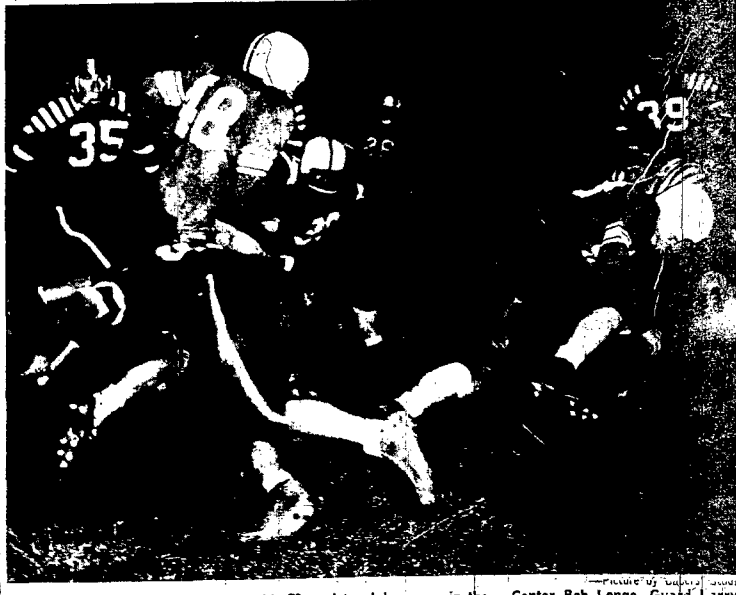
# City Council Approves No Parking Near High School

Two new ordinances and a possible addition to the swimming pool park provided the main order of business at a meeting of Wayne city council Tuesday night. One of the ordinances was passed. The other was tabled for two weeks to allow revision. The possible addition to the swimming pool area was taken under advisement. Passed was an ordinance prohibiting parking on the east side of Sherman between Third and Fifth streets. This covers two blocks on the west side of the high school. Tabled for revision was an ordinance establishing hours for burning garbage within the city limits. This proposal will come up for passage in its revised form Oct. 9. The council told Attorney Budd Bornhoff to have the ordinance prohibit burning garbage except from 4-8 p.m. weekdays. No burning was allowed on Sundays. The swimming pool question evolves from an offer made by Earl E. Lewis. He told the council he would donate his 100 x 150 foot lot at Twelfth and Lincoln to the city, if the council would agree to

move the house currently on the lot to his property across the street. This move would include excavating and erecting a basement under the house. The council took the matter under study to determine the possible cost of the move. Street Commissioner Henry Victor was authorized to purchase a suspended unit heater for the city building south of the light plant from Tiedtke's. The firm submitted the best bid among four given on the heater. Lewis was granted a permit to move a garage from his lot near the swimming pool to his house at Third and Lincoln. 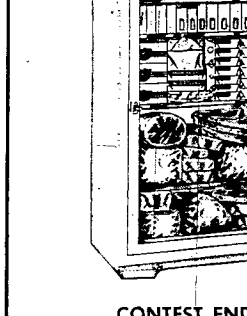

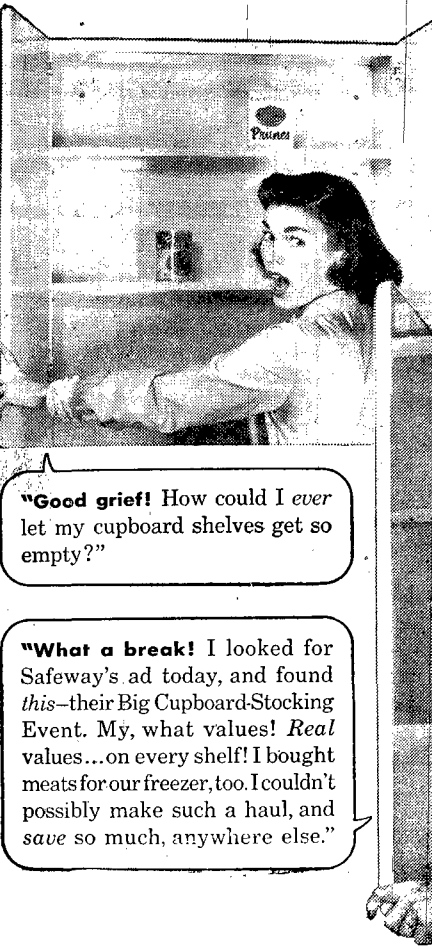

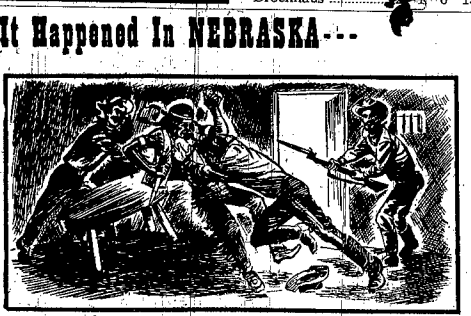

### Ton-Mile Tax

Lincoln. The fight over the proposed ton-mile tax on heavy trucks and inter-city buses is picking up steam like a rock rolling down a mountain. And the pace is going to continue right to the polls this November to decide whether they want the tax or not.

Opponents and proponents of the measure have been marshalling forces since petitions to put the matter before the voters were filed with the Secretary of State.

If voters approve the measure this November, it will be law. It would apply to trucks carrying 10 tons or more and inter-city buses weighing 28,000 pounds or more. Buses would pay two cents per mile tax. The rate on the trucks would vary from 19 cents per mile for 10-ton trucks to 6.1 cents for 25-ton vehicles.

