The bride wore a white, princess style afternoon dress with pink accessories. She carried a red rose corsage on a white Bible.

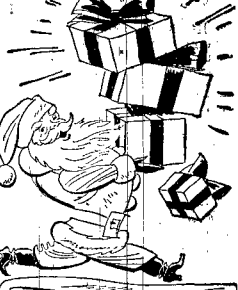
Maid of honor was Virginia Arthur, Storm Lake, Ia. She wore an aqua dress with black accessories and wore a pink carnation corsage.

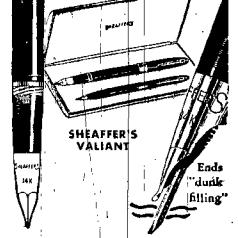



Moisture continued to avoid Northeast Nebraska this week, but temperatures remained unseasonably cold. Coldest reading was six degrees recorded last Wednesday. High reading was a warm 55 Saturday.

So far this month readings have been much colder than November, 1954. Degree-days for the first 22 days of this month total 737 as compared to degree-day readings of 478 for the same period last November, a difference of 259 degree-days or nearly half again as cold.

Degree-days are a unit used to determine fuel consumption. Degree-days are obtained by subtracting the average mean temperature from 65 degrees.

LINCOLN—The advisory State Highway commission meets here Nov. 28 and Governor Anderson says he will grant the group "certain authority" then.

Said the governor: "I want to take the advice of the commission when it holds adequate public hearings on controversial highway affairs."

Under the law, neither governor nor the State Highway department must adhere to advice given by the commission.

Delegation of authority to the commission would eliminate the necessity of the public bypassing the commission and appealing to the governor.

Navigation Network
Nebraska's radio navigation network for private pilots should be fully operative by Dec. 1.

At least that's the hope of State Aeronautics Director James Ramsey. He said stations at McCook, Kearney and Beatrice should be in operation by then.

Primarily, they are navigational devices, but they also provide weather information and help safe flying.

Legislature Good
Procedures used by the Nebraska Legislature in handling bills are looked upon with envy by officials of many states.

That's the word from Sen. John Beaver, Beemer chairman of the Legislative council, research group of the Legislature.

Heintze Wins Suit
A decision generally in favor of former State Treasurer Frank Heintze has been handed down in Lancaster county district court, Lincoln.

The suit was brought by Heintze to determine validity of the distribution law—since changed by the Legislature from the Jan. 1, 1950-Dec. 31, 1954 period.

The home builder who is looking for something different, yet practical, will find it in a new design by Mackie and Kararath of Houston, Tex. Two young architects who have earned an international reputation for both residential and commercial work.

The design illustrates how asbestos siding shingles can impart charm and distinction to better class homes. It was one of six prepared by outstanding architects in various parts of the nation.

The Houston architects' primary goal was to create a house "with an intimate, warm, friendly character, built to a personal scale."

Facing inward on a triangular terrace: the house includes a sleeping area of three bedrooms and a large glass-fronted living and dining room. In the sketch above the sleeping area is seen on the left. The flat-roofed wing has exterior siding of asbestos board. The living room wing rises to story-and-a-half height on the terrace exposure and slopes to single-story level for an adjoining utility room and carport.

The living room-utility room section features an unusual use of asbestos siding, a material which has gained great popularity because of its performance qualities and smart new styling. On the sidewalls of greatest height, the shingles are applied at an angle paralleling the eaves to add interest and to emphasize the angular plan-

ning. Redwood mouldings occur between every two courses of strength and permanence, the redwood moulding contributes a warm naturalness.

The asbestos products, of a mineral origin, give a feeling of shingles.

Because of their durability, fire-safety and attractive colors, asbestos shingles have become one of the most popular of siding materials. A companion product, rigid asbestos roofing shingles, has been a favored roof protection for more than fifty years.

Exposed Ceilings Liked

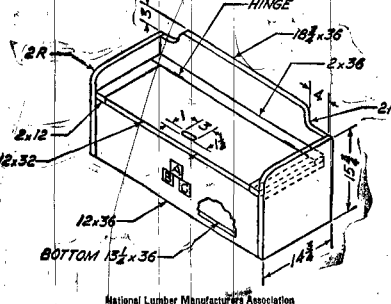
Use of exposed beams and exposed wooden ceilings has become so popular in contemporary home design that sale of these grades of fir and hemlock lumber has tripled in the past year, the West Coast Lumbermen's association reports. New types of rez, varnish and paint stains make it possible to retain all the natural beauty, grain and texture of these woods in the ceilings and beams which aid in the general decorative scheme of new homes.

