Further Action Unlikely as Highway 35 Suit Dismissed

High Court Rules Action Incorrect

Northeast Nebraskans battling the relocation of Highway 35 between Wayne and Wakefield are expected to drop any further action on the controversy, Lincoln attorney Frank Morrison said Monday. His announcement that no further court action is planned "at this time" followed a Supreme Court action Friday which upheld a Lancaster District Court decision dismissing the suit brought by the relocation opposition. Without a ruling on the merits of the suit, the Supreme Court held that the action failed to name as defendants all parties which should have been defendants and as such should be dismissed. Morrison said he had not discussed the matter with his clients since the Supreme Court decision but he believes further court steps would be futile. Defendants named in the action were Gov. Victor Anderson, State Engineer L. N. Ress and Attorney General Clarence Beck. Additional parties which should have been named include the state auditor, state treasurer and contractors with whom road construction contracts have been signed on the basis of the challenged legislation. The action was originally brought by Merle Haynes, ex-South Sioux City mayor; John D. Rossby, Niobrara, Knox county supervisor; Doyle Hanson, Dixon county commissioner; John Kinney, Wakefield; Joseph Beckefbauer, Wayne; the city of Wakefield and NE Nebraska Rural Public Power district. Their suit challenged the constitutionality of LB 187 passed by the last legislature, which set out what shall constitute the state highway system and which relocated Highway 35. The Lancaster District Court upheld the law's constitutionality. In appealing to the Supreme Court, the plaintiffs listed six assignments of error. These were not ruled upon by the Supreme Court.

Progress on the relocation is well ahead of schedule, local highway department officials said Tuesday. Original completion date was Nov. 24 but it is expected this will be bettered considerably. Workmen are now within three miles of Wayne applying the sand and gravel, which is being luminous surfaced. This must first be applied and then the blacktop can be applied. Oil is now being placed on the first mile south of Wakefield. Bridge work is also progressing nicely. Concrete ducts on the two smaller structures will probably be poured next week. The big bridge near the Wayne airport is also ahead of schedule.

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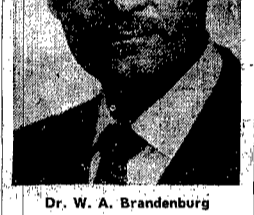
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Practice Judging Slated For County 4-H Members

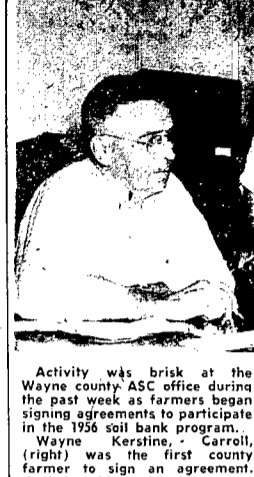
Concord Couple Honored Sunday On Anniversary

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First Farmer Joins Soil Bank



Activity was brisk at the Wayne county ASC office during the past week as farmers began signing agreements to participate in the 1956 soil bank program. Wayne Kerstine, Garroll, (right) was the first county farmer to sign an agreement. Assisting him with his agreement was County ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell, Wakefield, and Area ASC Fieldman Lee Sellon, Randolph. Kerstine placed 13 acres in the soil bank agreement. He will receive a payment of approximately \$450.

Cite Penalty For Breaking Agreements

Wayne county farmers have until July 15 to dispose of oats, barley or rye now growing on designated acreage reserve areas, County ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell announced this week. The deadline was extended from June 30 after Department of Agriculture officials said the late passage of the soil bank bill rushed farmers in disposing of such crops. The extension also applies to disposal of wheat within the 1956 allotment. The extension, does NOT in any way extend the June 15 deadline for compliance with the wheat allotment in order to qualify for the 1956 price support and marketing quota program, Sundell added. County officials were also cautioned about using the soil bank program as a form of free crop insurance. Sundell said soil bank agreements are expected to be carried out in good faith. The chairman also pointed out the severe 50 percent penalty on violation of the signed agreement. "If a farmer has a soil bank agreement in effect July 20 and leaves the crop growing after the disposal date (July 15 for oats, barley or rye; July 1 for corn, grain sorghums, soybeans or other unapproved cover crops) he runs the risk of having the agreement cancelled and might have to forfeit all payments he has received under the soil bank. He also faces a civil penalty of 50 percent of the compensation to which he would have been entitled." Sundell's warning followed suggestions by some students of the new farm program that any farmer who can qualify for soil bank payments should sign up now to "bank" all the land he can. The reason is that he will have until July 20 to change his mind and keep his crop on the acreage reserve. If he does not, the 50 percent penalty will be assessed. Farmers are cautioned that any violation of the agreement must be accounted for by that date or the farmer is subject to the penalty. There is an advantage for a farmer to sign up for the maximum acreage in case his crop is destroyed by natural causes. The possibility of a penalty must also be considered, however. A farmer can sign up now to put up to 50 acres or 50 percent of his crop in reserve, whichever is larger, into the acreage reserve of the soil bank. He must, of course, meet all requirements as being in compliance with acreage allotments. If by July 20 it appears his crop will be a total failure, he can cancel the contract for all or part of the acreage, allow the crop to mature and harvest it as he normally would. If however, during the summer a critical period before planting the field should get hatched or mowed, see SOIL BANK—page 2.

