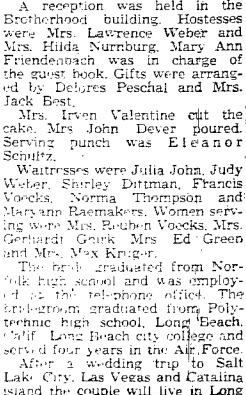

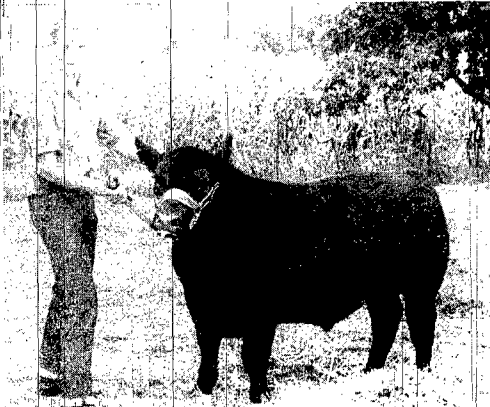

In Bookland

SCHOOL DAYS HAVE BEEN THE BIG TOPIC around the library the past week. Rural school teachers have been coming in for their reading matter. Taking out cards for their districts, film strips and records. Some of the teachers have been bookish, that is those who are fortunate enough to have regular 16mm projectors. Did you know that through the school year our library has 1,000 to 1,500 books loaned to rural schools every month? This accounts for nearly one third of our circulation during the winter months and that means that we are not only a city library but functioning as a county library as well. Someday we should have equal tax funds from both city and county so that everyone could use the library on an equal basis. At the present time a fee of \$1 is charged to rural families for each year since they pay no property tax in Wayne. Rural school districts pay \$2 for the same-month service. For that \$2 they are allowed to take out as many books as they wish and keep them for a month at a time. If a school has a projector, it can borrow two film strips and these are returned at a time. If a school has between 10 and 20 pupils you can understand how far the \$2 fee can go. We also book free films for those who have projectors just as we book them for individuals.

Sanitation Is Key
At least 15 percent of all chickens hatched in the U. S. die from disease before completing a laying year.

These points are outlined in the third of a series of circulars on poultry profit pointers entitled "Health Maintenance" published by the University of Nebraska and its fanned newspaper, circular No. 136 may be obtained through county agents and local feed dealers.

"There is no health measure more important than sanitation," Schultz points out in the circular. Housing for birds should be readied by removing dirt, filth and rubbish. After cleaning, a good disinfectant should be used in the houses. Most dips are not satisfactory as they are not intended to kill bacteria.

Effective vaccines have been prepared to prevent Newcastle disease, infectious bronchitis, fowl pox, and infectious laryngotracheitis, but are not recommended unless the disease is nearby or if hatching eggs are to be produced. When a disease outbreak occurs, lice and mites may be controlled with nicotine sulfate, lindane, DDT or malathion. Schultz says. Worm infection is best controlled by good range and litter management while de-worming is the best way to reduce intestinal parasitism.

Leaf Loss Is Large
Leaving half of the alfalfa leaves in the field during haymaking may mean losing the feeding value of 25 bushels of corn per acre of alfalfa hay put up, according to L. R. Fryman of the University of Illinois. Fryman mentions three ways to cut this loss: (1) Start cutting legumes for hay when blooms reach the 1/10 stage because leaves start dropping soon after this. (2) Balance chopping hay before it gets too dry. (3) Check long range forecasts and don't cut more hay than can be quickly cured and stored if the weather is threatening.

Farm Centers
Cented land makes up an important part of the North Central states farming picture. More than 40 percent of the land in the area is rented. Farmers who rent all or part of their land sell almost 70 percent of the total value of farm products sold from commercial farms in the 13-state area.

In spite of the importance of rented land, the use of soil conservation practices on rented land is behind that on owner-operator farms, according to the North Central Land Tenure research committee. In a new North Central region publication, No. 69, the committee urges that more lease agreements include conservation practices.

Since it takes several years to establish some of these practices, renters with short-term leases have little or no incentive to follow conservation methods. The committee suggests that longer-term leases would encourage better soil care.

A good lease, which gives the tenant more security, will share costs in the same proportion that income is shared, and will encourage the renter to practice conservation. Also, it should have provisions for adjusting unused resources when the lease term is ended.

