Ton-Mile Tax Fight

Lincoln—The ton-mile tax now has emerged in the top spot as far as Nebraska's November election goes. Barring anything drastic on the political scene, the controversy over the measure, which has grown by leaps and bounds and has become bitter, will be of primary interest.

Originally the Committee for Better Roads Through Fair Taxation sponsored a petition drive to put the question on the November ballot. The question is whether 10-bus-trucks weighing 28,000 pounds or more should be taxed on the amount or weight they haul per mile.

Court action was brought by a member of the Nebraska Producers and Consumers Committee, formed to fight the tax. As drawn up, the proposal would be law if passed in November. The court action was designed to keep the measure off the ballot.

Robert Crosby, former governor, is the attorney for the ton-mile proponents and Nate Holman, Lincoln, is representing the opponents.

After the court action came a strong attack personally on Crosby. It was made by George Spidel, who said a section of the proposed law was authored by Crosby and would be a "brighter star" in his crown than his well-known "Operation Honesty."

Most Nebraskans recall "Operation Honesty" as Crosby's drive for more honest tax returns. The drive figured in his defeat in a bid for a U.S. Senate seat.

Proponents of the measure have come out with strong words about an array of speakers being brought into the state by the opponents. Crosby has said the national trucking lobby is determined to defeat the proposal in Nebraska.

A program in Omaha featuring Mickey Rooney and an Ohio congressman drew fire from opponents of the ton-mile tax. Arthur Ganson, Omaha, said "powerful elements" paid for the program.

The congressman generally stated that a ton-mile tax is a consumer tax.

Joe Smith, a Joe Smith letter to Gov. Victor Anderson has caused some stir, primarily among Democrats who admitted helping draft it.

Joe Smith, Omaha, sent the letter to the governor asking for his opinion on such things as state income tax, sales tax, ton-mile tax and location of the interstate highway.

Ephraim L. Marks, Douglas county Democratic organization, said the governor "passes the buck to the voters and says in effect 'let them decide'."

He has said he will stand on his record of progress in the fields of taxation, mental health, roads and attracting new industry.

Rabies Concern

Health officials are becoming increasingly concerned about the high incidence of rabies in animals in Nebraska this year. They said if something isn't done soon, a human eventually will contract the disease, relying on the law of averages alone.

State Health department figures show that so far 50 cases of the disease have been reported, compared with 26 for a similar period in 1955.

Officials call for an increase in the vaccination of domestic pets, which would be the connecting link between the rabid wild animal and humans. A rabid wild animal could conceivably bite a domestic pet, which in turn could

Water Pollution

The Federal government has made a sizable allocation of money to Nebraska for use in water pollution control and the job of administering the funds is going to be a big business. That's the comment from Dr. E. A. Rogers, state health director.

Rogers said "It will be at least as big a job or bigger than the Federal hospital construction act which the state health department administers."

The pollution money totals \$860,000 per year for five years. Up to 30 per cent Federal money can be used for the cost of sewage disposal plants or other approved pollution control projects, or 250,000 per project, whichever is smaller.

It will be up to the Legislature, Rogers said, to decide whether to set up an advisory council or create an agency to handle the pollution control program.

Check Field Losses

Losses of corn occurring in the field and in storage are of considerable economic importance. When ear corn reaches the level of moisture safe for cribbing, the "normal" field losses consisting of dried corn and ears dropped in the field are about three percent per week for a period of about four weeks, with the loss thereafter increasing at a rate of about one percent per week.

The normal loss at the earliest safe cribbing time seems to be near three percent.

For ear loss, step off 190 feet along a row. Pick up all the ears between two rows. The weight in pounds will equal the ear corn loss in bushels per acre. Add the kernel and ear loss to get the total. Repeat at several points in the field and average your totals.

Fire Prevention Week

President Eisenhower has proclaimed the week of October 7-13 for national emphasis on the prevention of fires. Gov. Arthur Benson also issued a state proclamation requesting the people of Nebraska to join with those of other states in effective programs to promote safety in the control and prevention of fires.

The 1955 annual report of the Department of Fire Prevention shows that during the year there were 843 rural fires in Nebraska with a loss of \$2,114,798. Seventeen persons died and 51 were injured in fires of rural nature—certainly a most effective program of rural fire prevention is needed.

Hybrid Sorghum Outlook

Enough certified hybrid sorghum seed to plant 140,000 acres should be available to Nebraska growers in 1957, reports C. R. Porter of the Nebraska Crop Improvement Association. Several hundred acres of the seed are being produced under supervision this year, many of them under irrigation.

Be Careful Every Day

Be careful every day—not just on Farm Safety Week. Every year about 14,000 farm people lose their lives in accidents, and well over a million are injured. In addition, the economic loss to the people of the Nation from farm accidents is estimated by the National Safety Council at \$1,500,000,000.

