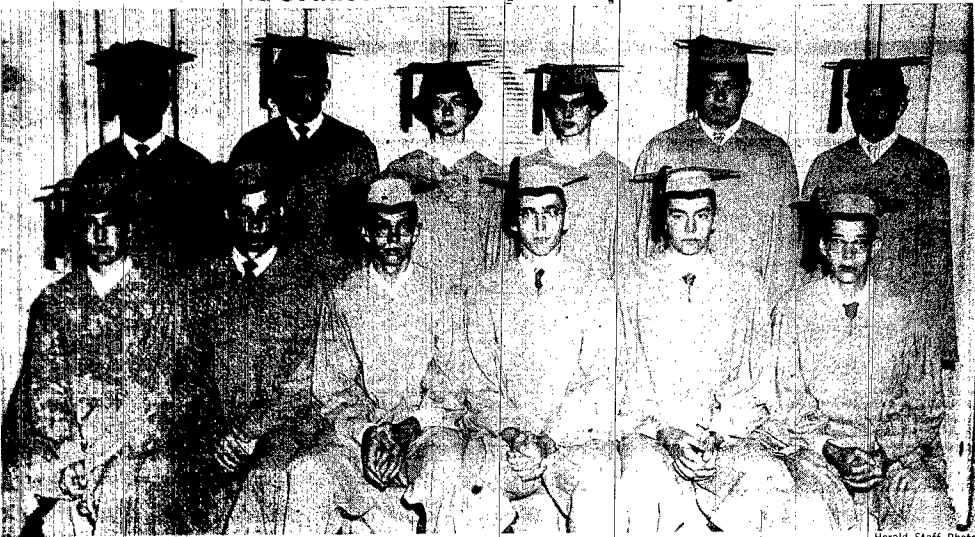


12 Graduated at Wayne Prep Monday

Five Miles Readied for Surfacing

Attorney General Clarence Beck Saturday defended again the constitutionality of the relocation of Highway 35 between Wayne and Wakefield and asked dismissal of a suit brought by a group of NE Nebraskans challenging a law defining the state highway system.

Beck filed a brief with the supreme court in answer to an appeal carried to the court by the group opposing relocation of the Wayne-Wakefield highway.

The action was brought originally in Lancaster District court. Plaintiffs included Merle Haynes, John D. Forsyth, Doyle Harrison, John Kinney, Joseph Beckenbauer, the city of Wakefield and NE Nebraska RPPD. Defendants included Gov. Victor Anderson, State Engineer L. N. Ress and Beck.

Plaintiffs lost the case in Lancaster court and appealed.

Beck's answer Saturday said the obvious reason for the attack on LB 187, which defines the highway system, is the fact it relocates Highway 35.

Plaintiffs are contending, his brief said, that LB 187, which is constitutional if State Highway 35 can remain at its old physical location between Wayne and Wakefield, but this bill is unconstitutional if there is any change in the location.

What the plaintiffs are primarily concerned about is the highway contract awarded for construction of 9.5 miles of State Highway 35 and in order to stop this project they are asking that an entire state highway system of 9,330 miles be set aside.

The brief contended also that the city of Wakefield and the power district are not proper parties to the suit.

"We may well question by what authority these political subdivisions are using public funds to maintain an action of this nature," the brief commented.

Work on the relocation project has been progressing rapidly. About five miles are now ready for blacktopping and crews of Abel Construction company, Lincoln, are expected on the scene about June 1 to start the surfacing.

Steel for the large bridge near the Wayne airport has been shipped and work will continue off it as soon as the shipment arrives.

Nov. 1 has been set as the date for completion of the entire project.

Plan to Open Swimming Pool Wednesday; Set Registration

Classes Will Start June 18

Wayne's municipal swimming pool will open the 1956 season Wednesday, it was announced today by Manager Don Kollmorgen. He said the opening was definite unless weather is unfavorable or some unforeseen difficulty arises.

The past week has been spent cleaning and painting the pool. Outdoor lights have been ordered but will not arrive until June. When installed, they will enable the staff to keep the pool open later in the evening.

Swimming lessons will be given again this summer. Registration for persons who wish lessons will start May 28 at the pool. Kollmorgen said. Registration will end June 10.

Tentative plans are to run classes from 9 a. m. to noon five days a week for six-weeks. Several adult classes are also planned between 5 and 7 p. m. No children will be admitted to the afternoon classes since the primary purpose is to provide an opportunity for working people to take lessons.

Vital Meeting Slated Tonight For Development of Industry

Funds Sought To Purchase 18-Acre Tract

Wayne businessmen will be given an opportunity to form an industrial development corporation tonight at Hotel Morrison. Industrial Committee Chairman Elmer Harrison said Wednesday.

"This is a key meeting in this project," Harrison said, "and it will determine just how much we can do toward attracting industry to Wayne."

