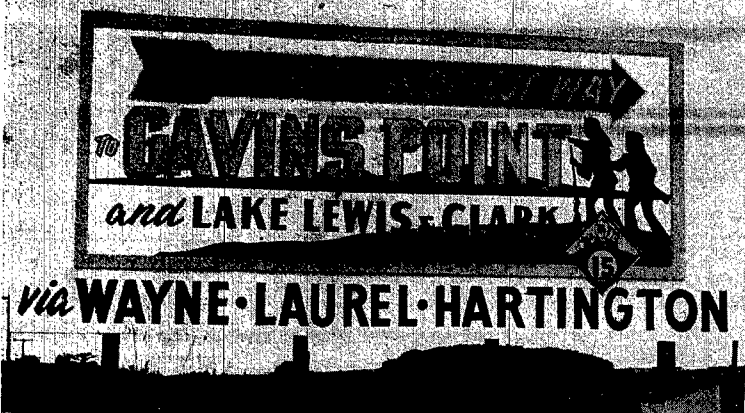


Sign Directs Sportsmen Through Wayne

County Farmers Reminded of Vital '56 Soil Bank Deadline

Cite Penalty For Violation

Friday is a vitally important date for Wayne county farmers interested in the 1956 soil bank program, County ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell reminded today. Tomorrow is important for two reasons: 1. It marks the final deadline for signing an acreage reserve agreement under the 1956 program. Landlords have until Aug. 31 if the tenant signs by Friday. 2. It is also the final deadline for the ASC to receive notice from farmers who have signed agreements that they wish to cancel or alter their contracts. As of closing time Tuesday, the ASC had 315 acreage agreements covering 5,568 acres. Only three wheat reserve agreements have been made by county farmers. They cover 39 acres. The remainder are designated as corn acreage reserve. Total payments to farmers under the agreements now total about \$159,000. By deadline time Friday it is expected to near \$200,000. Current average is slightly over \$500 per farm. Largest payment will be about \$3,100. Letters have been mailed to county farmers who agreed to destroy or plow under corn acreage when they signed their acreage re-

serve agreements. Sundell pointed out that all contracts will be considered in force unless the ASC is notified of cancellation or revision. Farmers who agreed to plow under corn have until July 31 to do so. If they fail to comply with the agreement they are subject to severe penalties. These penalties, which also cover willful grazing of the acreage reserve, are forfeit of all payments and an additional civil penalty of 50 percent of the total payments to which the farmer is entitled. A new national policy on grazing acreage reserve tracts was announced Sunday-but no action has been announced on Gov. Victor Anderson's request to have Nebraska declared a semi-disaster area so farmers could graze livestock on such tracts. June 22 was the last day when land could be grazed and still be eligible for the acreage program unless specifically authorized by the Secretary of Agriculture to meet emergency conditions. Cedar and Dixon counties have requested such emergency authorization. Chairman Sundell said the reason for exception to the ban on grazing is to protect livestock and dairy industries against the incentive for increased production. Farmers who have land in the acreage reserve must keep the tract free of noxious weeds and must not harvest any crop or graze livestock thereon before Jan. 1,

1957. However, approved cover crops for harvest in 1957 can be planted on the "banked" acres. Farmers who wish to follow this program should check with the ASC to get a list of approved cover crops.

County Bond Sales Top 60 Percent of Quota

Wayne county sales of savings bonds topped 60 percent of the 1956 quota during the first six months of the year. Chairman Henry E. Lay announced this week. June sales totaled about \$45,000, bringing the year's total to about \$382,300 or 60.3 percent of the quota. Percentages for other NE Nebraska counties were: Cumming, 42.2; Thurston, 37.1; Madison, 76; Stanton, 12.1; Dixon, 14.3; and Pierce, 33.5.

