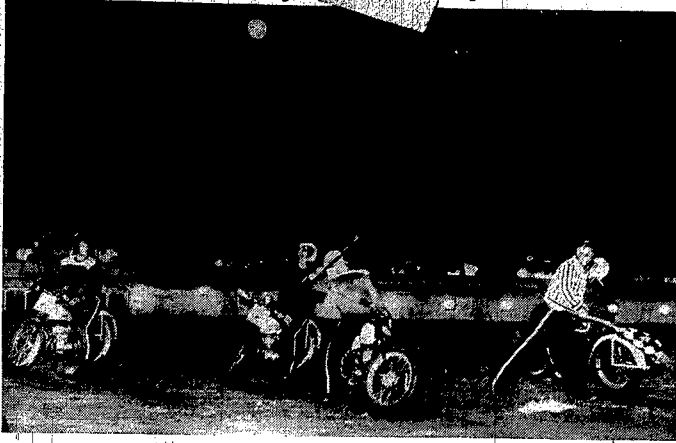


Thrillcade Re-opens Motorcycle Polo

ASC Chairman Outlines '56 Reseal Program; Rate Hiked

Delivery of Corn to Start Next Month

Wayne county farmers were urged this week to give serious consideration to re-sealing their 1955 and 1956-crop corn now stored on the farm under CCC loans or purchase agreements.

County ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell announced that the new storage payment rate for resealing farm-stored corn will be 16 cents per bushel. This is one cent over the payment rate for last year.

Tuesday is the maturity deadline for loans and purchase agreements on corn. However, farmers with corn under loan may signify their intention to re-seal any time before they receive a delivery notice from the ASC.

Farmers with purchase agreements on 1955-crop corn should notify the ASC of their intention to convert the agreement to a loan and re-seal by the Tuesday deadline.

Reseal program will not be extended for another year on 1953-crop corn. Farmers with such corn under loan will have two choices: re-seal the corn for the amount of the loan or deliver the corn to an ASC-designated storage depot.

Farmers who extend the re-seal on their 1954-crop corn will receive a storage payment of 15 cents per bushel at the time the extension is made. They will then receive 16 cents per bushel for the 1956-57 storage period.

A pro-rated storage payment will be made for the 1956-57 period in the event corn under re-seal or extended re-seal is redemmed prior to July 31, 1957.

Farmers who have purchase agreement corn stored in a warehouse must deliver a warehouse receipt dated Aug. 1, 1956 or earlier to the ASC no later than Aug. 10 in order to realize a price support loan.

Farm-stored corn from the 1955 and 1954 crops represents a considerable sum, July 15 ASC report revealed today. Slightly over 395,

Cooler Weather Aids Corn Crop; Rain Is Needed

Cool weather remained in the community during the past week, bringing blanket-sleeping weather to most homes. High temperature recorded for the period was 90 degrees Tuesday.

Nighttime readings have been generally in the high 50's with an average daily temperature of about 78 degrees.

Moisture falling during the week amounted to .62 inch. Largest amount was Friday when .27 fell.

Cool weather has proved a boon to crops, County Agent Harold Ingalls said Wednesday. Most of the county corn crop is in good condition but needs rain.

Pastures have shown marked improvement and most are now in "pretty good" condition while second cuttings of alfalfa just completed have produced about normal yields, he reported.

About 15 clubs are expected to participate in the "Share-The-Fun" contest Monday night at the city auditorium. The program will start at 7:30 p. m.

Two top acts at Monday's program will represent the county at district contest here Aug. 6. Judges Monday will be Ralph Copenberger and Henry Kumpost, Waltham.

Pre-fair day will be held at the auditorium Aug. 5 with a dress revue, music identification and song and speaking contests.

The day will open at 8:45 a. m. with singing by 4-H members in all classes of home economics projects. Demonstrations will start at 10.

Judging of dress revue entries will start at 1 p. m. with the actual revue at 2:30. Song contests will start at 3:15 with music identification at 3:45 and speaking contest at 4:15.

Cash prizes will be awarded for the three best floats in the Wayne county fair parade Aug. 13. Chairman Paul Peterson and Dr. W. A. Koerber announced Tuesday.

