

Farmers Can Receive Aid

Nearly \$69,000 in federal funds will be available to Wayne county farmers in 1956 for performance of soil conservation practices, County ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell announced this week.

Eighteen practices have been approved for the 1956 ACP cost-sharing program in this county. They are designed to encourage practices which provide the most enduring conservation benefits on the lands where they are to be applied.

Costs will be shared with a farmer only on satisfactorily performed conservation practices for which cost-sharing was requested by the farmer before conservation work was begun.

Farmers must file these requests at the county ASC office during the 30 day period prior to the time when the practice will be started. No requests will be accepted after work has been started.

An added service for farmers who wish to start practices has also been initiated this year. This is a system of prior payments to suppliers of materials or services used in ACP practices.

These suppliers can get such payments only by signing a participation form at the county ASC office. This enables the government to make advance payments for the materials or services before the practice is completed. Thus the farmer does not have to use his own funds to give the supplier immediate payment.

There are other procedures necessary for certain practices. A soil analysis must be obtained and filed with the ASC before cost-sharing can be approved for completion of lime or superphosphate. A certification of need and practicality must be obtained from the SCS technician for gradient terraces, diversions, sod waterways, channel and gully protection, tile drains, erosion control or livestock water dams and leveling irrigable cropland.

The approved Wayne county

practices, the rates and deadline dates are as follows:

Gradient Terraces
Construction of gradient or level terraces to detain or control the flow of water to conserve water and retard soil erosion on sloping land.
Federal cost-share: 2 1/2 cents per lineal foot for all terraces.

Diversions
Construction of diversion ditches or dikes to intercept runoff water and divert excess water to protect outlets.
Federal cost-share: Varies from three to eight cents per lineal foot.

Sod Waterways
Initial establishment of permanent sod waterways to dispose of excess water without causing erosion.
Federal cost-share: 90 cents per 100 square feet for shaping waterway; five to eight cents per lineal foot for filling according to cross section measurement; \$7 or \$30 per seed and seeding according to cross-section.

Channel and Gully Protection
Construction or installation of chutes and drop spillways or similar structures to dispose of water without eroding.
Federal cost-share: \$18 per cu. yd. of concrete installed; nine cents per lb. of reinforcing steel installed; varying amounts for installation, materials and fabrication of tubes, tees, bands and tubes.

Tile Drains
Installation of underground drainage systems to dispose of excess water and provide drainage for individual fields.
Federal cost-share: seven or 10 cents per lineal foot for tile; 11 cents per lineal foot for installation of tile; \$15 per cu. yd. of concrete installed; seven cents per lb. for reinforcing steel; nine cents times the drain diameter in inches per lineal foot for metal tubing.

Erosion Control Dams
Construction of earth dams for erosion control or sediment retention to prevent or heal gully and to retard or reduce runoff of water.

Federal cost-share: 10 cents per cu. yd. of earth in fill; \$18 per cu. yd. of concrete installed; nine cents per lb. of reinforcing steel; 40 cents per board foot of treated planking installed; 60 cents per rod for construction of permanent fencing; varying amounts for material, installation and fabrication of tubes, bands, elbows and tees.

Livestock Water Dams
Construction or sealing of earthen dams, pits or ponds for livestock water as a means of protecting established vegetative cover by the proper distribution of grazing.

Federal cost-share: Identical with erosion control dams except addition of one cent per pound of refined bentonite applied.

Controlling Shrubs
Controlling competitive shrubs to permit growth of adequate, desirable vegetative cover for soil protection on range or pasture lands.
Federal cost-share: \$1.50 per lb.

of 2,4-D active ingredient used; \$2.50 per lb. of 2,4,5-T active ingredient used.

Spraying must be done between May 15 and July 1.

Permanent Cover
Initial establishment of a permanent vegetative cover of perennial grasses or mixtures of perennial grasses and perennials for soil protection or as a needed land use adjustment.

Federal cost-share: \$4 per acre for seedbed preparation during year of seeding; \$3.25-\$3 for seed and seeding; nine cents per lb. of available P205 applied; 60 cents per rod for constructing permanent fencing.

Protecting Field Borders
Initial establishment of permanent vegetation as a protection against erosion.

Federal cost-share: Identical to permanent cover with exception of P205 and fencing payments.

Vegetative Cover
Establishment of additional acreages of vegetative cover of perennial legumes or perennial

grasses or mixtures of such in the crop rotation system to retard erosion and to improve soil structure and permeability.

Federal cost-share: \$2.50-\$4 for seed and seeding; six cents per lb. of available P205 applied.

Winter Cover Crops
Establishment of acreages of vetch, rye, barley, oats or mixtures thereof as vegetative cover for winter protection from erosion.

