Among the important items discussed in the booklet are: filing dates and forms to be used; income and expenses to be listed; depreciation and depletion regulations; how to report capital gains and losses; how to handle soil and water conservation expenses and payments and the new self-employment or social security tax. Examples are used to illustrate and explain troublesome or complicated points and procedures, making the booklet easy to understand and use.

#### 4-H Leader Training

More than 800 leaders of 4-H clubs in Nebraska will attend training meetings during January according to Assistant State 4-H Leader Eugene Lovestein. Wayne county leaders will attend the training meeting at Norfolk Jan. 10-12.

Leaders attending the meetings will hold similar training sessions later on in their own counties to share information with leaders unable to attend the state meetings.

These meetings will offer special project training sessions in clothing, foods, home living, animal husbandry, tractor, rural electrification, safety and health. Workshops will be held on parent participation and roles of both junior and adult leaders in 4-H clubs.

Ima Christman, assistant South Dakota state 4-H club leader, will assist with general club management sessions at the Norfolk meeting.

Banquet speaker at the meeting will be Don Novotny, Clarkson, Nebraska's 1955 IFYE delegate to India.

#### Crop Improvement Days

Annual Crop Improvement Days, sponsored by the Nebraska Crop Improvement association and the University of Nebraska college of agriculture, have been scheduled Jan. 30-31 on the college of agriculture campus.

The days give Cornhusker farmers a chance to find out about the new varieties of various crops being developed and tested by the experiment station. At this year's program, the hybrid sorghum breeding program will be discussed in detail.

#### Rise Cattle of Lice

Are you leading lice on your cattle this winter? If so, why not get rid of the vermin suggests Paul Geyer, extension animal husbandman at the University of Nebraska.

One method that has proven satisfactory is the use of backrubbers as recommended for control of horn flies. You can get full information on this practice in Extension Circular 1568 available at your county agent's office.

Another good control method is to spray your cattle on a warm, bright, sunny day. Spray solutions of methoxychlor, toxaphene or chlordane are effective when used according to directions.

## Christmas Care Urged

Nebraskans have been urged to take extra care in examining their Christmas tree lights and wires.

The advice came from State Fire Marshal E. C. Iverson. He said occasionally the wires are damaged in storage or moving and should be carefully checked to eliminate the risk of Christmas tree fires.

The trees, Iverson said, should not be placed in doorways or stairways. In event of a fire a tree next to a door or stairway might block exits from the house, he said.

Records show over the country many people lose their lives because of accidents that could have been avoided by precautionary measures.

Experts say a Christmas tree should be kept in water from the time it is brought into the house until it is removed.

## Use of Candles to Decorate Tree is Strongly Discouraged

Use of candles to decorate a tree is strongly discouraged because of the fire risk. And, experts say bulbs should not rest on the branches of a tree. Lights should never be turned on when no one is in the room.

## Pay Hikes Criticized

Members of a Legislative council study committee have criticized the State Board of Education for hiking salaries in the State Education department. One of the first moves of the board this year was to increase the pay of F. B. Decker, commissioner of education, from \$6,500 to \$9,000 per year. Other division heads received smaller increases.

But the board defended the hikes, contending they were necessary to bring the salary level of the Nebraska department to that in other states.

The Legislative council is a research group composed of state senators.

## CAPITOL NEWS

Lincoln—State Engineer L. N. Riss says Nebraska's Panhandle will have a road network by 1957 that is on a par with that of other states in the state.

The Panhandle, Riss said, "is getting its proportionate share of highway revenue allocated for new construction."

The engineer said an estimated \$2,000,000 of the \$35,000,000 being spent for roads in the 1955-57 biennium will go to the Panhandle. He said the state has 3,124 miles of black-top roads and 637 are in the Panhandle.

"That's almost double the mileage in any of the other seven field divisions in the state," Riss said. "In fact, the Panhandle has over 20 percent of the bituminous surfacing in the state."

There are 60 miles of concrete pavement in the Panhandle, Riss said. He said "that isn't the least concrete mileage for any division by any means."

**Garbage Warning**

Nebraska Veterinarian Dr. J. L. George has a firm warning for persons violating the law by feeding to hogs raw garbage from public establishments.

George said although such violations are on the decline, there still are a few people who seem to think they can get away with it.