After meeting for a 6:30 dinner the group will hear Assistant Chief of Nebraska Resources Division Sidney R. Bradley explain industrial development corporations and their functions.

Following Bradley, Harrison will report findings obtained during a tour of Crete, Hastings and York towns successful in industrial development efforts.

If the group wishes to incorporate to buy land and promote industrial development, a slate of 16 names for temporary directors will be offered and voters will choose directors. Copies of articles of incorporation of other industrial development corporations will be available for study.

The meeting is open to the public but persons wishing to attend the dinner portion must make reservations in advance, Harrison said.

Mayor Willard Wiltse will preside.

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The Power of Memorial Day

by Dr. Norman Vincent Peale

I had the privilege of growing up in small Ohio communities in the early part of this century, and one of my most inspirational memories centers around Memorial Day and the old soldiers of the Civil War.

To me, Memorial Day was one of the most moving of all the national holidays. I was stirred by the speeches and martial music from the bandstands or I was amazed on what we called "Decoration Day." There was something about the newness of life that the Spring had brought; soft sunshine falling on the fresh green grass of early summer, the misty hills in the distance, the sound of stirring national songs, and above all, the softly flapping flag in the gentle breeze as the speaker told us of our country, the deep devotion of its heroes, and recounted once more the stirring episodes of our heroic past.

And our lazy summer afternoon, I sat on the coping around the old courtyard listening to the veterans of the Civil War tell of their experiences in the epic struggle between the States. A boy's imagination quickly sent him off behind long columns of blue or grey, and to him, such names as Antietam, The Wilderness, Shiloh, and Gettysburg became very real and meaningful.

Those old soldiers used to talk gratefully of Lincoln's insistence that those who had borne the heat of the battle and the burden of the struggle, the widow and the orphan, were to be given not charity, but their rightful due as the dependents of those brave men who had fought to preserve liberty and to keep the Union intact. It was regarded as a sacred duty of the nation, and the nation kept faith with its veterans.

In those days, as now, were many who had been disabled by the struggle. Their ability to compete in life had been reduced by wounds suffered in battle. Even as a boy I remember hearing how it seemed they were thought of only on such days as Memorial Day, when orators, fervent in their patriotism, remembered, if only for a day, the long continuing sacrifice made not by those who had died in battle, but by the disabled who were to live for many years following the great struggle.


The heroes of World War I and World War II and the Korean War are, of course, men who, with no concern for themselves, gave their lives that freedom might live. We can never do them adequate honor. And, we must never forget them. They died in their young life, forsaking the opportunities of the years that the rest of us might live and develop our highest hopes and dreams.

However, there are other living heroes who deprived themselves of either physical, emotional, or mental health for us and for their fellow countrymen. It would be as wrong for us to neglect or forget them as their buddies who today sleep on some Pacific Island or in a European cemetery. A hero dead or a hero maimed and disabled are both due our equal gratitude and our unceasing devotion.

We must never forget that the most effective way of honoring those who have died is to remember the living disabled, that their lives may be rich and full. They are a great asset to our country as the living embodiment of devotion to freedom. A country is recast indeed which does not everlastingly keep alive grateful appreciation to those who suffered disability to perpetuate everything that we Americans hold dear.

There could be no better time than on Memorial Day to resolve that we shall gratefully support the honored men and women who have suffered disability from the wars of the United States.

CAPITOL NEWS

Primary Unusual
Lincoln—Nebraska's primary election was unusual in several respects but true in form in others. Probably most significant was the lack of a group who voted at the polls. It was the lowest vote for a Presidential candidate year since 1932.

Two candidates in doubt after the votes had been counted unofficially in the two news weeklies. The two news weeklies were in a public contest for lieutenant governor between State Senator Dwight Henry Huntington and Carl Swanson. Omaha is Swanson's home and has been acting lieutenant governor. Swanson is a former state legislator.

The other contest was between Joseph Bensch and Phil Allen, Omaha, for the Democratic nomination for Congress in the second district. Officially, the results of the contest were not known until June 4 when the Congressional board meets and the winner is named. But the secretary of state, auditor, treasurer and attorney general on the basis of returns made by county canvassing boards.

The slowness in counting the vote was truly unusual. It was two full days after polls closed before the final precinct had reported its unofficial returns. Observers said this may have been because of the large number of persons seeking posts as delegates to the national conventions of both parties.

Running true to form was popularity of the Scandinavian names on the ballot. A candidate with a Scandinavian name, Wayne Swanson, Omaha, upset incumbent Ralphy Carmonson, Platte. Fred Fredson, Omaha, ran a close second to Swanson. There were two Scandinavians on the Democratic ballot for state treasurer and Richard Larsen was top Scandinavian in many other races.

