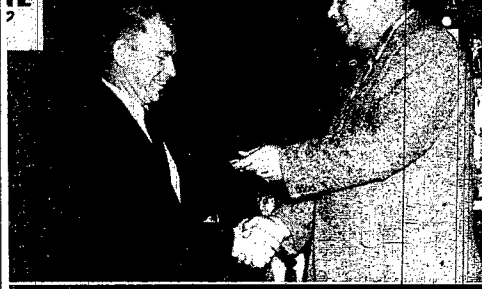

He saw the first railroad built past the home in 1882. He recalls Hoskins being named after a surveyor of the town and also that the postoffice was located in the Behmer home before the town was built.

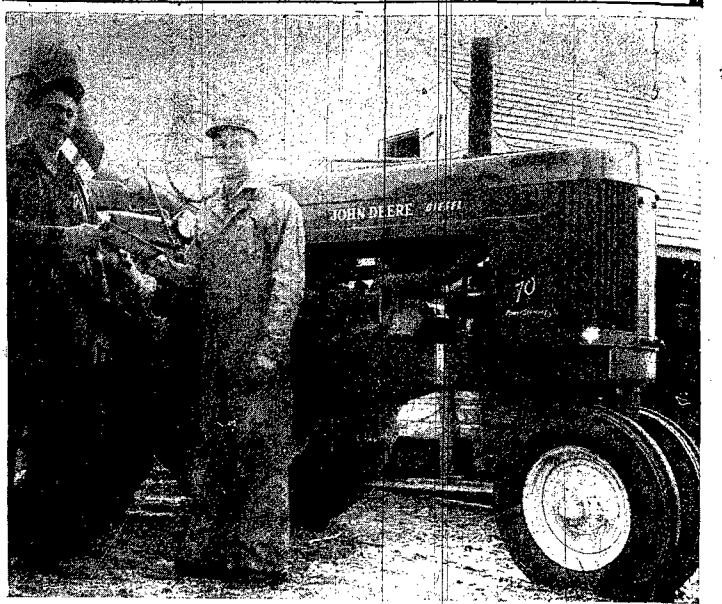

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Prime Question Never Asked

When school redistricting is mentioned it brings up many questions, some of great importance, some quite minor...

That question is: "What will it do for our children?"

Let's not kid ourselves into thinking that schools set up to educate our grandfathers can provide adequate education in today's complex world.

Grandma washed by hand, carried wash and rinse water from a well, stored her butter in a cave or lowered it in the well on a string...

No present day wife would put up with those hardships... not while she could get refrigerators, home freezers and automatic washers and dryers...

Even our own Constitution has undergone changes during the past 70 years and no doubt will be changed again.

Yet many of us would force our children to accept the same educational facilities that were deemed adequate when this state was young.

With all due respect to our grandparents (and they were a hardy, thrifty, industrious people), their three "R's" wouldn't stand a ghost of a chance today.

The varied needs of a modern school are incorporated with a plan for redistricting in this excerpt of a letter from K. R. Mitchell, Allen superintendent of schools.

"How does a school in a town of less than 400 population put out athletic teams that compare favorably with other towns in Northeast Nebraska? How did Allen happen to get one of the superior ratings in the Little Theatre contest in the district meet at Wayne recently? How did Allen win first in individual judging in Sioux City where 113 schools from four states were entered?"

Several years ago the folks in the rural districts around Allen decided to merge and they formed a district large enough to present a full school program. At that time transportation difficulties limited the size of the district to 12 and one-half sections.

Now, modern transportation over vastly improved roads would make a radius of eight to 12 miles very practical.

And the need for extended curriculums, more varied programs so we can offer today's youth something more than reading, writing and arithmetic is not just a figment of an educator's dream. It is a very real thing, perhaps best manifested by the students themselves.

These are the real things to consider. Granddad's educational facilities are as outmoded as the Pony Express. Our children have every right to expect an education that will give them good understanding of today's problems.

All factors should be considered with regard to cost of course. This is not a suggestion that the public go overboard for a curriculum. Just remember that our children will have more problems than we.

Mansion at Monticello Tribute to Jefferson, America's da Vinci

America's Leonardo da Vinci—Thomas Jefferson—was not only third president of the United States, but also an able lawyer, statesman, scientist and engineer. He is probably second-best known as an architect, as witness his ingenuity, his skill in designing and building Monticello. Building was a hobby that gradually grew into an obsession with him, and he incorporated into his home many devices still used two centuries later.

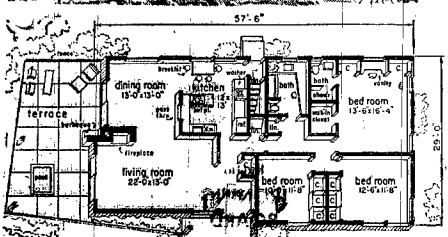

Wood Textures Important in Contemporary Home

Wood, in proper juxtaposition with other building materials, has captured the imagination of man through the ages, observes S. Roy Anshen, San Francisco, a leading member of the American Institute of Architects, and an authority on wood design.

The English, French and Italians, Anshen reports, used much wood during the Renaissance. The half-timbered structures of the middle ages in Europe—the original wooden temples of the Greeks—the wooden "plywood" sarcophagi of the Egyptians—lead us back through history.

The Chinese, Japanese and Indian cultures, the architect points out are well-known for their extremely knowing, civilized uses of wood.

It is the constant purpose of the American architect today, Anshen continues, to capture the human, warm, tactile quality which wood alone possesses in design of domestic, commercial and industrial structures where appropriate.

One of the most important skills of architecture, he observes, is to interrelate textures and qualities of material as to create a warm and human result. Out in the far west where the contemporary styling of the new American home had its first great impetus just a dozen years ago, architects were fortunate in being able to draw on many native western woods, which are also available nationwide.

The natural quality, grain and unduplicated colors of such widely used woods as fir, hemlock, redwood and red cedar have been used effectively both for interior and exterior design of these wonderfully livable, informal contemporary homes. Wood products are some of the great tools to this end, Anshen concludes.

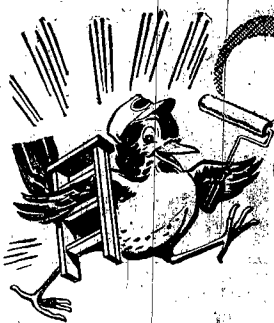

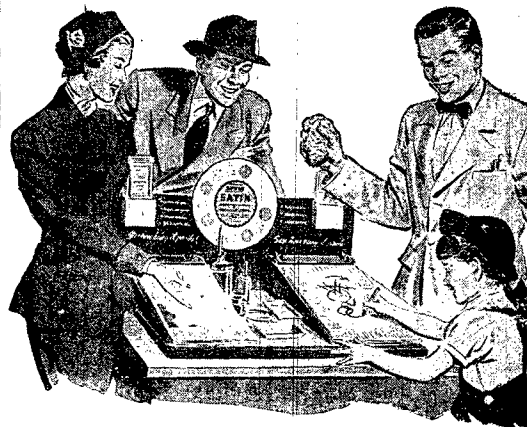
