This map is drawn mainly to provide a starting point for determining district lines. We urge every one concerned in this county and adjoining counties to contact the school board member. From his district and discuss these plans. The board member needs to know the reaction of his people so he may act more in accordance with their wishes.

The committee's job is not easy. Districts must be large enough for sufficient evaluation to support a school without making takes excessive.
