Pass New Dog Vaccination Ordinance

The city council on Tuesday night passed a new ordinance requiring the vaccination of dogs. The ordinance was passed by a vote of 5-2. The ordinance requires that all dogs over the age of six months be vaccinated against rabies. The ordinance also requires that the owner of the dog pay a fee for the vaccination. The ordinance will take effect on June 1, 1956.

Oh Boy! A Million Dollar Rain Soaks Wayne County

The rains finally came—flooding basements in homes and Main street businesses Tuesday night. Weatherman Archie Wert measured 2.08 inches on the official gauge while reports varied throughout the town and in the county.

Storm sewers were unable to handle the run-off on Main street and waters backed up at First and Main to run into basements and some ground floor businesses. Sump pumps were running long after midnight to clear the water out.

Monday night an official 80 fall in Wayne and most of the community, although reports indicated heavier amounts in some areas. Warm sunny days coupled with recent moisture have brightened the 1956 crop outlook and pastures are rapidly improving.

The two rains bring the year's total to 7.09 inches, about 26 ahead of normal for the first five months. Total rainfall for May stands at 4.41 inches.

Set Meeting For By-laws

Elmer Harrison was named chairman of Wayne's newly-organized Industrial Development organization. Tuesday Harrison will serve in a temporary capacity until a permanent organization is formed. Bill Richardson was named secretary-treasurer.

Following the election Harrison appointed a committee of Burr Davis, John Carhart and himself to write by-laws for a corporate set-up. They have them ready for inspection by June 7.

Harrison, Richardson, Davis, and Carhart were elected temporary directors of the organization Thursday night when nearly 50 Wayne businessmen approved the project. Others on the board include Henry Lew, Adley Jeffrey, Willard Wiltse, Arnold Rees and Roy Coryell.

The organization was formed to promote manufacturing and processing plants for Wayne.

Industries manufacturing lightweight products in which labor cost is important to the cost of the product have been the most receptive to invitations to move to Nebraska.

Heavier industries can find neither raw materials nor markets in Nebraska and consequently freight rates become prohibitive for them, Bradley said.

State Resources division uses three methods to get leads on industry in moving here. Bradley continued: advertising in business magazines; advertising in newspapers in manufacturing centers; and advertising by direct mail.

Anything short of personal effort is wasted, he said, explaining that advertising material should be sold individually as a follow-up to advertising or mail contacts.

Advertising in business magazines has never proved as effective as the other two methods. Three steps a town must take in attracting industry, Bradley said, are: organizing a group to do the job; gathering pertinent information for industrialists; and adopting a positive approach to the task.

Bradley also warned that a town should never attempt to horse-trade with industry. Nebraska is not in a position to horse-trade and competition for industry is so keen among towns that industrialists will not even consider making unusual deals, he explained.

Deadlines Announced for Excess Corn, Wheat Acres

Wayne county farmers with a 1956 corn acreage in excess of their farm allotments may take action until Aug. 1 to adjust their corn acreage into compliance, County ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell said today.

The chairman added that farmers have the choice of two price supports on 1956-crop corn. Expected support price for corn produced under the farm acreage allotment for Wayne county is \$1.43 per bushel. Corn produced that is not in compliance with the farm acreage allotment will be eligible for supports at \$1.18 per bushel.

Reporters are now starting to move corn acreages on county farms where the higher support price is wished. Only estimates are being formulated on farms where the farmer has signified he does not intend to seek the higher price.

Sundell said that farmers who decide later to try to secure the higher support price by reducing acreage and thus need a later acreage measurement, will be charged extra for such measurement.

Minimum corn support prices were announced earlier this month in line with President Eisenhower's April farm message announcing prompt administrative steps to increase farm income. The high support price represents 85.2 percent of current parity. The lower price is about 70 percent of parity. This brings the
