A record crowd attended last year's performance and hopes are this year's production will better that mark.

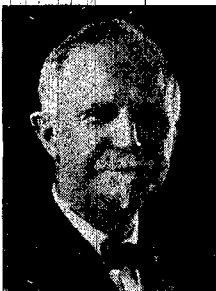
Wayne Man New Head of Royal Masons Chapter

Farm Home Destroyed in Fire at Winside Sunday

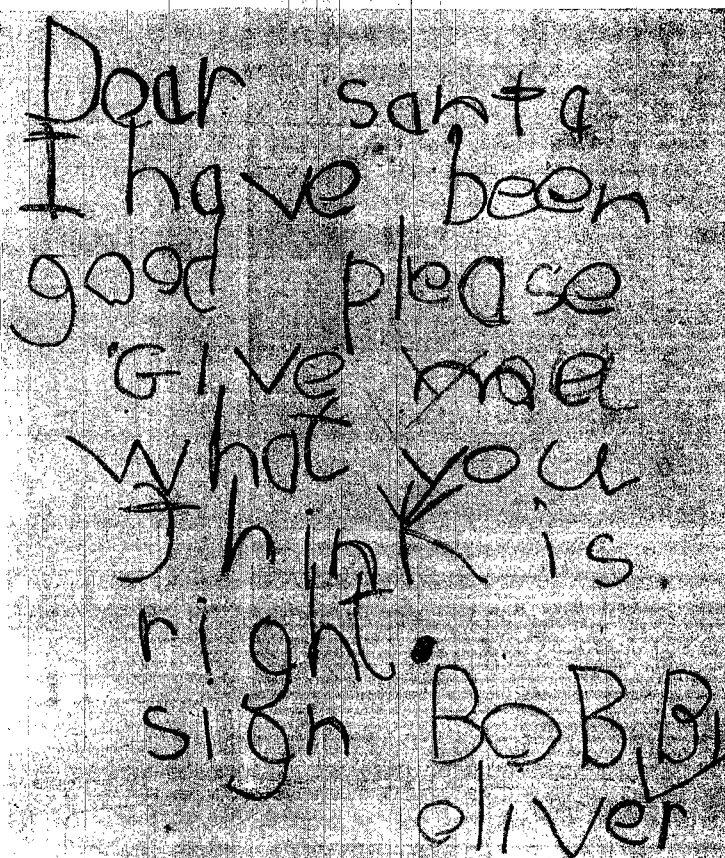

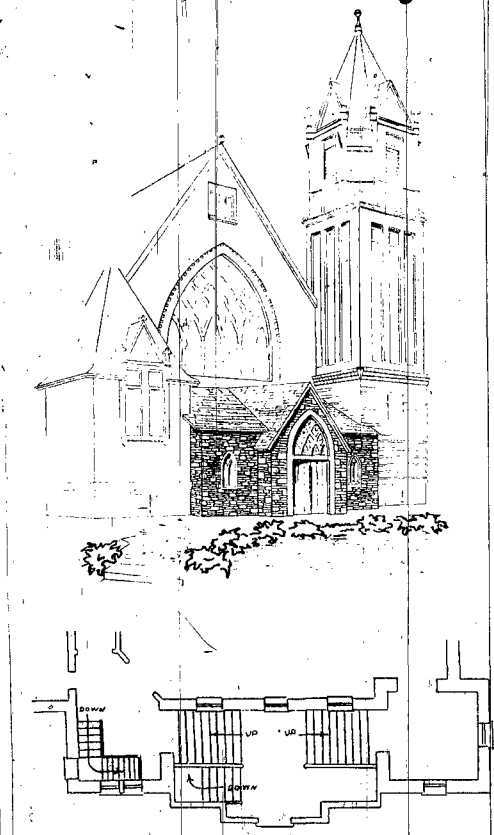

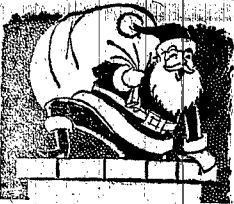

Leaner Pork

The American Meat Institute, Chicago, has recommended meat packers trim more fat off pork cuts to give the customer what she wants. At least one major company announced its intention to follow this recommendation.

Consumer preference studies have consistently shown that consumers prefer leaner cuts of meat but such lean cuts have too often been hard to find.

Close trimming of fat is a step in the right direction; also needed are more meat-type hogs coming from farms. (There's a limit to the amount of fat even the government will purchase.)

A possibility for increasing meat consumption might be the development of plans for consumers to buy meat for lockers and home freezers on the installment plan—pay-as-you-eat.

The lower average price per pound and greater availability and variety of meat would increase per capita meat consumption considerably in many families.

One of the nation's leading swine experts, who has judged many marked hog shows, said recently that 85 percent of all hogs coming to market are over finished. More surprising, he says further, is that 75 percent of all barrows coming to major livestock shows are likewise over fat.

Recommended Alfalfa
Thinking about putting in a new field of alfalfa next spring? Don't gamble with an alfalfa variety that hasn't been tested under Nebraska conditions.