Federal cost-share: \$1.25 per acre for seeding rye, barley and oats; \$2.25 per acre for seeding vetch.

Seeding must be completed by Sept. 15.

Green Manure Cover
Establishment of additional acreages of vegetative cover of biennial sweetclover, alfalfa or red clover for green manure and for protection from erosion.

Federal cost-share: \$1.25 per acre for seeding sweetclover; \$2.25 per acre for red clover and alfalfa.

Seeding must be completed by June 1.

Treatment of Cropland
Initial treatment of cropland by application of liming materials to permit the use of legumes and grasses for soil improvement and protection.

Federal cost-share: \$3 per ton for liming material applied.

Contour Farming
Initial establishment of contour farming operations for close sown or row crops on non-terraced land to protect soil from wind or water erosion.

Federal cost-share: \$1 per acre for row crops.

Seeding for row crops must be completed by June 15.

Tree Planting
Initial establishment of a full stand of trees or shrubs by planting, interplanting or replanting windbreaks, shelterbelts or woodlots for erosion control or watershed protection.

Federal cost-share: \$1-\$4.50 per acre for site preparation; \$8 per 100 trees for planting or interplanting and three cultivations; See ACP PRACTICES—page 2

First annual meeting of Northeast Nebraska Experimental Farm association has been scheduled Tuesday in Wakefield, Vice President Jack Kinney announced last week.

Highlights of the meeting will be 10:30 a.m. tours of the experiment farm a mile east of Concord and a discussion of plans for the farm in Wakefield high school auditorium at 1 p.m.

Wakefield Lions club will serve free lunch to association members from 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. in Wakefield city auditorium.

A caravan of cars is slated to leave Wakefield at 10 a.m. to visit the farm. Signs will be placed at 100 points to help guide individual cars to the farm site, Kinney said.

The farm, recently donated to the organization by C. D. Haskell, will be operated by University of Nebraska college of agriculture. College officials expected to report on the afternoon program include Dr. Elwin Prok, Dr. Tom Dowe and Dr. Harold Rhoades.

Nearly 2,000 invitations have been mailed to persons who purchased memberships or contributed money to the organization, Kinney said.

Preparatory work by the extension service has already started at the farm. Agricultural engineers visited the farm last week to survey improvements and list those needed.

The farm is presently occupied by Francis Weisler. He will continue to farm there this year, then vacate early next year.

The half-section is valued at about \$70,000. It was given as a memorial to Haskell's parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. John D. Haskell, in December after the association had sold about \$37,000 in memberships to purchase such a farm. The gift climaxed several months of work on the part of Northeast Nebraska farmers to produce money.

Part of the group's funds, according to terms of the gift, were to be used to improve the farm and \$25,000 was to be set aside in a student loan fund at the University of Nebraska for use by agricultural and engineering students from Northeast Nebraska.

Funds were collected from 11 Northeast Nebraska counties including Thurston, Burt, Dodge, Cuming, Cedar, Wayne, Dixon, Knox, Stanton Dakota and Pierce.

Further resolutions ask "adequate emergency farm credit" be made immediately available; Congressional investigation of "monopolistic market manipulations"; and end to land reclamation projects until increased demand for food justifies increased production and recommend that wheat allotments be made on a bushel basis.

By-laws of the organization expressly forbid officers and directors of the organization "to enter into or engage in, on behalf of this organization or to use any of the assets or property of this corporation, for the purpose of engaging in any business of the sort commonly entered into by persons, firms or corporations for profit."

County Farms Show Big Jump In Value Over 1950 Census

Average Up \$8,000 by New Figures

New York — Acre for acre, Wayne county farms command higher prices than do those in most other parts of the nation, according to new figures revealed in the Census bureau's new census of agriculture.

Results of the survey are being issued in preliminary form for each of the 3,067 counties in the United States. The average value of this kind since 1950.

It shows the average value of farms (land plus buildings only) in Wayne county is \$163,891 an acre, an increase over the 1950 figure of \$141,38 an acre.

This is more than farmers can get for their property in most parts of the country. The national average is \$84.37 an acre. The local figure is also better than the Nebraska state average of \$110 an acre.

In terms of total dollars per farm, values also rose locally since the last census. The average value in the county, including machinery and equipment but including land and buildings, has climbed to \$35,613 per farm, according to the current census. It had been \$27,982 per farm in 1950.

The downward drift of agricultural prices, which has become a major concern to the entire nation, has meant an overall decline in net farm income.