Bike, pony, wheelbarrow, chicken and foot races for children from 7-10 years and 11-14 are slated for the afternoon. Children wishing to enter the contests should fill out the entry blank on this page and return it to the Wayne Herald office by Aug. 10.

County Total Now Near \$200,000

Wayne county farmers now have until Friday to sign an acreage reserve agreement under the 1956 soil bank program, County ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell said today.

A change in program relations announced late last week extended the final date for signing acreage reserve agreements from July 20 to July 27.

Tomorrow is important for two reasons:

1. It marks the final deadline for signing an acreage reserve agreement. Landlords have until Aug. 31 if the tenants sign by Friday.

2. It is also the final deadline for the ASC to receive applications from farmers who have signed agreements that they wish to cancel or alter their contracts.

As of closing time Monday, the ASC had 389 acreage agreements covering 6,704 acres. Only three wheat reserve agreements have been made by county farmers. They cover 39 acres. The remainder are designated as corn acreage reserve.

Total payments to farmers under the agreements now total about \$193,500, an average of about \$500 per farm. Largest payment will be about \$3,100.

Other recent revisions in program regulations extend the final date for disposing of crops in order to qualify under the 1956 program.

The final date for destroying oats, barley, rye and wheat is Friday. The final date for destroying corn, grain sorghums and soybeans is Aug. 3.

Letters have been mailed to county farmers who agreed to destroy or plow under corn acreage when they signed their acreage reserve agreements.

Sundell pointed out that all contracts will be considered in force unless the ASC is notified on cancellation or revision. If farmers fail to plow under corn as agreed, they face severe penalties.

These penalties, which cover will be grinding of the acreage reserve are forfeit of all payments and an additional civil penalty of 50 percent of all payments to which the farmer is entitled.

Farmers who have land in the acreage reserve must keep the tract free of noxious weeds and must not harvest any crop or graze livestock thereon before Jan. 1, 1957.

However, approved cover crops for harvest in 1957 can be planted on the "banked" acres. Farmers who wish to take this step should consult the ASC office for a list of approved cover crops.

Safety Council Meeting Slated Monday Night

Representatives of eight NE Nebraska counties are expected in Wayne Monday night for a workshop and public meeting to encourage the formation of additional county safety organizations.

The public meeting will start at 7:30 p. m. at the city hall. The Area III meeting is under the supervision of T. S. Hook, Wayne, local coordinator and liaison representative of the Nebraska Traffic Safety foundation.

Currently only 18 of 93 Nebraska counties have safety organizations. This foundation-sponsored tour is aimed at increasing this number considerably.

Invitations have been extended to two representatives in each county to bring a safety group to attend the Wayne workshop, which will be under the direction of Foundation Director Gifford D. Mullins. It will be held Monday afternoon.

County representatives will receive material resources helpful in setting up an organization and its subsequent operation. Also provided will be suggestions for surveying local traffic safety needs, projects affecting the state as a whole, sources of material and professional assistance, etc.

Representatives of Thurston, Cedar and Dixon counties have not yet been announced.

The tour program includes 15-100, the Legion of Safety rescue unit presented to the citizens of Nebraska in 1954 by the association. Fully equipped with numerous rescue facilities, the unit will be on display for the public.

County representatives invited to the workshop are Hubert H. Wolf and Alice M. Cox, Pierce; Gary Rinehart and Mrs. Wimer Marra, Wayne; Joe Morton, sr. and Mrs. Sam Knox, Dakota; Mrs. Diver Hauptman, Antelope; and Mrs. Walter Wenke, Knox.

Central Fireplace Wall, Open Planning Feature New Bob Johnson Residence

Homes Series Starts Today

Editor's Note: Today marks the opening of a new feature series on new Wayne homes. In line with building better community thinking, The Herald will endeavor to give its readers up-to-date descriptions of building and decorating ideas in new homes throughout the city.

