Two Local Firms Sponsoring Countywide Spelling Contest

Typewriter Grand Prize For Students

First annual Wayne county spelling contest for grade school students will be held at Wayne Apr. 21. The event is being sponsored jointly by The Wayne Herald and Wayne Book store. Students will compete in two divisions, town and rural, with the champions spelling off for the grand prize, a portable typewriter. A fountain pen and pencil set will be awarded to the runner-up.

Contest rules and lists of words to be used in the contest have been sent to each county school. Herald Editor Bob Johnson announced this weekly entry deadline is Mar. 15, but more than 60 entries have already been received by County Supt. Gladys M. Porter.

The contest will be held in Wayne city auditorium. It will consist of a written test at 10 a. m. Oral examinations will follow as soon as the number of contestants is reduced to a workable number. Entries are restricted to fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth graders. Rural schools may enter no more than two students. Town schools will be allowed two participants from each of the eligible grades. In addition to the individual prizes, a traveling plaque will be awarded to the school of the grand prize winner. It will be engraved with the student's name and school district.

This plaque will become the permanent possession of the first school whose students win the contest in consecutive years. Each entrant in the county finals at Wayne will receive a gift.

Lancaster District Court Decision Backs Wayne-Wakefield Highway Relocation

Bridge Work Started Near Local Airport

Lancaster District Judge Harry Ankney Monday upheld the constitutionality of a bill passed by the last Legislature defining Nebraska's state highway system. The judge, in general, ruled against a suit brought by North-east Nebraskans opposing the relocation of Highway 35 between Wayne and Wakefield. The legislation, LB 187, had the effect of relocating the highway. The judge decreed the suit be dismissed. In finding for state officials, Judge Ankney said Engineer L. N. Rees and Gov. Victor Anderson were operating under proper authority in Highway 35 relocation, work on which is now underway. Workmen for Hobbs Construction company began tearing down old bridges on the new route last Wednesday and part of the old road is now blocked off traffic. The small bridge just east of the Wayne airport has been completely dismantled. Things may be driven later this week. Culvert work may also be started this week. Work on bridges will move to the angled bridge six miles east of Wayne before starting on the big bridge near the local airport. Specifically, Judge Ankney held that a map prepared by the State Highway Commission and made a part of LB 187 had been "properly and duly adopted" by the Legislature as the state highway system. He also held that this did not constitute "local or special legislation" of a type which the state constitution prohibits. The plaintiffs opposing the suit were Morte Waynes, South Sioux City mayor, John D. Forsyth, Doyle Hansen, John Kinney, Joseph See HIGHWAY 35—page 4.