Work Bench Tip

The curved back is cut with a coping saw. All pieces should be sanded before assembly. Assemble the end panels to the front, rear and bottom panels, using glue and 6-penny finishing nails. Then install two 2-1/2 by 18-1/2 inch seat sup-



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Even Moderate Price Houses Now Offer Deluxe Features

Even comparatively moderately priced homes can have custom-built features. This is demonstrated in a new housing development in the Philadelphia area, described in a recent issue of the Correlator, official organ of the National Association of Home Builders.

The Lawrence Park development, to be built at a cost of \$30,000,000, will have 1,200 homes. All will be air-conditioned. Lower levels of the split-level houses will have a spacious living room, dining room and modern kitchen. On the upper level there will be three large bedrooms and a ceramic tile bath. The accent, according to Builder Ralph Bodek, will be on "comfort and gracious living." The price—just under \$15,000.

The exteriors are a very attractive combination of brick and as-

bestos siding. A typical home is finished with brick walls on the single level unit and on the lower portion of the two-level unit. The upper part of the two-level section has an attractive exterior finish of asbestos siding in smart new colors and designs.

Kitchens feature a built-in, eye-level oven and burner unit with a table-top range. Giving the kitchens a warm, natural look are cabinets of birch, trimmed with antique copper. The heating system is gas-fired forced air. To provide summer and winter air conditioning, units of two-ton capacity are supplied. Both air conditioning and heating are automatically controlled for fluctuating weather conditions. There is hardwood

flooring throughout the home except in kitchen and bath.

Included in the development will be a massive shopping center which will contain all the stores necessary to make Lawrence Park a self-sustaining community. The shopping center will have parking space for 3,300 cars.

Modernization Means More When Colors Are Correct

"Good color is just as important to an old house as to a new one," says Practical Builder magazine. "In fact, 'modernization' is just a name without real significance if it fails to include an attractive color-styling job on the remodeled house, without good color, the house simply can't be truly modern."

"Home-owners can be as colorful as they wish without running up remodeling costs. A white roof costs little more than a black one, a icy green asphalt shingles about the same as mist blue or smoky gray. Some of the deep tones in paint are more expensive than white, but the difference isn't prohibitive—and what is true of roofing and paint is true of most finishing materials. Color costs so little more, so why not use it?"



First step in color styling, according to the magazine, is to select the roof color, as "the roof generally is the largest single area visible to the eye."

"A light, bright roof makes a house appear taller than it is. A dark roof makes the house seem lower. Use light-colored asphalt shingles on one-story houses, deeper colors on two- or three-story houses."

Next step is to choose the siding color. Practical Builder suggests, "If the roof is light in color, keep side walls light. If the roof is medium to dark, keep walls the same. In general, there should be no sharp contrasts between the roof and the siding. Paint trim the color of the siding or in a tone of the siding door."

For a focal point, the magazine recommends bright, cheerful accent color for the entrance door, but not for the windows. "Windows are 'eyes' to homes. Keep them warm and inviting. Paint sash and frames in the trim color, not the accent color. Exception: picture windows are frequently painted in the accent color."

How to Get FHA Loan for Home Modernization

The government-sponsored and insured FHA Title I loans for home modernization and repairs are available through most banks and building and loan associations.

You fill out a simple application form. It is processed by the lending agency. Within a few days your check is ready.

No mortgage is involved. No title examinations. No extra charges or service fees.

Loans range from \$100 to \$2500. You can take from six months to three years to repay.

Interest by the government, is five percent, deducted at time loan is made.

Homes Per Farm

Although number of U. S. farms will decline by 10,000 each year until 1975, Stanford Research Institute estimates number of dwellings per farm will increase. Reason: farms will become larger economic units and housing will be provided as inducement. Farms are large consumers of lumber. Brite Douglas fir, which is easily used for repair and maintenance of fences, out buildings and homes, with a minimum of tools.

Love of Wood

Most people love wood in their homes because it is warm, soft-toned and livable. Some home owners, faced with the problem of selling their older homes when business and employment requires them to move, have discovered the real appeal of wood. By installing a wall of rich-looking fir paneling in a living room or den, they have found ready buyers and best of all, have been able to get more money for their homes.