Nebraska Experiment station

tests many alfalfa varieties each year to give farmers an idea as to which varieties do best in the state. Here are the varieties recommended for planting in 1956 where long-term stands are desired.

Ranger and Harditan are recommended for both dryland and irrigated land in all parts of the state. Both are hardy, will resist high yielding and maintain good stands a period of years.

Buffalo and Ladak do well in some areas but are not recommended for Northeast Nebraska.

There's a new alfalfa variety under development that shows promise for the future. It's a combination called A-22, which has shown up well in Nebraska and Iowa tests. It has a broad crown with much greater branching of the root system than standard varieties. The crown tends to remain below the surface of the ground, providing some protection from grazing.

What are the conclusions of Nebraska research men about the so-called creeping types of alfalfa?

Since they don't have any evidence to do creep in Nebraska, and since these "creepers" haven't proven superior to varieties now grown in the state—the Nebraska Experiment station doesn't recommend either Normal, Rhizoma, Secura or Renner varieties of creeping alfalfa.

CAPITOL NEWS

LINCOLN—The release system used at the Beatrice State home, where the mentally retarded live, is going to get a study.

The board of Control has directed Dr. Cecil Wittson, state mental health director, to make a survey on the release of patients. Some had been saying 20-25 percent of the children at the institution could be released if given proper guidance.

But Wittson said the 25 percent figure is "entirely too high."
However, he said, experience in other places "certainly indicates that we can do a lot more about mental troubles than we have been able to do before."

The number of patients at the institution has climbed from 1,647 in 1950 to 2,147.

M. E. Wyant, newly-named superintendent of the home, said he plans a "complete survey of our release program so that we may determine the possible recommendations which can be made to the Board of Control and the Legislature in order to expedite the release of any eligible boy or girl."

Wyant, formerly business manager at the home, pledged cooperation with the board, Wittson and the advisory board for the institution.

Blind School Visits
The Board of Control hopes to visit three schools for the blind in other states shortly after the first of the year.

Members hope to visit schools at Kansas City, Kans., St. Louis, Mo., and Little Rock, Ark.

Engineer Earl Botsford probably will accompany the board.

Harold Peterson, board administrative assistant, said "it is necessary that the board make the visit in order to get a good understanding of what the structure should be provided for Nebraska blind children."

Nebraska's blind school is located at Nebraska City. The location was the center of much controversy during the last session of the Legislature.

School Referendum

A referendum for Nebraska public school employees will be conducted Friday and Saturday, under supervision of State Tax Commissioner Fred Herrington.

Herrington said if the referendum carries on whether teachers want social security, his five field men will instruct the more than 11,000 employees on how to file reports with his office.

The only school employees who will not vote are those in the Omaha public school system, the University of Omaha and the University of Nebraska.

Employees there recently favored social security by large majorities.

Herrington said ballots for the referendum must be postmarked not later than Sat. Dec. 17. Results of the balloting will be known about the first of the year, he said.

New Hospital Head

Dr. Jack Arlington Wolford, 38, Warren, Pa., is the new head of the Hastings State hospital.

He succeeds Dr. G. Lee Sandritter, a center of controversy and severe critic of Nebraska's mental health program.

Wolford will get \$16,000 a year. He has been senior clinical director at the Warren State hospital. Wolford will leave Warren for the Hastings position Feb. 15.

The new superintendent is the first of the heads of mental hospitals in Nebraska to hold a certification by the American Board of Neurology and Psychiatry.

Dr. Cecil Wittson, mental health director, said Wolford "is an outstanding man, and already has proved himself in institutional work. He has built up a good staff and a good program at Warren."

Polio Money Deadline

A deadline for Nebraska to spend money for Salk polio vaccine is drawing at the Warren State hospital. Wolford will leave Warren for the Hastings position Feb. 15.

partment said Nebraska has spent only \$42,000 of its allocated \$245,000 which must be used by Feb. 15.

Said Rouse: "Nebraska will be lucky to get 100,000 doses of the 300,000 it could afford with the \$245,000, unless new regulations are made."

Nebraska has received 55,000 shots of the vaccine and another 8,700 are earmarked for the state. Rouse estimates there are 182,000 children in Nebraska between one and 10 years of age, plus expectant mothers, who are eligible for the vaccine.

Chase has said he will not file for re-election in the 1956 balloting, but instead will try to get his old job back as district judge.

Douglas, County Republican Chairman Charles A. Nye said shortly after the announcement by Chase that at that time he did not know of anyone who had indicated any interest in trying for Chase's seat.

Mayor John Rosenblatt, Omaha, said, however, he was giving the idea of filling a card for Chase consideration and that he may have an announcement after the first of the year.

Meanwhile in other political developments, Rep. R. D. Harrison, Norfolk, said he would run again. He had high praise for Chase.

So far, Harrison has at least three opponents in the third district primary, Merle Haynes, South Sioux City; Lester Anderson, Aurora; and A. C. Carlson, Holdville, have filed.

Here's Sleeping Tip For Sore Back Victims

A number of back-sufferers reported considerable improvement by making use of a small piece of plywood placed under their regular mattress. The plywood provides an excellent support. By using 1/2-inch or 3/8-inch plywood, the bed does not become overly hard.

