

Rural School Boards Discuss Reorganization Wednesday

Officers to Plan Public Meet Soon

A resolution favoring reorganization of school districts in Wayne county was adopted last Wednesday at a meeting of Wayne County Rural School Boards Association. The group met at the courthouse.

The resolution directed that a committee be appointed to obtain information on reorganization and disseminate it to the various districts.

The committee is composed of the organization's newly-elected officers: Gordon Numbarger, Wakefield, president; Richard Jones, Hoskins, vice president; and Ralph Watson, secretary-treasurer.

Numbarger said the group plans an open meeting soon with a speaker on school reorganization.

The rural school group also approved a resolution that they go on record as opposing "Federal aid or Federal intervention" in the public school system.

Figures from the office of County Supt. Gladys M. Porter show that 1954-55 per pupil cost in school districts in the county range from a high of \$121.13 in District 11 to a low of \$127.58 in District 14. Both these districts are closed and contracting.

Average per-pupil costs of rural schools in the county are \$31.24 with a variance of \$10.40 pupils per school.

Average salaries paid to teachers is \$231.61 per month for beginners and \$258.80 per month for experienced teachers. Salaries range from a high of \$330 per month to a low of \$209 per month. These salaries are based on nine-month periods.

Only 12 of the present rural school teachers have two-year teaching certificates. After 1958 rural teachers will be required to have two-year teaching certificates in two years' experience and 30 hours of college credit. Beginning rural teachers will be required to have a two-year certification. Seventy rural teachers in the county do not now have two-year teaching certificates.

All districts except Hoskins, Wayne, Winslow and Carroll pay 6.26 mills for high school levy in addition to the regular school levy.

Levies for 1955-56 range from 16.10 mills in District 46 to none in District 32. Hoskins levy is 20.54 and Carroll is \$3.92.

Month's Moisture Totals .5 Inch; Readings Frigid

Precipitation-wise January was off to a good start for the best Nebraska in a month that normally gets .3 inch of moisture. Wayne received an accumulation of one-half inch.

Snow falling in January amounted to eight and one-half inches, most of it falling in two storms. Tuesday night's snow will show on February records.

Temperature readings for the month have been another picture, however. Readings hit zero or lower 10 days during the month. Despite a high of 60 degrees this has been the coldest month of the winter. Low for this period was minus 16.

Comparing the 1955-56 heating season from Sept. 1 through Jan. 31, this has been the coldest winter since before the 1948-49 season. Total degree days for first five months of 1955-56 season was 4272. The winter of 1949-50 racked up a total of 4043 degree days.

Total degree days to date in the 1955-56 season stand at 1542.

HERE AND THERE ... With Your County Agent

Protect Cattle

Your cattle will thank you if you go to work now to protect them from heel flies. You'll be glad if you start the treatment now too, for this is the best time to kill the pesky flies, says Dr. Oliver D. Grace, extension animal hygienist at the University of Nebraska.

Heel flies in the grub or warble stage can be found just under the skin on the backs of cattle. Success of treatment depends on working one of the following mixtures into breathing holes made by the grubs.

Extension Entomologist Robert E. Roselle and Dr. Grace both suggest a mixture of one part five percent rotenone dust and two parts dusting sulphur. Work this mixture into the hair of the animal. Another good combination is one-half pound five percent rotenone dust dissolved in five gallons water to which a small handful of detergent has been added. For larger quantities use 7 1/2 pounds rotenone to 100 gallons water. Apply the liquid solution with stiff brush or condenser as a spray. Dr. Grace advises repeating the treatment three or four times at about three week intervals.

County Agents Short Course

Nineteen county agents including your agent are on the College of Agriculture campus in Lincoln enrolled in the annual winter refresher course, which closes Friday, Ed Janke, associate director of agricultural extension service announced.

The course includes three phases: communications, irrigation and use of chemicals, of which the

agents select two for training. Successful completion of the month-long course applies to the agents' certificates for professional improvement.

