Wednesday.

October's .20 inch of moisture brought the year's total rainfall to 15.37 inches, leaving a deficit of 4.19 inches for the first ten months of 1955.

**HOME OWNERS' QUESTION BOX**

Q—Is there a way to remove oil from a concrete floor?

A—Yes. Spread dry Portland cement or hydrated lime over the oil spots. If the spots are not absorbed after several days, a solution of 4 ounces of trisodium phosphate and 4 ounces of washing soda to a gallon of water can be used to wash down the concrete. Flush with clear water to remove the solution.

Q. My house has brick veneer walls. Does it need insulation?

A—Yes. Brick veneer and other solid constructions do not prevent heat loss. It would take nearly 6 feet of common brick to do the

# Plainview Downs Wayne 20-0 Friday

## Loney Paces Ninth Win Of Season

Jerry Loney, a 135-pound half-back, paced Plainview's Pirates to a 20-0 win over Wayne High's Blue Devils Friday night at Plainview.

Wayne mustered its only offensive spark early in the third quarter after Loney ball quickly kicked to the Blue Devil 7. Hofeldt got 21 yards in three carries as Wayne got two straight first downs.

Then Glenn Houdersheldt got 12 yards over tackle but fumbled as he was tackled. The ball bounced to the Wayne 13. Loney held by Bob Vogel and then ended up in the hands of Plainview.

The Pirates wasted no time in getting their second tally. After two first downs, Hinrichsen faded back on second down, found no receivers and elected to run. He raced 21 yards and kicked the extra point to give Plainview a 13-0 lead.

Early in the final quarter Gary Lingenfelter recovered Hofeldt's fumble on the Wayne 14. The
