Council Adopts Levy of 14.3 Mills; School Levy to Jump Valuation Up \$70,000

Wayne's 1956 tax levy for operation of the city government will be 14.3 mills, the same amount levied in 1955. The new levy was adopted by city councilmen at their meeting Tuesday night.

Maintenance of the same levy should be a boon to city real estate owners, who are expected to bear the brunt of increases in the county, state and school levies because of a drastic cut in personal property valuations in town.

This move had been requested by the college for development in line with its expansion program. The Free Gate day is a gesture of appreciation by Wayne firms for the public's loyalty to Wayne, spokesmen said. No tickets will be necessary—no ticket takers will be on the gates and the public will be able to enter and leave the grounds as they wish.

Grandstand entertainment in the afternoon also will be free. Included on the regular fair program for that day will be the horse judging, pony races, sack races, foot races and bicycle races for children.

The big day will get underway with an open street parade at 10 a. m., composed of children, pets, farm machinery, new autos, professional performers from the Mario shows at the fair—in short, anyone and everyone who wishes to participate. Another innovation this year will be a pre-fair exhibition of articles to be entered in competition at the fair. Such exhibits will be displayed in store windows and labeled with names of exhibitors. Date for displaying the exhibits will be announced later.

Fair officials also announced some changes in procedures and called attention to specific rules that will govern exhibits. At Top Steer Show Superintendent Al Fapp said the weight minimum for entries in this division had been dropped to 1100 pounds. Judging will be the first day of the fair by packer buyers. Secretary manager Al Bahr called attention to the rule that prohibits exhibitors from removing articles from the grounds before 8 p. m. on the last day of the fair. Bahr said the rule will be enforced this year because the 1956 fair is scheduled for only three days instead of the usual four.

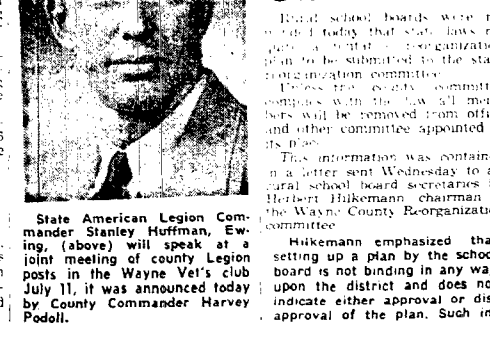
Normal Board Asking Bids On WSTC Auditorium

Saturday Deadline Set on Oats Clip for '56 Program

Precinct corn yield averages were determined by ASC committee this week to determine payments for land placed in the soil bank acreage reserve. Payments to county farmers will be based on a rate of 86 cents per bushel, which is 60 percent of the 1955 county CCC support price of about \$1.44 per bushel.

The Wayne ASC office was rushed this week as farmers sought details on participation in the soil bank program. Regulations on the program have been released almost daily by state ASC officials. The table at left shows the average yield figures and payments per acre for the 13 Wayne county precincts. Chairman Carl O. Sundell pointed out that yields for each individual farm within precincts were rounded off in multiples of five for easier handling. Thus farmers will be given set yields for their farm of 30, 35, 40 acres, etc.

Payments in Wayne county will vary from an average of \$24.08 per acre in Hoskins precinct to \$33.54 per acre in Logan precinct. County average will be \$28.55 per acre, based on an average yield of 33.2 bushels.

Further explanation of the choices open to county farmers were explained this week by Sundell. He took specific farmers and outlined the choices and payment possibilities. He explained it thus:

1. He can choose not to participate in the soil bank. He still will be eligible for the maximum price support of about \$1.44 per bushel for his 1956-crop corn.
2. He can participate in the soil bank. He must then clip 18 acres of his oats by June 30 (Saturday) or designate 18 acres of other comparable cropland as acreage reserve. On this basis he would receive payment for 18 acres at \$28.38 per acre of \$510.84. The land he designates as acreage reserve may not be grazed or harvested in 1956. He can, however, sow the tract to some approved cover crop for harvest in 1957.
3. He can place the maximum acreage in the acreage reserve.

In Jones' case, his maximum is 59 acres (50 percent of soil bank base). Under this method he could clip 18 acres of his oats by June 30 and plow under 31 acres of corn by July 31. His payment would then be for 59 acres at \$28.38 or \$1,674.22.