Bruceellosis Eradication

Testing and calf vaccination are the necessary first steps in wiping out bruceellosis from cattle herds. During the year that ended in June 1935, nearly a million herds and more than 14 million cattle were tested for this disease, and nearly 4 1/2 million calves were vaccinated, under an expanded federal-state eradication program. The United States farms are still infested with bruceellosis, according to a report from the U. S. Department of Agriculture. When the program was started in 1934 the rate of infection was approximately 12 1/2 percent of all cattle in Nebraska. Bruceellosis infection in Nebraska cattle was below 1 1/2 percent in 1935.

Cooperating federal-state authorities are hopeful that with increased cooperation from the industry this costly cattle disease can be completely eradicated from the United States within a few years. Three states have already been certified as modified bruceellosis free. Several more states hope to attain this status by June 30, 1936 and practically all remaining states have set a goal for similar certification by 1950.

A recent change in Federal policy provides for local veterinarians to cooperate in this program. As a result, the number of practicing veterinarians working on a federal fee basis has increased from 124 to approximately 4,000 since September, 1934.

CAPITOL NEWS

Lincoln—The buildup toward the rush of filings for the May primary election in Nebraska already has begun—and filing fees are causing some confusion.

This came to light when Paul Kruger, Fort Calhoun, was "overcharged" on his filing fee at Blair for the Republican nomination for Congress in the second district. This drew comment from Deputy Secretary of State Roland Luedtke.

Kruger's filing was delayed while the matter was corrected. Luedtke said Kruger should have been charged only \$10 instead of \$25, and said the Washington County board could direct the county treasurer to return the overcharge.

Candidates for University of Nebraska regent, presidential elector and convention delegate are not required to pay a filing fee, Luedtke explained.

For other district and state filings, including Congress, the fee is \$10, except that the charge is \$50 for United States Senator. The fee for filing for county office, including county judge and county superintendent of schools, is \$5. The fee for district judge is \$25, the same as for judges of the Nebraska Supreme Court.

There also is confusion as to where the fee is to be paid. Luedtke explained this must be done at the county seat of the candidate's own county. The receipt must be presented and mailed to the Secretary of State with filing before a name can be entered on the ballot.

Bids Called

Contracts are slated to be awarded Feb. 24 for constructing four buildings to serve as division engineer and safety patrol offices for the Highway department. The offices will be located at Norfolk, Grand Island, McCook and North Platte.

State Engineer L. N. Ross said plans are available to all interested contracting firms. The work will consist of constructing a one-story structure at each site. Also included in the work will be grading, sidewalks, parking space and all other minor items as specified.

Ross said the department has long advised the "decentralization" of the department so that local problems may be more easily handled at the division level. Said Ross, until such decentralization is brought about, the department's main offices in Lincoln must continue to act on all highway and safety patrol questions.

The state is divided into eight divisions for highway administration purposes, two of which have offices in the statehouse. Plans for new division offices in Ainsworth and Bridgeport will

be drawn up and released at a later date, Ross said.

Morris to Court

George Morris, ousted head of the Men's reformatory, has taken his drive for reinstatement to Lancaster County District Court. His attorney, Frederick Wagnor, filed a petition with the Board of Control, which fired Morris, with error.

The petition charged basically what Wagnor and Morris have claimed all along: "That Morris was wrongfully discharged."

2. He was not given a "full and proper hearing" according to law. 3. A referee should not have been designated to take testimony at a public hearing, instead of the board.

4. There was error in conduct of the public hearing. The board fired Morris Sept. 8 on grounds he made public statements which "hampered efficient operation of the Penitentiary and Reformatory." It also said he failed to cooperate with Penal Director B. B. Albert.

Morris said he made the statements, but denied they hurt the penal program. He also denied he had failed to cooperate with Albert.

In a statement, Wagnor said that the board had taken the position that the "king can do no wrong."

