10 Cent Increase Announced In 1956-Crop Corn Loan Rate

County Price Set at \$1.43

Wayne county support price for 1956-crop corn was announced this week by County ASC Chairman Carl O. Sandell.

The board is in line with President Eisenhower's Apr. 13 farm message announcing a prompt increase in the price of corn.

The chairman also announced the new price support available for the 1956 crop which is not to be in compliance with acreage allotments.

With the initiation of two support prices, county farmers will be able to make a choice between the 1956 price or the 1955 price.

As in the past, price supports for the 1956 crop will be carried out through CCC loans and purchase agreements.

County price support nationally will be a minimum average of \$1.50 per bushel on over produced acreage allotments.

Minimum acreage support on corn not produced in accordance with acreage allotments will be \$1.25 a bushel.

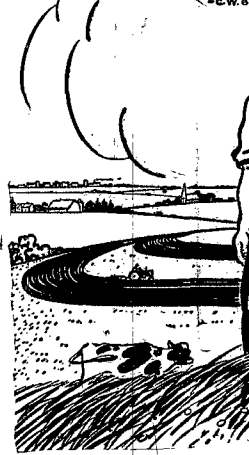

Among the developments at the Missouri college during Mr. Brandenburg's association are a graduate program leading to the master's degree, foreign language instruction in the elementary grades of the campus laboratory school and a program for the training of teachers in this special field.

He served several times as a member of accreditation committees for the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education. In addition to serving as district Rotary governor, he is member of the five-man legislature drafting committee for the Rotary International convention in June.

Dr. Brandenburg received his bachelor's and master's degrees of science at Kansas State, Pittsburg. His doctorate is from the University of Colorado. He also did post-doctoral study at the Midwest International seminar, Haslev, Denmark.

His professional experience started as a teacher in Tulsa, Okla. public schools. He served as a teacher at the University of Colorado and dean of faculty at William Woods college, Fulton, Mo., before taking the Maryville post.

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Dr. Brandenburg is a Shriner and Thirty-second Degree Scottish Rite Mason, member of Knights Templar, American Legion and Marine Corps Reserve Officers association and a past president of Phi Sigma Epsilon. He was also active in the Maryville Chamber of Commerce.

A member of the Christian church, he served as an elder and chairman of the official board of the Maryville congregation. His military service includes three years' active duty as a Marine corps captain in World War II. He served a year in the South Pacific.

Dr. W. A. Brandenburg to Succeed Late Dr. John Rice

Dr. William A. Brandenburg, Maryville, Mo., Wednesday was named president of Wayne State Teachers college to succeed the late Dr. John D. Rice. He will assume the post July 1.

Announcement of Dr. Brandenburg's appointment was made yesterday afternoon by the State Normal board after interviewing candidates for the post at Lincoln Friday.

The new president is currently dean of faculty at Northwest Missouri State college, a post he has held six years.

In accepting the appointment, Dr. Brandenburg issued the following statement:

"Mrs. Brandenburg and I and our two children, Ann and Billy, look forward with much pleasure to making our home in Wayne. I have known of the excellent reputation of Nebraska State Teachers college at Wayne for some time.

"Only recently has it been my privilege to visit the college campus and the city in which it is located. While there I found ample reason for the statement, appearing in college literature and at the edge of town—'The Midwest's Most Beautiful Campus.'"

"The building of this institution represents the labor of many devoted and able educators, supported by citizens of Wayne and the state of Nebraska. I am humble in the knowledge of this and pledge my best effort toward a continuing progress for the institution."

Blue Devils Win First Husker Conference Track Title Friday

Hendrickson Run in Relay Gives Victory

A brilliant 440-let by Jerry Hendrickson in the mile relay furnished Wayne Blue Devils with its first Husker conference track championship Friday afternoon at Wayne.

Hendrickson's run gave Wayne the relay victory and enabled the Blue Devils to edge West Point by 2 1/2 points in the team standings.

Other winners were: Wayne, 50 1/2; West Point, 48; Oakland, 27 1/2; Pender 27; Nollah, 25 5/8; Omaha, 23; Lyons, 10; Madison, 10; Wakefield, 5; and Wisner, 2.

Following by 30 yards when he took the baton, Hendrickson caught Nollah's Bent Boderen on the final turn and broke the tape's foot in the lead. Hendrickson's time from the flying start was estimated at 51 seconds.

Three records fell despite wind and heat. Wayne's Larry Hofeldt broke the 800 yard mark with a time of 2:04. This bettered his own mark of 2:04 in 1955.

Stanley's Art Freiberg ran away from the field to set the new mile mark at 4:32.6, more than six seconds better than the record he established last year.

Mike Jones, West Point, ran the 100 yard hurdles in 16.3 in the morning preliminaries. This bettered the 16.4 set by Charles Ziegenbein, Wayne, in 1954.

College Switches Quadrangular to Wednesday Night

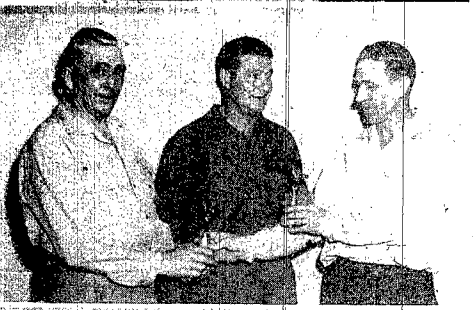
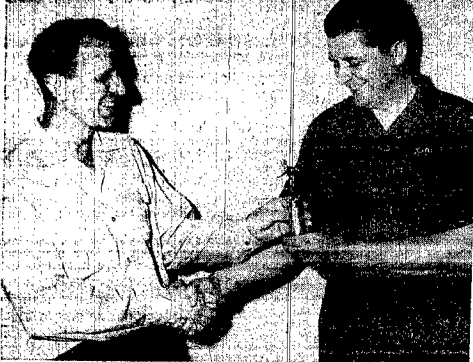