Many doctors have advised this and similar treatments for sore back treatment. The advantage of fir plywood panel for this purpose is that it is economical, in addition to which it can be cut from a regular 4x8 panel and neatly fitted to the individual bed.

History keeps repeating itself—and every time this happens the price goes up.

HERE'S HOW... MAKE A HOBBY HORSE FOR CHRISTMAS

The homemade hobby horse shown here will delight any tot.

Materials: a straight-grained board 1/2-inch x 10 inches x 10 feet, eleven 1 1/2-inch flathead wood screws, six 1 1/2-inch screws, six 2-inch screws, 1/2-inch dowel 6 inches long, glue, paint, and varnish. Cut out all parts as shown. Use a 2-inch grid as an aid in laying out the curved parts. Bevel the top edges of the legs and the bottom edge of the back rest for a snug fit to the seat.

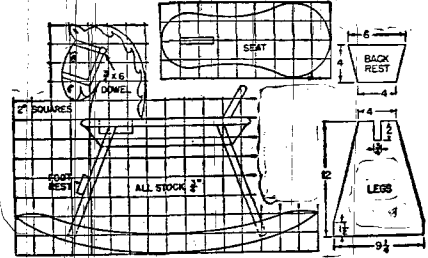
Use glue on all joints. Recess screws with countersink. Assemble as follows: Put one 1 1/2-inch screw through rockers near each end into the edge of the leg so that bottom edge of leg is 1/2-inch above lower edge of rocker. Join seat to brace with 1 1/2-inch screws through top of seat into top edge of brace with brace under

centerline of seat and slot in seat in line with notch in brace. Position brace in leg slots, align, and finish assembling rockers to legs with 1 1/2-inch screws.

Put 2-inch screws at an angle through top of seat into tops of legs. Set head in place with projection fitting through seat slot into notch in brace. Join with two 2-inch screws through bottom of brace into bottom of projection. Attach back rest with screws through under side of seat into beveled edge of back rest.

Insert 1/2-inch dowel in head. Screw 12-inch foot-rest to front of front leg at proper height for child who will use the horse and with ends projecting beyond sides of front leg.

Round all sharp corners, sand, paint or varnish, and trim.

Coffee Table Idea For Outdoor Use

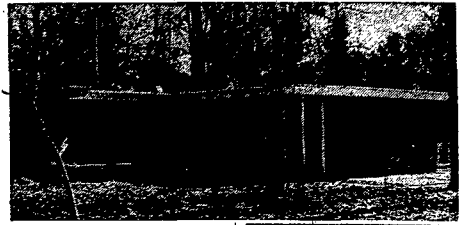
You can make a handsome outdoor coffee table or bench for your patio or garden all in one afternoon. All you need is a piece of fir plywood and some plumber's pipe and fittings.

Here's the trick. Cut a panel of 1/2-inch plywood to the size of table you want, 3x6 feet, 3x8 feet, or 2x4 feet. Nail some lumber stiffeners to the underside and face the edges with 1/2-inch hardwood strips.

Use the plumber's pipe for legs. One-inch pipe is ideal. Fasten the pipe to the table by screwing it into a standard metal flange which can be attached to the underside of the table.

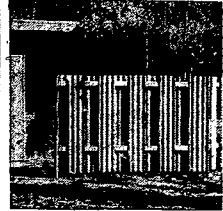
For an outdoor table, be sure to use exterior-type fir plywood wood with completely waterproof glue.

Corrugations Add Appeal



"Modern" building materials aren't necessarily brand new. Take corrugated asbestos sheets, for example. They were developed almost half a century ago and have long been accepted as a standard product for industrial roofing and siding and for hundreds of commercial purposes. Today, however, home builders and landscape architects hail them as a new discovery.

The trend toward low houses with long, sweeping lines has brought corrugated asbestos sheets into use as a siding material for houses. A single sheet will span a wall from foundation to roof. The graceful curves cast ever-changing shadows to catch and please the



eye. Illustrated above is an appealing Louisiana home which gains beauty and distinction from its corrugated sidewalls. The vertical

lines of the corrugations complement the horizontality of the building stone used in the exterior treatment.

The builder also employed corrugated asbestos for the five fencing (lower photo). It was built by first erecting wood brackets and creating deep wall 2x4's. The asbestos sheets were cut into narrow strips and placed vertically on the 2x4's, alternating between the face and back of the wood strips.

Corrugated asbestos sheets are a natural product immune to damage by acid rain, snow, extreme heat or cold, or contact with the earth. They're easy to paint for protection but a complete harmony with the landscape setting chosen for the home.

Awkward Corner Remodeling Easy

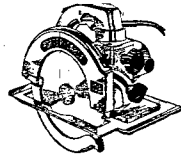
Whether a room is a side or end there's apt to be an awkward corner in the living room.

Here's one way of taking care of that. Make a projection on seven 6-inch wide boards. The sections should be adequate. They mount magazine pictures on the plywood.

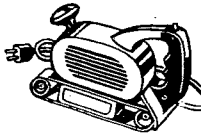