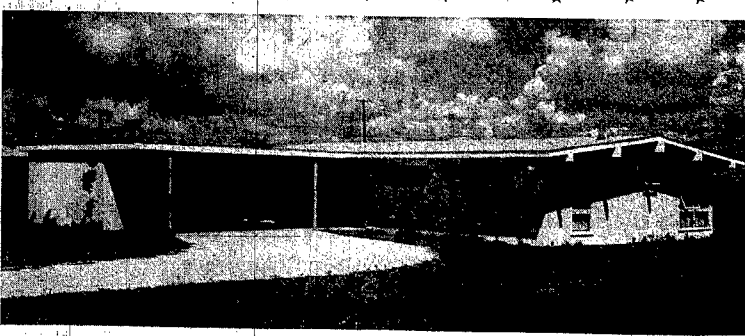
As an added feature in this series, a sketch of the floor plan of each home will be pictured whenever it is available.

A stone fireplace which forms a wall in three rooms is the central feature of the new Bob Johnson home at 612 Hillcrest Road.

Built of Arkansas ledge stone, it forms the fireplace wall in the living room and east wall of the all-purpose room and the north end houses a built-in gas oven in the kitchen.

The house, which contains about 1,600 square feet of floor space, is fronted by a carport enclosed on two sides. A storage wall is built in the south wall.

The carport is separated from the house proper by a patio and L-shaped planter which holds five Japanese yew. The patio is covered by roof overhang from the house.

The 9 x 6 entry has a floor of Colorado red sandstone. It leads straight ahead to the all-purpose room or left into the living room, saving much wear on the living room. The entry closet and part of the fireplace wall do not extend to the sloped ceilings which have exposed beams. This open design provides an atmosphere of

roominess. East wall of the entry and basement stairway wall are paneled with redwood as is the exterior of the house. Exterior color is yellow while this inner paneling is white.

Fireplace in the 15 x 20 living room is highlighted by wrought iron and brass accessories. A wide ledge of the Colorado sandstone adds seating space when entertaining large groups.

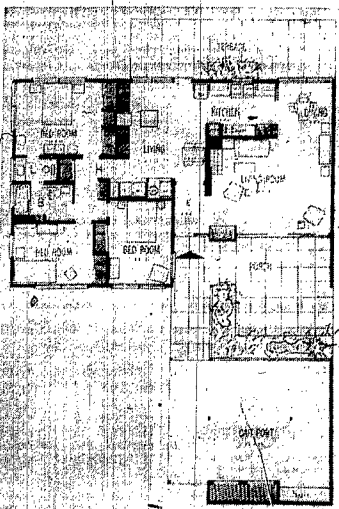
The light beige nylon carpeting contrasts with the pink sand walls and light turquoise ceiling. The same ceiling color is used in the living, entry, hall and all-purpose room to provide unity.

Sheer drapes of light turquoise in a modernistic design with gold spatter overlay hang at the triple awning-type windows on the south and north. Six cornice windows top See HOME FEATURE—page 2

 the west wall. Overhanging eaves shade all windows and keep out the hot afternoon sun.
 Furniture is limed oak, low and modern. One suite is dark brown with a gold metallic thread. Other chairs are dark green and coral. At the north end of the L-shaped living room is a 9 x 9 dining area. Straight east from here is the 8 x 11 kitchen. Television can be viewed from the dining area, kitchen or all-purpose room.
 The built-in gas oven with a see-through door highlights the kitchen. The waist-level broiler eliminates much bending and stooping for Mrs. Johnson.
 Walls of the kitchen are shrimp and at the east end of the turquoise counter is a charcoal telephone. Beside the built-in oven is a counter top stove with a fan and lighted hood directly overhead. Natural finished cupboards have copper trim.
 The glosheen curtains are a modernistic print with a gold overlay. The kitchen and all-purpose room floors are covered with a brown and beige spatter on gray tile.
 In the east wall of the friendly all-purpose room is Mr. Johnson's built-in hi-fi system and TV. The rest of the wall is storage space for cleaning supplies and children's play clothes. The wall is shrimp with a musical design in black, white and turquoise spread across.
 A wrought-iron dinette set in turquoise is at the north end of the 12 x 16 room. Pillows on a black tweed davenport are of the same material as the drapes.
 At the end of the fireplace wall is a paint-philadendron in a wooden planter. The basement stairway is enclosed by a wrought-iron rail and gate to keep the Johnson children from tumbling into the basement. Finishing the basement is in Johnsons' plans for the future.
 A hall leads from the all-purpose room to the three bedrooms and bathroom. Closets in the hall and the bedrooms all have sliding doors of natural finish.
 The gray-green 12 x 12 master bedroom is furnished with maple furniture, beige cotton carpet and white background print draperies over ribbon and floor-length windows.
 The bright yellow bathroom, with entrances from the master bedroom and the hall, is divided into two rooms by a sliding door. One room is a lavatory and stool and in the other is a lavatory, vanity and bathtub. Fixtures are