County Farmers Will Vote Friday on Wheat Quotas

Wayne county farmers who will harvest more than 15 acres of wheat in 1957 will participate in the national wheat marketing referendum Friday. County ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell said this week. Balloting will be at the county ASC office from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. Only farmers who intend to harvest over 15 acres of wheat as grain in 1957 are eligible to vote. A two-thirds favorable vote will mean marketing quotas and penalties on excess wheat will be in effect for the 1957 crop. Under quotas, top price support to growers in the commercial area who comply with their wheat acreage allotments will be at the full level available-between 75 and 90 percent of parity. Secretary of Agriculture Benson has announced a national average support price of \$2.00 bushel for 1957 if marketing quotas are approved in Fed-

Hail Accompanies Rains; Some Farms Suffer Badly

Periodic rains continue to improve the county corn picture through reports of hail damage follow almost every rain. Rainfall in the past week has totalled 1.22 inches in Wayne, bringing July moisture to 2.26 inches. Following Tuesday night's rain insurance offices received reports of light to medium hail damage in an area about halfway between Wayne and Carroll. Damage from medium to heavy was reported near Altona.

George Thompson and Anton Pfueger estimated their losses at near 90 percent. Bulk of the heaviest losses were in Plum Creek precinct. Temperatures have remained in the high 80's and low 90's, topping at 94 degrees for the week. Nighttime lows have all been in the 60's.

Crop are responding well to cooler weather and intermittent rains. County Agent Harold Ingalls' weekly crop report lists corn and alfalfa as "good" with pastures "improving."

Ingalls said his office has received no reports of corn borer damage so far this year despite last year's infestation being the heaviest on record in Wayne county. Insecticide dealers reported they had received only a few reports of light infestations.

Total rainfall for Wayne in 1956 now stands at 15.45 inches. Normal through July 14 is 14.14 inches. Growth-temperature and precipitation records for the period Wednesday, July 11 through Tuesday, July 18:

Cut Would Drop Taxes By \$44,000

Wayne county commissioners will hold a public hearing at 2 p. m. Wednesday on the proposed 1956 county budget. A tentative levy of 5.0 mills has been set in the budget summary issued by the commissioners today. This represents a decrease of 1.18 mills over the 1955 levy.

Reduction of the levy was made despite a drop of over \$2,000,000 in the county's valuation. The cut was accompanied by reduced budget estimates for some county offices and the size of certain agencies on hand. This year's total valuation is \$56,686,500 as compared to \$28,835,500 in 1955. Thus each mill levied in 1956 will bring about \$28,000 as compared to \$28,000 last year. If the budget is held at the 5.00 mill Wednesday, taxpayers would pay about \$44,000 less in county taxes than they paid a year ago.

Wayne city band will play its final concert of the summer season at 7:30 p. m. Friday at the WSTC Willow bowl.

Many features will be included in the program. They are junior high band, trombone novelty and twirlers from Wayne High and Wayne Prep.

Members of the summer recreation program will also present some of the games and activities they learned during the summer. Junior high band will play four numbers: "True Blue," "Little Brown Jug," "American Patrol" and "The Poor People of Paris." The band program listed by Director Earl Green includes: "God Bless America," "The Nutcracker," "The Golden Glow Overture," "Hollywood Serenade," "Springtime Polka," "Dry Bones," "March of the Slide Trombones," "High School Cadets" and "Star Spangled Banner." The Wayne band has accepted an invitation to participate in Wakefield diamond jubilee celebration Aug. 7. The band will march in the afternoon parade and play a concert in the park.

Biggest cuts came in the general and road funds, where budgets were cut about \$12,000. Because of large balances on hand, only a .46 road levy will be made for 1956. Levy for this fund was 1.65 mills a year ago. Levy for the general fund may be cut from 2.30 to 2.01 mills if commissioners adopt the proposed budget. Bridge fund levy will remain the same with an additional emergency levy of .20 mills to meet requirements. A raise of .09 mills was necessary in the county relief levy because of a lower cash balance and a slight increase in the budget requirements. 