Its effect, according to the Agricultural department, has

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

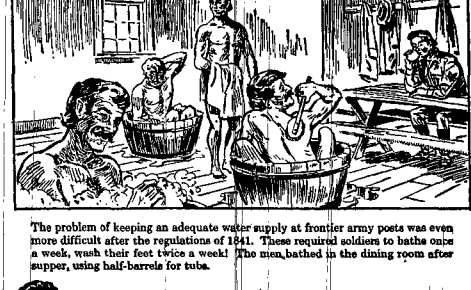

Bargain in Conservation

A "cut-rate" sale on conservation—that's the way Bob Zink, ACP program specialist for the Nebraska ASC office, describes the 1956 Agricultural Conservation program (ACP) available to Cornhusker farmers this year.

Under ACP, federal cost-sharing is made available for conservation measures that establish or improve a protective cover of grasses, legumes or trees, that conserve or dispose of water or protect, improve and make better use of farm and range land. The cost-sharing usually pays about one-half the cost of the project, but may pay considerably more in some cases.

The program is administered by elected committees of local farmers known as Agricultural ASC committees. Each county ASC committee decides which conservation practices will be approved in its county, and how much cost-sharing will be approved for each practice.

How does a farmer go about getting this cost-sharing aid? His first step is to contact his local county ASC office.

This step a most important one—is the one many farmers miss. Unless a farmer fills out and signs an outline request for cost-sharing assistance before he starts a conservation practice, he isn't eligible for the federal aid.

Any farm owner, tenant or sharecropper may request ACP cost-sharing. And for larger con-

Conservation projects affecting their farms, two of more farmers may pool ACP cost-sharing to help solve community conservation problems.

New Tractor Testing

The new summary of Nebraska tractor test results is now available.

Data is included on all current model tractors that have been tested at the University of Nebraska tractor testing lab. It includes results on 124 tractors on the market Jan. 1, 1956.

Single copies of the summary may be obtained without charge from county agents or from the college of agriculture.

More than 28,000 Nebraska 4-H club members will join 4-Hers all over the country in observing National 4-H Club Week Feb. 3-11.

Local plans vary for observing the week. Some communities will have special events where 4-Hers, leaders and parents are guests and speakers. There are endless ways to finish these beautiful softwoods to make the home more attractive.

Bright, New Ideas on Home Lighting Can Solve 'Gloomy Corner' Problem

Good lighting backed by new and original ideas can turn the problem of that dingy corner into the bright spot of your whole house.

There are few home owners who haven't at one time or the other run up against the knotty problem of whether to use a pin-up lamp, an upright or to hang one from the ceiling, to bring additional illumination into various rooms.

Three of the nation's top architectural firms kept these problems in mind when they turned loose along with two other colleagues, to conceive the '50 Golden Ideas' for the Douglas Fir Plywood association's fifth anniversary celebration recently in Portland, Ore. The firms who brought from their drawing boards new ideas in ways to light your home were: Campbell and Wong, A. Quincy Jones and Frederick E. Emmons, architects, and Anshen and Allen, architects.

When three such imaginative designer-architects get together you're bound to get some unusual and perhaps controversial ideas. These are a few of the ideas introduced during 1955.

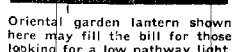
Architects Anshen and Allen offer "cubes of light" as a plan for an interior lighting unit which would be designed into the architecture of the house. It is made up of 6-inch boxes holding lighting elements with open sides covered by opaque glass or, perhaps, parchment. These boxes are open at the top and bottom.

Alternating between these, plywood baffles in a variety of arrangement throw the light in different directions, creating a pattern of light and shadow that has proven highly effective in many installations.

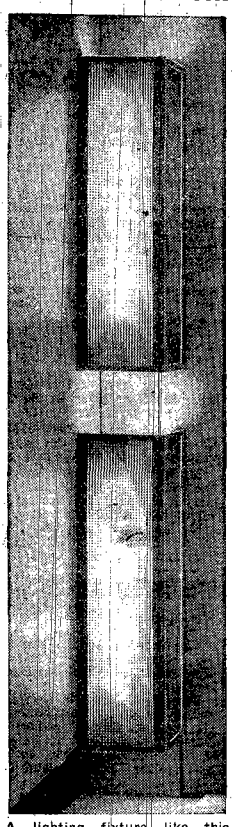
The Anshen and Allen project lends itself unusually well to the problem of the darkened corner. Designed intentionally with small diameter and a length that can vary to the needs of each home, the "cubes of light" take up very little space yet throw plenty of light from that corner.

Another idea from the Anshen and Allen firm is the "boomerang ceiling light." This consists of twelve boomerang shaped plywood joined at top and bottom and covered inside the structure. The pleated parchment shade is provided. With the focal source of light inside the parchment and the plywood, this should work nicely as a ceiling light for a large room.

