Wednesday Funeral Services Held for WSTC President Rice

College Head Dies Sunday

Funeral services for Dr. John D. Rice, 53, WSTC president since 1951, were held Wednesday afternoon at First Methodist church. Dr. Rice, who had been ill several months, died of cancer shortly after noon Sunday at Benhack hospital.

A. B. Gray officiated at Wednesday's services. Mrs. C. N. Olson played organ selections. Pallbearers were Ralph Carhart, Clarence Kuhn, Gordon Shuge, M. B. Street, Milton Hassel and Everett Rees. Burial was in Greenwood cemetery.

Memorial services for Dr. Rice will be held at an all-school convocation at 10:30 a.m. Monday in the college auditorium.

Since assuming the Wayne presidency in August, 1951, Dr. Rice had been responsible for institution of an extensive building and remodeling program on the campus.

Completion of the U.S. Conn Memorial library is scheduled this year. Construction of a new auditorium-gymnasium is expected to start early this year. Numerous other remodeling projects have been completed around the campus.

In addition to the physical expansion, Dr. Rice was also responsible for establishing added degrees and a new graduate program in the college curriculum.

Also active in civic affairs, he was a Community Chest and Kiwanis club director and had served in a similar Chamber of Commerce post. He was 1954-55 president of Nebraska State Education association.

Prior to coming to Wayne, Dr. Rice served as superintendent of schools at Holbrook, Arapahoe, Superior, Glenview and Kearney and Aberdeen, S.D. He was much interested in maintenance and custodial problems and directed the State Custodial school while at Kearney.

Dr. Rice was born Jan. 16, 1901 at Grand Island. He was a graduate of Grand Island high school and the now closed Grand Island college.

He received his master of arts degree from Columbia university, New York City, and his doctor of education degree from Colorado State College of Education, Greeley, in 1949.

Dr. Rice was past president of Nebraska Schoolmasters club and held memberships in Phi Delta Kappa (national professional education society), Methodist church, Masonic lodge, American Association of School Administrators and National Education association.

Survivors include his wife, Minnie, and a son, David, an Army lieutenant stationed at Ft. Benning, Ga.

Dean of Students Milton J. Hassel will administer affairs at the college until the State Normal board meets. Hassel has been acting during the illness of Dr. Rice.

Cut 16,000 Acres from '55 Total

Corn allotments in Wayne county will be cut about 16 percent from the 1955 figures, County ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell announced this week. This would follow release of 1955 allotment figures by the State ASC committee.

Wayne county's allotment is 83,994 acres. The 1955 figure was 99,918. The county decrease is slightly under the state average of 16.2 percent.

Counties in Northeast Nebraska varied from 15.4 percent in Pierce county to 17 percent in Thurston county. The table below shows the 1955 and 1956 acreage allotments and the percent of cut.

Allotments for 1956 were based on plantings in a five-year period from 1951-55. Sundell pointed out allotments will vary from farm to farm in each county because each precinct had different planting averages during the base period.

Allotments for individual farms are being prepared and the county committee hopes to have them to county farmers early in March.

Sundell reminded that if any change has occurred in ownership, operation or control of a farm or there is any change in 1956 the result of divisions, sale or rental or purchase or renting of additional land, the 1956 producer must report such change to the ASC office promptly so adjustments may be made in the allotments.

There are no marketing quotas in effect on corn. The only way farmers will be affected by overplanting allotments is that they will not be able to participate in the price support program, which has not yet been announced on the 1956 crop.

When a farmer plants in excess of a grain acreage allotment for his farm, the entire production of that commodity from the farm becomes ineligible for price support, Sundell stated. He was speaking from a ruling by state officials.

Besides complying with his acreage allotment for the particular grain, the farmer must also have produced all of the grain he offers for price support on his farm during the year for which he is applying for support.

Producers must meet certain official U.S. grain standards and must be in storage before the loan is applied for.

A meeting with university officials will be held in the high school auditorium after lunch. All persons who purchased memberships or contributed money toward the farm will be invited to attend, association directors said.

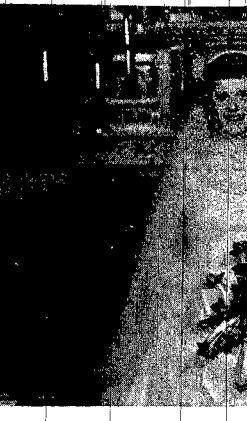

He had planned action on a new dormitory to be built on the campus.
He had planned for new wings to be added to Morey Hall, allowing accommodations for an additional 55 students.
He had planned a general clean-up, paint-up, light-up campaign on campus that has been a continuing project since his arrival.