white. Curtains are a black and white stripe with black and white marbled tile floor and a black vanity top.
 The lavender furniture in the 10 x 13 nursery matches the lavender walls which are attractively decorated with Mother Goose pinups. The draperies at the east floor-length windows and the south ribbon windows are a herculean print design of lavender, pink, turquoise, charcoal and avocado with a gold overlay spatter. The floor is covered with a beige cotton carpet. The nursery is complete with Kurt, Johnsons' 5-month-old baby. Ann,

4, sleeps in the youth bed opposite Kurt's crib.
 Bobby, 7, sleeps in one of twin maple beds in the sand colored bedroom. There is a beige nylon rug in this 10 x 14 room. The windows are covered with green draperies in modernistic print.
 As Mrs. Johnson pointed out, a special feature of the decoration of her home is the ceilings in the bedrooms and bath, which have been painted with a whiter mixture of the wall colors. It eliminates the harsh break in color otherwise noticed when plain white is used.
 Johnsons have lived in their home since January 24.

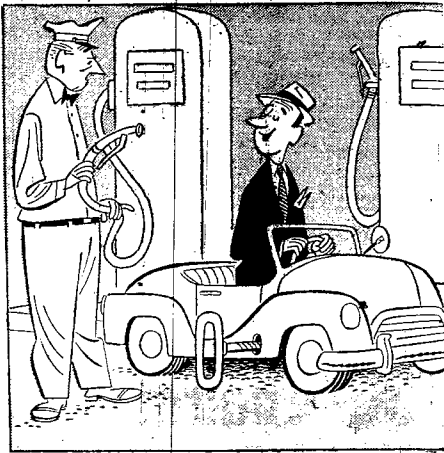

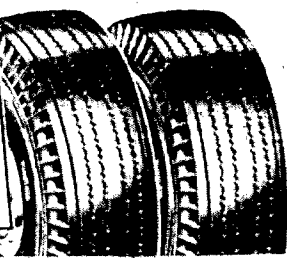

EDITORIAL COMMENT

WE PREDICT . . .

We're going to stick our necks on this editorial on two counts. Perhaps it actually isn't risky a thing, though, if the people of Wayne county follow their usual pattern.

Here's what we're writing Monday night about something that will happen Wednesday, so let's see if we are right:

FIRST: We believe that no one will show up at the county budget hearing at the courthouse Wednesday. (Actually, for a Thursday newspaper we should say no one **SHOWED** up Wednesday.)

This failure to show up should indicate pleasure at the new budget published last week by the county commissioners—and well it should, for our levy was reduced 1.18 mills from last year despite a \$2,000,000 drop in valuations. But it doesn't indicate approval—rather it shows only highly significant lack of interest in public affairs.

Probably not one person in ten can tell if tax

were one mill or 15 last year.

SECOND: Despite the fact that no one showed up at a budget hearing, there will be complaints about the tax levy and taxes being too high, not to mention criticisms of the use of tax monies.

The discouraging part of watching a democracy operate is the complete lack of interest shown in the workings of that government by the very people who benefit most from a democracy—the citizens.

It is on this weakness that subversives prey when they attempt to overthrow a government.

If we are wrong about Wednesday's meeting, we'll be happily embarrassed. But don't bank on seeing our discomfiture—not more than three persons showed up, we're sure.

What is the proposed levy this year? Oh yes. It is 5.0 mills as compared to 6.18 mills in 1955.

FOR WANT OF A NAIL . . .