Observers said because of the popularity of Scandinavian names, and Swanson's previous experience in state government through appearing on the ballot, the showing of Bensch in the lieutenant governor's race was unusual.

Bensch, however, had been an active and leading member of the Nebraska Legislature for more

than a decade. Also, Marvin Griswold, Lincoln, no relation to the late Dwight Griswold, drew a heavy vote, which observers said might have gone to Swanson.

Operation Alert
Nebraska will participate in the national "Operation Alert" exercises in emergency evacuation of the state. The exercises will be subject to a possible nuclear attack aimed at important cities and strategic installations.

Omaha in the exercise will be presumed to have been hit. This, officials said, will require evacuation of the population. However, for the purpose of the test the evacuation may be a token one. Lincoln will evacuate the courthouse and city hall.

The State Civil Defense system will be mobilized to rush aid to Omaha. Under the plan, all civil defense services will be brought into play on the state level. The state control center in the courthouse will be manned continuously during the exercise.

Polio Vaccine
Nebraska's polio season fast is approaching, but so far the state has been getting a considerable amount of Salk vaccine.

Allan Rouse, head of the state polio division, said Nebraska has an excellent chance of getting 75,000 to 80,000 doses of the vaccine during May. So far in May, the state has received 38,410 doses.

Bank Call
Nebraska's economy, predominantly agricultural, continues in good shape despite need for more moisture for crops, according to a State Banking department spokesman.

The spokesman commented on a report on the 293 state-chartered banks. He said demand deposits in the banks declined \$19,368,000 during the first quarter of the year. However, this decline in deposits was accompanied by a considerable reduction in loans.

The principal liquidation in loans was in the Community Credit corporation loans which decreased from \$22,800,000 on Dec. 31, 1955, to \$13,000,000 at the beginning of April. Most of the reduction represented wheat loans.

Also declining was the amount of U.S. government bonds held by

In the fact that the amount which the state banks loaned on farm land increased only \$31,500 during the period.

Installment loans, however, showed an increase of \$300,000, mostly on automobiles, and in single payment loans for personal expenditures.


The report showed the total resources of the 293 banks amounted to \$482,751,000.

Sudagrass for Pasture
Nebraska's bromegrass, bluegrass and wheatgrass pastures were severely injured by last year's hot, dry weather. We'll soon be entering a season of higher temperatures which means the growth of our common pasture grasses will be further slowed. The planting of sudagrass for pasture, hay or silage offers one of the best possibilities of relieving our potential pasture and feed shortage.

Sudagrass responds favorably to a wide variety of soil and climatic conditions. It does best on rich loam but can be grown successfully on heavy clay and light sand. It likes a warm climate and will produce a fair crop under conditions of low rainfall. Seeded preparations are essentially the same as for corn.

Normally sudan should be seeded about two weeks after the planting. Seedlings may be made as late as mid-July. A grain drill is one of the most satisfactory methods of planting. Seed 15 to 25 lbs. of high quality seed per acre.

Put only high quality seed. Sudan crosses readily with sorghum and Johnson grass, both of which are high in prussic acid. Stands from pure sudan rarely cause prussic acid poisoning unless contaminated with sorghum or sorghum-sudan hybrids. Certified seed is the best assurance of pure seed.

New plants and new growth of sudan are high in prussic acid so pasturing should be delayed until the plants are 18 inches high. Soils well supplied with available nitrogen but deficient in available phosphorus tend to produce greater amounts of prussic acid in the plants which tend to accumulate prussic acid during droughty periods.

Analysis of fall growth at Lincoln in 1948 and 1950 showed that Texas Sweet contained over 14 times more hydrocyanic acid than Piper and 2 1/2 times more than Wheeler. Piper and Wheeler are the two recommended varieties for Nebraska.

Control Corn Borers
A new method of European corn borer control is recommended in Nebraska for 1956 by University of Nebraska Extension Entomologist Robert E. Roselle.

Granular formulations containing five percent DDT on a carrier of attacy, benonite or tobacco base are dropped above the plants, landing in the leaf axils and whorls. The little borers are killed when they crawl through this area on the way to the corn stalks.

Roselle says the granules may be applied either by ground or air equipment. When applied by ground against the first brood of borers in June, granules are dropped in a band about 14 inches wide and 10 inches above the plants. Granules should be applied with special applicators, or with modified grass seeders. DDT granules of five percent DDT granules per acre should be applied when there are 50 egg masses per 100 plants and the first eggs have started to hatch, or when 75 percent of the corn plants show feeding signs of the small borers.

The odor of grass or legume silage can be as mild as the best corn silage if the moisture content at ensiling is reduced to near 65 percent by wilting or the addition of corn and cob meal or oats as a conditioner.

In comparative yield trials of small grain cut for silage, oats ranked fourth when compared to rye, barley and winter wheat. The best silage producer was a mixture of small grains and vetch—10 tons per acre.)