Always a strong believer in maintenance, he was instrumental in starting a state school to help custodians of state buildings learn better and more efficient ways to maintain buildings.

Take It Easy
Farm economists at Nebraska College of Agriculture say these notes of caution in the regular weekly news letter to county agents:
One snow storm doesn't make a good crop in Nebraska. A lot more moisture will be needed before the danger of drought is past. It's still a good idea to use caution in making spending plans for 1956, especially in buying on credit.
Seasonal increases in hog prices have led to statements that the five-year decline in farm prices has ended. The likelihood of a slight recession in 1956, lower crop support prices and continued high farm production do not hold much hope for farm price recovery in the year ahead. Ration prices will stabilize at a lower level.
Farm costs should be cut where possible without reducing gross income more than costs. Large capital outlays such as for new machines and buildings will often have to be postponed. Labor should be used efficiently; its cost has gone up more than any other farm production item in recent years.
Dry-land farmers may want to hold off on fertilizer application to see how spring rainfall develops.
Farmers who have reduced their livestock operations this winter may want to comply with their corn acreage allotments. This permits them to use the price support program if livestock feeding conditions are unfavorable. Compliance has another advantage in case they have a bumper corn crop. A farmer who stays within his allotment could "sell" his own corn at the support price and buy free corn at much less than the loan rate.

New Sweetclover
Madrid, Spanish and Evergreen are all improved sweetclover varieties. Stands are easily established because of quick germination and vigorous seedling growth. They help overcome first year weed competition, adverse climatic conditions at seeding time and infestations of sweetclover weevil and other insects.
Madrid is a yellow-flowered, biennial sweetclover. It matures early and has proved excellent for all farming areas. It is outstanding in first year pasture and hay production yielding over 50 percent more forage than Common Yellow. In the second year, however, there is very little difference between the two. Seed supplies are quite plentiful.
Spanish is a white-flowered, biennial sweetclover. It produces over 70 percent more forage than Common White in the first year and in the second year about 10 percent more. Seed supplies are scarce.
Evergreen is white-flowered biennial sweetclover. Its outstanding characteristics are late maturity and heavy forage production in both the first and second years. Evergreen can be expected to produce over 70 percent more forage than Common White in the first year and 30 percent more in the second year or a total of about 50 percent more forage for the two years. Seed supplies are limited.

DID YOU EVER READ "MOULIN ROUGE" BY Pierre La Mure? If you did you know that it was a very skillfully constructed story. This author has written another book now called "Beyond Desire," the fictionalized biography of Felix Mendelssohn. It is the story of love, his love for the fiery Italian prima donna, Maria Salla, and for Cecile Jeannerod, his wife, who was one of the most beautiful women in Europe. But it is also the story of a different kind of love which became a dedication—his love for the music of his great predecessor, Johann Sebastian Bach, and his fight to restore that music to its rightful place in the world. For this love he risked his marriage, his career and his health.

"THE VALLEY OF THE VINES" BY JOY PACKER is a very interesting story. It will remind you of the Jaina stories about the setting in South Africa instead of Cuba and Africa. The land, owned by the family, ruled over by an aged grandfather, gives a similar theme. The style of writing, the good character sketches and a good many other things brings this comparison to mind. If you want an up-to-date story of South Africa we recommend "Valley of the Vines." The book is the February selection of the Literary Guild.

A GOOD MANY PEOPLE, OUR MEN READERS especially, look for books by Edison Marshall with anticipation. He is a master story teller, an adventurer who has really been to the high and far-off places he describes so vividly. His new book "The Gentleman" takes the reader from Carolina to the West Indies, to Cuba and Africa. Plenty of action in this story to keep you awake.

Nebraska's Unicameral Legislature was adopted at a general election in 1934. It became effective in 1937.

Spears said there are two possible methods of calling an election to amend the Constitution to provide for a partisan legislative body. This could be done by a vote of senators themselves in 1957 or by petitions calling for an election on the question.

Spears conceded an election by either method would be "difficult" to arrange.
State Democratic Chairman Lawrence Brock, Wakefield, said the most fundamental instrument for maintaining and exercising principles of freedom in a Democracy is the two-party system.
Brock said the logical place for the two-party system to flourish is in the legislative branch of government. He said if the Legislature is a representative body it should portray the "political coloration" of the voting districts that choose its members.

Levy Needs Cited
A committee of state senators is studying information on the institutional building levy, gathered from a meeting in Lincoln last week.

The senators comprise the Legislative council committee studying the problem of whether the levy should be continued. The levy is \$1.10 for each \$1,000 worth of tangible property.

Proceeds go to the Board of Control, University of Nebraska, state teachers colleges and the military department.

building program if the levy, originally enacted for 10 years, were continued for another five.
Henninger said remaining structures would cost \$3,970,610, of which the federal government would be expected to pay \$1,838,250.

