City Council Awards New Police Building Contract

Wayne's city council Tuesday night awarded a contract for construction of a new police department addition to the city hall to Frank Thielman, Wayne. Thielman's bid of \$2,880 was the second low of three submitted, but he stated he would be able to start work immediately. J. H. Hesse Construction, Norfolk, was the low bidder at \$2,736, but qualified by saying work could not start for about six weeks. Sidewalk cost will be in addition to the building proper. Thielman's bid for this work was 34c per square foot.

Greetings from the city and Chamber of Commerce will be given by Dr. Gordon Shupe, city council vice president and Chamber director. Dr. M. B. Street will represent WSPC. Rev. Robert J. Ware, Norfolk, will speak for the Nebraska presbytery, of which he is moderator. Rev. Russell Dackén, Baptist minister, will represent the ministerial association. Jake Jeffrey will speak for youth of the church.

Dr. O. B. Proett, pastor of the church, has been in charge of the anniversary event. He was assisted by A. F. Gulliver, Mines, Mrs. Atker and Mrs. F. W. Nyberg. Mrs. W. G. Schulz is in charge of Tuesday's banquet.

Wayne's Presbyterian congregation was organized with 11 members in December, 1881. First religious services in the city had been conducted Sept. 16 last year by Rev. G. M. Lodge, Shelby.

Charter members were Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Lindly, Mr. and Mrs. L. Merriman, Dr. and Mrs. W. A. Love, Mr. and Mrs. Shaffer, Mrs. Wilbur, Julia Hardenburg and Mrs. Anna Maxwell.

Oldest current member of the congregation is Mrs. A. A. Welch, 95, who joined Feb. 8, 1885. There are now 439 members in the congregation.

Site of the church was purchased for \$200 and a frame building, costing \$1,200, was dedicated Jan. 14, 1883. It was also used as a school for the new community until 1885. A few years later a parsonage was provided at a cost of \$1,800.

A new church was built about the turn of the century when the congregation outgrew the first building. It cost \$12,000 and a new manse was erected for \$4,800.

The church was remodeled and expanded in 1925 at a cost of about \$20,000 and a dedication service was held. A new organ was installed and other remodeling done in recent years.

The congregation has been served by 14 pastors since its organization. Dr. Proett has been minister since 1943.

A hearing will be held in County court Wednesday on condemnation proceedings brought by the City of Wayne against S. J. Hale to secure an air easement over his property at the northeast corner of the Wayne airport.

The easement is necessary to allow federal approval of a \$20,000 project which would include lighting of a runway at the airport.

County Judge David J. Hamer appointed Albert Kern, Martin Ringer and John Mohr appraisers in the proceedings last week. They will make their report Wednesday.

An invitation was extended to the State Health department to hold a district waterworks conference on emergency chlorination in Wayne in the future. The meeting would be for waterworks personnel from throughout NE Nebraska.

L. W. Powers was granted permission to farm the city property at the northwest corner of the airport. As in the past, the city received two-fifths of the crop production.

Purchase of new doors and a gas heater for the city machinery shed south of the light plant was approved. Attorney Budd Bornhoft was instructed to prepare an ordinance pertaining to burning of garbage in the city. The council said it should be limited to after 4 p. m. and prohibited on Sundays. City Clerk Walker Bressler issued one building permit. That went to Raymond D. Dillon for a \$12,000 residence in Pine Heights addition.

Highway Relocation Nearing Completion

Relocation of Highway 35 between Wayne and Wakefield is nearing completion, local Highway department officials stated this week. Two miles of the road south from Wakefield were opened to traffic Tuesday. Crews are now applying asphalt coating on the eight mile stretch east from Wayne. Officials said the highway will probably be opened to traffic about Sept. 20.

Wayne county's annual 4-H baby beef sale will be held at the Wayne sales barn at 8 p. m. Friday. County Agent Harold Ingalls reminded this week.

The annual event is sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce agriculture committee. About 50 calves are expected. The sale was limited to one calf per 4-H member.

Club members will bring their calves to town in the afternoon for judging by Joe Watson, West Point. Sale byer will be determined by the placing in judging.

Chamber Secretary K. N. Parke said a packer buyer will place bids on all the calves. Merchants who buy calves and want to resell them to the buyer can do so by paying the difference between their bid and the packer's.

WSTC Enrollment Reaches All-Time High Wednesday

Judge David J. Hamer fined Holmer \$75 for driving 120 mph in Nebraska for 30 days.