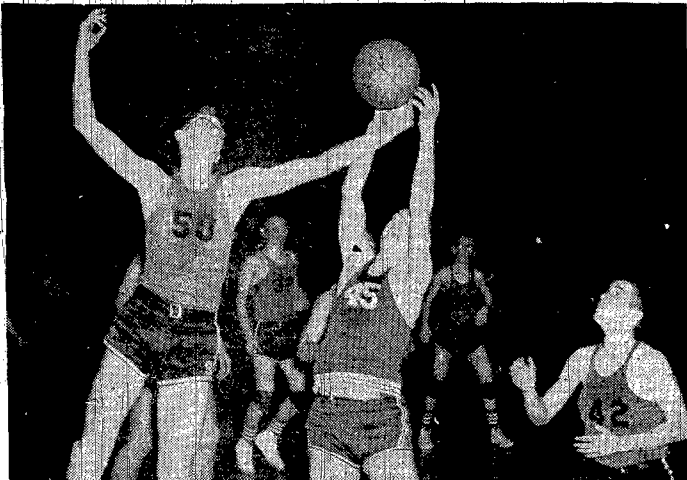

Slight Edge To Wayne in First Game

Wayne High's Blue Devils will square off with Loup City in the first round of the state Class B basketball tournament at 7 p. m. today in Lincoln. Winner of tonight's game will face the Chadron-Hebron victor in the finals at 10:30 a. m. Saturday. All class B games will be played on the University varsity court. Wayne gained the state meet by overwhelming Howells 83-50 in a playoff at Norfolk last Wednesday night. Loup City earned a tournament berth by edging Hastings St. Center 48-46 in a playoff at St. Paul Friday night. Tonight's game will be highlighted by considerable rivalry between the two teams. This is brought about by the fact Wayne Coach Harold Mackiewicz is a Loup City graduate and coached there six years. His brother-in-law is a member of the Loup City squad. Both teams boast identical 18-1 records for the season. Wayne's only loss was to Omaha's Holy Name 54-45. Loup City dropped a 58-36 decision to Central City. On paper the two teams appear even. Wayne holds the advantage in total offense with an average of 75.2 points per game, to 67.8 for Loup City. However, the Blue Devils trail 52 1/2 to 45.3 in defensive averages. Both starting teams are made up of three seniors and two juniors. Both are also noted for balanced team scoring and the ability to score from outside. Wayne's taller team will starters averaging 6-1 1/2. Forward Kenny Dahl heads the list at 6-5 1/2 with Larry Hofeld at 6-4. Loup City averages slightly under 6-5 with Center Dale Reger the tallest at 6-8. Rural Education Meeting Here Friday Attracts 350

More than 350 persons from six Northeast Nebraska counties heard primary and secondary education in rural schools discussed at the Wayne county educational conference Friday afternoon at city auditorium. Sponsor of the conference was Wayne County Rural School Boards association. Appearing on the panel were Alta Louise Otto, Hamilton county superintendent, Avery Linn, state department of education, and Dr. Allen Burkhardt, Norfolk superintendent of schools. Moderator was Gordon Nuernberger, president of the county group.

Delegations from Wayne, Curran, Stanton, Dixon, Madison and Thurston counties attended. Miss Otto discussed elementary education in rural schools. Dr. Burkhardt's topic was secondary education. Linn then opened both discussions together and pointed out problems confronting both phases.

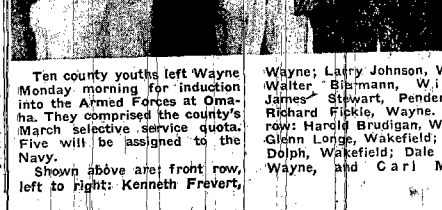

Appraisers filed reports in Wayne County Court last Wednesday in condemnation proceedings brought by the State Highway department to gain new routing of Highway 35 near Winside.

The reports covered about 9 1/2 acres on the Kent Jackson farm and seven acres on the Mrs. Henrietta Lewis and T. W. Sladke land. Appraisers estimated recovery at \$9,150 on the Jackson farm and \$4,000 on the Lewis-Sladke land.

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Dogs, Dogs, Dogs

Dogs are a bother, whether you like 'em or whether you don't. We happen to like them, but we do know they pose special problems. Our police department lately has been deluged with complaints about dogs tipping over garbage cans and spreading refuse in their search for food. A good many dogs are guilty of this... some of them from good homes. It is disconcerting to say the least, to have one's garbage spreading all over the ally and in the yards of neighbors. It is unnecessary to have the refuse lying around, it causes some owners and garbage men alike a lot of extra work. Dogs run in packs, much like people. They have leaders and followers, they soon learn handy and destructive tricks.

Many people add to the problem of loose dogs by turning out their pooches to fend for themselves. Like any other animal, when they get hungry they hunt for food. They find it in garbage cans. It isn't necessarily the fault of the dog, but he is the one who gets blamed and is picked up by police.

Of course the owner has committed a misdemeanor by allowing the dog to run loose. Ordinance No. 468 says "... no dog shall be permitted to run at large in (Wayne) at any time and running at large shall be construed to mean off the premises of the one owning or controlling said dog and running at will out from under the control of the owner or master thereof."

The same ordinance provides for licensing dogs, requiring a new license May 1 of each year. Violation of any part of the ordinance may be punishable by a fine. Worse punishment yet could be inflicted on a youngster who saw his dog taken or destroyed because it was unlicensed and running at large. Yet police would have no alternative because the law says how such dogs must be handled.

No one wants to see dogs destroyed, but rules have to be made and kept. The ordinance requiring dogs to be confined is good. They often are destructive, even dangerous at times. Soon the gardening season will be here and one or two playful pups can wreak havoc in the best planned garden.

Too, dogs running loose are more likely to contract rabies than a well-fenced dog that is kept at home. Many cities have had sad experiences from outbreaks of rabies in their areas. Rabies treatment for humans is extremely painful.

