Real Estate Owners to Bear Larger Portion of Tax Load

Two Million Cut Seen in Valuation

Wayne county real estate owners will carry an even bigger share of the 1956 tax load than they did in 1955, figures released by County Assessor Henry Arp, revealed this week.

Recaps of 1956 county assessment figures indicate the county's total valuation will be about two million dollars under the \$29,000,000 total last year. All of the decrease comes in personal property assessments.

Comparing the totals for the two years, real estate owners will pay about 82 percent of the taxes as compared with 75 percent a year ago. Wayne residents who own real estate will carry even a bigger share of the load. They will pay 88 percent of 1956 taxes as compared with 82 percent last year.

total population this year was 48,100 as compared to 56,600. The valuation drop was about \$1,865,000.

Arp's figures showed county residents added about \$200,000 in improvements to their properties in 1955. Bulk of this jump came in Wayne where construction of new homes and improvements were assessed at \$184,000.

Indications from the figures released by Arp are that taxpayers are due for higher levies in 1956 because of the valuation drop.

In Wayne, the increased valuation could result in a lower levy. But the school board has increased its request from taxes \$7,500 and this will require an additional 1 1/2 mill on the total local levy. Wayne's levy for 1955 was slightly over 44 mills.

Assessment figures released by Arp are 50 percent figures. They do not include valuations on motor vehicles, special schedules for telephone, pipeline and express companies and franchises.

Sun Drives Many to Pool As Crops Thrive in Heat

"Crops throughout the county are slightly better than last week, although rain will be needed in the near future," County Agent Harold Ingans said in his crop report Wednesday. "Sub-soil moisture is sun baking, but crops are not in serious danger yet," he added.

"There was no rainfall the past week, but showers from the previous week, coupled with temperatures in the 90's the past three days shot corn and oats upward. High for week was 96 recorded Monday.

"The week's low was set Friday night as the bulb dipped to 50 degrees. Friday was the coldest day of the week as the thermometer peaked at 74.

"Temperatures throughout the week soared swimming pool attendance as hundreds sought relief from the heat. Long range forecast calls for more hot days with little hope of cooling rains.

City Council Asking Federal Funds for Airport Revisions

Wayne's city council Tuesday night passed resolutions seeking to speed Federal aid in improving facilities at the municipal airport.

Estimated cost of the anticipated improvements is \$24,000. This includes slight realignment of the runway pattern, grading, crowning and seeding runways and lighting of the NE-SW runway.

Wayne's share of the cost would be \$7,750 with the state furnishing \$4,250 and the Federal government \$12,000. Approval of the improvements must now be secured from the CAA before contracts can be let.

The council met with Special Engineer R. J. Wedner, representative of the State Aeronautics commission, Tuesday to prepare the request for Federal funds. Restriction of a Peoples Natural Gas company easement across the airport was also accomplished.

Vacation of portions of two city streets also came before the council. Thirteenth street between Lincoln and Douglas was vacated to allow development of a park north of the municipal swimming pool.

Ralph Carhart appeared before the council to request vacation of Forested street between Main and the first alley west of Walnut. He said the college is eventually planning to pave the roadway in line with its current building program. The council agreed to vacate the street at its next meeting.

Two members of the Library board were appointed by Mayor Willard Wiltse. Dave Ewing was named to a four-year term to succeed Dr. J. R. Johnson. Adon Jeffrey was re-appointed for a five-year term.

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County Payment Rate Set At About 86c per Bushel

Further details of the requirements for participation in the 1956 acreage reserve of the soil bank program were announced today by county ASC officials after receipt of a telegram from State Chairman Frank Reec. Of particular interest to county farmers was the outline of plans for the acreage reserve concerning the 1956 corn crop.

County Payment Rate Set At About 86c per Bushel

County payment rate for this acreage reserve will probably average about 86 cents per bushel based on the normal yield. This would mean payments to county farmers would average about \$28.50 per acre.

Quoting from Reec's telegram, County Chairman Carl O. Sundell said all farms in compliance with acreage reserve provisions will be eligible for the acreage reserve program.

