



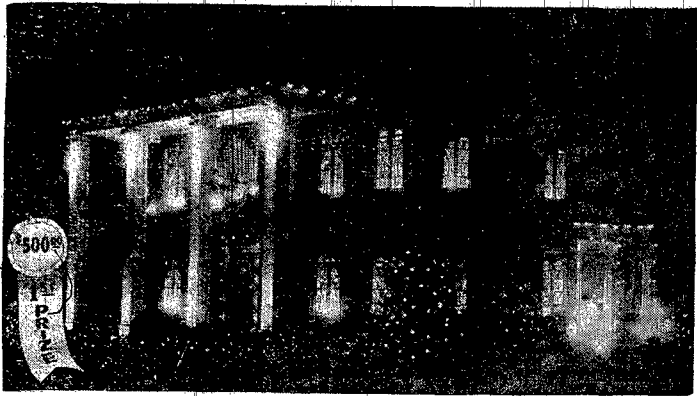

Tips from Contest Winners for Outdoor Holiday Decorations



Before you start putting up your outdoor Christmas lights, take a minute to study these pictures of prize-winning Missouri, California and Minnesota homes.



Each was a top prize winner in its own city's locally sponsored holiday lighting contest and finally, top winners in a nationwide Christmas lighting contest.

Proof that originality, artistic merit, ingenuity and lighting technique can pay cash dividends is evidenced by the \$1,000 these homeowners won for their efforts.

For the holidays, all windows were transformed into colorful "stained glass" with inexpensive crepe paper. Old carpet rolls, given a coat of dime-store gold paint, were used to create a message coming out of its smoke stack.

The second prize winner in Beverly Hills chose to make his own cut-out of a toy train with a "Seasons Greetings" message coming out of its smoke stack. Notice how cleverly the cut-out of a church is silhouetted against the house with the help of 150-watt projector spotlights.

Wood Insures Snug Fit for Kitchen Units

If you are intrigued by the glamorous new built-in kitchen appliances but fear complicated installation, there is good news for you in a recent issue of a large home builders' magazine.

The magazine points out that installation "does not offer any particular problem. Builders are advised that it is mostly a matter of providing the proper size opening, setting equipment in place and making proper connections."

The workability of popular plywood kitchen cabinets plays a major role in simplifying installation of built-ins.

Because there are variations in size of the built-in ovens and ranges made by major manufacturers, it is helpful to have cabinets and wall areas which can be tailor-fitted to the appliances.

Thus, should the wall oven prove to be slightly larger than the opening, it is a simple matter to enlarge the opening when cabinets and wall paneling are of plywood.

Wood cabinets can be built on-the-job by carpenters, obtained custom built by national manufacturers or assembled from stock cabinets available through retail outlets.

Fire-Resistant Doors Of Plywood Available

Smooth hardwood plywood flush doors, the most popular style in homes, are available in fire-resistant models for institutional uses.

Home Siding Can Compliment Building Site

Wood's flexibility manifests itself in home design from traditional Colonial to the earth-hugging contemporary structure.

So says Architect Richard Sundeleaf, A.A.A., whose striking residential designs are attractions throughout the northwest.

"Red cedar boards, overlapped vertically with rough side exposed are texturally effective for informal siding, and cedar resists weather and takes stains beautifully," the prominent home designer states.

Sundeleaf lists other siding patterns which identify themselves with certain architectural styles.

"Wood has limitless design possibilities," Sundeleaf continues. "It may be cut and shaped to suit individual preferences and it takes paint and stain beautifully."

Heat and Cold Controlled by Wise Building

Air-conditioning of new homes is easily accomplished, believes H. V. Simpson, nationally known lumber authority, by wise use of wood for sheathing and siding.

Wood siding, Simpson points out, keeps home interiors cooler in summer because it does not absorb and retain exterior heat like many other types of surfacing materials.

Horrie siding of fir, hemlock and red cedar, some of the most popular woods now in use, save on heat bills, Simpson points out, because there is about 25 percent less heat loss in winter.

The reason wood is such a good insulator, the lumber expert states, is because nature has built a cell structure in the wood which is the world's most versatile natural insulator.

Ready-Made Decorations Excellent Holiday Results



If you ever feel just too rushed to put up your outdoor holiday decorations, here's a tie that can save valuable time.

Holiday lighting specialists suggest that when the time is short, merely concentrate your decorating on a large window area and the doorway of your home.

Today's wide selection of ready-made lighted devices, combined with a few strings of outdoor lights and greens, can give your house that special holiday look in minutes.

First step in this last-minute decorating plan is to place your indoor tree in the center of your window, if possible.

Then, as shown in the picture above, place a lighted Santa and snowman or other lighted figure on the ground beneath the window.

Christmas lights woven through shrubbery and in evergreen roping above and below the window and around your doorway.

If you are spending your first holiday in a newly-built home that you have not yet landscaped, substitute evergreen branches for permanent shrubbery.

Separate Yard Into Use Acreas

Land masses around the home are divided into zones in much the same way areas of living within the home are allotted, says Robert Hale Ellis, Jr., prominent landscape architect.

"It is important that use areas have boundary suggestions," declares Ellis, and this can best be accomplished by using inexpensive grades of fir and red cedar lumber in fence and screening devices.

For example, Ellis mentions the "public zone," the walkway and entrance. It is a utility zone which should be easily located by strangers. Trellises for climbing shrubbery, built from strips of weather-resistant cedar will spotlight and beautify any entrance.

Then there is the "service zone," Ellis says. This is the area around the kitchen door where the laundry yard garbage can, vegetable garden and tool shed is located.