Dairy Production, Supports
Production of milk in the U. S. in January was 13 percent above the 10-year average. Here in Nebraska milk production in 1955 was higher than for 1954. Production per cow in our state was 90 lbs. higher than in 1954, up from 3,280 to 3,370 lbs. Compare these figures with the average production of 8,815 lbs., the average for all cows in the Northeast Nebraska dairy herd improvement association or 13,984 lbs. which was produced by the association's best herd.

When we consider that approximately one-half of the cows milked in Nebraska produced less than the average of the state's figure, we can only conclude that a large number of families are wasting their time producing for Northeast Nebraska and bligible for certification included: Oats, Jackson, Andrew, Cherokee, Nemaha, Clintland, Mo. O-205 and Marion; Spring Barley, Custer, Velvinton, Plains. There is a definite opportunity for producers of some special adapted seeds which are in short supply and for which there will no doubt be a good demand. Among these are bromine-grass, Iored canary grass, Nebraska-28 switchgrass and Empire birdsfoot trefoil.

Home Freezers
USDA says that 6 cubic feet of space are needed for each family member. This study shows that a freezer will last about 12 years and costs about the same to operate at zero temperature regardless of how much food is stored in it.

Junior College Aid
Lincoln—The question of whether to seek state financial aid for junior colleges is being investigated by the Nebraska Association of Junior Colleges.
That request was made last week to the State Board of Education. The board has the same relation to the junior colleges as does the board of regents to the University of Nebraska. There are four public junior colleges—McCook, Fairbury, Norfolk and Scottsbluff. Luther college, Wahoo, is a private junior college.
Frank Kleager, dean at the Scottsbluff school, presented to the board an association request that the board ask the Legislature to consider the state aid matter.
But the board withheld action on the request. Dr. Raymond Gilmore, Kearney, a board member, told Kleager: "The junior colleges better formulate a direct plan and submit it to the Legislature." Said Gilmore: "We don't want to stick our neck out."

totalled 12,775,145 barrels, a 50 percent increase over 1954. Recovery of natural gas totaled 10,289,444,000 cubic feet, up 65 percent. There were 876 test wells for gas and oil drilled, almost 70 percent more than in 1954. About half the tests, 461, went close to producing fields. A total of 262 successful oil wells and two gas wells were drilled.

However, they are admirals in the mythical Nebraska Navy, not the real one. Gov. Victor Anderson handed out the commissions to the 65 recruits.
Fifty-four of them were sworn into the Navy at ceremonies last week in the statehouse. The recruits will train as a group and get their leave after boot camp together.
The men are all high school graduates. The company picked Ann Pettis, Omaha, queen of Ak-Sar-Ben, as its "sweetheart."

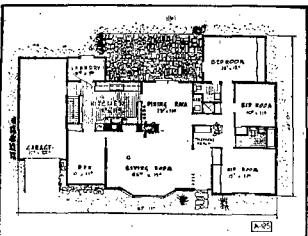

A Living Fence Insures Privacy

A living fence, or hedge of shrub and trees insures privacy to the home owner, helps to shut out traffic noises and dust, or may entirely eliminate an unsightly view of any bordering property.

Living fences may be low or tall, flowering or non-flowering, evergreen, or deciduous. They can be made to fit any shape desired, may require little maintenance, need not even be clipped if the natural shape is desired. Some species grow low without much attention at all. Plants for hedges have been divided into the following groups for various purposes:

1. Evergreen plants, which keep their leaves all winter.
2. Dense plants, which have dense foliage, require minimum care.
3. Thorny plants which make excellent barriers.
4. Low plants, requiring little, if any, clipping.
5. Flowering, usually informal in nature, needing to be clipped only once a year at the most.
6. Colored fruits, to bring brightness and interest.
7. Plants for poor soils and growing conditions.
8. Narrow, columnar and upright plants.
9. Plants for the most adverse conditions of summer heat and drought, or winter cold, or both.
10. Windbreaks and screen plants.
11. Plants for southern gardens. Some flowering plants, like the rose, will grow almost anywhere. There are many other plants available from the pyracanthus and hollies to the moderate climates to the philadelphus and spiraea of northern areas. There literally are hundreds of species of shrubs and trees for practically every screening purpose.

- Light is Right
Light colors for houses, like light colors in clothing, are good for warm weather. The ideal roof has a smooth, white surface. Such a roof will reflect as much as 65 percent of the sun's heat.