The feeding of raw garbage to hogs can cause vesicular exanthema, a virus disease. Outbreaks of the disease in 1952 twice forced closing of the Omaha stockyards and required action by a special session of the Legislature.

"We can't afford to have another outbreak of the disease again," George said. "The federal government would just have to step in."

The 1952 special session enacted a law requiring all garbage fed commercially to hogs to be cooked at 212 degrees for at least 30 minutes.

"We cannot and will not tolerate violations of the law," the veterinarian said.

The veterinarian said "It isn't the big operator that's causing us the trouble. It's the type of individual who has a small herd and collects garbage from neighborhood eating establishments."

About half the persons feeding the garbage, George said, have not installed the proper thermometer which makes a permanent record on paper of the procedure.

The deadline for getting the gadget, he said, is Jan. 15.

"Any person not having one after that date," George said, "will be prosecuted."

He said the fine provided by law ranges from \$100-\$500 for each day of violation.

# FARM REVIEW AND FORECAST



## Farm Families and Social Security

Federal social security program was broadened considerably by 1954 Amendments to the Social Security Act enacted by the 83rd Congress. This legislation provided for the extension of old age and survivor's insurance coverage to over 1 1/2 million farm operators and 2 million additional hired farm workers. These people are asking many questions about provisions and requirements of the program as it applies to them.

### Old Age and Survivor's Insurance

Basically the old age and survivor's insurance program is a family group insurance plan operated by the federal government. Self-employed persons, like farm operators, hired workers and their employers pay "premiums" for this insurance while they are earning income. The protection provided for survivors of an insured person is especially important to young farm families with children under age 18. The retirement income feature is of more immediate interest to older farmers in addition to the survivor's protection.

This program, together with adequate life insurance and accumulation of savings and other property, will provide greater income security for families of many farmers and farm workers. Social security should be considered as only a part of a family's plan for adequate insurance protection and retirement income.

**WHAT ARE THE KINDS AND AMOUNTS OF BENEFITS?** Three kinds of benefits are provided by the social security program to qualified dependents:

1. Monthly retirement payments to insured persons and specified dependents;
2. Monthly survivor's payments to families of deceased insured persons;
3. Lump-sum payments of \$90 to \$255 upon the death of an insured person.

Table 1 gives some examples of kinds and amounts of retirement and survivor's payments. The top line lists the minimum payments and the bottom line the maximum payments which may be earned.

**IS PARTICIPATION IN THE PROGRAM VOLUNTARY?** No. If you qualify it is required. All self-employed farmers and hired farm workers whose earnings are such as to come within provisions of the law must report earnings and pay social security taxes regardless of age.

### Responsibilities of Farm Families

Who Are "Covered" and Required to Pay Social Security Taxes?

**FARM OPERATORS AS SELF-EMPLOYED PERSONS.** Farm operators—persons farming for themselves as owner-operators, partners participating in a joint venture, or as tenants or share-farmers—who make a NET PROFIT from farming of \$400 or more in a year must pay social security tax and will be entitled to protection of federal old age and survivor's insurance. This coverage of farm operators as self-employed persons took effect Jan. 1, 1955, for farmers reporting their federal income tax on a calendar year basis, or at the beginning of any fiscal year ending in 1955 for those reporting on a fiscal year basis. It is not necessary to live on the farm in order to be covered. Farm owners who operate their farms entirely with hired help are considered self-employed persons.

**FARM WORKERS AS EMPLOYEES.** Hired farm workers, including farm household help, who are paid as much as \$100 CASH WAGES IN A YEAR FROM ANY ONE FARMER-EMPLOYER, whether the work is regular or not, are included as of Jan. 1, 1955. Regularly employed farm workers have been in the program since 1951. A farm worker now gets credit for one quarter of coverage if he is paid \$100-199 in a year from any one employer; two quarters if he is paid \$200-299 in a year; three quarters for \$300-399; and a full year for \$400 or more. Thus, a worker who is paid \$100 cash wages by one employer and cash wages of \$60 and \$70 by two additional employers during the year would get credit for only one quarter of coverage and pay the social security tax on his earnings of \$100 from the one employer. Payments received for farm work other than cash wages, such as board, room and farm products, do not count for social security.

Farm work is NOT covered and social security taxes are not paid if the work is done: (1) by the employer's son or daughter under age 21, or the employer's father, mother, wife or husband; (2) by foreign workers lawfully admitted from the British West Indies or by Mexican contract labor; and (3) in connection with gum naval stores (turpentine, etc.).