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### Two Changes Needed

Melvin Steen, recently appointed director of Nebraska's Game commission is likely to be an unpopular man for a few years—but if he can hang on, he will make sportsmen like and respect him.

Mr. Steen's trouble will be caused by his bluntness—an attribute that is lacking in too many of us.

This characteristic will get him in hot water with state politicians, who will try to twist his words and actions to the discredit of both the Game commission and Mr. Steen.

As an example: The new director said the commission does not have enough income to operate efficiently. Personnel is spread too thinly to effectively enforce the laws and laws are spread too thickly to be properly enforced.

Director Steen would like to see two things: Higher license fees and fewer laws.

Discussion of higher license fees will immediately raise phony howls of protest throughout the state—mostly from persons or groups trying to gain public attention. Their protests will be groundless.

No one can honestly deny that hunting and fishing are a luxury. We now pay \$1.50 for each license or \$2.50 for a combination, plus a 10-cent issuing fee. This paltry sum entitles us to hunt and fish at about the same price as we paid 15 years ago.

For this amount we expect the Game commission to keep waters stocked with fish and up-

lands full of our favorite game. It can't be done. A fairer price would be \$3 for each license with no reduction for a combination.

Now don't start screaming that we're trying to price hunting into the reach of a favored few. Show us a man who spends \$1.50 for his hunting license, but who would be bankrupt if he had to pay double that amount! Phooey!

Far too many so-called sportsmen feel they have a divinely-endowed right to hunt or fish but at the same time call on the game commission to provide the game.

If the commission's income from fees could be doubled, Director Steen probably could triple the benefits we derive from such fees.

We can't expect the commission to provide a budget at 1956 expenses with an income from 1930. We say raise fees.

The multitude of laws enacted by well-meaning legislators probably could stand cutting in half. Other states have found that their game problems increased and game decreased as game laws multiplied.

Steen should be asked to make recommendations concerning our state's game laws and the next session of the Unicameral should give these suggestions very careful study.

The game commission was sufficiently impressed with Steen's abilities to hire him. Let's give the man a chance to show his talents.

# Wayne Youth Tells of Korea, Inflation, Pitiful Children

## Makes First Seoul Visit

Editor's Note: The following letter was written by Bob Carhart, Wayne serviceman, to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Carhart. In it he describes his impressions of Korea and gives some of the details on Army life there. The Wayne youth has been in Korea since February.

I have been in Korea two days over four months now and finally can look forward to receiving my first leave. Japan is probably having its rainy season now just as Korea is, but the change of scenery is something to anticipate even if the weather is not likely to be much different.

If things go as I am planning them I should be able to catch a flight to Japan sometime during the first or second week in July. I will spend a week there.

Two weekends ago I took my first visit to Seoul and paid my first trip to Seoul. I was very much impressed by this largest of Korean cities, which is certainly also the oldest city I have ever visited.

As is the case with most old cities in Europe and Asia a wall had been constructed around the city to protect it from invading barbarian tribes. The wall around Seoul was built about 600 years ago and either provided very little protection or was not particularly well built for there is little evidence of its having been there.

The only traces remaining are the three main gates which entrance to the city could be made. They are large, ornate archlike structures, obviously reconstructed and maintained like national monuments.

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The groups of older boys are a greater gang of brigands than you ever met in any of Dickens' novels. Many of the more astute young criminals seek a more profitable livelihood by procuring for the thousands of prostitutes found everywhere, not only in Seoul but all over Korea. I have never anywhere seen a sadder young generation than this young Korea.

I used government transportation to travel from downtown

Seoul to the Seoul Military post, which is the Korean headquarters for AFPE Eighth Army. If you forget about the city, you would almost believe to be looking at an equipped military post in the US. Everything you could possibly desire is there in abundance.

I can safely say that the GI's who live at SMP have a better lot than GI's who are stationed at most posts in the States. Like the pasture, however, the SMP probably looks better from this side of the fence than from inside.

