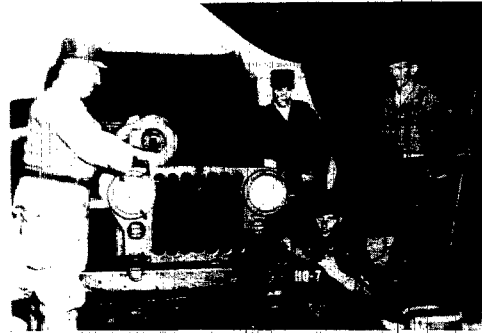


National Guard Returns from Camp

Winside Citizens Seek New Approach to Aid Doctor Craig

Sen. Curtis Says He Can't Assist Cause

Winside residents were not overly optimistic this week on their chances of securing Dr. Donald Craig from serving a four-month term for income tax evasion.

Sen. Curtis said at Minden Tuesday that he would be unable to help Winside residents in their efforts. He pointed out that the case was out of his hands, noting that he was in the legislative branch of government and the case falls under the judicial branch.

John DeLorant, Dr. Craig was given 60 days to get his affairs in order before serving the term.

"I am not familiar with the particulars of the case," Sen. Curtis said, "but I am in sympathy with their problem." He suggested that petition signers work through an attorney of their choice and through the courts.

C. E. Missett, Winside banker leading the support for Dr. Craig, said Monday the citizens felt their best hope was to gain a suspension of sentence by the judge or a Presidential pardon.

"We are pleading in the interests of community health," he said. "The loss of our doctor would be pretty bad. People elsewhere don't seem to realize what that means to a community like ours."

Dr. Craig serves an estimated 3,500 persons in the Winside-Carroll-Hoskins area, including 31 invalids, he said.

"Dr. Craig has never asked our help in this thing. And the petitions haven't been pushed. People have just come in and signed them. Dr. Craig is the kind of doctor who makes calls any time of day or night without a sumner and the people have come to depend on him. We're afraid we might lose our doctor entirely and that would be a catastrophe."

The physician, who has been here since the late 1930's, has been practicing as usual since the sentencing.

WHAT DO LUTHERANS Really BELIEVE ABOUT THE LORD'S SUPPER?

Just this: That it is the Lord's Supper.

He comes — all the way. He is present — personally. He gives — His Body and Blood. He says to each individually, "... given and shed for you for the forgiveness of sins."

You may not be interested in history's complex theological arguments about the Holy Sacrament. But nonetheless, the questions that lie beneath all the controversies do concern you:

- Is the Supper merely a human ceremony? — or is Christ really present?
