Only Two Incumbents Listed On Tuesday Election Ballot

Jaycees Plan Drive to Get Voters Out

Wayne voters will go to the polls Tuesday for the annual city election. Local citizens will name a mayor, three councilmen and two school board members.

Names of only two incumbents will appear on the ballot. They are B. A. Meyer, first ward councilman, and Albert Kern, school board. Other candidates are: Willard White, mayor; Wayne Marsh, second ward councilman; Dr. Gordon W. Shupe, third ward councilman and Herb Kolmipren, school board.

Polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m. Balloting will be at the usual polling places: First ward, city hall; second ward, library basement; and third ward, courthouse lobby.

Wayne Jaycees and Mrs. Jaycees are sponsoring a get-out-the-vote campaign urging local citizens to exercise their civic duty by voting despite the lack of any election contests.

Mrs. Jaycees will call local residents to remind them to vote. Cars will be provided to persons needing transportation to the polls and a baby-sitting service will be available to mothers while they vote.

Quarter-Block Purchased by Council Tuesday

Wayne's city council purchased a quarter-block tract west of the swimming pool Tuesday night for development into a recreational area.

The 150x150 area was optioned from Mrs. Alex Jeffrey, executrix of the Hoguewood estate, for \$1,500.

Discussion of the erection of a memorial monument to servicemen at the park a mile north of town was also held. Lyle W. Gamble, Don Miller and Melvin Frelvo, representing veterans organizations, presented the matter to the council.

They were asked to reach an agreement with the Wayne County club concerning location of the monument and development of recreational facilities.

Possibility of veterans purchasing a tract on the city was also discussed. Mayor Glen Houdersheldt expressed opinion that such a move was possible.

Seek Public Comment on School Plan

Tentative redistricting plans for rural Wayne county schools were announced this week by Wayne County Reorganization committee.

Chairman Herbert Hilkemann, Randolph, said the plans are by no means definite but were formulated to determine public sentiment. He added that the proposed divisions of the county were made in accordance with a survey of high schools attended presently by tuition students from rural county districts.

A map of this survey and the proposed map for redistricting are shown at the bottom of the page.

"We have tried to get each proposed district's valuation high enough so that all county children will have the same educational opportunities, and so that taxes will be equitable," a statement issued by the committee said.

In discussing the map, committee members repeatedly pointed out the plans are extremely temporary. District patterns are asked to discuss the plan with school board officials; and members of the reorganization committee.

Committee members are: Hilkemann, Otto Ulrich and Alvin Schmode, Winside; Joy Tucker, Carroll; Edwin Strate, John Asmus and Martin Schermer, Hoskins; Lloyd McQuistan, Pender, and Burr Davis, Wayne. A meeting was held for school patrons in Logan and Leslie counties Friday night. They discussed comparative costs of K-12 units with bus transportation, two K-3 units and two-room schools.

It was decided to organize a community meeting for the Wakefield area in the near future to discuss reorganization possibilities. Gordon Nuernberger and Errol Muller, Wakefield, were appointed to organize the meeting and contact a possible speaker.

As indicated on the map, the proposed Wayne district would have a \$12,000,000 valuation, triple its current size. Enrollment, however, would be increased only about 20 in the elementary grades. High school enrollment would be changed little since most rural children in the area are now attending Wayne High.

Average per pupil cost for education in the Wayne area districts is \$338.75. County average is \$313.34. Wayne's average cost per elementary pupil is \$168.78.

Average 1955 tax levy for districts in the suggested Wayne area was 15.73 mills. County average was 15.67. Wayne's levy was 15.26 mills.

Plans are underway for public meetings and question and answer sessions on the proposed Wayne district.

