Social Security

Many farmers in the 60 and over age group in Nebraska are wondering just how the new social security law will affect them.

Since each farmer may have something different about his farming program that influences how the law applies to him, all farmers are urged to contact their local social security office if they inverted to the farmers in this age group—perhaps in 7a position of semi-retirement with sons or others operating the farmer—are often not aware that they too are covered by the new program.

There are some pretty definite rules for establishing whether income going to owners who have moved to town is subject to social security tax and subsequent benefits. For answers to this question, contact the social security office or your tax adviser.

contact the social security office or your tax adviser.

Other older farmers feel that by getting into the program now they would be getting something they haven't carned. The benefit available to those at or near the retirement age of 55 do seem quite generous.

For example, a farmer 63 years old on Jan. 1, 1955, whose net farm profits were \$4,200 a year for 1955 and 1956, would pay in only \$252, if he retired Jan. 1, 1957. He would be entitled to receive \$108,30 a month as long as he lived. When his wife also reached 65, the combined monthly benefits would be \$162.80 a month.

It is important that income on which tax is paid be at or near the maximum \$4,200 for the qualifying period.
