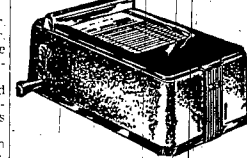

Variety for Feeders
A variety of cattle feeding experiments will be discussed by members of the animal husbandry staff at the University of Nebraska's annual Feeders Day Friday. The morning session will get underway at 9:15 at the college activities building at the College of Agriculture, V. H. Arthaud, assistant in animal husbandry, will discuss using promergrass pasture in cattle fattening. Dr. T. W. Dowe, assistant professor of animal husbandry at the University will report on experiments in roughage in calf wintering. The value of different roughages in the fattening ration and a comparison of different methods of feeding fattening cattle. Use of corn cobs in wintering cattle rations will be explained by Dr. John Matsushima, assistant animal husbandry professor, as well as feeding animal carcasses to fattening cattle and the value of stillbirth in fattening cattle rations. The experimental cattle will be shown to those attending.

Farm Land Values
A report on changes in the dollar value of farm land from the Agricultural Research service of USDA shows farm real estate values in the nation reached a new peak Nov. 1, 1955. Here in Nebraska, particularly in recent years. This, the council said, is despite the fact that county revenue collections in 1955 are estimated to have been \$38,800,000 as compared with school revenue collections the previous year of about \$64 million. The figures are for fiscal years.
Forty percent of the county revenue comes from the property tax, the council said, while the remaining 60 percent is from various other sources.
On the other hand, the council continued, school property taxes represent about 50 percent of school revenues. This, the council said, accounts for the spotlight being focused on school problems more than on county government problems.
In a typical Nebraska county, 46 percent of a dollar goes for roads and bridges, according to the council. Assistance and relief services got 27 percent. General administration takes 22 percent.
Larger counties spend more for assistance and relief than for roads and bridges. But in the smaller or counties it is the other way around.

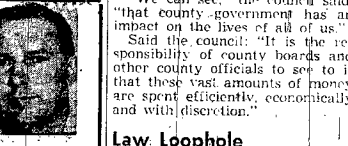

In it he tells the exciting story of what happened to him since the day when he returned to his bombed-out hospital after the war.



"We can see," the council said, "that county government has an impact on the lives of all of us." Said the council: "It is the responsibility of county boards and other county officials to see to it that these vast amounts of money are spent efficiently, economically and with discretion."

Law Loophole

There was a black spot in a law passed by the last Legislature concerning unland game stamps. Under the law the stamp must be obtained by hunters who want to stalk pheasants and quail. The money goes to the State Game Commission. The theory was the commission would use the funds to restock the two birds.
Now, it has \$110,000 on hand. But there is where the trouble lies. Legally, the commission can't spend the money in the office of Atty. Gen. C. S. Beck's office. The office said the Legislature didn't make provisions in the bill it passed authorizing expenditure of funds.
The commission had been relying on using the money to help pay for \$64,000 worth of pheasants. The birds will be paid for out of regular commission budget. But other budget items will have to be trimmed to do so.
Under the law each pheasant or quail hunter must buy a \$1 upland game stamp in addition to the regular hunting license.

Statehouse Changes

There are some changes in positions in the statehouse. One is a major one.
Mayme Stukel, state welfare director since 1953, resigned effective May 1. She will take over as Lancaster county director of public welfare. In her letter of resignation, Miss Stukel said there has been an "apparent lack of confidence in her recommendations to the Board of Control." She said this has been demonstrated by "constant procrastination" by the board.
The board, Miss Stukel said, had refused to "permit me to initiate policies and organization" which she said would have improved operation procedures.
The new job will pay \$6,500 per year. She got \$6,300 annually with the state.
