All wearers of white booster hats will be admitted free as guests of the Wisner show, Bahe said.

Tuesday the group will go to Wakefield to attend their Diamond Jubilee celebration. Boosters are asked to wear white hats and meet at the Wakefield school at 1 p. m.

Meals will be served at the school for the fair parade slated here Aug. 13 to kick off Free Gate day at the Wayne county fair.

Parade chairman Dr. W. A. Koerber and Paul Peterson announced that early returns show many local firms plan to enter floats in the parade.

Cash prizes of \$15, \$10 and \$5 will be offered for the three best floats. Prizes also will be awarded in the children's division.

No particular theme has been adopted for the parade, Koerber said. The float should tell the story of the sponsoring firm, he said.

106-Degree Heat Scorches Corn In NE Nebraska

Except for one searing day temperatures the past week remained moderate in Northeast Nebraska. Last Thursday the thermometer hit 106 and brought white caps to cornfields throughout the state.

Moisture during the seven-day period totaled .42 inch falling in two showers. Saturday's rainfall was .32 and the remainder fell Tuesday.

This brought total July rain to 3.17 inches and the year's total to 16.37 inches according to Weatherman Archie Wert's figures. Normal rainfall for July is 3.26 inches.

Average accumulation total for the first seven months of the year is 14.14 inches.

438 Farms Approved For Soil Bank

Wayne county Wednesday morning was officially declared a drouth disaster area. This means producers may graze livestock on designated soil bank acreage reserves through Aug. 31.

Wayne county ASC office received confirmation by telegram Wednesday from Frank Reece, state ASC committee chairman.

Following is full text of the wire: "The Secretary of Agriculture has approved (Wayne) county to permit the grazing of the designated acreage reserve to and including Aug. 31, 1956. Such grazing is only for the benefit of the producer's own livestock and such livestock cannot be leased to other producers for grazing."

"Application to have the county declared a drouth disaster area was made last Friday following Thursday's 106-degree heat that burned corn throughout the state."

Wilbur, Hunter and Logan precincts were among the worst hit in the county.

County ASC Chairman Carl Sundell said Wednesday morning 438 soil bank contracts totaling \$31,560 had been signed with Wayne county farmers. Final date for signing agreements was last Friday.

Final date for destroying crops on designated acres was set for Aug. 3, but with designation of the county as a drouth disaster area the acres may be grazed by the producer's own livestock through Aug. 31.

Sundell estimated that approximately 50 more agreements still being processed would be completed this week, revising the figures upward. Nearly 8,000 acres in the county are now under the soil bank plan.

Governor Victor Anderson Tuesday requested that the deadline for signing soil bank agreements be extended.

Winside Community Petitions To Keep Doctor from Prison

Cite Public Health Need As Reason

Winside residents may seek help from President Eisenhower in an effort to keep the town's only doctor on the job. Townsmen are petitioning Winside and surrounding areas for support in an appeal move.

Spokesmen for the community said Monday night that they had nearly 3,000 signatures on a petition to suspend Dr. Donald Craig's prison term. He was sentenced to four months in prison for tax evasion.

According to Rev. H. M. Hilpert, spokesman, the signatures would be turned over to Rep. Bob Harrison or Senator Carl Curtis for further action. Hilpert stressed that the community doesn't feel that Dr. Craig shouldn't be punished. Their wish is suspension of the prison term, he said.

Rev. Hilpert added, "We are not trying to get around the law. We are trying to work through the law to help our people." C. B. Misfield said the community would continue to work for sentence suspension during the 60-day period granted Dr. Craig to arrange his affairs.

Community leaders contend Dr. Craig's presence is necessary to insure public health. They stated that in addition to being the only doctor in Winside, he has many patients in the surrounding area.

Numerous townspeople showed their desire for sentence suspension Monday night as they told reporters of late calls and emergencies handled by Dr. Craig.

The overwhelming community

interest was shown by hearty applause and a motion for authorities to show mercy to the community. Dr. Craig has served the Winside community for over 17 years.

Statewide publicity has been afforded the case. Residents wait for word from Senator Curtis on further action. They are still adding names to the petition for Craig's suspension.

\$348,000 Loan Approved for Wayne RPPD

Wayne county Rural Public Power district Tuesday received approval of a \$348,000 loan to improve present facilities and increase capacity to handle anticipated loads, Manager Robert O. Haas announced Wednesday.

Haas said improvements include a new substation, 3 1/2 miles of 69,000-volt transmission lines and about 40 miles of new distribution lines.

Tentative plans call for construction of the substation south of Sholes.

Anticipated loads are projected 10 years, Haas said and include about 75 new customers and an estimated 20 irrigation pumps.

Notification was in the form of a joint telegram from Senators Carl Curtis and Roman Hruska and Rep. Robert Harrison.

School Census Done; Includes Pre-School Ages

Wayne schools will have better picture of anticipated enrollment for the next five years with the completion of the 1956 school census. This year's figures include children from birth to age 20 and are broken down by age brackets.

Census figures include only children living within Wayne's city limits, however, and the number of rural students must still be estimated.

Wayne kindergartners this year should number about 45, a decrease of 10 from last year. The following year the number will jump to 58.

About 620 are listed as presently being of school age, although this includes 500 20 years and many are already through school. This group is used to determine state apportionment funds.

Last year 720 students attended Wayne uga, Supt. E. W. Willert said, with 135 of this number rural students. All but 25 of this group were enrolled in high school.

At Wayne Prep enrollment last year was about 250 with approximately the same proportion of town to rural students, Admistrator Daryl Dell said.

Mrs. Porter also warned rural school districts that are closed and contracting that the contracts must be in the county superintendent's office by Aug. 15.

Pre-opening day for Wayne county rural teachers will be Sept. 1. This includes 500 teachers pick up supplies and instructions for the school year.