I hope to return to Seoul soon after my leave so that I can have a chance to get to know it well before it becomes cold in the fall. Both the cookies that you sent and those that Aunt Helen sent arrived in perfect condition and as fresh as the day they were boxed. I received both boxes after my birthday and both were gone by my birthday. I do not recall the dates they were post-marked, but I remember when I opened them I figured up that it had taken only 4 1/2 days for them to get here. I couldn't have received a more appreciated gift over here. Home cooking is an extremely rare thing indeed.

Currency here is inflated somewhat. The best, which is none too good, costs as much as or more than it does in the States. I will cite some examples.

The Bando hotel and the Chosen hotel, which are the two finest hotels in Seoul, and which are comparable to any fine hotel in Chicago, cost a good \$20 a night. Another example is the cost of American cigarettes on the Korean market. In the PX I pay 10 cents for a package of cigarettes whereas when compared with market prices the civilians in Korea pay about 35 cents a pack. This is too high even when compared with market prices in the States.

Food is another good example. Three of us ate a Chinese dinner of chicken chow-main at one of the better Seoul restaurants. It costs us 4,900 hwan or about ten dollars. This is an expensive meal at home.

I don't know where all of this buying things cheaply overseas talk comes in that you hear in the States. It is true that in the PX's you get some tremendous deals and also when buying goods manufactured in the country, but otherwise you are not doing it.

**Hornet's Nest**  
Lincoln. The new executive secretary of the State Game commission has stirred up a hornet's nest. The buzzing began when Commission Secretary Melvin Steen confirmed he had ordered Game Warden Harland Huppert, Falls City, to file a criminal complaint filed against Game Commissioner Don Robertson, North Platte.

Huppert's complaint alleged Robertson shot a quail from a road near Tecumseh Nov. 11, 1955. Robertson said he shot away from the road, then walked on to the road. Huppert said the complaint had been postponed once. Steen said

he ordered Huppert to drop the complaint and told him insubordination would lead to Huppert's dismissal.

"We are not going to clutter up the courts with these complaints," Steen said. "But we are ready to prosecute the people who deserve punishment. Don Robertson was not one of them. He did no harm to any person, property or thing. He didn't hurt the wildlife conservation by shooting a single quail. This is a type of offense that is commonly handled with a warning."

Sen. George S. Yeaman, chairman of the Game and Fur commission, is studying the commission

He said before he came on the job he saved the people of the state more than his salary, by finding a way for the commission to keep \$70,000 in Federal funds that otherwise would have lapsed.

**Ton-Mile Tax**  
Opponents of the proposed ton-mile tax on trucks and intercity buses are laying groundwork for possible action to try and keep the proposal off the November ballot. Secretary of State Frank Marshall ruled last week petitions to put the proposal on the ballot had more than enough signatures. The petitions were filed by the Committee for Better Roads Through Fair Taxation.

Marshall held the proposal should go on the November ballot. If approved by voters it would become law. The proposal applies to trucks of 10 tons or more and buses weighing 28,000 pounds or more.

Deputy Secretary of State Ronald Luedtke said he believes opponents have until Oct. 17 to take legal action in the matter.

**Hospital Money Short**  
Nebraska has been notified of its share of Federal funds for Hill-Burton hospital construction for the fiscal year of 1957. But it's far short of the amount needed.

Norman Pangborn, head of the hospital division of the State Health Department, said Nebraska's share is only \$125,000 more than the \$1,084,302 received for the 1956 fiscal year.

Of the total, \$300,000 is earmarked for specialized medical facilities. The proposed new Omaha Children's center will take all that money and already has requested \$300,000 more.

Applications for Federal hospital aid are on file from St. Francis of Grand Island, Seward Memorial St. Mary's of Nebraska City, St. Joseph's Rehabilitation Unit Omaha, Immanuel Deaconess Rehabilitation Unit, Omaha, St. Catherine's of Omaha, Gethsemane Memorial and Schuyler Memorial. An application also is expected for a new Merrick County hospital in Central City.