The Board of Control told the committee it would like to add \$4,423,500 worth of buildings to the physical plant at the state's 17 institutions.

The levy is due to expire next year.

Hospital Funds Up
If President Eisenhower's recommendations for funds for the Hill-Burton hospital construction program become law, Nebraska will get \$36,017 more money for the 1957 fiscal year.

The fiscal year begins July 1, 1956. The figure proposed by Mr. Eisenhower for Nebraska would be \$1,022,819, compared with \$1,084,302 for the 1956 fiscal year.

Vernon Pangborn, director of hospitals for the State Health department, said the 1957 proposal would include \$87,961 for general hospital construction, an increase of some \$3,000.

The 1957 recommendation would include \$332,358 for special facilities, a \$22,358 increase from the 1956 total.

Parole System Working
Gov. Victor Anderson has high praise for Nebraska's new approach to the problem of paroling inmates from the penitentiary and reformatory.

The governor said the system is "working well" but should be viewed periodically to see if it can be improved.

It might even be a good idea, the governor said, if the Legislature studied the system and those in other states to see if Nebraska's can be made better.

Now the governor said, authorities at the penitentiary and reformatory are preparing when the State Pardon board, of which he is chairman, decides which inmates should get a hearing before the board.

That is new procedure. Also new is a "pre-release" program at the penitentiary. Under the program inmates get instruction on how to behave when they are released and the problems they are likely to encounter.

After the board decides who will get a hearing, Dr. James Reinhardt, University of Nebraska professor of criminology, interviews each inmate and presents a report to the board.

Family Life Dictates Home Design

Well aware of the growing size of American families and the greater emphasis on family life, builders are adopting design changes and architectural styles which contribute to home-centered living according to Otto F. Weizel, architectural consultant.

Five trends which enforced slowly after World War II are now rapidly gaining momentum and becoming firmly established in American residential architecture, Weizel said.

Just as we saw the two bedroom house become obsolete in recent years, the architect said, "we could find in the years to come that new houses which lack the family facilities buyers are looking for will be drug on the market."

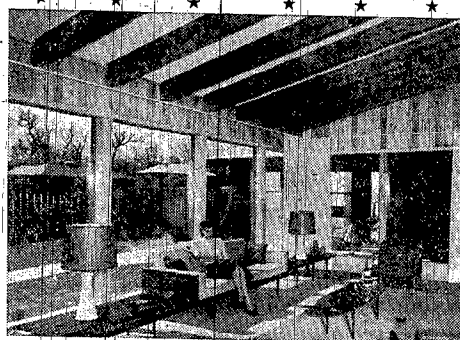
The major trends Weizel sees in modern residential architecture are:

1. A family room which may be used as a den, a play area for entertaining or as a hobby center is replacing the dining room. Often the family room adjoins the kitchen so it can double as a dining room and sometimes it opens onto a patio. Safety glass doors or plate glass in large closets or insulating glass in less temperate areas are used to make the play area and patio a single living area. In warm weather the doors can be opened to make the play area and patio one and on cold or rainy days the closed doors do not isolate the outdoor "room" from the interior. In many cases the family room is in the basement or, in the split-level house it is frequently on the lower level in the rear.

2. Homes are more grandly styled. The lines are simpler and the "gingerbread" look, which characterized the houses built in the 20's and 30's is disappearing. Builders make more use of materials. Roofs are low pitched. Frequently the post and beam method of construction is used and the beams are left exposed to lend a feeling of strength, height and spaciousness to the interior.

3. Builders are paying closer attention to orienting the house on the lot so the homeowner can enjoy his property to the full. Privacy fences are being used more and more to combine privacy with the freedom of indoor-outdoor living and contemporary design on smaller lots.

4. Built-in type kitchens with plenty of cabinet and counter space and which take much of the "drudgery" out of preparing meals and doing dishes are getting greater emphasis. Many new homes feature a room-length working counter which houses the drier, washer, dishwasher, garbage disposer, sink and range. Appliances and cabinets are finished in colored porcelain to end the bleak look which formerly characterized ki-

chens. Wood cabinets with natural rubber finishes are also popular. The built-in range, oven and one-wall refrigerator are combining much of the back-breaking "chores" the kitchen is being "joined" to the rest of the house through the use of room dividers and sliding doors to keep Mom in on the family activity while she is preparing meals.

5. Interiors and exteriors are becoming more closely integrated. The patio, terrace or porch is an extension of the living area and is in perfect harmony with the indoor room. In heightier the closed indoor spaces are being used to make the rooms "flow" on outside. In more and more instances, an American version of the European "court" is being used. "L" and "U" shaped patios are built with a garden patio-pool as the house's center of attraction. The house "opens up" so that bedrooms, kitchen, family room and living room face on the court and window walls, sliding glass doors or french doors link the interior through large glass areas adds space to every room and assures a completely private outdoor living area.