**RENTAL INCOME EXCLUDED:** Share or cash rental income received by farm landlords is specifically excluded by law from income classed as net earnings from self-

employment. Farm landlords are therefore not now included in the OASI program unless they receive other income from a covered business or occupation.

### How Are Retirement Payments and Survivor's Benefits Earned?

Farmers and farm workers become entitled to benefits by earning enough over a period of time from operating a farm or from cash wages in farming or other occupations that come under the law, and by paying the social security tax on these earnings.

The Social Security Administration uses detailed rules established by law for determining eligibility and figuring payments. In general, payments are based on average monthly earnings from Jan. 1, 1951, up to the year in which you reach age 65 or die. In figuring average earnings you are entitled to omit up to four calendar years after 1950 in which your earnings were lowest or in which you were not working in a covered occupation. Since Jan. 1, 1951, is also the starting date for figuring average earnings of newly covered farmers and farm workers, their four-year drop-out is already used up. When you have at least 20 quarters (five years) of covered work, you can leave out one more calendar year of your lowest earnings. After that drop-out, average monthly earnings will be figured by dividing the total taxable earnings in the remaining period by the number of months in that period. If less than 18 months remain, the total earnings will still be divided by 18.

### When Do Farmers and Farm Workers Become Insured?

The amount of time in "covered" work or self-employment necessary to qualify for payments at retirement and survivor's benefits in case of an insured person's death is very important. Farmers and farm workers who are near or past the retirement age of 65 are very much concerned with the time required to qualify for retirement payments. Younger farmers will want to know how soon their families will be protected by the survivor's insurance phase of the program.

Certain lengths of time in covered work are necessary to qualify for these social security payments. The time varies with the type of benefits, whether survivor's or retirement, and the date a person reaches age 65 or dies. The amount of work required is measured in "quarters of coverage" which are equivalent to calendar quarters or three-month periods. A farmer gets four quarters of coverage for each year after 1954 in which he either reports \$400 or more net earnings from farming or uses the optional method. A hired farm worker gets one quarter of coverage for each \$100 of cash wages from any one farm employer in a year, but only four quarters per year.

A farmer 65 or older could qualify for retirement payments as early as April, 1956. He would need to report net earnings of at least \$400 or gross farm income of at least \$800, if reporting on a cash basis. FOR BOTH 1955 AND 1956. For example, such a farmer who is sure of earning at least the minimum necessary annual income in the first three months of 1956 could retire and start receiving retirement payments as early as April, 1956.

If he considers a farm sale as a way of receiving this income, he should remember that income from the sale of capital items like machinery, livestock for dairy, breeding, or work purposes, etc., does not count toward social security benefits.

In most cases, it will pay the farmer to continue farming for at least two full years under social security coverage to be sure of earning enough income to qualify for at least the minimum benefits and, if possible, for larger payments than the minimum. For example, if a farmer qualifies for retirement payments on July 1, 1956, but does not apply for these social security benefits until early 1957, his benefit payments would be retroactive to July 1, 1956.

### How Do Insured Persons Become Eligible for Retirement Payments?

Farmers and farm workers become eligible to receive retirement payments when they meet ALL of the following conditions:

1. Fully insured status;

### Brief and Important

#### LIVESTOCK

Heavy marketings of cattle and especially hogs have resulted in disappointing prices this fall for Nebraska livestock producers. Some seasonal strengthening can be expected from now on. Abundant feed supplies in the country generally and non-compliance with corn allotments caused a strong demand for feeder cattle. Nebraska cattle feeders and hog producers will operate at a relative disadvantage at least until the 1956 crop is harvested because of the 1955 drought.

#### PROFIT SQUEEZE

The combination of drought and lower prices for farm products has some Nebraska farmers in trouble. Young farmers who have considerable indebtedness for the purchase of land, livestock, machinery, and household goods are experiencing the most difficulty. Some older farmers may not have sufficient gross or net income for social security coverage in 1955. Employment offices in the state report quite a number of farmers have applied for work in towns and cities to provide supplementary income.

