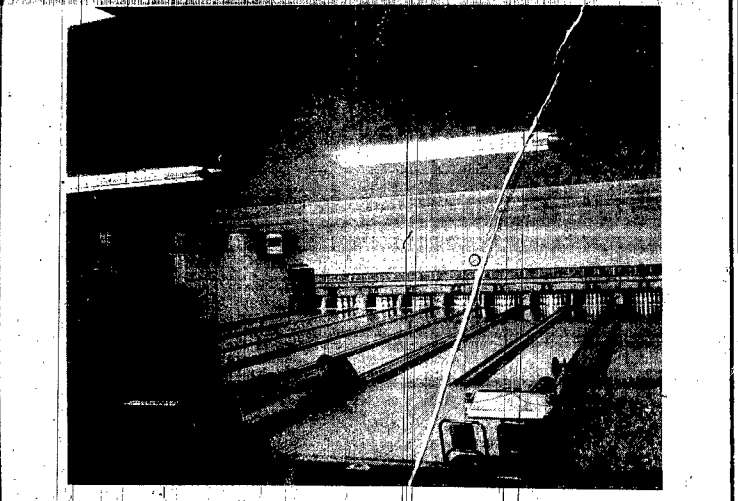

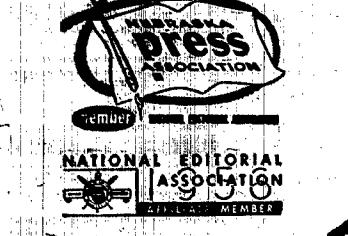

The library subscribes to the magazines and books to give you the facts about the candidates. Have you read "A Call to Greatness" by Adlai Stevenson, a collection of his lectures at Harvard? hower Story" or the latest magazine articles on the candidates and their issues? If not, you are not really an informed voter.

**CHURCH ORGANIZATIONS WILL SOON BE** looking for material for their fall and winter programs. We have three new books which would be of interest to them. "The Will to Believe" by Marcus Bach stands out among similar books because it has realism and depth. It is not another "how to" book. It is, in fact, a "will to" book and marks a new approach to a usable, workable philosophy of life. This book was chosen by the Acme club as a memorial for Mrs. C. L. Pickett. It is the type of book she would have liked to review. The whole theme of the book is "the greater you will to believe, the greater and richer your life." ## HERE AND THERE . . . With Your County Agent By Harold Ingalls

**Fly Control**  
Dairymen are troubled with three types of flies at this time of year. They are house, horn and stable flies.

House flies can be controlled with methoxychlor residual spray or a poisoned bran in which malathion is mixed with sugar or molasses.

Horn flies also can be controlled with methoxychlor used as a spray or on a mechanical homemade back rubber.

Stable flies are especially difficult to control in yards and pastures. These flies are blood suckers so any spray acts only as a temporary repellent. A spray mixture of pyrethrin compounds and Crag repellants mixed with water and distilled oil is effective for a short time.

**Big Investment**  
Fewer people on American farms producing more food than ever adds up to a mechanical worker being the most highly financed in the world. Each of our 8 1/2 million farm-workers has an average capital investment of \$14,000. This does not include such things as farm buildings, household goods, savings and automobiles which add another \$5,000. The capital investment per worker in 1940 was only \$3,500. Farm real estate used in production is now valued at \$9,000 per worker as compared to \$2,500 in 1940.

**Prevent Borers**  
It is much easier to prevent than control shade tree borers. Borers may be removed with a sharp knife, crushing with a stiff wire or fumigating with carbon tetrachloride or borer pastes. However, removal is much more difficult than prevention.

The first prevention step is wrapping trunks of newly transplanted trees and young trees with a special wrapping of "crepe" paper with an asphalt layer to prevent egg laying. Begin wrapping at the lower branches and wrap in a spiral fashion to the soil line. Leave wrapping on over winter to prevent sun scald.

If trees are too large to wrap, a spray consisting of eight pounds of 50 percent wettable DDT powder to 100 gallons of water may be used. Apply the first spray about May 1 and repeat every 14 days for four applications. It is not necessary to spray foliage.

White washes containing 10 percent lime sulphur may have a repellent effect on the borers but should never be mixed with DDT spray.

Since borers are particularly active during drought periods, trees should be heavily watered during a prolonged dry spell. An area the size of the extended branches of the tree should be watered and the application should continue as long as the soil will absorb the moisture.

Industries are demanding more and more trained personnel from agriculture colleges. Demands at present far exceed the supply. Some firms are placing seniors on the payroll even before they are graduated.

## Taxes and Reports

The Nebraska tax commissioner's office will inspect Federal income tax records in Omaha. State Tax Commissioner Fred Herrington has used the reports to check the amount of inventory turned in by certain businessmen for Nebraska tax purposes.

