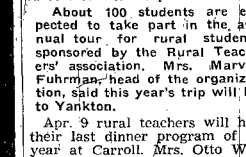

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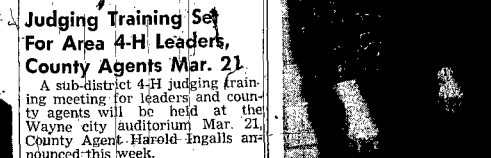
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## Hebron Falls 61-56; Down Red Raiders

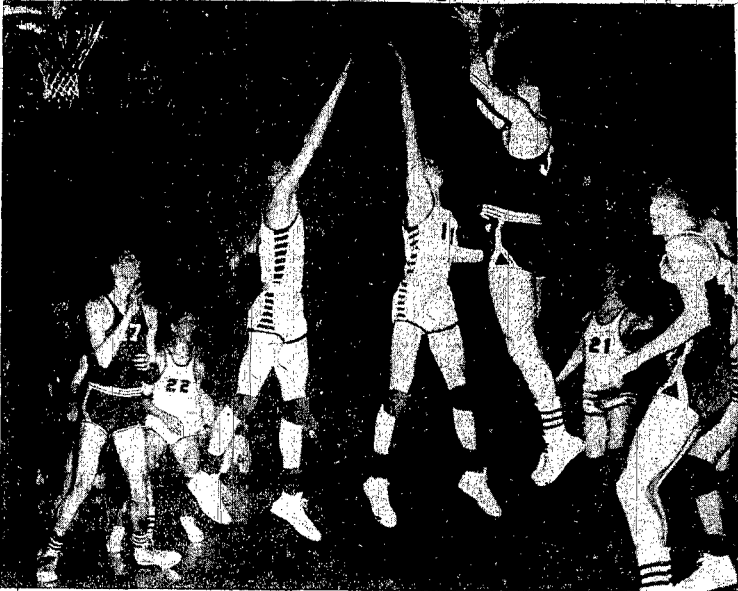

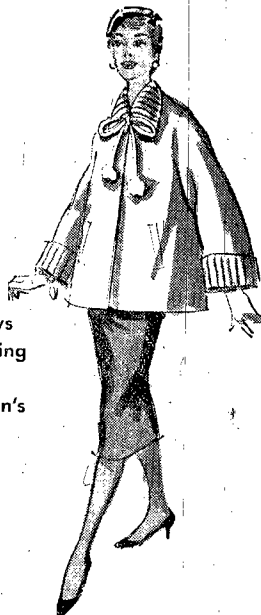

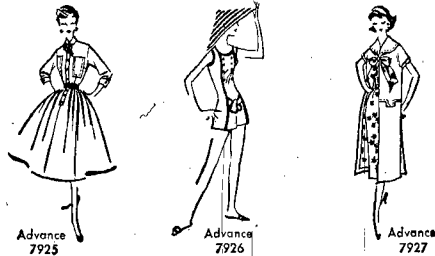

**Lobbyists**  
The widely-publicized "Case case" has highlighted activities of lobbyists. Lobbyists—in the eyes of many—are undesirable rich persons who skulk around trying to influence the votes of our elected representatives.

Actually lobbyists are a necessary part of the political and governmental scene. They are just people, usually paid for their work, who try to show how proposed legislation will affect the future of a certain business, group of businesses or segment of the population.

We are all lobbyists to a greater or lesser degree. When we talk to our councilman here in Wayne concerning a proposed activity—or lack thereof—by the city council, we are lobbying.

If we send a letter to a state legislator concerning an act contemplated by the Unicameral, we are lobbying.

If we write to a Senator urging action for or against a bill, we are lobbying.

Facetiously defined, a lobbyist is a person who is trying to influence a political office-holder in opposition to our wishes.

Seriously, our elected representatives would pull a great many more bladders if there were no lobbyists. They would be in complete ignorance of the effects of many proposed laws. How could they ever hope to know all about everything? Lobbyists perform a vital function despite the bad reputation given them by unthinking or unknowing persons.

Lincoln Progress of a bill in Congress to allocate money to the states for a super highway is being watched closely by Nebraskans.

The bill would appropriate \$25 billion for a four-lane, divided interstate highway, spanning the country.

The "urgency" cannot be over-emphasized for passage of the bill, according to State Engineer L. N. Rens. He said he hopes Nebraskans will support the measure and make their views known to the Congressional delegation.