The Morris hearing and the ruckus over it some weeks ago touched off a sharp series of statements from Albert who said the Reformatory was "dirty and rundown" and badly in need of repair.

Albert Hopeful

Penal Director B. B. Albert has notified the Board of Control he hopes to return soon to his advisory post.

But, he said in a letter, that depends upon the outcome of his physical examination this week at Walter Reed Army hospital. Since Dec. 16 Albert has been at his home in Roanoke, Va., on a 60-day leave of absence without pay. He took the leave to try to regain his health.

Albert is suffering from arthritis and gallstones. He told the board that the Virginia sunshine has materially helped his arthritis. And, he said, he hopes the examination will give him a "clean bill of health" so he can be of "further service" to the board.

Krush Speaks

Dr. Thaddeus P. Krush, director of community services for the Nebraska Psychiatric Institute, Omaha, said education is a big part of Nebraska's mental health program. At a speech in Lincoln he said mental illness is now at the stage tuberculosis was several years ago.

Krush said people once dreaded tuberculosis and believed it carried some kind of a "stigma." His job will be to direct the state mental health program's plan to attach small psychiatric units to general hospitals throughout the state.

"We want to provide better psychiatric care to more people and make it possible for families to see patients without driving clear across the state," he said.

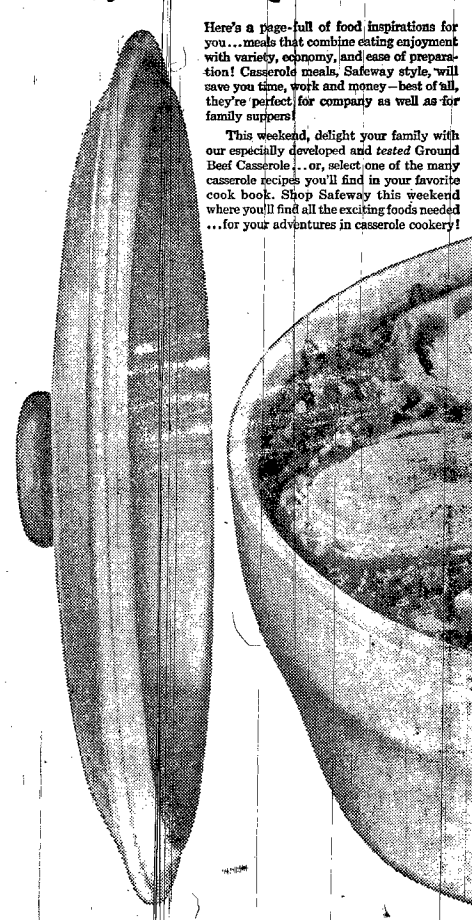

1 1/2 pounds ground beef • 1 1/2 teaspoons salt • 1/4 teaspoon pepper • 1 cup chopped onion • 1 tablespoon oil • 1 No. 2 1/2 can of tomatoes • 1 1/2 cups uncooked rice • 4 cups water • 1 1/2 teaspoons salt • 3 green peppers, halved and cleaned • 3 large or 6 small onions, fresh cooked or canned, OR 1 package, or can, mixed vegetables, or whole kernel corn drained • 1/4 pound sharp Cheddar cheese, grated.

Mix together beef, salt and pepper. Fry onions in oil until golden. Stir in beef, lightly brown. Add tomatoes. Season. Place rice, water and salt in casserole. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) for 35 minutes. Set green peppers down in rice. Place onion or mixed vegetables inside green peppers with cheese. Pour meat mixture over all; cover and return to oven. Bake 20 to 30 minutes longer.