The commissioner said his office will continue the policy of releasing the Federal income tax information only on request of a county assessor.

Gov. Vickie Anderson recently expressed concern that some county assessors were not requiring certain businessmen to completely fill out their inventory form, upon which Nebraska taxes are assessed.

The governor said that Herrington's work had been hampered by new regulations in the Omaha office of the Internal Revenue bureau. But Herrington said he and officials in the Omaha office sat down and arrived at an understanding. He said the officials were very cooperative.

## Save The Trains

Removal of two passenger trains that would affect towns in 13 Northern Nebraska counties is being sought by the Northwestern railroad. The application for removal was filed with the State Railway commission. Involved are trains 13 and 14 running from Omaha to Chadron.

Efforts to "save the trains," begun in November 1954, have proved fruitless, the railroad said. It said its estimated annual loss is \$204,717. The railroad claims the public no longer uses the trains and that it is not "honest, efficient and economical management" to continue to operate them.

Communities would be affected by the removal in counties of Douglas, Washington, Dodge, Cumming, Stanton, Madison, Antelope, Holt, Rock, Brown, Cherry, Sheridan and Dawes.

Officials of the "Save the Train" association say they will oppose the railroad's request to drop the service. They say the railroad people have "not told the whole story" and that, at important points on the line, passenger revenue increased.

The association said it succeeded in arresting what has been an alarming decline in express shipments.

### New Mansion

Lincoln—Nebraska's new governor's mansion is going to be an eye-catcher. It will be an impressive pink brick, two-story structure of modified Georgian colonial design.

Architect Selmer Solheim, Lincoln, says there is a reason for the design. He said it was felt "a style which leaned heavily on our basic American heritage might more soundly approach the permanency desired in the style of building."

It is expected the new structure, to cost about \$200,000, may be serviceable for 75 to 100 years. Thus the problem of getting a design that would stand the test of time was a big one. The present white frame mansion has been the home of the state's chief executives for 67 years. It was purchased by Nebraska for \$22,500.

The front of the new mansion to be occupied next May, will have a small, white-frame porch supported by six wooden columns.

Gov. Victor Anderson said brick was chosen as the material because it costs \$15,000 less than limestone—which had been considered—and would make the mansion look more like a home than an office building.

Planning for the mansion was guided by the State Building commission. It is composed of the governor, State Engineer L. N. Ross, Jack Winkle, Nebraska City; W. C. Fraser, Omaha, and A. Q. Seimund, Lincoln. Legislative representatives was Sen. Carl Vogel, Omaha.

A considerable amount of furnishings and material from the old mansion will be used in the new.

### Indian Troubles

Gov. Victor Anderson says there are "serious" conditions on Indian reservations in Thurston county and something should be done.

The problem was brought to the governor's attention by a group of Thurston county officials. They said legalized sale of liquor to Indians has resulted in a one-third increase in crime in the county.

There have been three murders in the county since January of this year, the governor was told. He was also informed of a large amount of teen-age delinquency and drunkenness.

The delegation was asked by the governor to see if it can come up with some kind of program to help correct the situation. He also suggested the officials contact their Congressmen in an effort to get some aid from the Federal level. Since Congress legalized sale of far to Indians the Federal Indian agency has withdrawn its law enforcement people from reservations throughout the county.

In Thurston county there is only a county sheriff. Because of the large number of Indians—about 2,000 out of 8,000 population—the county does not have the tax valuation to hire deputies. Already the county's mill levy is at the legal limit.

A representative of the Indian agency said the group "will take another look" at the problem in Thurston county. The Federal government has aided in schooling of Indians, but Thurston county of-

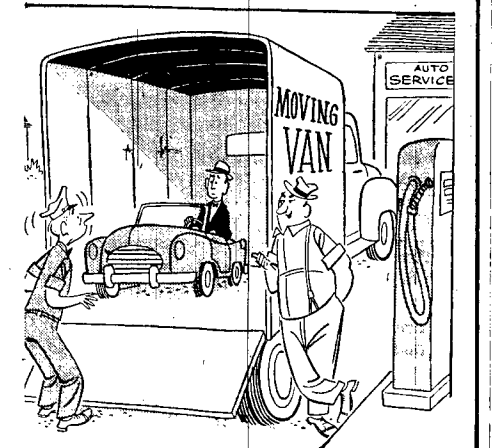

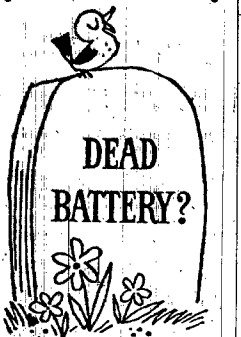

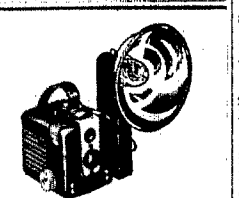
