But upon thinking it over we know that the answer is money. Authors must earn a living and even a best seller does not mean the author will live in luxury the rest of his life. Many people would be surprised to know that the earnings from a best selling novel are very meager and few authors rate more than one of them in a lifetime. Raymond Fosdick may not have been so motivated in writing about John D. Rockefeller

but we wouldn't bet on it. Of course, as President of the Rockefeller Foundation until 1948 when he really began his writing career, he learned to know all about the Rockefeller family.

"AMERICA RIDES THE LINERS" IS THE EXCITING story of the ships, the shipping companies and the shipping men who have served America. This is another gift book from the author, Addie Clark Harding.

"RISKS WE FACE" WAS SENT US BY A FIRE insurance company. It is a manual written for the layman... brief, technical and informative. It seems apropos since this is National Fire Institute Week.

ANOTHER GIFT FROM AN AUTHOR CAME from Gen. Courtney Whitney. This is a biography about MacArthur telling about his rendezvous with history.

Timely Tips
1. In sorting livestock for their trip to market, let an animal go by rather than slam a gate to head it off.
2. The time saved by this common sorting practice is not worth the cost of severe shoulder or hip bruises. Many farms and ranches would find it profitable to provide more adequate sorting and holding facilities. It will not only help prevent costly bruises, but will save valuable time handling livestock.
3. Good quality alfalfa hay or meal cuts costs in brood sow rations if sows are not to waste hay excessively.

Economist Predicts
Everett Peterson, University of Nebraska economist, speaking at a meeting of Wayne county feeders last week, predicted choice fed steers would top at near \$24 cwt. in January. He based his estimate of lower prices because of feed shortage than normal number of feeders moving to feedlots in July and August. He also predicted that the December low in hog prices would be near \$14.00.

When asked the question "of what importance is farm prosperity in this era of national economy" he answered that it is constantly growing less important because: (1) The total farm income of the United States amounts to only one-tenth of the total national income. (2) Adverse conditions in the farm areas are due mainly to drought and farm areas, although less prosperous than in war years, are still doing reasonably well.

Does Deep Tillage Pay?
Deep tillage, often referred to as subsoiling, is any tillage practice which affects the soil below plow depth. Other names sometimes used are "chiseling," "chisel

plowing," "panbreaking," etc. There is much interest in this subject at the present time. Many new deep tillage projects have been started in recent months. Already several of them are showing practical results for and against the practice in certain areas and on specific soils. While it does appear that deepening of the root zone should be beneficial, most cases of farmsteads would not permit its recommendation as a general practice. Breaking up tight layers within reach of a chisel sometimes gives good returns. On the other hand, Aeration, it may not pay unless it is on well-drained soils with permeable subsoils.

Even where conditions favor deep tillage, it may not pay unless done correctly. For example, dragging a chisel through wet or moist soil will do little good, and may make the situation worse. Tilling is dry enough to shatter.

Corn Cultivation
How many times should corn be cultivated? On the average, good corn growers are cultivating corn about half as many times as they did 20 years ago. Fields have increased despite fewer cultivations.

Four apparent reasons for fewer cultivations today are: Farmers have more power and better equipment to prepare seed beds and destroy weeds before planting; rotary hoe or spike tooth harrows before the corn is large enough for cultivation; row-fertilized corn grows faster, giving less time for extra cultivations; weeds are being controlled by other practices, such as chemical spraying, heavy fertilizations and greater corn population.

The main benefit of cultivation is weed control. However, cultivation also improves soil aeration and water intake on right heavy soils. Once weeds are under control and the soil loose, further cultivation is of little value.

Three-Way Race

Candidates in Nebraska's three-way race for governor have launched their campaigns with considerable vigor. They are Gov. Victor Anderson, Republican incumbent, Democrat Frank Sorrell, Syracuse, and George Morris of Lincoln, petition candidate. All appeared at the same speaking table in Lincoln last week and laid their platforms before the people.

Gov. Anderson said he will stand on his record of progress in the fields of highways, education, mental health, government expenditures and industrial development.

Sorrell called for new industry to utilize raw materials from Nebraska farms, fuller utilization of the state's power, water and other resources and said if elected he would sign no bill that would increase property taxes.

Morris went on record for a combination state sales and income tax, probably a domestic exemption to ease the property tax load, more school re-districting, adequate salaries for teachers and abolishment of the Board of Control system of governing state institutions.

Anderson and Sorrell spoke from prepared texts. Morris spoke extemporaneously, using only notes. Both Sorrell and Morris attacked the Anderson administration which the governor vigorously defended. Morris made a personal attack on Anderson and the board. The board fired him ago as superintendent of the men's reformatory in Lincoln.

Anderson said during the last two years Nebraska built more hard-surfaced roads than in any previous period of the same length. He said for the first time in many years there are empty beds in the mental hospitals.

The governor said Nebraska has "kept in step" with needs for buildings and physical equipment for schools, curricula and personnel standards. He said the budget is "one of the most misunderstood" to parts of government and that parts of government can remain static is "utterly foolish."

When the economy expands, he said, so does the cost of government. He said the demand by the people for increased services and inflation must be taken into account when casting a critical eye at state spending.

Sorrell charged the present Republican administration under Anderson "often put party loyalty above loyalty to the state." And,

weight carried and miles traveled. Nate Holman, representing the Nebraska Producers and Consumers committee—formed to fight the tax, said such a levy would "seriously jeopardize" the economic future of Nebraska.