Opponents of the measure state Nebraska business would suffer a "disastrous" blow if the tax is approved. They contend the consumer will pay the tax. Omaha's position as a leading livestock market would be jeopardized, opponents say, because trucks would by-pass that point and ship to other large markets.

The proposal, opponents continue, "pumps the railroads" in that trucks could be carried on flat cars to cities. When in a city the truck could make deliveries without paying a tax because the tax would not apply within city limits. However, proponents of the measure claim it would

### Indian Problem

State and Federal officials have kicked around the problem of who should handle law enforcement on the Indian reservations in Nebraska. The Indian Bureau of Indian Affairs said that Nebraska long ago agreed to take over this matter.

But Atty. Gen. C. S. Beck said the fact is the state merely said in a 1951 letter that it would not oppose enactment of a bill by Congress providing for jurisdiction over the problem by Nebraska and other states. Beck said no one could object to such a law for several reasons.

Among them, he said, was the fact that Nebraska has exercised jurisdiction since 1873. Offenses by or against Indians in Thurston county have been handled in state courts there for years, he said.

But aside from this, the attorney general said, "The problem in Thurston county is not one of jurisdiction. The problem is to help the Indians, and by so doing to help Thurston county."

Some time ago Thurston county officials called on Gov. Victor Anderson to inform him of a difficult law enforcement situation in the county among the Indians. The county said it was short on money, had only one sheriff and there had been a drastic increase in crime among the Indian population.

### Gibberellic Acid?

USDA plant scientists are doing preliminary work with an amazing substance called gibberellic acid. In greenhouse experiments, researchers applied Gibberellic acid as a lanolin paste mixture externally to young stems. In three to four weeks, plants such as snap bean, soybean, pepper, corn and barley were in many cases doubled or tripled in growth rate by the chemical.

Extremely minute amounts— as little as one-millionth of an ounce of acid in one ounce of water— will make plants grow taller. The acid is produced by the fungus Gibberella, and is obtained experimentally by methods similar to those used in producing antibiotics like penicillin.

### Need Adequate Feed

Cows must be well fed in order to obtain high efficient production, states C. W. Nibler, extension dairyman at the University of Nebraska.

This fact is shown in the annual report of the Hamilton Dairy Herd Improvement association, where each cow received 7,800 pounds of silage, 5,800 pounds of hay, 2,400 pounds of grain and 164 days of pasture during the test year.

In other words, a cow marketed about \$150 worth of home-grown feeds and concentrates. Nibler points out. The value of the milk above the feed cost was about \$197 per cow. This was needed to pay all expenses and leave an income for farm family labor.

The average production for cows in the association was 9,784 pounds of milk and 335 pounds of butterfat. The range of production went from 6,969 to a high of 12,500 pounds of milk and from 256 to 442 pounds of butterfat.

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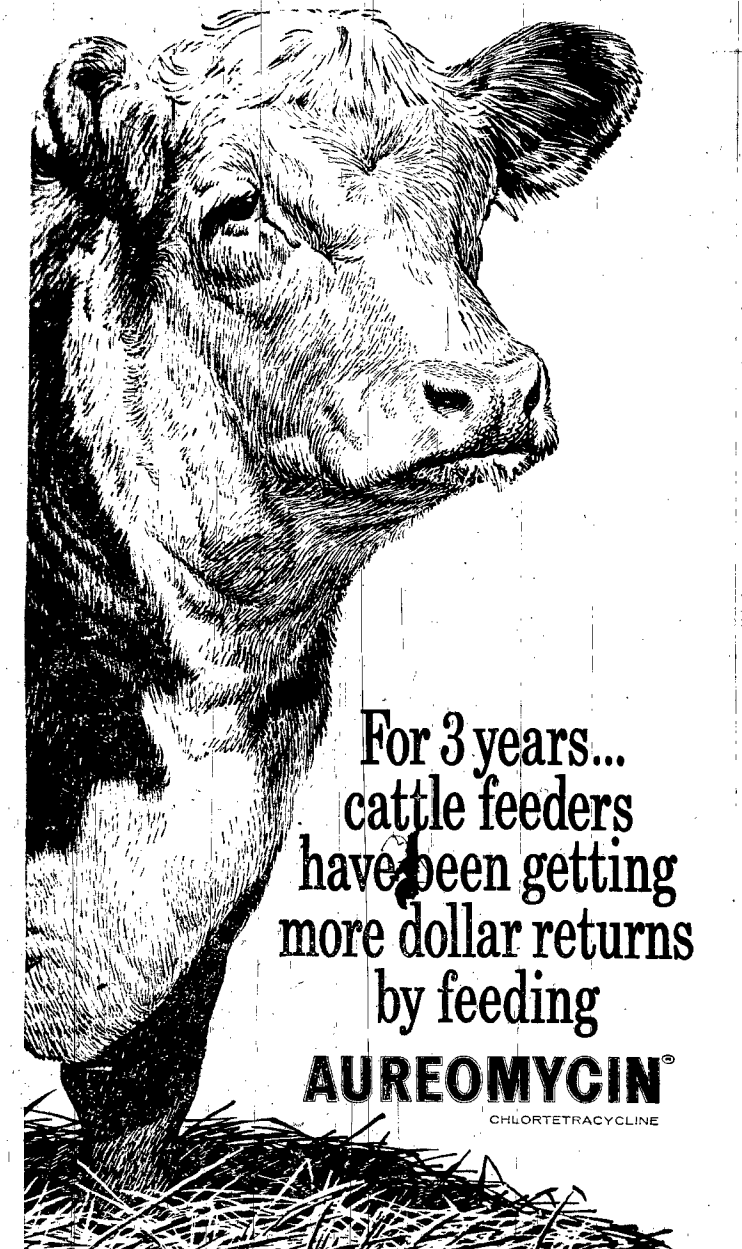
