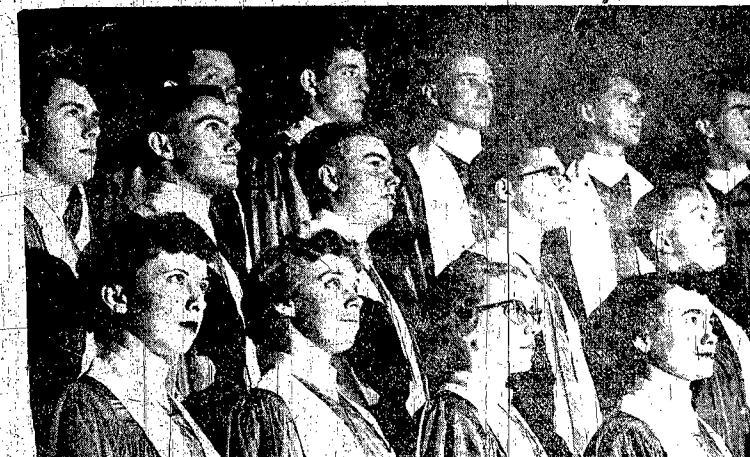

The property must be located in a residential zone and meet FHA requirements. The application for a loan is made through an approved lending institution. The Housing Act of 1954 liberalized the down payment requirements. On new construction, the owner occupies the home. The FHA now insures a mortgage amounting to 85 percent of the first \$9,000 of the FHA appraised value plus 75 percent of the FHA appraised value in excess of \$9,000.

Inspections are sent to the lending institution which advances the building loan accordingly. The loan is repaid in equal monthly installments, similar to the payment of rent. Each installment includes taxes, interest, insurance and direct reduction of the principal. When the loan matures, the mortgage has been repaid in full and the property is held by the borrower free and clear.