#### FEWER FARMS

Preliminary results of the 1954 Census of Agriculture show a decline of 6,300 in the number of farms in Nebraska since 1950. The average size of farm in the state increased from 443 acres in 1950 to 471 acres in 1954. The reduction in numbers took place among farms of less than 200 acres. Net income per farm and per person on farms were lower in 1954 than in 1950 because total net farm income declined faster than the number of farms or farm population.

2. 65 years of age or older;
3. Retired (see discussion below);
4. Application for payments has been made.

### WHEN IS A PERSON CONSIDERED TO BE RETIRED?

A retired farmer or farm worker between the ages of 65 and 72 can earn up to \$1,200 in cash wages or from self-employment and still draw all of his retirement payments. If he earns more than \$1,200 and works in all months of the year, he will lose one benefit check for each \$80 he earns over \$1,200. If he does not work in all months of the year, the benefit payment is made for any month in which he earns less than \$80 or does not actively engage in self-employment.

When the wife or dependent husband of an insured person who has retired reaches age 65, she or he becomes eligible for a retirement payment equal to half the insured person's payment provided that they have been married for at least 65 years. Payments are also made to a wife (under 65) if she has in her care children (under 18) of a retired insured person until all children are either 18 or married. Payments of this type end with the death of the insured person but his survivors may then be entitled to survivor's benefits.

**PLANNING INCOME FOR LARGER RETIREMENT PAYMENTS.** Older farmers, especially those who were 63 or older Jan. 1, 1955, may wish to plan for the highest possible net farm income (up to \$4,200) in order to qualify for the largest retirement payments possible for their situations. Those whose net or gross farm income is near or below the minimum level for social security coverage should try to increase their net farm earnings enough to be included in the program. Those farmers with net farm incomes between \$400 and \$4,200 may want to strive for average net earnings as close as possible to \$4,200. For example, a farmer who reaches age 65 in 1956 can qualify for the maximum benefits if his net farm earnings are \$4,200 or more in both 1955 and 1956.

Farmers who plan to retire or partially retire within the next year or two have considerable flexibility in managing income and expenses to increase taxable net income and social security benefits. Where choices of the methods of handling certain items of income and expenses are optional, they may wish to choose the method which will give greater income and smaller deductions for a specific year. Examples of such choices would include: (1) timing of the sale of crops and market livestock; (2) shifting from the rapid depreciation method to the slower straight-line method for grain storage facilities, other improvements, machinery, etc.; (3) electing to treat soil and water conservation costs as capital investments rather than as current operating expenses; (4) disposing of some depreciable capital items to reduce the total depreciation; and (5) in general, reducing operating costs to a minimum.

**SUPPLEMENTING INCOME AFTER RETIREMENT:** Once a farmer has retired, he can supplement his retirement payments from social security in several ways. A retired person can receive any amount of income from rent, dividends on stocks, interest on investments, insurance policies and interest and principal payments from the sale of a farm or other property without losing any retirement payments. A retired owner-operator has these additional possibilities for increasing or "stretching" his retirement income from social security payments: (1) rent out his land and continue to live in his farm dwelling and raise products for home consumption; (2) rent out his land on a crop-share basis and maintain one or more livestock enterprises for self-employment income (up to \$1,200); and (3) change from a partnership to a lease arrangement.

### What Are the Eligibility Requirements For Survivor's Monthly Benefits?

Two conditions must be met for survivors to receive monthly payments: (1) the deceased must have been "currently insured"; (2) application for benefits must be filed.

Eligible survivors include: (1) widow or dependent widower past age 65, or a young widow provided she is caring for a child under 18 who is eligible to receive benefits, who married the deceased at least one year before his death or is the mother of his child; (2) child under age 18 and unmarried; and (3) dependent parents over 65 providing there is no widow or child under age 18.

### What Is the Lump-Sum Payment?

A lump-sum payment is made upon the death of an insured person. This payment can be as much as three times the monthly retirement payment but not less than \$90 nor more than \$255. It is in addition to monthly survivor's payments and is made to the widow or widower, or to the person who paid the burial expenses if there is no surviving spouse.

### What Does Old Age and Survivor's Insurance Cost?

Farm operators pay the social security tax like other self-employed persons. Until 1960, this is 3 percent of net

farm profit from \$400 to \$4,200 a year. If a farm operator has covered wages in addition to his farm earnings, he pays social security taxes on only enough farm earnings to bring his total wages plus farm earnings to \$4,200. The smallest social security tax a farmer will now pay in a year is 3 percent of \$400 or \$12. The largest social security tax in a year is now 3 percent of \$4,200, or \$126.