To participate in the program the farmer must designate specified fields as acreage reserve and reduce from corn base about 17.8 percent greater than the farm corn allotment by one or more of the following three ways:

1. By underplanting corn base and farmer certifies he underplanted due to adverse weather or in anticipation of participating in soil bank.
2. His 1956 corn acreage is less than his corn base because of destruction by natural causes (flooding, out, hail, etc.)
3. He plows or otherwise incorporates into soil or clips, mows or cuts an acreage within his corn base after May 27 and before Aug. 1.

The class will be limited to 10 and will be taught by an instructor provided by the Red Cross.

Industry Board Draws Articles

Articles of incorporation for Wayne Industries, Inc. were approved Thursday night by temporary directors of the Wayne industrial development organization.

The articles call for issuing 1,000 shares at par value of \$100 each for a total of \$100,000. The \$10,000 or 100 shares must be sold before the corporation legally begins business.

The book is supplemented by 72 magnificent photographs. If you want your reading about planes to be in novel form we have a really good one to recommend this week, "Roll Back the Sky" by Ward Taylor. This author, a lieutenant-colonel in the U. S. Air Force, served as a bomber pilot during World War II. His book is a novel based on the experiences of the men who flew the first low-altitude fire-bombing missions over Japan. You will find it a thrilling story.

DO YOU REMEMBER A NOVEL BY IRWIN Shaw, "The Young Lions"? This author has written another best seller which you will find good reading. The title is "Lucy Crown". A good character study, but not a world shaking piece of literature, it will give you a few idle summer hours for you. Or, if you prefer the historical novel, Margaret Campbell Barnes has written another of her English tales, this time about Charles I during the time of his imprisonment on the Isle of Wight. Not a ponderous book but quite readable.

WITH SO MUCH POLITICS IN THE AIR WHY not read about some of the decisive moments in the lives of celebrated Americans. Sen. John F. Kennedy has given to the American people a book worth reading, "Profiles in Courage" takes us through John Quincy Adams, Daniel Webster, Thomas Hart Benton, Sam Houston through to men like George Norris and Robert Taft. Reading this book renews your faith in men of politics.

Tough Sledding

Lincoln — Observers predict tough sledding for sponsors of the labor-backed drive to increase membership of the Unicameral Legislature and hike salaries of senators. But sponsors are confident they can obtain the required 41,384 valid signatures by the July 5 deadline. That amount of voters must sign the petitions in order that they can get placed on the ballot.

If voters okay the change from the present 43 members to 85 as sought by sponsors, it would be the first alteration in the system set up in 1937. Sponsors feel that a larger, better paid Legislature might possibly be more friendly toward labor.

And, too, they feel a petition drive is the only way that the state will ever be restricted, to bring about a more even distribution of population per senator. This results from the fact that the Legislature now has authority to increase its membership to 50, but has consistently declined to do so.

A complicating factor for the petition calling for senators to be paid \$25 per day while in session, with a maximum of \$3,000 for a special session and \$250 for a regular session and \$250 for a special session. Now senators get a flat \$872 per year.

A Constitutional amendment to increase the pay of senators was turned down by voters in recent years and senators themselves have been reluctant to try to bring about a hike in pay, mostly because of the voter reaction to the amendment previously.

Backers of the present drive want to pay each senator \$1,200 expenses per regular session, in addition to the higher pay.

School Ratings

The State Board of Education has served notice to many Nebraska schools that they need to correct deficiencies.

Fourteen schools were told that state approval of their operations is doubtful unless substantial improvements are made in the next year. They are at Arthur, Endicott, Greenwood, Holdville, Irvington, Malmo, Odessa, Reynolds, Riverdale, Roca, Steele City, Stockville Rural high school and Swanton.

When state approval is withheld, usually schools find it impossible to continue operations because they are no longer exempt from the county free high school tuition levy.

Rating of the schools is done by the State Accreditation committee, established by law. Twenty-six schools were dropped from the top or "accredited" category to the approved group:

Pigs on Alfalfa Pasture
Several different combinations of supplementary feeds can be used efficiently with yellow corn for pigs on good alfalfa pasture. In tests at Lincoln very satisfactory pig performance and economical production resulted from feeding the following supplement: soybean meal, 600 pounds; meat and bone scraps, 400 pounds; iodized salt, 20 pounds, and antibiotics, 25 grams.