Construction of the route in Nebraska would cost a total of \$160 million, Rens said, \$54 million more than was estimated in 1954.

The reason for the increase, he said, is that the 1954 estimate was hurriedly compiled. And he said the figures did not take into consideration the high standards of construction contemplated by the federal government.

Rens said a re-evaluation of the cost of the road should be undertaken in the states during construction because the amount of federal money going to the states should be based on need.

"It is imperative," Rens said, "to see that regardless of the ratio of apportionment (of funds),

the ratios are dependent on what the individual states need to complete their portions of the system. If that formula would be equitable."

It is expected the federal government would bear about 90 percent of the cost of the interstate route.

A portion of the highway in Nebraska will be put under construction this year. That will be between Omaha and Lincoln. The exact route will be decided by a study made by an eastern engineering firm.

### New Member

The Nebraska Aeronautics commission has a new member. He is Jess Quinn, Gothenburg, who has been active in flying circles for 10 years.

Quinn replaces Harold N. Jensen, Ainsworth, who resigned. Jensen has served 16 years on the commission and Gov. Victor Anderson said he had a "big part" in the advancement of aeronautics in Nebraska.

Anderson said he accepted Jensen's resignation "with regret."

Quinn, a farmer and rancher for many years, founded the national and state flying farmers organizations.

Judging Contest

High scoring school is awarded a cup by Alpha 1 and Alpha, honorary agriculture education fraternity. Winners in the dairy cattle selection and dairy products judging contests will attend the national contests at Waterloo, Ia. Those winning in meats, poultry and livestock judging contest will compete in the national contests at Kansas City, Mo.

Egg Size  
Surveys in the grocery stores of Lancaster and Douglas counties show that there is a consumer misconception that all eggs must be large to be an AA or A quality. It is the interior quality not the size that determines the grade.

Producers and educators have an important job to accomplish by informing consumers that AA and A quality eggs can come in any size. Small size, for instance, must weigh a minimum of 18 ounces per dozen but can be purchased in AA or A quality. The same holds true

with the extra large size that must weigh a minimum of 27 ounces per dozen and can be purchased in AA and A quality. Someone made the statement recently that they thought they had netted one dollar per bird on their chickens last year. The unfortunate portion of this statement is that dealing with possible profit. They thought they had made a profit but they didn't know. This kind of situation is not necessary for it is possible to keep reasonably accurate records of expenses and income.

Records of this kind remove doubts and inform the individual who is faced financially. Competition is so keen in most businesses that a well kept account book is a necessity. Unfortunately too few Nebraskan poultry raisers are now able to gauge their poultry profits and losses even as close as the person who thought he had made a dollar a bird. You can improve your own situation best by asking yourself this question, "How much profit did I realize from my poultry enterprise last year?"

If it happens to be an embarrassing question now is the time to begin keeping good books in 1956. You will be benefited in many ways, but best of all will be the realization of how you fared financially over the next production year.

Wood's beauty of grain, texture and line place it high on the list of most popular materials to cover the modern home. We have known for centuries about the uses of wood. A.A. Weber, architect, A.I.A., leading designer of contemporary western homes, "that wood-sided structures could withstand heat, cold, rain, snow and parching dryness and still protect the building and contents. "What many an architect is discovering today," Weber continued, "is wood's amazing versatility. It is virtually a new material today, as we utilize its texture, coloring and grain to give new character and meaning to the progressive styling of the home in the modern home. We open the walls of our new homes, he said, to the countryside,

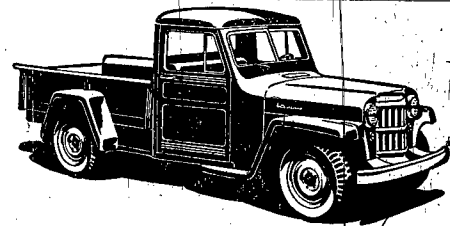

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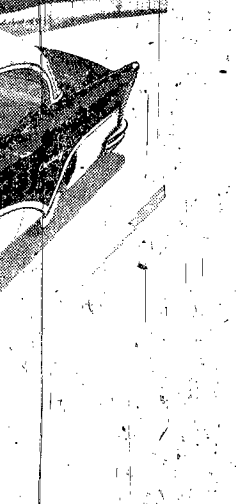