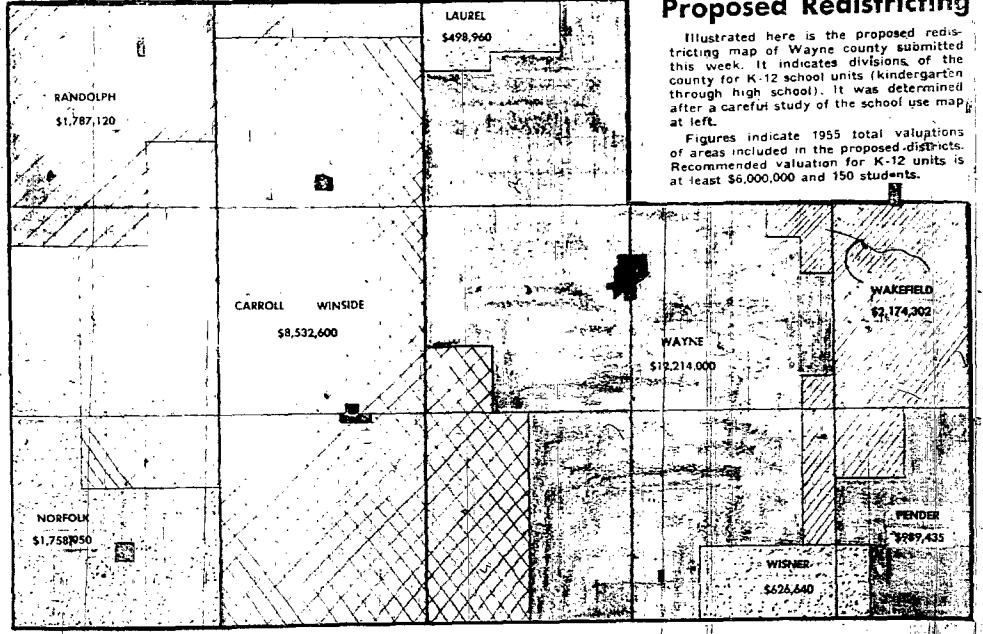
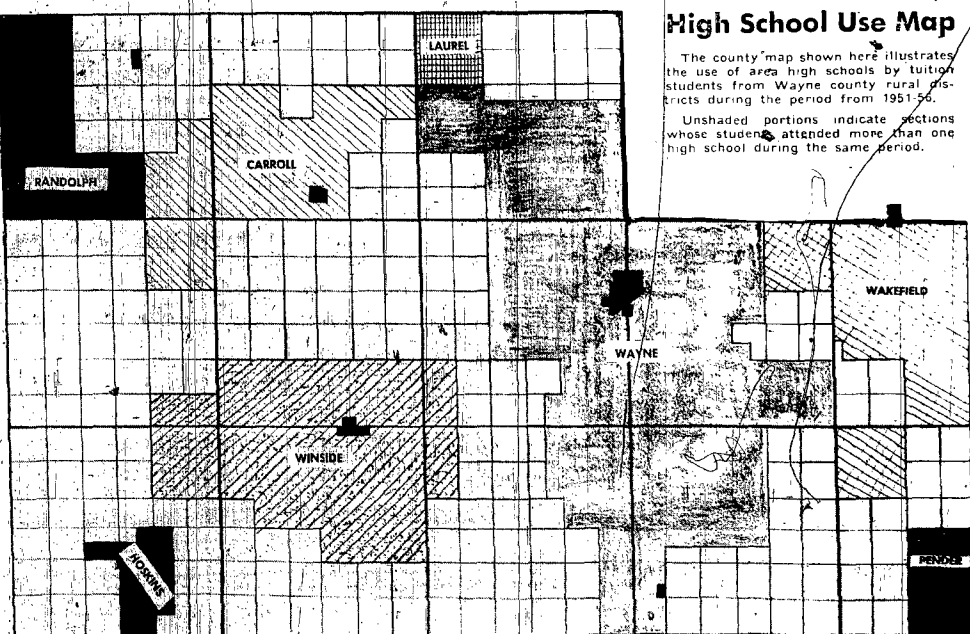

Board Decision Revises College Textbook System

A system of renting textbooks in Nebraska's four state teachers colleges will come to an end with the opening of the first semester next fall. Students will henceforth purchase books required for their classes.

This action was taken Saturday by the State Normal board after a survey of practices in collegiate institutions throughout the country.

WSTC Interim President Milton J. Hassel said the board felt the change would allow a more flexible use of up-to-date textbooks as well as encouraging students to acquire a professional library. It will result in considerable savings in operation of the colleges.