Corners being admittedly the chief trouble spots, Campbell and Wong have come up with a "corner light" fixture which should find itself some real popularity amidst the clean lines of a contemporary room setting.



Oriental garden lantern shown here may fill the bill for those looking for a low pathway light.

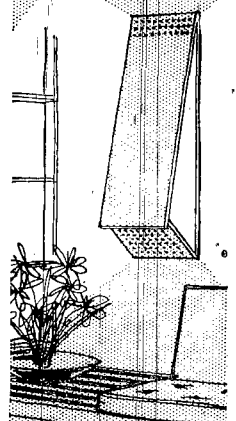


A lighting fixture like this would be completely at ease in the clean lines of a contemporary room setting. It is a simple fixture created by boxing in the light against a corner of the room.

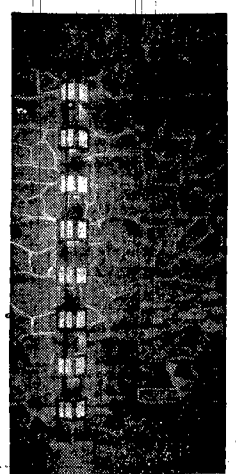
Simplicity Emphasized
It is a simple corner fixture created by boxing in the light against a corner of the room. The exposed sides of fir plywood are marked by long parallel slits, backed by opaque glass or parchment. The simplicity of the fixture adds to its natural appearance and lends itself to many situations.

This same firm of Campbell and Wong has named a second of their many ideas as the "architectural light fixture." This idea could be placed against a vertical pattern wall surface of perhaps "Texture One-Eleven," the western fir plywood industry's new product of grooved fir plywood.

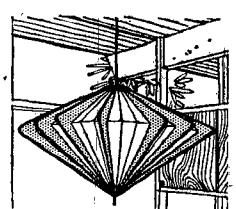
This fixture throws its illumination through irregular triangular shaped sides and out through a pattern of holes drilled at top and bottom. Here again simplicity is the keynote with many designs easily executed to fit nicely against any wall surface in a contemporary room setting.

Called "Cubes of Light," this is another idea in architectural lighting. It is made of six-inch boxes of fir plywood with open sides.



Pleated lantern arrangements set inside series of twelve boomerang shapes cut from fir plywood make up this fixture, called by its designers "the boomerang light."

Not all of the "Golden Ideas" for lighting were directed to indoor use.

Anshen and Allen provided a design for an outdoor garden lighting fixture for use on pathways and other garden elements, planned to keep outdoor lighting down low where it is most useful and attractive. It consists of three simple flat squares of plywood of descending size, mounted one above the other on spacing blocks at the corners. This permits light to escape down and through the structure.

The entire unit is mounted on a simple bracket containing the light element. The unit is adaptable to construction in varying sizes but is recommended to stand not more than two or three feet high.

Exterior Color Scheme Could Match Interior

Carry your inside-the-home color theme right outdoors for a smart ensemble effect, says Grace Holm, home decorating authority.

If your house is sided with one of the many exciting patterns of natural wood, then such accessories as louvers and patio ceilings may be painted any color to harmonize or blend with the wood exterior. Interior color schemes may be carried to these outdoor accents suggests Miss Holm, home decoration editor for the Portland Oregonian's Hostess House.

Miss Holm says that even the carpet beams, a part-time patio if the overhead is painted a gray color and a few shrub tubs of natural cedar are placed at strategic points, giving the area a party atmosphere.

One of the reasons why natural wood is such a popular siding material is because it is so complementary to landscaping, the decorative authority asserts. Red cedar is particularly appropriate for its rich red-brown hue is in perfect accord with most building sites, and cedar has a natural weather resistance, making it ideal for all outdoor construction.

Carpenters and Do-It-Yourself Fans Get Break

Do-it-yourself converts and the nation's millions of carpenters and lumber users will welcome this news from west coast lumber mills.

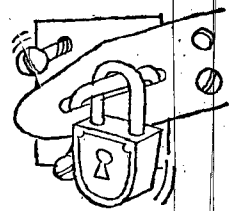
Early in the spring, a new set of grading rules will become effective for fir, hemlock, red cedar and Sitka spruce lumber.

Out the window go old number designations 1, 2, 3 and 4, according to H. V. Simpson, head of the West Coast Lumbermen's association.

In their place, the construction grades of these species of board and dimension lumber will be named in this order: Construction, Standard, Utility and Economy. Simpson pointed out that the new grading rules embody the first major changes in many years and will be as easily understood by the ordinary purchaser of a single board as by a contractor who uses thousands of lumber at a time.

The lumber leader said that architects, engineers and lumber specifiers will find in the new rules a more realistic approach and definition of the engineering qualities found in the strong west coast species of fir and hemlock.

Back Trouble