Crops Improve With Rain and Cool Weather

Rain and cooler weather dominated the weather picture for Northeast Nebraskans the past week. For the first time since June 1 the week's temperature record shows no readings of 90 degrees or more. Rainfall totaled 78 inches falling in three separate showers and bringing the June total to 6.12 inches. Average rainfall for this 30-day period is 4.05 inches. Wayne rainfall for the year now stands at 13.20 inches about 2.52 inches ahead of the normal of 10.88 inches for the first six months. Pastures are showing a strong improvement under cooler skies and heavier rains while corn is recording vigorous growth. ASC Chairman Explains Yields on Acreage Reserve

Regulations determining when "normal" yields will be used as the basis for payments under the 1956 soil bank acreage reserve program were clarified today by County ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell. "The simple way to remember this is to associate normal yields with underplanting," the chairman said. "The regulations require the county committee to use normal yields for acreage placed under the acreage reserve by underplanting this year. This means farmers who participate in the program by underplanting are assured of payments based on normal crop yields." One hitch: the corn must be in good condition at the time of signing up to get full payments. If hail or another natural disaster strikes before the farmer's name is on the dotted line, he will be paid on the basis of the appraised yield after the damage.

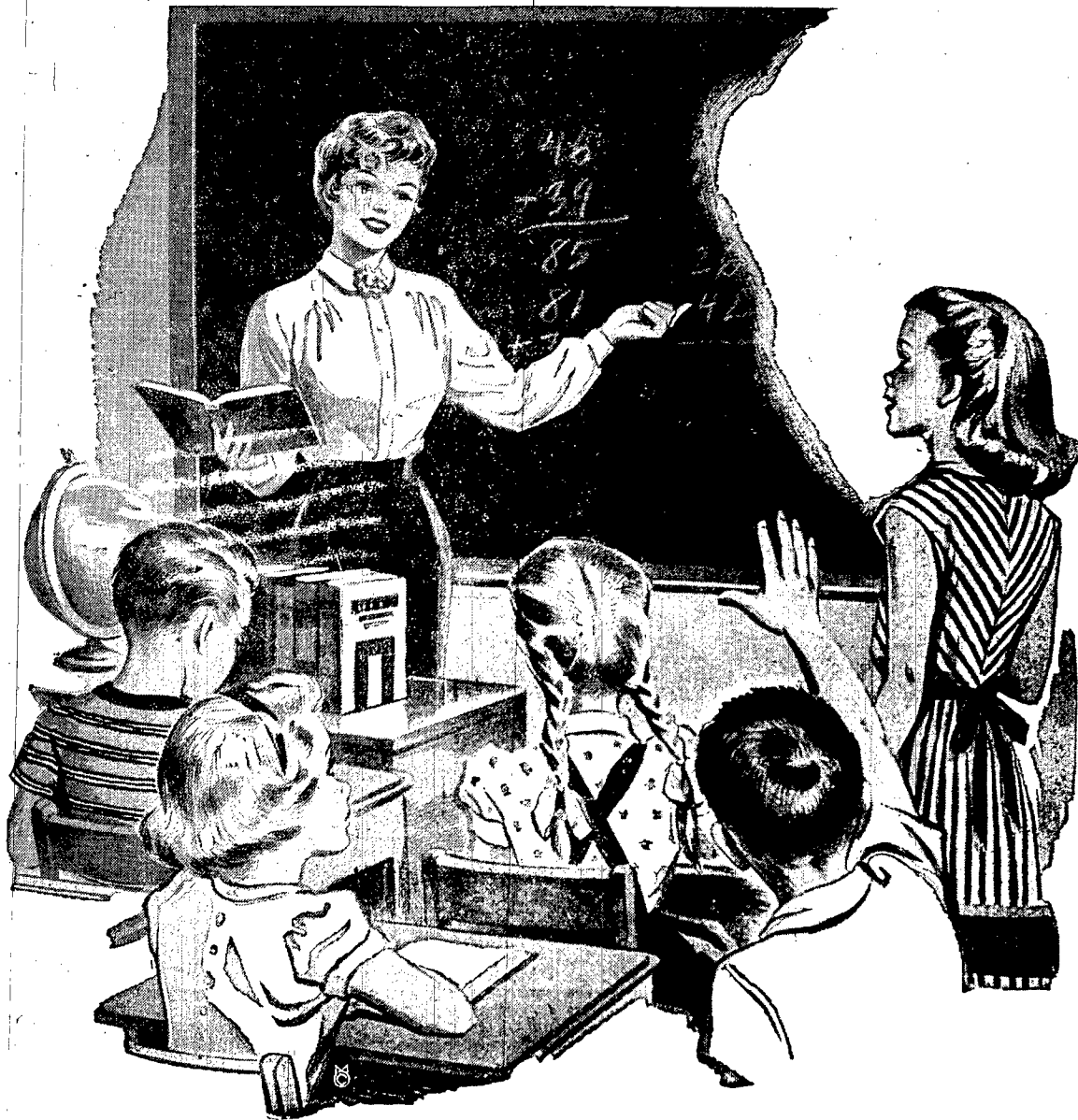

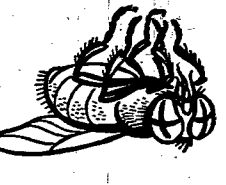

Why the Fair?

Each year about this time someone is certain to question the value of the county fair—any county fair. Why, they ask, have a county fair when we can see all the same and more at the state fair?

How short-sighted can one get? FIRST: One cannot see the same at the state fair! Most of the youngsters who exhibit 4-H livestock at our county fair would find it difficult to show at the state fair. Besides the extra cost of transporting and showing the animal, where would they all find stall space?

This would prevent many good young farm folks from ever entering their livestock in competition... which in turn would prevent their knowing just what is needed to make prize livestock... which in turn would mean that the average run of farm animals would be of much poorer quality than that now produced.

SECOND: Most of us who attend the county fair would find it difficult to attend the state fair each year. And if we could attend, how would we ever find little Johnny, our neighbor's son, in all the thousands who would be showing there?