4. He can place the minimum acreage under the acreage reserve. For Jones this would be 12 acres. He could then clip 12 acres at \$28.38 or \$340.56.

Farmers who have overplanted their corn allotment must plow under the acreage in order to qualify for participation in the soil bank. They then can designate another acreage equal to 15 percent of their soil bank corn base for the acreage reserve.

Deadline for signing a soil bank agreement is July 20. Landowners have until July 31 if the tenant signs up by July 20.

Saturday is the deadline for disposing of oats, barley or rye now growing on acres to be designated for the acreage reserve for corn. July 31 is the final date for disposing of corn, grain sorghum, soybeans or other crops not approved as a cover crop now growing on the acreage to be designated for the acreage reserve.

Taking corn acreage out of production for the acreage reserve will not reduce the farm corn base in the future. Cropland placed in the reserve will be regarded as acreage devoted to the crop in establishing future corn base. Payments will be issued in the form of negotiable certificates after the county ASC committee has determined that requirements of the program have been met. These certificates can be cashed at any government check or can be redeemed in wheat, corn or other grain in government storage. It does not have to be redeemed in the grain for which it was issued. Rates for redemption are kind are not yet available. They are taken instead of cash as an acreage reserve payment can be sold or turned back to CCC under the price support program. Owner-operators and landowners are not required to sign a three-year reserve agreement. Penalties for failure to live up to the agreement are forfeit of part of the rights to payment and refund of payments received.

Rains Keep Coming; June Total Now Stands at 5.70

Heavy rains continue to improve the crop picture in Northeast Nebraska. More than 4 1/2 inches have fallen during the past week, bringing the month's total to 7.70 inches. Tuesday night a quick shower brought 2 1/2 inch to Wayne, while Monday night's downpour amounted to 2.71 inches here but dumped amounts up to six inches in local areas. Wakefield reported a 4.23 inch shower Monday's rainfall.

This storm was accompanied by some hail and gusts, though they terminated the damage generally light local damage. Tuesday's rain brings the year's total to 12.78 inches, nearly two inches ahead of normal for the first six months of the year. The 40-year average rainfall through June of each year is 10.88 inches. Monday's rain sent the South Logan out of banks at Wayne where it covered Highway 15 for several hours.

Taxes and Weather... Taxes—like the weather—seem to be the subject of much discussion and little action.

With returns in for 77 of the 85 school districts total voters at these meetings was only 502 persons!

Apparently the rest of the citizens were not interested—at least they did not bother to attend the annual meetings.

The amount of money needed to operate schools represents about 35 percent of the taxes to be collected in the county next year.

Does that sound like big money? If not, try this for size: Taxes levied in 71 districts totaled \$266,061.

Without a doubt many persons disapprove of the tax levy... but where were they when the levies were set?

Most of those who disapprove never tell anyone until it is too late, then they gather to share the wailing wall over a cup of coffee.

The trouble with this problem is... it applies to almost every qualified voter in the county with the exception of board members of the various districts.

The meeting of school district 17 (Wayne city school) is typical. Not a single person attended the meeting except those required by their jobs to be there.

This is no attack on the various school boards. Neither is it an argument against the levies set by the boards.

Perhaps the lack of attendance is an oblique compliment to the yeoman service performed by the board members—and no doubt they merit it.

When a certain argument suits our conveniences, we can easily justify ourselves that it is a matter of principle.

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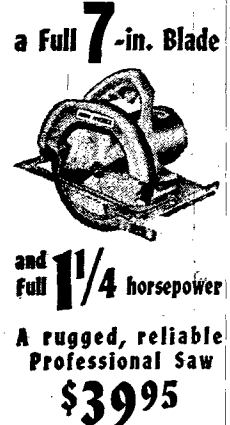

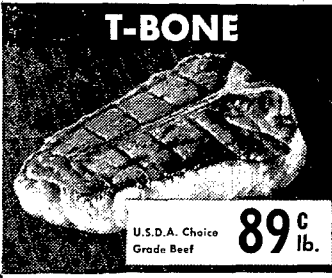