Perhaps one painted wall of

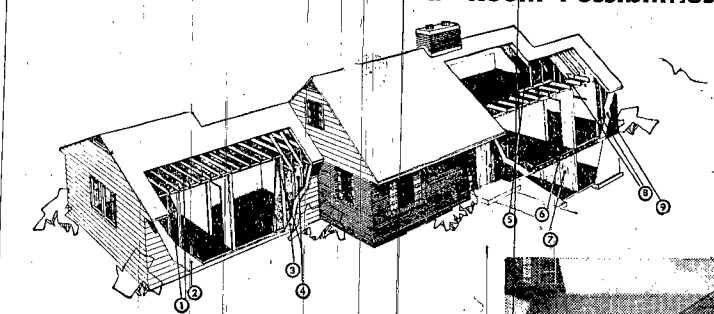

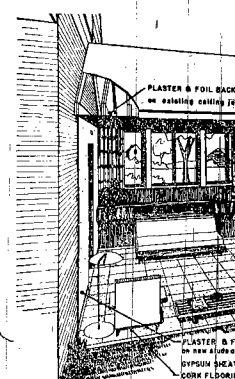

Misted Windows Warns Humidity Is Too High

Don't blame the windows for collecting condensation in the winter. They are danger signals warning you the humidity in your home is too high.

A humidity of 30 per cent is generally accepted as the optimum for comfort. In older houses it is often difficult to maintain this much moisture in the air, but in modern homes, tightly-insulated to reduce drafts and conserve fuel, excessive humidity is the villain.

And it's a villain which can cause hundreds of dollars worth of damage to your home. The gallons of water which, when it rains, is cooking, bathing, washing clothes and even breathing... contribute to the air having no way to escape, to the drier air outside.

When the indoor air becomes saturated, the water vapor starts to "collect on the window panes, because glass is a vapor barrier, and in the case of single-glazed windows, the air next to the glass is considerably cooler and, therefore, has less moisture-bearing capacity than the rest of the air in the room.

As the water vapor is forced toward the drier air outdoors, it may pass right into the walls, where condensation under the exterior paint causing it to blister, or it may

condense on the studs and siding, causing rot.

If your home is equipped with storm windows or glazed with double-paneled insulating glass and the windows collect condensation, the danger signal is flying with a vengeance, since untreated or unglazed windows equipped with storm sash collect condensation far less readily than single-pane windows.

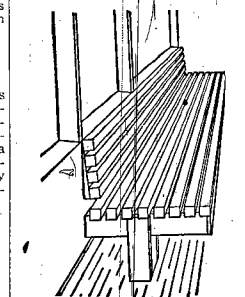
What can you do to keep the indoor humidity within reasonable limits?

1. Vent clothes driers to the outdoors.
 2. Open a window for a few minutes after a shower or bath.
 3. If windows start to fog, open the front door for a few minutes. The resulting heat loss will be small, but the excessive moisture will pass quickly to the outdoors.
 4. Open a kitchen window a half inch or so at the top when cooking or washing dishes. If you hang clothes in the basement to dry, leave one of the windows open a little.
- If excessive humidity persists after these precautions:
1. Check the roof, flashings and gutters for leaks.
 2. Install a vent fan in the kitchen and bathroom.
 3. Insulate the crawl space under your home with a vapor barrier packed insulating material, the vapor barrier toward the ground.

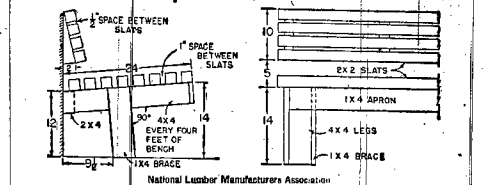


MAKE A WALL BENCH

Make a seat frame: two pieces of 4 by 4-inch lumber, each 24 inches long, for the ends; one 2 by 4 for the back; and a front apron of 1 by 4. Taper the ends of the 4 by 4's 5/16 inch to provide the seat slope. Use the same taper for the bottoms of the legs. Fasten the legs to the frame ends with 1 by 4 braces.

Nail the frame to the wall using 20-penny nails at each stud. The seat slats are fastened to the frame with 20-penny finishing nails. If the seat is to be covered, the slats must be about 1/2 inch apart. If covering is not used, more slats should be added. The back rest consists of two or more 10-inch wedges and four lengths of 2 by 2.

For long benches, additional legs and frame members will be needed to provide a minimum span of 4 feet.
