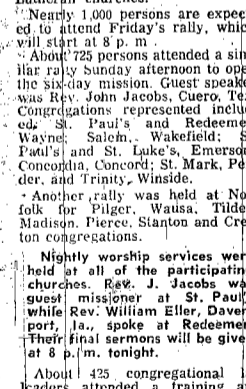

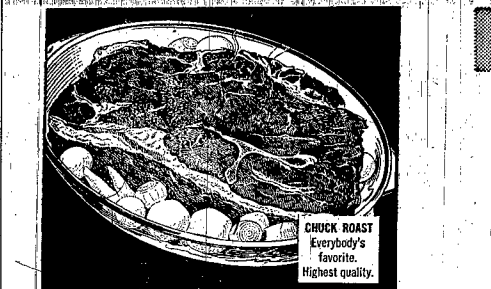

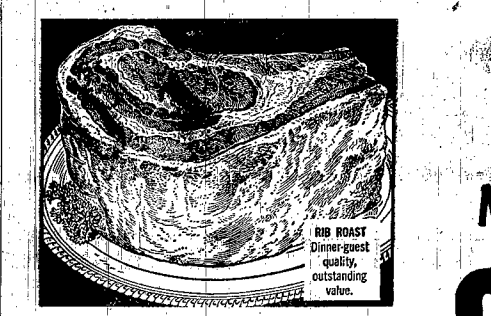

His off tackle slants were usually through good holes carved by the Wayne forward wall with performance by the line and Larry Milliken, Jim Hein and Darrel Gilliland outstanding.

Denny Kern, playing his first year as a varsity squad member, turned in a creditable job at quarterback, completing three of seven passes and showing some good ball handling. Terry Wehrer, switched to the backfield this season, displayed some good punting and scored two of the three Wayne touchdowns.

Allen, plainly rebuilding this season, was handicapped slightly by the use of several underclassmen in the starting lineup. The Eagles failed to muster a serious scoring threat against the rugged Wayne line. The losers had a net total of only 37 yards for the evening, 43 of them on the ground.

Allen had taken the kickoff and moved to its 24 in two plays. Chuck Zavadil faded to pass but the Wayne line broke through and forced him to fumble before he could throw. Dahl recovered on the Eagle 12.

Wehrer scored from the six and Warren Rodgers added the extra point.

A better picture of Wayne's strength is expected Friday night when the Blue Devils travel to Madison for their Husker conference opener. The Dragons, although defeated by Pierce 19-7 Friday, are rated behind Stanton as West division powers this season.

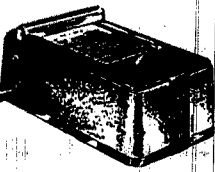

Critics agree that Ruth Moore is one of the country's ablest portrayers of people, their talk, their thoughts, their geography and their life. Then Emilie Loring, who has been writing a new love story every year since the '20s, has a new one. "What Then Is Love."

"Research is essential"
Continuing success in agriculture requires the continuing expansion of basic scientific knowledge. Most agricultural research is "applied research" - that is, an effort to apply existing knowledge to the solution of specific problems. Basic research is a search for new knowledge - often undertaken without any particular idea as to how the results are to be put to work. Once discovered, however, new knowledge opens the way for practical applications.

FEDER CATTLE
Everett E. Peterson, member of the agricultural economics division at the College of Agriculture in Lincoln, has this to say about cattle feeding prospects this fall.

With a calf crop of over 43 million this year, one percent above 1955, and 19 million head of last year's calves on hand January 1, there will be plenty of stockers and feeders available for those who wish to buy this fall. Low profits from cattle feeding last year shook the confidence of Corn Belt feeders.

Recent strength in the fat cattle market with prices higher, and for a longer period than expected, has stimulated renewed interest, especially in short feeding. Some farmers in eastern Nebraska are sufficiently optimistic to plan on buying considerable grain in order to feed cattle despite the drought.

Prices of feeder cattle had been about 2 cents a pound less than a year ago until slaughter cattle prices fell. This has brought higher prices for replacement cattle which is favorable for ranchers but could reduce profits from feeding if Corn Belt feeders try to make up for last year's losses in one season.

The big runs of feeder cattle usually come between September 15 and November 1. Buyers should watch for periods of heaviest marketings and for shipments from the dry range areas of Montana, Texas and Colorado. Prices probably will average \$2.50 per cwt. lower than last year which will mean choice grades of steers \$18-19, heifers, \$16-18, and calves, \$12-14.