If these well-meaning but short-sighted persons would consider all the angles they would see that elimination of the county fair would have a disastrous effect on the quality of agricultural products. Young folks—farmers of tomorrow—would not

learn best ways to produce gains, breed quality livestock, raise quality grains, in any other field of endeavor... and without the competitive spirit fostered by county fairs that progress would be greatly lessened.

Business Is Business Would you think much of a company that left important papers in miscellaneous desk drawers or poked vital documents between books in the book case?

1. All insurance policies in the family, with benefits provided and names of companies. 2. Social security cards and their numbers. 3. Numbers of all government bonds in order to make claim in case they are destroyed. 4. All family debts, with schedule of payments and terms agreed upon.

All valuable papers, including birth and marriage certificates, should be kept in safety vaults or in a locked metal box for protection from fire and theft. Bank accounts and safety deposit boxes are best held jointly unless a will gives wife or husband access to funds in case of death.

Chicken a Bargain The best eating time of year (fried chicken) can be a year or longer now. The best of the crop is now being offered in plentiful supply and at bargain prices. The full fed, early maturing broiler weight chickens are superior in quality at this season. Variety in meats year round is possible if they are freezer stocked now.

Humus Best Conditioner So far nothing has been discovered that is superior on a cost basis to organic matter as a soil conditioner. When fresh organic matter rots in the soil, slimy materials are developed by the soil microbes. These bind the soil particles together in much the same manner as it is done by chemical conditioners. When the soil dries out these slimy materials shrink and draw the soil particles together in crumbs, and hold them in this condition for some time. Soils liberally supplied with rotting organic matter will remain in good condition and

National Conventions

Nebraska delegates to the Republican national convention this summer apparently want to keep Vice President Richard Nixon. Support for President Eisenhower is solid, and delegates to the convention answered a poll were almost 100 percent for Nixon. A few said they didn't want to comment since the matter was up to the presidential candidate. Eleven of 18 delegates either listed Nixon or had previously come out for the Eisenhower-Nixon team.