Facilities of the WSTC textbook library will be used to handle new and used books, Hassel said.

An increase of 50 cents per week in room rentals for the WSTC residence halls was also approved by the board. Beginning with the summer session, rental of most rooms will be \$2.75 a week instead of \$2.25.

Changing Times . . . Better Education

Last week we observed Wayne county school re-districting committee in action . . . and we were impressed.

The committee is approaching an enormous task in a sensible way . . . seeking all the answers before they move, trying to understand all phases of re-districting before making definite moves.

Re-districting must come if children are to be given adequate education. Changing times have brought a change in schools, attendance and curriculum. Meeting these changing needs will also mean that some community may have to give up its school so a merger could be affected with other schools.

Re-districting may bring what seems to hardships to a few—a change usually does that. For the most part, however, re-districting offers advantages for rural areas.

First—and most important—students are given an opportunity for better education. Rural school board members who have visited reorganized districts elsewhere in Nebraska say their reaction is, "Why didn't we do it sooner?"

Then come the other factors such as better buildings, lower per pupil costs and, in many instances, reduced tax levies.

Elsewhere in The Wayne Herald this week we have published maps showing very tentative re-districting plans submitted for Wayne county by the re-districting committee.

This map is drawn mainly to provide a starting point for determining district lines. We urge every one concerned in this county and adjoining counties to contact the school board member from his district and discuss these plans. The board member needs to know the reaction of his people so he may act more in accordance with their wishes.

The committee's job is not easy. Districts must be large enough for sufficient evaluation to support a school without making taxes excessive. The districts still must be small enough for practical operation. It is much more than just drawing lines on a map and saying, "Here is a new school district."

A Dangerous Trend

The efforts of the Prohibitionist forces to ban interstate advertising of alcoholic beverages is not only a threat to the entire advertising industry but also is an attack on freedom of business enterprise.

For 12 years the drys have been promoting legislation which, by prohibiting liquor advertising, would attempt to accomplish what 14 years of the Volstead act failed to do. In the last 12 years legislatures in 23 states have considered and rejected such measures. Every year the same bills are introduced in Congress.

These proposals seek to have Congress superimpose a restriction on sale of a product which a large majority of the American people more than 20 years ago said they wanted sold legally. The great Prohibition experiment had failed because the majority of the people were opposed to it. Now 84 percent of the American people live in wet areas by majority choice. Congress cannot circumvent the people's wish especially through a subterfuge such as an attack on advertising of alcoholic beverages.

The people of this country will have been started down a dangerous road if its lawmakers, Federal or state, decide that any product legally manufactured and sold cannot be advertised. The door will have been opened for similar minority attack against advertising of other products. Advertising is an essential part of distribution and sales. Without it an industry suffers sales declines.

But, completely aside from the economic aspects, there are the moral and ethical considerations. We think it is wrong for any government to permit the legal manufacture and sale of a product, to supervise and tax many stages of that process, then declare that the manufacturers cannot advise potential customers of their wares through advertising.

Farm Fire Season
The spring clean-up time again and a good time to get rid of quick burning rubbish of all kinds. Dry, windy weather is ideal for spread of dangerous outdoor fires which may become difficult to control.

Before doing any outdoor burning, the following precautions are advised:
1. Pick a wind-free dampish day for rubbish or trash burning.
2. Pick a spot well away from buildings and clear a good sized area around the fire site free of inflammable material.
3. Have some fire-fighting equipment close at hand.

1. Have well in mind what to do or who to call in case of fire indoors or out.
Pointers for Profit
The summary of Thursday and growing crops in northeastern Nebraska during the past five weeks indicates that farmers growing recommended varieties and fertilizing as recommended following soil tests harvested twice as many bushels per acre as did those growing other varieties not fertilized on average soils.

New imports of sweetclover varieties (Madrid, Spanish, Evergreen) fixed 1 3 more nitrogen per acre than do other commonly grown varieties. The value of nitrogen fixed by the following corn crop is generally considered to be worth more than the net return from the oats crop.

The best information available shows that the average return over feed costs per cow milked in Wayne county was approximately \$100 in 1935.