Equally good results have been obtained by feeding this above supplement either free-choice or in a mixed ration. A mixed ration containing this supplement and ground yellow corn should contain 12 to 14 percent crude protein for pigs from weaning to 100 pounds; 10 or 11 percent protein is recommended for pigs from 100 pounds to market weight.

Even though oats are usually a low income crop, about 2 million acres are grown in Nebraska each year. While trying to find ways of increasing net returns from oats, research workers at Illinois found that oats harvested as silage and fed in wintering rations returned more profit than oats harvested as grain. New legume or grass seedling included in the oats crop benefits from earlier removal of oats for silage. Substitution of oat silage for corn silage may be still another advantage because corn silage must come out of the corn acreage allotment.

The danger from nitrite poisoning from oat hay or silage is not of major consequence. The high nitrate content occasionally found in oat forage is largely the result of seasonal weather conditions. While making silage may reduce the danger of nitrite poisoning below that of oat hay, it will not eliminate the danger entirely.

Points to consider in making oat silage: variety - medium to rank stalk produces most tonnage; general varieties with different maturity dates spreads silo filling stage time; Cutting Methods - wilting is not recommended; Stage of Maturity - late milk stage seems best for direct cut and chop. If wilted, average milk stage seems best if cut early enough; Persistence - none needed if cut at right stage and paced properly; Oats Are Hard to Pack - hollow stem and slick straw contribute, mixing depends on moisture, fertility, variety - range 4-12 tons per acre; eight tons is a reasonable average; Feed Value - between corn and grass silage. More protein but less energy than corn. High in energy but less protein, carotene and minerals than legume grass silage.

Following is a summary of points emphasized by Dr. John Matsumura in discussing antibiotics in cattle rations at the recent Feeders Day.

General recommendations for the use of antibiotics in beef cattle rations cannot be made at this time because of considerable variation in experimental results. Control of calf scours in young calves antibiotics seems to be effective. Experiments here at Nebraska indicate that antibiotics administered prior to three months of age will help control liver abscesses also.

Fed at low levels in high roughage wintering rations antibiotics may increase rate and efficiency of gain slightly. In fattening rations (above 40 per cent concentrate) results have ranged from a decrease of 4 per cent to an increase of 20 per cent in rate of gain.

June, July and August are some of the most important months in fitting show steers. Also they are months when 4-H members are most likely to be busy with other work and show steers are likely to be neglected.

During the summer months steers being groomed for fall shows should be gaining rapidly. In addition to proper feeding you club members should be doing things that will pay off when you lead your steers into the show ring this fall. Control of lice and the calf pen is a "must". Spray the calf and his pen regularly with methoxychlor or other recommended mixtures.

In the fall about eight weeks is required to grow a good coat of hair. During this time the calf should be kept in a cool shady place during the day and, at night, turned out in the cool air. If steers are kept in a shed during the day, the sides should be raised to provide maximum ventilation. Natural shade (for example, that furnished by large trees) is more desirable than a shed or other prepared shade.

Feet should be trimmed if the toes are long. Trim again about 30 days before the calf is to be shown. A steer that can walk properly has an advantage over one that can't. You can do a lot through proper trimming to make your steer walk correctly in the show ring.

Wash show steers regularly at this time of year. About two months before show, wetting the calf at night along with currying and plenty of brushing will help to get a good growth of hair.

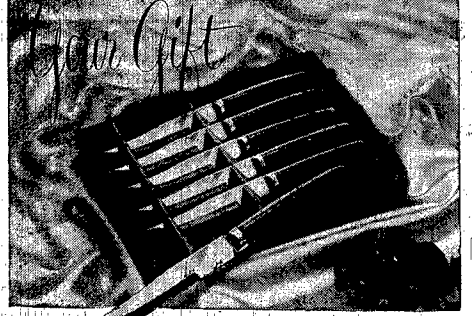