Several of the candidates said they would support whoever seems most likely to unseat the present administration. The way the Democratic lineup now stands, Sen. Estes Kefauver has four votes, with eight delegates uncommitted. Kefauver was the only Democratic entry in Nebraska's May primary... But there was no indication of objections to Kefauver and if he went to the convention this summer with considerable strength he could possibly get the support of the entire delegation from Nebraska.

Polio Changes

There have been some changes in the Salk polio vaccine program that have met with approval of the State Board of Health. The Board agreed to a recommendation of the Advisory Polio Committee that all persons under 20 years of age and extant on July 15, 1955, now may receive the shot. Previously, persons one year old through 15 were eligible. Booster injections will be given seven months after the second shot. Nurses who work with acute polio cases and technicians who work with live virus may be given the inoculations.

Normal Board

Complete plans are going to be drawn up for two new dormitories and a combination dining hall for the State Normal Board, which governs the teachers colleges, has approved preliminary sketches of the new buildings. The dormitories, one for men and one for women, each will house about 100 students and cost around \$500,000 apiece. The other structure is expected to cost about \$200,000. The buildings will be financed by step plan of self-liquidating bonds. At WSTC, a new \$750,000 audi-

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CAPITOL NEWS

Statehouse Salaries LINCOLN — Legislators may probe into the matter of statehouse salaries again in the 1957 session. This is a perennial problem in state government and especially in the statehouse where there are so many people in the same classification working under one roof. Many stenographers, for instance, get widely different salaries for the same jobs. It doesn't take long for the fact to get around by way of the statehouse grapevine. Some department heads in an apparent move to combat the problem, have been hiking the salaries of employees. One department asked for pay increases for 92 persons.

State Tax Commissioner Fred Herrington turned them down. Herrington has the job of checking such requests to see if the department involved has enough money to handle them. After the request for the blanket hike was received, Gov. Anderson took over. The Governor summoned department heads and asked them to cooperate in a "hold the line" policy on salaries, regardless of whether they come from federal or state funds.

Gov. Anderson said his policy is to blanket pay hikes. And he asked the department chiefs to explain to him by letter any change upward in salaries. The governor doesn't have any control over what elected department chiefs do regarding salaries. But he said he got a free expression of opinion states from the chiefs. "Said the Governor "I don't care whether the employees are paid from state or federal funds. It is just a matter of federal funds as state funds. It's all taxpayer money." Anderson said he has a "hold the line" policy for the departments immediately under his jurisdiction. One of the big problems in state government, he said, is inequality of wages and policy concerning employees. The Governor said at one time he felt that perhaps a statewide personnel director might be part of the answer. But he said "maybe some better method could be worked out."

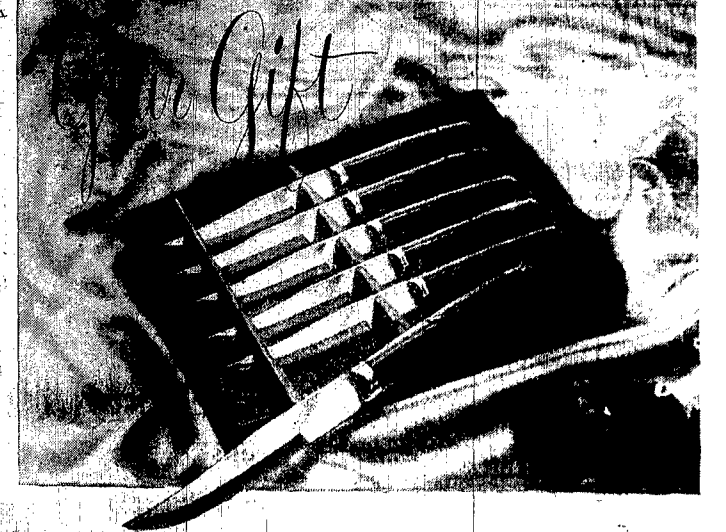
Any salary hikes should be done every two years on approval of the Legislature's budget committee," the Governor said. "A study should be made every two years to see if we are paying fair wages."

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