Three good Wayne county dairymen have reasonably accurate records to show a net return of \$300 per cow. The best herd in the same testing association shows a net return of \$500 per cow. Multiply \$500 (the approximate number of cows milked in Wayne county) by \$100, \$300 or \$500.

A report from major meat packing interests says that less than 20 percent of all hogs slaughtered recently graded number one (desirable in type, finish and weight) the big majority coming to market as overweight and over-fat.

The producer of the least profitable product of the pig contributes most to market gluts and lower prices.

Salk Vaccine
Lincoln—Nebraska can't spend all the federal money it is to receive for purchasing Salk polio vaccine for persons who can't pay for shots. That's the report from Allan Rouse, director of the polio division in the State Department of Health.

Rouse said Nebraska was allocated \$245,000 originally to buy vaccine for all residents, but to Feb. 15 the method of getting the vaccine to doctors was changed.

Previously, the state handled all the vaccine, parceling it to doctors. Now, 90 percent of the vaccine goes through commercial drug houses and to percent through the department.

The state has \$165,000 of the federal money left and is to get about \$25,000 more.

The unused money, Rouse said will revert to the Federal government. He said the amount that goes to the state is not affected by the method of distribution. The state will get the same amount now that it got before.

Salk vaccine now is going through commercial channels and Rouse said the outlook is brighter than at any time in the past.

At least 15,000 doses of the vaccine will be received or are earmarked for Nebraska this month, Rouse said that is by far the largest amount ever received.

"The prediction there would be quite a lot more vaccine available in March and April apparently will hold true," he said.

School Land

There now are about 412,745 acres of school land under oil and gas leases.

Robert Hiatt, secretary of the Board of Educational Lands and Funds, which administers school lands, said the leases are bringing in a total of \$338,964 per year. This

averages out at about 87 cents per acre rent, Hiatt said.

Hiatt said at last count there were 51 producing wells on state-owned land, bringing royalties to Nebraska of about \$36,000 per month.

Judges Retirement

The long-awaited ruling by the State Supreme court on the judges retirement act passed by the last Legislature caused considerable commotion.

The high court held the law, requiring judges to retire at the age of 70, was constitutional. But, it held the law does not become effective until Jan. 3, 1937. It did not become law last Sept. 18, the court said.

On the theory that the act became effective last September, along with most other laws passed by the Legislature, district court clerks began collecting a \$1 fee on each civil case as the state's contribution to the judges retirement fund. Those collections at the time of the opinion amounted to \$2,564. In addition, judges themselves have paid in \$3,844, or four percent of their earnings.

Intensely interested in the case were nine district judges, seven of whom had filed for re-election and two who had not. The latter ones, James Fitzgerald, Omaha, and Frank Munday, Red Cloud, had intended not to file for re-election because they thought the law was effective.

Now, however, they will seek re-election. The other seven judges, all of whom are 70 or will be after the first of the year, can run for re-election under the Supreme court ruling.

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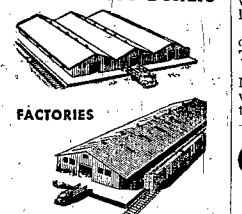