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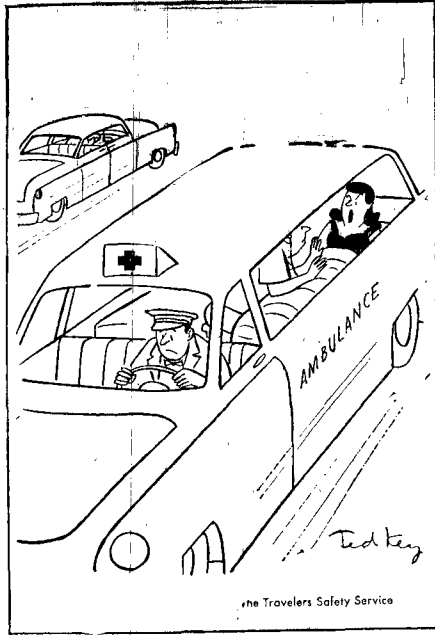

Pasture Weed Control
Since 1950 Dr. K. McCarty, a USDA weed specialist, has been conducting experiments on the control of pasture weeds. The USDA, in cooperation with the University of Nebraska, is trying to answer questions concerning pasture improvement.

How does mowing compare with spraying in the control of pasture weeds? McCarty used four different methods of treatment: early mowing, late mowing, early spraying with 2,4-D and late spraying with 2,4-D.

Results show that an early spraying with 2,4-D appears to be the most effective method where mowing and reseedling are impractical. The use of 2,4-D has been abandoned primarily at perennial, broad-leaved weeds because mowing at the proper time has controlled annual weeds.

By mowing perennial weeds for four years, however, only one-third reduction has been obtained. By cutting the weeds just before the average grasses have increased in number. Evidence shows that spraying is twice as effective as mowing in terms of extra grazing.

Seed Certification
Applications for seed certification are due May 29 in the Nebraska Crop Improvement association's office at the University of Nebraska college of agriculture. Seeds that may be certified include wheat, oats, spring barley, rye, corn, sorghum, soybeans, vetch, sweet clover and first cross alfalfa.

County agricultural agents have applications for seed certification and can supply additional information. Persons interested in having seed certified also may obtain application and further information by writing the Nebraska Crop

Landis Name Off
The name of the late District Judge, Harry Landis, Seward, has been removed from Nebraska's May 15 primary election ballot.

There had been speculation that time was too short to take the name off after the long-time jurist's death. But the Secretary of State's office contacted county clerks in the six counties of the fifth judicial district and got the job done.

But, an attorney could be nominated for the November general election by getting a primary write-in vote equaling five percent of the 1954 vote for governor in each of the six counties.

Chickens Hatched
There were a lot of chickens hatched in Nebraska during the first three months of this year, up 12 percent from the same period in 1955. Total this year so far is 10,379,000 chicks compared with 9,302,000 for the same period in 1955. The figures come from the state-federal division of agricultural statistics.

The division said the March hatch was 6,900,000 chicks alone. That's up four percent from the same month last year, but below the 10-year average of 8,079,000.

Ton-Mile Tax
Lincoln—A familiar subject to many Nebraskans—whether there should be a tax placed on trucks based on tonnage hauled and miles carried—is up before the people. A group has started a petition drive for a popular vote in November. To put the issue on the ballot that is whether the state should have a ton-mile tax. Sponsors need a total of 29,039 signatures by July 5.

The tax proposal generally is the same as one killed in the 1955 Legislature. Such a tax probably would produce about \$6,000,000 per year in revenue. Money would be divided among state highways, city streets and county roads in the same proportion as the state gasoline tax now is distributed.

A Committee for Better Roads Through Fair Taxation has been put together to lead the drive for signatures. C. E. Beals, retiring executive secretary of the League of Nebraska Municipalities, is secretary-treasurer of the ton-mile group.

Argument in the last Legislature even the question of a ton-mile tax on trucks was bitter. The bill was killed at the last stage in the legislative mill.

Sponsors of the petition drive said railroads will not be asked for financial assistance in the drive. However, they also said that the committee would run down help from the railroad unions if they volunteered to circulate petitions.

If the proper number of votes are received in November the ton-mile tax becomes law automatically. It would apply to all commercial trucks carrying 10 tons or more and inter-city buses weighing 28,000 pounds or more.

The movement will draw stiff opposition from truckers. The opposition will likely be spearheaded by highway users groups, primarily the Nebraska Motor Carriers association.

Beals, in a statement, said: "It

is the contention of the members of this committee that big trucks and buses licensed to carry over 10 tons do not pay their fair share of the cost of building and maintaining the roads in the state of Nebraska."

Beals also said the committee believes thousands of out-of-state trucks not licensed in Nebraska are getting almost a free ride on our roads, for they pay only the diesel and gas tax.

Truckers have claimed in the past when the ton-mile question arose, that they are paying their fair share in taxes and now especially because the last Legislature increased truck license fees.

Employment Law
Fifteen cities are scheduled for May for employers who will be coming under a new unemployment compensation law for the first time. An estimated 6,500 Nebraska businessmen have been reminded they will be confronted by the new law, enacted by the 1955 Legislature.

Unemployment compensation taxes will be collected from all employers who have four or more persons hired. The old law applied only to those employing eight or more. The Nebraska law was set up to conform with changes made in Federal law.

The May cities will be sponsored by the Nebraska Chamber of Commerce, Managers' association, and the State Employment Security division.

Officials say employers should be familiar with the new state law "in order to be protected from late assessment of back taxes and heavy interest through ignorance they should fail to recognize their liability."