BOX GLIDER BUGS
Soon box glider bugs will start their annual migration into homes. It is advisable to begin prevention now. Watch for concentrations of bugs in grass, on trees and shrubs, also near the foundation of buildings. Spray these concentrations with 5% chlordane prepared by using 1 part of 45% chlordane emulsion concentrate to 10 parts of water. Also, spray around basement walls and light into the lawn. Do not spray on flowers, etc. as they may be killed by sprays at this strength. Sprays around basement walls will help prevent the migration of crickets, sow bugs, millipedes and other undesirable insects into the home.

Political Tempo
Lincoln—Traditionally, the political tempo during an election year picks up after the Labor Day holiday. Such apparently is the case in Nebraska again this year.

The State Democratic Central committee got things rolling by giving State Chairman Willard Townsend, Lincoln, full control of party campaign funds disbursement. The action came at a day-long meeting in Lincoln during which plans were firm up for the coming election.

State Party Treasurer Leo Beck Sr., Lincoln, said the financial condition of the party is good. Frank Reed, Lincoln, chairman of the party's advisory committee, said the candidacy of Lawrence Brock, Lexington, was being well received in the Third district.

At Nebraska City, Democratic friends of Governorial Candidate Frank Sorell kicked in more than \$2,000 to help his campaign.

Meanwhile, a former GOP governor, chairman of the Nebraska Volunteers for Stevenson-Kefauver committee, the former governor, Adam McMullen, Beatrice, bolted the Republicans because of their farm program. Mrs. Fred Barrow, Lexington, was named with McMullen as co-chairman of the Nebraska Volunteers for Stevenson-Kefauver.

Ephraim Marks, past commander of the Omaha Legion Post No. 1, charged that Gov. Anderson's has tried while the farmers' crops and the penitentiary were being also took exception with the proposed governor's mansion which he termed "an architectural monstrosity" completely out of keeping with Nebraska's magnificent landscape.

The Republicans were busy too. State GOP Headquarters announced the itinerary for the Republican caravan. Starting the week of Oct. 8 the caravan will visit scores of cities and towns in all parts of Nebraska.

The first week will be spent in the Third district, the second in the Fourth district, the third in the First district, and the fourth in the Second district.

At this writing, Robert E. Speltz, Grand Island, and R. M. Van Steenberg, Mitchell, were battling for the chairmanship of the GOP State Central committee.

Not one Republican has yet announced his preference for the party's next gubernatorial nominee.

Ernest Emerson Graunke, Cumming county assessor and president of the Nebraska Association of County Assessors, said the thought that the tax might be passed is causing consternation among some county tax officials.

He said the state will feel the impact if the law passes, especially in fees derived from truck registrations. The newly formed Nebraska Producers & Consumers committee said it will wage an active campaign against the proposed tax.

Legitimate proponents of the measure repeated that the bill is sound and is succeeding in a growing number of states in producing revenue for roads on a just and fair basis.

Assistance Payments
A McCook doctor filed a complaint with the State Board of Control charging that assistance care is being denied many eligible applicants by the Red Willow County Assistance office.

The doctor, J. H. Donaldson, Jr., sent a long letter to the board outlining generally his complaints.

Thomas Dredla, chairman of the state board, said he felt there must be a misunderstanding somewhere along the line. Mrs. Audra Cook, Red Willow county welfare director, said "No legally entitled person has been denied aid."

State Fair
The 1956 State Fair did not break any attendance records—but it was successful anyway. Fair Secretary Edwin Schultz said. Total gate for the seven-day event was estimated at \$29,000, well below the 288,000 set at the 61st day event last year.

This year was the first time the fair ran a full seven days. And Schultz said it's possible it may be a full week long every year hereafter.



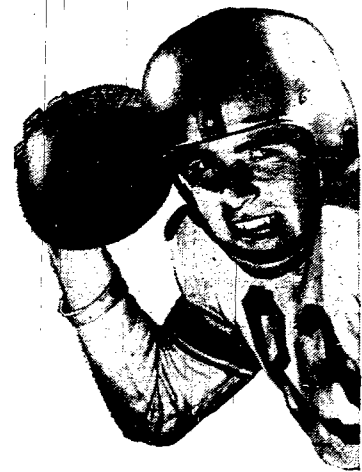