CAPITOL NEWS

Lincoln—Problems of building a road, especially in a new location, are king-size and do not stop with engineering matters.

Take the interstate highway which one day will span Nebraska, providing the state gets enough money to match the federal funds available for the project.

Engineering problems on building the route to the high standards themselves are difficult. But even more troublesome is the route.

The four-lane, super highway will require considerable right-of-way, some of it across rich farmland and valuable city property.

That's the reason the route is planned to cause the least inconvenience to the most people and still keep the engineering and cost problems in mind, before it is announced in a new bid setting.

One off-shoot of such a route is the land speculator, who, if he knew where the route was going, could buy up chunks of land and hold out for a high price.

Battle lines already have formed on the Nebraska interstate road, over the route and regulations imposed by the federal government.

Some objections are that it will be impossible to get on to the highway except every 10 miles or so.

But planners say this is a safety feature, to cut down crossing accidents. Also, in time of national emergency, the highway will channel military vehicles to all parts of the country.

State Engineer L. N. Ross was one of the men who helped draft the plans for the interstate highway. He is a member of the National Association of State Highway officials.

That group, not only participated in drafting the design and standards, but it violently objected to some regulations set up by Congress which would slow work on the route.

The regulations require a public hearing on any road going around or through any city.

Ross said this means hearings will have to be held all across Nebraska on virtually every mile of the interstate, further complicating the already difficult job.

The hearings undoubtedly will be conducted by the Advisory State Highway Commission which will have to handle such matters regarding non-interstate projects.

This will throw a heavy workload on the commission which in the past has met only once monthly. Ross said this may be increased by six or eight times as a result of the federal law.

Polio Check
Figures compiled by the State Health department's polio division show why it is important for 15 to 29-year-old persons to get those Salk vaccine shots.

The division's director, Al Gauss, said persons in the 15-29 age group accounted for 41 percent of the first 62 polio cases reported in Nebraska this year.

And, said Gauss, the dreaded bulbar polio struck more in the older age group. There were eight such cases among the first 62, with the age running from 16 to 47. The average age was 26.

Rouse said 65 percent of the cases were non-paralytic, an unusually high percentage.

Only five of the 62 cases, he said, involved persons who had been vaccinated within 30 days before they contracted the disease and all five had a minor, non-paralytic attack.

So far, Rouse said, 90 percent of the children in Nebraska up to 14 years old have been vaccinated and 30 percent in the 15-19 age group.

School Land
Everyone makes mistakes some time in a life span, and the state of Nebraska is no exception.

State Education Commissioner F. B. Decker said the state made some costly errors in judgement in its administration of state-owned school lands.

study of the state's school lands and funds. This was done leading up to his obtaining a doctor's degree from the University of Nebraska.

Save of school land in five counties brought the state a total of \$388,687, Decker said. The same unimproved land today is worth about \$12,746,500.

Decker's study also showed that returns from school land money, invested mainly in government bonds, have not been as lucrative as from land retained by the state.

Drouth
Procedures for counties wanting to seek designation as major drouth disaster areas have been outlined by Gov. Victor Anderson.

Such a designation permits certain feed benefits for foundation herds and credit from the Federal Housing Authority.

Anderson said this is the procedure:


The board of supervisors of the county must send a certified resolution to the governor describing drouth conditions and requesting approval of a major disaster designation.

The governor submits the proposal to the State Drouth Committee.

The state committee surveys the county.

Then the state committee submits a final report to the governor, who forwards it to Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson for final determination.

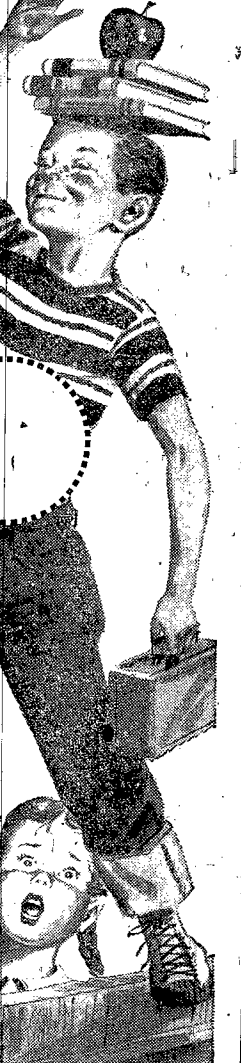