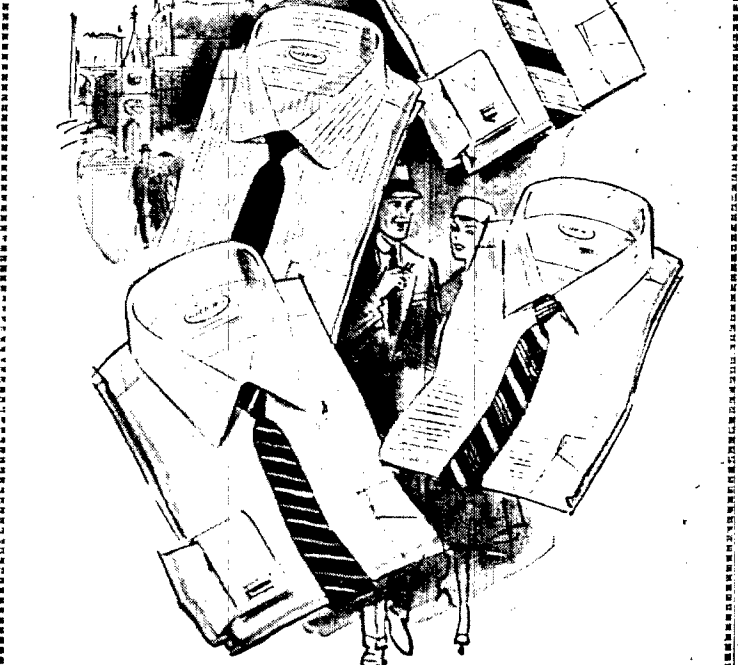

Easy to Transform Waste Space into Useful Rooms

Many older homes waste thousands of cubic feet of space in the attic while rooms on lower floors are straining at the seams. That unused space can easily be transformed into one or more very useful rooms—largely by yourself, too.

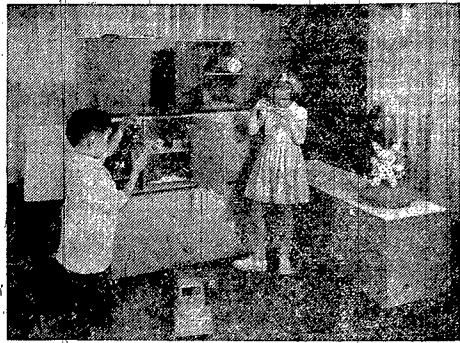
They have proved the point with an attic modernizing project that created two bedrooms, a playroom, and a compartmented bathroom in a mere 25x23 feet of floor space.

The roof was literally raised on one side, permitting inclusion of a dramatic window wall in the boy's bedroom.

Wooden folding doors increase efficiency, close off the tiny bedrooms when they are in use. With

doors open, bedrooms are in effect part of the play space for the boy and girl sharing the attic. Folding doors also divide three bathroom compartments.

Plywood built-ins make the best possible use of space. Most notable is the built-in bunk arrangement used to divide the bedrooms. The lower bunk is on the girls' side, with a bulletin board above. On the other side of the bulletin board is the boy's bunk. An electric-train table pulls out from underneath the girl's bunk into the boy's room. A moveable storage unit at the end of the bunks is shared. Under-the-ways cabinets and closets store clothing, playthings and other equipment.



Units of simple design for construction from fir plywood may be combined in several arrangements for a child's room. This system of toy storage boxes for

children is not only decorative but is an approach to the problem of what to do with scattered toys when not being used.

Loose Toys Children's Room Hazard? Handy Storage Boxes Offer Answer

How often have you been set into motion by loose toys on the floor of the children's rooms?

A roller skate or marble can sometimes produce some painful results. More than that, an untidy room can be a constant dread to Mother who must run a put-sized obstacle course every time she enters the room.

An idea guaranteed to keep at least a few gray hairs from the busy housewife's head is a set of highly versatile toy storage boxes. Its versatility is in the fact that the storage boxes can be transformed from a place to put the many things children leave on the floor into a toy chest.

Those who run the gamut of a darkened room will see much utility in the idea, one of many geared to children's room use to come out of the Exposition of Golden Ideas, conceived and conducted in Portland, Ore., by the Douglas Fir Plywood Association. **Tots Kept Busy**

Made of several units, the toy

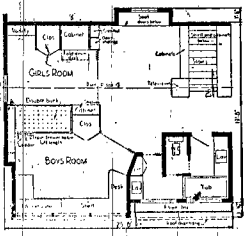
chest is designed to be used in multiples so that children can create a wide variety of arrangements. There are plenty of little swinging doors to keep the boxes and provide an incentive for them to put toys away. Not that the kiddies will always do this. In fact, the toy boxes are designed so that parents may quickly assemble all the varied toys in the nursery and tuck them away neatly.

Each unit of the unit is a box 1-foot long and 18 inches more than a foot wide. The boxes designed for the Portland show were likewise a foot high, but can be varied with different dimensions that meet your needs.

Each unit contains one storage area, one for a child, two in the middle, and one for a swing. In fact, it is in line with the idea to provide something that will be interesting to play with and at the same time serve as a roomful of compartments out of which to pull out toys when it is time to put them away.