"For want of a nail a shoe was lost. For want of a shoe a horse was lost, etc." the quotation goes and it might well have been made part of an early safety slogan.

Generally it is the lack of attention to little, seemingly unimportant things, that lead to major accidents on the farm and elsewhere.

This is National Farm Safety week. With the national spotlight on farm safety it behooves every one to think of safety a little more strongly, act a little more positively.

Lets take the case of a typical farm accident—not the spectacular kind, but just a common, everyday type thing that could happen easily and quickly.

The farmer is an average farmer on an average farm with a family and an average number of debts. He is grinding feed one morning, being extra careful around the machinery so he won't get hurt.

Walking into the barn from the grinder seems

safe enough—but he has forgotten that loose board in the floor he meant to replace soon as he got the time and stumbles.

The fall broke his leg. Nothing spectacular—just a plain, everyday broken leg. But it means a trip to the doctor, and a cast on his leg for several weeks.

The neighbors come in and help with the field work but they have work of their own and can't help every day. The family pitches in to help, too, but the work still suffers.

When the season is over the crop didn't come up to expectations, the milk cows that normally furnished a pretty good income had been sold because they couldn't be cared for, notes couldn't be met and he had to start the next year behind the financial eight-ball.

All because he didn't nail down a loose floor board in the barn. How profitable it would have been for him to stop for five minutes to replace that nail.

Corn Acreage Protected

Participation in the acreage reserve phase of the new soil bank program will not affect the corn farmer's future acreage allotment. Frank Reece, chairman of the Nebraska ASC committee, reported this week.

Even though the farmer reduced his corn crop to earn soil bank payments and help with surplus adjustment, he will receive credit for having planted the full amount of his corn acreage allotment. In that way his corn history will be protected for allotment purposes.

Reece pointed out that farmers have only until Friday to sign agreements for participation in the corn acreage reserve program. Farmers who have not yet called the county office to discuss this program and to sign agreements should do so today.

Control Flies Today

Rains will cause a rapid increase of flies around barns and homes. The first and most important method of controlling house and stable flies is sanitation. They breed in decaying organic matter, especially manure, straw manure, spilled feed, silage and in similar situations when they are placed in good conditions and maintained that way for satisfactory control. Ask for EC 1588 for instructions as to how to use the insecticides and make backrubbers. On beef calves a table-spoon or two of 5 percent methoxychlor wettable powder rubbed lightly into the hair will control horn flies. These recommendations are not satisfactory for stable flies.

Chiggers

For control in lawns, picnic areas, etc. use a spray of chlordane, toxaphene or lindane. Apply about three quarts on one of the following mixtures to 1000 square feet of lawn area:

Chlordane, 4 1/2% EC . . . 2 cups
Toxaphene, 60% EC . . . 1 1/4 cups
Lindane 20% EC . . . 1/4 cup

Allow spray to dry thoroughly before children or pets play on the lawn.

Supply and Demand

Potatoes have been retailing in Lincoln at 12c a pound or at the rate of \$7.20 a bushel. The early potato crop in the South was damaged by freezing and the crop is short and the demand far greater than the supply. This is an example of action of the old natural law of supply and demand.

The trade gets as much as it can from the consumer so in the last analysis the consumer sets the price. This is one law that cannot be repealed. Not even the government can get around this law. Any commodity that the demand is almost a billion bushels of wheat for which a higher price was allowed than the demand will pay. The more accurate the information on supply and demand the more nearly the producer will get the maximum price.

Test Soil Now

Now that the rush of spring and summer work is out of the way farmers should get time to take soil samples for test. Samples are easier to obtain now and the information received as a result of tests will allow making early plans for next year's cropping program. Then, too, you will avoid the spring rush and delay in getting returns. Sample boxes and information on taking samples is available in the County Extension office.

Feeder Lines

Lincoln Distances between many Nebraska cities might be shortened in the next 12 months, through a plan that can come about in the form of a feeder line. The Civil Aeronautics board in Washington. Pending before the board is the request of the Nebraska Aeronautics department for local feeder airline service.