For hired farm workers, social security tax is 4 percent of cash wages. Two percent is withheld by the employer from the employee's cash wages. The employer matches this with a like amount and sends the total to Internal Revenue service with his employer's report. The farmer-employer must file reports and withhold and pay taxes for each employee to whom he pays \$100 or more cash wages in a year.

### What Account Numbers and Other Records Are Needed?

**ACCOUNT-NUMBER CARDS:** Every farmer and farm worker who comes under the program will need a social security account-number card. The number of this card is used to identify the individual's social security account and should be on every report of earnings and social security taxes paid. If you never had such a card or had one and lost it, you can get one by filling out Form SS-5, which is available at your post office or nearest social security office, and taking or mailing it to your social security office. If you previously had a number, you should apply for a duplicate of your old number.

**EMPLOYER'S IDENTIFICATION NUMBER:** A farmer who hires workers covered by the program needs an employer's identification number in addition to his own social security account-number card. This employer's identification number can be obtained by filling out Form SS-4A and sending or taking it to District Director of Internal Revenue. This form is available at Social Security and Internal Revenue service district offices. After this application has been filled out and filed with the Internal Revenue service, you will receive your number and information about the social security tax and, at the proper time, you will also receive the necessary return forms.

**WHAT RECORDS ARE ESSENTIAL?** The necessity for making reports and paying social security taxes is another reason for having good farm records. Reliable information is needed when reporting your own farm income and expenses as well as cash wages paid to farm workers. Record books available from the Extension Service in each county and other books prepared by commercial concerns are helpful guides to proper records and encourage record keeping. Analysis of these records will help you improve your business and increase your farm income as well as provide information needed for social security and income taxes.

### Questions—Answers

1. Is a birth certificate required in order to receive social security payments?

Answer: No. If a birth certificate is available it is usually considered as acceptable evidence. Other records are also acceptable, such as baptismal certificates, family Bible, school, lodge, or military records, insurance policies, etc.

2. A farmer's son carries on special activity (such as 4-H or FFA projects) all by himself. Is he self-employed?

Answer: Yes. If his net earnings amount to \$400 or more he must get a social security number, file a tax return and pay the self-employment tax regardless of how young he is.

3. A young farmer is now 30 years old. Will he have to continue paying social security tax after he has 40 quarters of coverage and fully insured status?

Answer: Yes. He must report and pay tax so long as he has taxable wages or self-employment income, regardless of age or insured status. Furthermore, the amount of his benefit depends upon the AVERAGE of earnings to his account throughout the period he is under the program. Although he might be permanently insured for SOME benefits, his benefit AMOUNT would be sharply reduced if the average earnings were not maintained up to the time of his retirement or death.

### For Additional Information

In general, information as to social security coverage that is: (1) as to when you are currently or fully insured; (2) what earnings are considered in computing the amount of your OASI coverage; and (3) other similar questions relating to this phase of social security, should be obtained by either a visit or a letter to your nearest social security district office. District offices are located in major cities in all states. Information on taxes can be obtained from any district office of the Internal Revenue Service. Representatives from these offices also regularly visit county seat towns and other communities.

THE CHRISTMAS SPIRIT

The visiting missionary from America had just arrived in the war torn and famine-ridden land of Korea. He had received an invitation to a prayer-meeting at five a.m. on a cold, stormy, winter morning. After telling himself it was rather foolish to expect anyone to be there, he finally decided to go to the appointed place. As he entered the lighted, war-shattered building, he was overcome by the sight of about 500 people already in prayer. When they had prayed and studied the Bible for about two hours, the leader suggested that they take an offering for the folks who were not so fortunate as they were that day. The visiting missionary wondered what these poor folk would have to put in an offering. Then, right before his eyes, they began an orderly march to the front and each one took off a coat or sweater and laid it on the altar. It was the best they had to give. It was ALL they had to give. 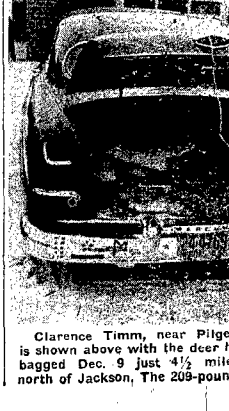
District Dairy Group Elects Two Wayne Men