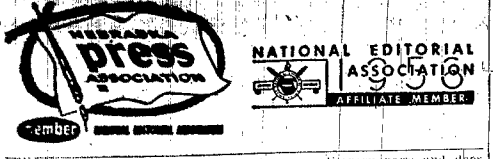

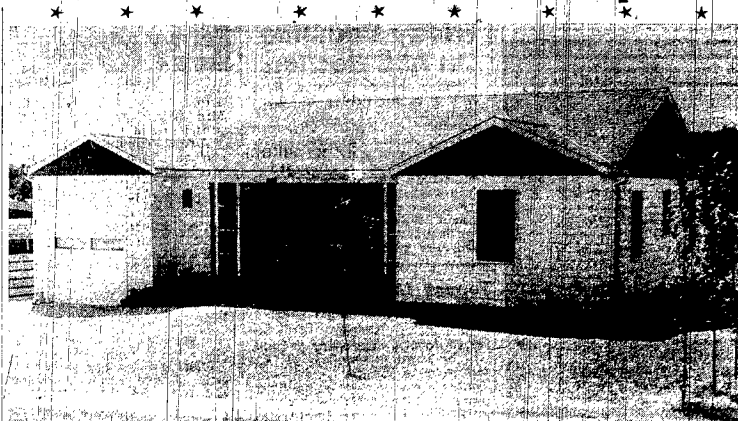

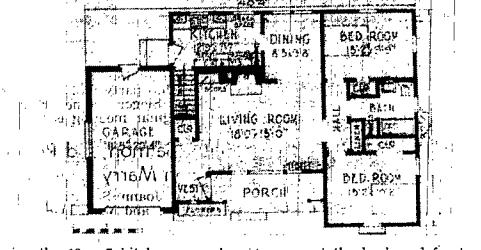
Compact Bungalow Proves Step Saver Yet Has 1,000 Feet of Floor Space

The new white house with brown trim at 1014 Lilac Lane is the home of Emma Haisch and her brother Ernest.
Miss Haisch and Ernest moved into their home in May, 1955 from Laurel, where she worked 48 years in the Security National bank and part-time for J. V. Harper.
She says perhaps the best feature of the home is its compactness. She added that it is much more step-saving than her former large family home. The new home has about 1,000 square feet of living space.
Miss Haisch has planted lilacs, seven rose bushes and other plants in front of the recessed cement porch and they are already blooming. Bamboo shades on the porch protect the thermopane picture window and two side windows from morning sun.
Vestibule walls are smoke rose. Ceilings throughout the house are white. Oak floors and woodwork have a natural finish in all rooms except the kitchen and bath.
The 12 x 13 living room walls are sand colored. Draperies are the Jewel Flowers pattern in rose, chaireuse, olive green, turquoise and gold. A mauve mohair suite is against the west and south walls.
African violets are growing on a wrought iron stand in front of the picture window. Throw rugs supply the floor covering.
Miss Haisch's 13 x 10 front bedroom has three flaminos and one white wall. Draperies are a light blue rayon. A special feature here, in the bathroom and Ernest's room are vertical traverse venetian blinds especially made for draped windows.
They may be either tilted or opened full width of the window. The blinds are white in Miss Haisch's room. Furnishings are blonde oak in both bedrooms. A built-in wardrobe has sliding doors. A linen closet in the smoke rose hall also has sliding doors. The bathroom is also smoke rose with green, yellow and gray stripe linoleum. Yellow tweed blinds and



yellow turkish draperies are at the window. The bath fixtures are white and are surrounded by ivory and marbled green tile. Behind the bathroom door is a towel closet.
Ernest's room, 13 x 10, has tropical green walls, rose apron length draperies and white blinds with a wheat design.
An 8 x 10 dining room is directly off the living room. Here the walls are a spray blue and draperies are the same as in the living room. A lined oak buffet and dinette set in green and black sometimes gives the walls a green cast. The floral design in the ceiling fixture is gold, rose and green. A wrought iron combination telephone stand and magazine rack is in a corner.
Gray spatter linoleum, gray vinyl counter tops, parakeet green walls, and cupboards which were painted pink and then varnished

give the 13 x 7 kitchen a modern tri-color effect. Curtains are a kitchen ware pattern in gray, green and pink with white background.
The attached garage is on the south of the house and has entrances at the back and front.
Plans for the future include finishing a full basement, planting more flowers and trees in the backyard and finishing a small back porch.

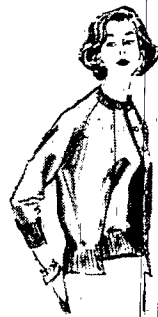

In Bookland

Mrs. F. A. Middlee City Librarian



THERE IS A GREAT DEAL OF DIFFERENCE between an eager man who wants to read a book and a tired one who wants a book to read. We try to serve both at the Wayne public library. That is why we try to make our book stock as diversified as possible. There are still folks who think the library is a place to get a story book. True, we have many story books but they are only a fraction of the entire number of books we have on every subject imaginable.