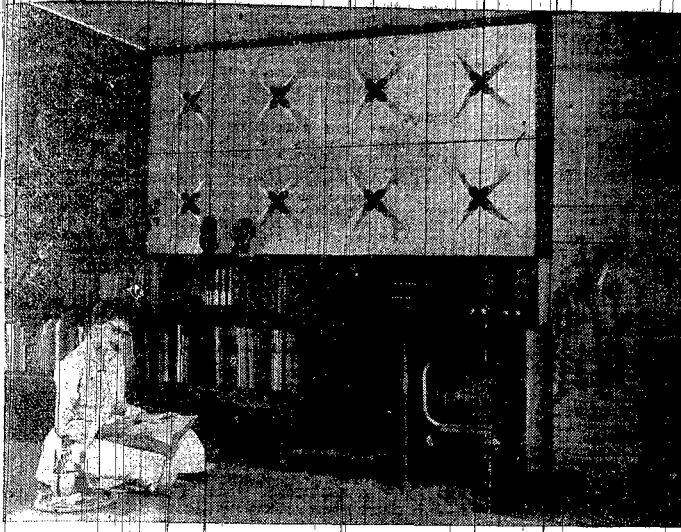

'Weave' With Fir Plywood Technique Proves Exciting New Remodeling Idea

It's called Moke—which rhymes, appropriately, with Olney—it's the newest in fir plywood design concepts. This wonderful idea in decorative remodeling may be just the thing for creating original and exciting interior remodeling effects.

Moke is an entirely new design principle that combines pattern and texture with dramatic color, finishes and lighting effects. Many have admired Moke as just one of the "50 Golden Ideas" introduced recently at the Golden Jubilee observance of the western plywood industry in Portland, Ore.

Moke came from the drawing board of Architect Whitney R. Smith, Pasadena, Calif. He suggested the idea as a new and versatile treatment for fir plywood panels.

Originally conceived as an interior decorating and remodeling

idea, Moke has received considerable attention in other fields such as in department store back-grounds, lobby displays, but it primarily remains something for the home.

Although several standard designs are already gaining acceptance, Moke leaves it up to the busy do-it-yourselfer to come up with his own idea. By its very nature, Moke treatment has limitless applications and literally hundreds of design possibilities.

In fact, the idea is actually a new art form pointing the way to a multitude of design effects in building.

Strengthens Panels
Moreover Moke has applications in strengthening light plywood panels—applications which may be combined with design

that may well lead to entirely new architectural and construction methods.

The name Moke is based on a seldom-used English word, Moke, which means "to weave." That literally describes some of the effects created when fir plywood is cut into patterns in such a way that dowels or other inserts form an attractive three-dimensional relief effect. The visual pattern is made even more dramatic by unusual lighting effects.

Here is what you do to create Moke with fir plywood:
Trace a pleasing design on the surface of a fir plywood panel in such a way that cuts along the design will permit you to spring sections of your pattern away from the panel proper. Cut along your design with a saw. Sprinkle the

design sections outward and hold them with an appropriate dowel or other piece of wood. That's Moke.

No Special Tools
It's made with ordinary tools. A portable saber saw is best. It can be held by hand or clamped to a table. A plain keyhole saw can also do the job. In addition, you'll need a hand or electric drill, bits, hammer, screw driver and pliers, just about what you'd expect to find in most basements or garages. Until you've had practice with Moke, it's best to stick to designs which do not call for sharp curves or intricate cutting. To start with, you can experiment by cutting small Moke patterns in light cardboard. A ruler and compass will help in the layout. Repetitive patterns are generally most effective.

Here are some tips things to watch to gain the best effect in Moke:

Try to allow at least 10 inches for all cuts which will be woven. Shorter cuts may cause the panel to distort but a simple frame around the edges will bring it back into shape. Start the actual construction by drilling holes to provide starting points for the saw

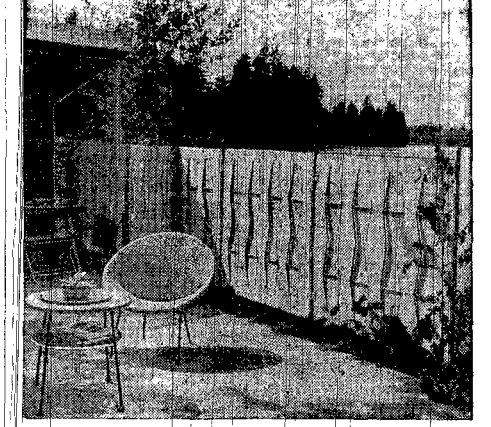
cuts. Holes may be made $\frac{3}{4}$ " to $1\frac{1}{2}$ " or larger, depending upon the effect desired.