On the basis of past records, the National Safety Council says accidents are killing, on the average, about 40 farm residents each

Backfield Speed Give Wayne 19-6 Win over Holy Trinity

Blue Devils to Face Neligh Friday Night

Wayne's Blue Devils made excellent use of their superior backfield speed Friday night to win a 19-6 victory over Hartington Holy Trinity.

It was Wayne's third straight victory of the 1956 football season. The Blue Devils traveled to Neligh Friday night for their second Husker conference game. Wayne and Stanton currently lead the West division with one victory apiece.

Bob Schwartzbach was the main difference between the two teams Friday. He scored all three Wayne touchdowns on runs of 22, 64 and 65 yards. He amassed a total of 132 yards in 10 rushing plays and caught two passes good for 79 yards.

He also returned an intercepted pass 21 yards. A fourth touchdown run was nullified when officials blew the ball dead after being fooled by Denny Kern's excellent fake to Terry Wehrer.

Fans from both sides were witness to very poor officiating by Earl Kirchner, Gene Grace and Dick Coome, Sioux City. Twice during the first half the officials mistakenly stepped off 20-yard penalties against Wayne instead of the prescribed 15.

In the third period they did the same thing but corrected the error after cries from the fans. In another instance, Wayne drew a 15-yard penalty but was assessed only 10.

Trinity scored first, late in the opening period after Kenny Dahl had punted out on the Wayne 44. It took the Trojans nine plays to score with Bob Kathol crashing over from two yards out. Jerry O'Gara's 24-yard run around left end was the big play of the march. Dennis Huss' try for point was blocked.

It took Wayne only seven plays after the kickoff to go ahead 7-0. The Blue Devils marched 66 yards with Schwartzbach skirting left end for the last 22. Jerry Hendrickson added the extra point around right end.

Kenny Dahl set up the second Wayne touchdown midway in the second quarter when he recovered Don Rossiter's fumble on the Trojan 47. Wayne drew a 15-yard penalty factually 18 by the officials and then Denny Kern tossed a pass to Dahl who lateraled to Schwartzbach. The float half-back cut to midfield and raced 64 yards for the tally. The try for point was no good.

Trinity failed in a try to tie the count early in the third quarter. The Trojans blocked Dahl's

punt and recovered on the Wayne 11. Wayne dug in, however, and took over on the 3.

The Blue Devils then marched 97 yards for the final tally of the game. The score came on a 65-yard sprint by Schwartzbach over left tackle. The conversion again failed after Wayne drew a five-yard penalty for too much time.

Statistics again were peculiar as against Madison a week earlier. Trinity held a 12-6 advantage in first downs but Wayne held a 284-185 superiority in yardage.

Among the highlights of the rough battle between the two lines was a vicious block by Bob Longe which sprung Schwartzbach on his interception return.

Coach Harold Maciejewski experimented with Denny Mankske in the backfield and the converted end made 18 yards in four attempts.

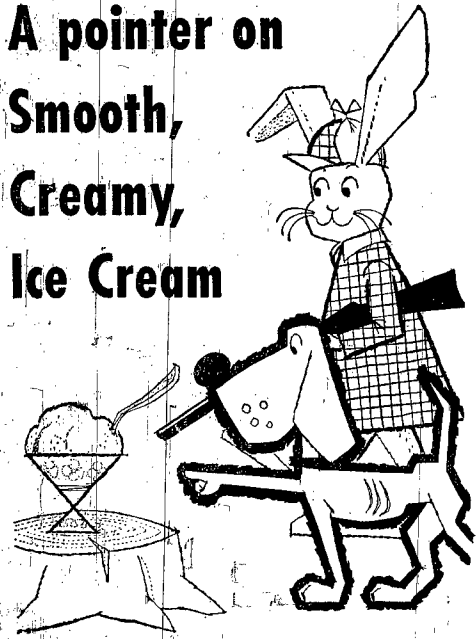

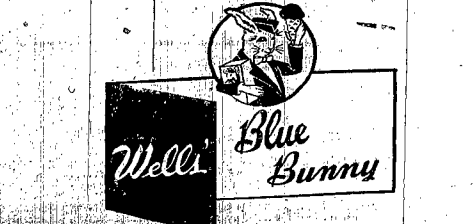

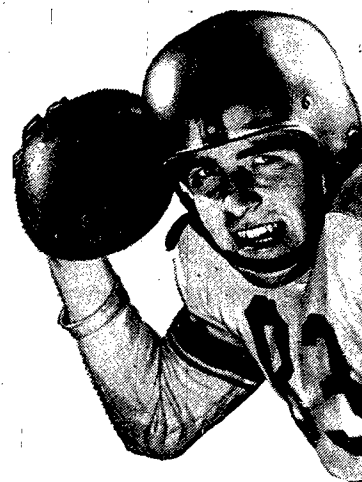