AFTER THE LARGEST AUGUST CIRCULATION record we are starting a month of September that makes August look slow. It certainly is gratifying to know that the library has become an indispensable part of the community.

WHILE THE SERVICES OF THE LIBRARY MAY have become indispensable to the community it seems that the librarians are not. This week our chief assistant librarian, Mrs. Catherine Sewell, resigned to take a teaching position in Wagoner. She quit the library with great reluctance because she liked the work very much but since school teaching pays three or even four times as much as a librarian's salary, with shorter hours, fewer vacations and even less education required, it is not hard to understand why people don't stay in library work. It was once suggested to our librarian that something had gone out of our American way of life since people no longer were willing to work for the love of the work like doctors and teachers used to do. The implication was, of course, that librarians should still feel that way about it. Unfortunately librarians must eat and wear clothes and while they may be a peculiar breed they also enjoy the comforts of life as well as other people. Possibly someday the taxpayers will understand what library work really is.

THE BOOK-OF-THE-MONTH FOR SEPTEMBER is a non-fiction title about man's quest for the truth about his earliest ancestors. "In Search of Adam" by Herbert Wendt, a German writer, journalist and lecturer, is a book about man from before Biblical times, through the nineteenth century, Mendel's man, Peking man, Pitdown man, one after another. There are photographs and a fresh presentation of material to make it interesting.

"THE HUMAN HEREDITY HANDBOOK" BY Abram Schenfield is a new book for all parents and prospective parents, doctors, marriage counselors and teachers. It answers such questions as these: What are the odds your children will look like you? Why do children of a family differ? Is insanity hereditary? Do parents' IQ's determine a child's intelligence? What are the chances of a "repeat" defective child? Why is it almost pointless to boast of distinguished ancestors? Whether

you have a question you want answered or just like to read about such things you will find this book very interesting.

Chemical Curing

Farmers can increase returns from legume seed production by using chemicals to cure the crop. The chemicals enable producers to harvest seed of higher quality and greater purity at less cost. This point and other tips on seed production are outlined in a University of Nebraska circular on the subject by John Furrer, assistant extension agronomist, and N. E. Shafer, assistant agronomist at the college of agriculture.

An average of 40 to 50 pounds of seed per acre is lost when alfalfa is mowed, withdrawn and picked up before seed is harvested. Nearly 100 to 150 pounds of seed is lost per acre when sweet clover is handled in this manner. By chemically curing the crop, losses can be cut to 10 or 15 pounds per acre. Chemicals should not be used to hasten maturity of soybeans due to the adverse effects on yield and size of seed.

Chemicals that may be used to cure legume crops and the rate of application are listed in Campaign Circular No. 125, "Chemical Drying Sprays as Aid for Seed Production," which is available through county agents. Dinitro and pentadiophenol have given best results in Nebraska, according to the circular.

Farm Gas Purchases

Farmers and ranchers should keep a complete record of gasoline used for farming purposes this year so they can take advantage of the federal tax refund. The bill, passed by Congress and signed by the President, is now law.

Claims for refund on gasoline used for farming between Jan. 1 and June 30 may be filed any time after June 30. Deadline for filing claims for this period will be Oct. 31.

After this, however, refunds will be made on the government fiscal year basis—July 1 to June 30. Federal form 2240 will be used for refund claims. This form is available from county agents and bulk oil dealers.

National Seed Bank

Seed for the nation's future food supply will be protected. For the first time in history a concentrated effort will be made in a central location to keep alive a large reservoir of crop plants valuable for breeding purposes.

The USDA has received Congressional approval of a \$450,000 appropriation for national seed storage facilities. The seed bank will be established at Colorado A & M college, Ft. Collins. When the storage unit is completed, the bank will store seed of farm crops, vegetable crops, fruit varieties and other species needed for breeding new plants. Seed production will be carried on in fields and greenhouses to renew and replace stored seed, losing its viability.

Statehouse Elevators

Tourist traffic has been heavy in recent weeks in the state capitol. And no one knows it better than two harassed elevator operators. Normally, there are three elevators carrying passengers in the statehouse and exclusively for employees. But that elevator is being repaired. One of the remaining two is balky and, during the heavy state fair rush, could be handily only at slow speed.

The result was frequent "traffic jams," composed of sightseers wanting to go to the statehouse tower, and employees coming and going on business or coffee breaks. There will be only two elevators in operation for at least until the middle of February when there will have been one of the new ones installed. One new elevator is in operation and one slated to go shortly.

As soon as the second new elevator is put into operation, the balky one which goes to the tower will be taken out and work begun on replacing it. This will take place in February, because there are numerous pipes and other utilities to hamper workmen in the shaft.