"Nebraska right now is in the center of a 'blank spot' as far as feeder airlines go. Feeder lines connect passengers and freight to terminal points. In Nebraska these would be Omaha and Lincoln.

Now there is transcontinental service to Grand Island, North Platte and Scottsbluff by United Airlines, to Scottsbluff and Alliance by Western and to Norfolk by Braniff.

But the State Aeronautics department wants the CAB to order the "feeder line" service discontinued in favor of local routes to 13 cities: Beatrice, Hastings, Kearney, McCook, Imperial, Sidney, Grand Island, North Platte, Scottsbluff, Alliance, Chadron, Ainsworth and Norfolk. The department feels that local service would better serve Nebraskans and keep the state abreast of commercial aviation trends.

But Scottsbluff, North Platte and Grand Island told a CAB examiner they don't want to lose the trunk service of United which flies Convairs and operates without government subsidy, for a local line, using DC-3 equipment and which would require supplemental federal funds.

United said also it doesn't want to pull out of the three cities. But Rolland Harr, director of airports for the department, said United is providing only "token service." And, he said, the area can't support a trunk line as well as local carriers.

Harr says the network of local carriers would "change the economy" of Nebraska and help attract new industry. Cities, isolated virtually in the past, would have access to an airline, he said. Many businesses could profit by the fast service offered by the airlines, he added.

The CAB will have three questions to decide:

1. Should Nebraska have feeder service?
2. If so, who would serve the state? Four feeder lines—Ozark, Central, Frontier and North Central are bidding to serve Nebraska and six other states in the Midwest.
3. If feeder service is authorized should the three trunk airlines be required to suspend their operations?

Harr believes the decision will have a far reaching effect on the progress of commercial aviation in Nebraska.

Wage Earner

If you consider yourself an average wage earner, you made about \$3,597 in 1955, or just about \$108 more than in 1954, according to the State Labor department.

Using the department's figures, the University of Nebraska business research department came up with the statement that the upward trend in wages is "marvelous."

And, said the publication, "though causes for it are obscure, we can only hope that it continues year after year into the future."

The value of railroads in Nebraska for tax purposes this year has declined about five percent to a total of \$138,782,556. The 1955 amount was \$147,200,105.

State Tax Commissioner Fred Herrington announced the figures. They showed the taxable value of Union Pacific in Nebraska dropped to \$68,549,497 from the \$72,204,970 of 1955.

The value of the Burlington was cut some \$4,000,000 to \$35,403,929. The Rock Island from the 1955 total of \$2,714,500 to \$2,624,132, and the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis and Omaha declined in tax value from \$982,640 in 1955 to \$866,801.

On the franchise value of telephone companies, the board raised Northwestern Bell from \$1,037,370

to \$1,222,225. Lincoln Telephone and Telegraph Co. has increased from \$477,355 to \$509,070.

Bold Action

Gov. Victor Anderson says the states that have made the most progress in slashing traffic fatalities have used "bold action."

Nebraska's not going to try this right now, he said. Instead, the governor favors an education campaign. Said the governor: "If that doesn't work, we will have to take more drastic action."

In some states, governors have reinforced state police with National Guardsmen. But the governor said experts believe the job can be done with education of citizens.

In Nebraska, the governor said, the state has built safer roads, added 34 patrolmen on the highways, erecting new speed limit signs and also signs proclaiming that speed limits are radar enforced.

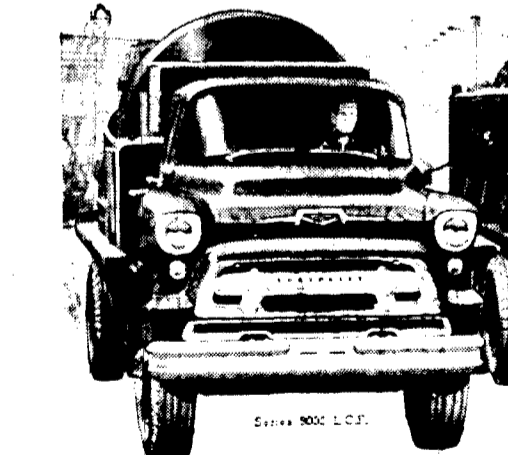

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