Sawing Cuts
You'll saw cut may be started in one hole and ended in another for symmetry of design. In making saw cuts with the saber saw, place your plywood panel with the good side to the wall using the saw installed in a table. Place the good side down with the hand-held saber saw. To prevent chattering, insert the saw in a drilled hole before starting it and do not remove the saw until it has stopped.

After the cuts are made, the actual weaving is done by lifting part of your design and inserting a dowel or other spacer. Weaving should be done carefully, one section at a time. When the weaving is completed, fabric or plastic backgrounds may be installed.

You can paint or stain the finished panel and Moke design according to your own taste and the decorative effect you want.

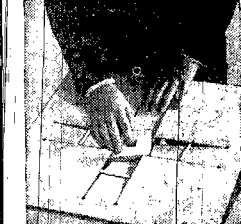

Here's How to Make Drilling, Nailing Easy

Need a handy tip on how to start drilling holes in fir plywood? Those who work with metal nearly always carry around a center punch to start drilling holes. This also works for fir plywood panels, where a small punch hole will enable the drill to start more easily.

Another useful tip for dripping fir plywood is that when nailing or drilling into the edge of any panel, a common fault is in getting slight splintering of the end. This can be eliminated by using a small clamp which compresses the area where you are going to do the nailing or drilling. The clamp can be put on in a jiffy, the nailing or drilling done and the clamp removed in a couple of seconds.

Varied Colors Give House Needed Drama

"Give a house drama by painting various parts of the house different colors," says Faber Birren, New York color consultant.

"The second story can be painted pink and the bottom white. A wing can be painted a different color from the main structure. So can an attached garage," he explains.

"Multi-color is particularly useful in houses that have little basic architectural drama. The color variation can be used to provide the necessary drama."

Because it often is the single largest visible area, the roof plays a unique and necessary role in multi-color decoration. The homeowner should use the same solid color shingle throughout the roof. The roof should not be roofed in green, one side of the main roof in blue and the other side in red. The roof must serve to relate and unify the different colors used elsewhere on the house.

In new construction or with existing houses where re-roofing is imminent, the home owner should take special care to select a roof color that will harmonize with several different color schemes. This will give him flexibility for future redecorating.

Asphalt shingles come in such a wide spread of colors any preference can be satisfied. The shingles can be used on both the traditional pitched roof and the contemporary low-slope roof.

"In using multi-colors on a house," suggests Birren, "the color break generally should be made where there's a natural interruption in the architecture, such as where two walls meet. In places where there is no interruption, a molding strip can be used to mark the division."

A different color or shade from that used on the main parts of the house can be used to highlight particularly handsome features—a porch, a gable end, a dormer, or an outside chimney.

The multi-color treatment can also be used to change or hide bad features. A top-heavy house will seem lower if the second story is painted a dark color, also if a dark color asphalt shingle roof is used. A low house will look taller if a light color roof is used. An unattractive wing will be inconspicuous if painted a bland, neutral color.

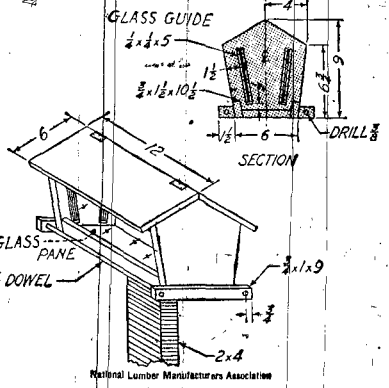