To Mail '56 Statements Here Dec. 30

Most Wayne county car owners will pay about the same motor vehicle taxes in 1956 as they did in 1955. This was the news this week from County Assessor Henry Arm, who will mail the 1956 statements Dec. 30. In most cases, if you are driving the same car, your taxes will be within a dollar of the amount you paid in 1955. Increased tax levies in most districts offset the reduced valuations on the autos and trucks. How taxes compare in various parts of the county are shown in the table below. Taxes listed are for a 1951 model car both years. The rural precinct is based on an average tax levy of 30 mills in 1956 and 28 mills in 1955. The car was valued at \$270 in 1955 and \$250 in 1956.

Motor vehicle taxes will be paid at the same time new license plates are purchased. County Treasurer Leona Bahde said plates will go on sale Jan. 3. No licenses will be issued before that date. Miss Bahde pointed out that some revisions have been made in the procedure from last year. Car owners will have until Mar. 1 to secure the 1956 plates. Licenses for purchase last year was Feb. 15.

Next year's plates will have white numerals on a black field. Added at the bottom is "The Beef State" line approved by the Legislature. Truck owners will receive only one plate while autos will remain at two. Truck plates are mounted on the rear of the vehicle except on semi-trailers when it will go on in the front. Weight tabs will not be used on commercial truck plates. Instead windshield stickers will be used to designate hauling capacity. Commercial truckers will be required to bring a new certified scale ticket to the treasurer's office at the time the license is purchased. License fees have also been changed for some autos and all commercial trucks. Cars will now have a flat \$8 fee. Last year these weighed under 3,000 pounds required only a \$6 fee. Commercial trucks vary from \$12.50 for a 1/2-ton unit to \$7.50 on a 20-ton unit. This compares with a spread of \$10-\$420 a year ago. Farm truck fees remain the same: 3-ton or under, \$8; 1-1/2-ton, \$10; 1 1/2-ton, \$12; 2-ton, \$13, and 2 1/2-ton, \$25. Method of securing plates will remain the same as last year. Owners must bring the tax statement from the assessor with them when they purchase new plates as the statement also serves as receipt. Persons who wish to receive their plates by mail must include the entire statement from the assessor, license certificate and check or money order covering license fee, vehicle tax and 25 cents for postage.

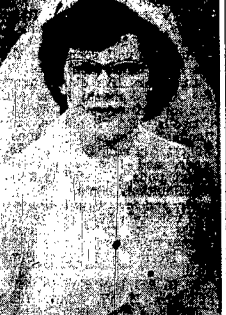

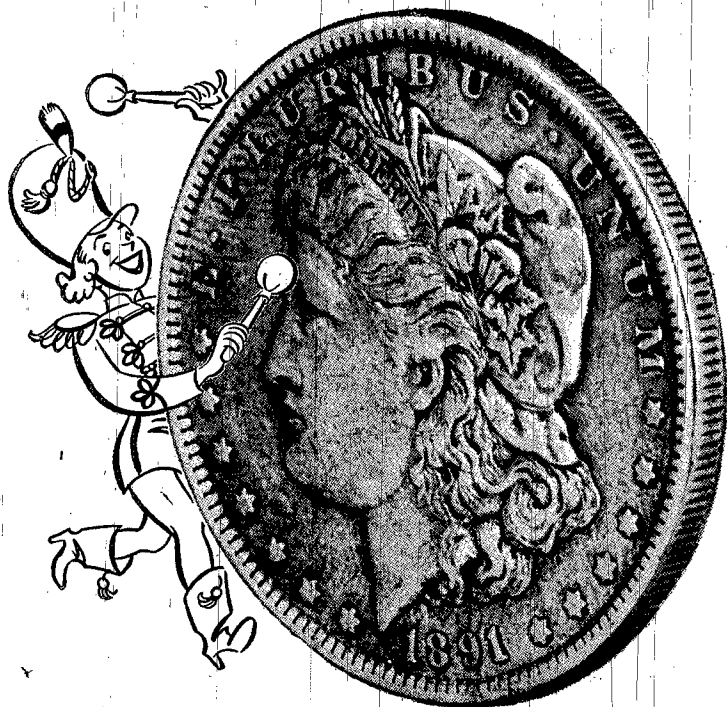