Robert Crosby, representing the Committee for Better Roads Through Taxation—sponsoring the proposal, said the tax would hurt Nebraska farmers, not hurt them. Holman charged that the ton-mile tax would place an additional obstacle before any company considering a move to Nebraska and the higher truck rates would force some firms to leave the state.

Crosby said the ton-mile tax would help farmers by shifting some of the tax burden from their backs to the "foreign trucking combines and by making money available for good farm to market road system."

State Plane
Some weeks ago Gov. Victor Anderson took a state plane and went to the Republican national convention in California. He paid for the trip, Aeronautics department \$52.70 for the trip.

Since then, rumors kept circulating that he got a "bargain rate" paying \$15 per hour instead of \$45. George Morris, petition candidate for governor charged that very thing. This prompted a statement from the governor.

He said his opponents appeared to be trying to make a political issue out of the trip. In fact, he said, the governor is authorized by law to use that state plane at any time at no cost whatever.

But the governor said, he felt for that particular trip it would be fair to the state to pay what he considered the cost of operating the craft. He said his payment was nearly \$400 more than it would have cost him to go by commercial airline.

Further, he said he used the twin-engine craft because of the impossibility of getting commercial airline reservations and because with the state plane he could get back to Nebraska quicker in case of emergency.

Said the governor: "I have not traveled for pleasure during my term of office and have taken no vacation during the two years. During my term of office, even when on official state business, I have personally paid my travel expenses out of my pocket."

FARM REVIEW AND FORECAST



LIVESTOCK AND FEED OUTLOOK FOR 1956-57

Chances for making a little profit from the raising and feeding of meat animals appear considerably better than at this time last year. There will be no repetition of the heavy runs of fat cattle and butcher hogs hitting the market at the same time, a situation which caused the sharp price breaks last fall and winter.

Cattle feed-lots are not so full as a year ago and feeders are operating for quicker turnover. The 1956 spring pig crop was 8 percent less than 1955 for the nation and was down 28 percent in Nebraska. Feed supplies in total are adequate but there will be local shortages because of drought. Demand for meat will continue strong with high employment and incomes and generally prosperous business conditions. Once again the situation is less favorable in Nebraska after another dry year than in the Eastern Corn Belt feeding areas.

Prosperity Prevails— Meat Demand Strong

Business activity is expected to run along at boom level for the remainder of 1956 and on into 1957. The main strength comes from: high federal, state and local spending; business investment in inventories and new plant and equipment; and rising wages and high consumer spending.

Federal spending will rise gradually during the next year. The budget for this fiscal year calls for bigger outlays for defense, veterans' benefits, aid to agriculture and new highways. Spending by state and local governments has been increasing about \$2.5 billion a year. This trend will continue into 1957 and may step up as states try to raise matching funds for new highway construction.

There is little hope for tax cuts at any level of government. So long as inflation is greater than recessions, federal taxes will not be reduced. Taxes by state and local governments are more likely to rise than decline.

Business investment in 1956 indicates about a 20 percent increase over 1955. This has largely taken up the slack from lower farm machinery and automobile sales and production and from reduced home building. Recent increases in the cost of borrowing are expected to slow down the rate of plant equipment and inventory expansion in 1957.

High employment and another round of wage boosts add up to further increases in consumer incomes and spending. Prices are also rising because of higher costs all along the line from producer to consumer. The cost of living hit a new high this summer after three years of stability.

The supply of meat, estimated at 27.6 billion pounds in 1956, will set a new high but the main increase came in the first half of the year. Production in the second half is expected to be slightly below that of July-December, 1955.

Meat consumption per person at 162 pounds will average about one pound higher than last year, with beef up 2 pounds from 81 to 83 and pork down one pound from 66 to 65 pounds.

Feed Supplies: Ample Total, Local Shortages

Feed grain production will be about 8 percent below last year's near-record output but, with the large carryover from '55 and previous years, will be adequate for the livestock on farms and ranches. The nation's corn crop is forecast at 3,144 million bushels, 3 percent under last year. The oats crop is almost a fourth less than '55, barley 10 percent less, grain sorghum, 21 percent less and all hay, down 5 percent. Soybeans may produce a record crop of over 440 million bushels, an increase of nearly one-fifth over 1955, which should provide plentiful supplies of protein supplements.

Crop production has been very disappointing again on Nebraska's dry-land farms. Conditions looked more favorable than a year ago until the last week in July when

several days of extreme heat and wind severely damaged both the corn and grain sorghum crops.

Our corn crop is forecast at about 100 million bushels, slightly less than last year and less than half of the 10-year average of 221 million bushels. Over half of the 1956 crop will be produced on the state's 900,000 acres of irrigated corn. The oats crop of 18 million bushels is the smallest since 1934 and only 30 percent of average. The grain sorghum crop is a little more promising than a year ago with production of 12 million bushels indicated, 5 million above 1955. Pasture conditions have been poor all season due to lack of rainfall for two years, and more in some areas. Hay yields are the lowest since 1940 and production will be about 5 million tons less than last year.

FEED PRICES WILL AVERAGE A LITTLE HIGHER than during the past feeding seasons. Reasons for the increase are: (1) less production due to drought and Soil Bank, (2) higher support prices for feed grains and (3) severe winter weather in Europe which destroyed the olive crop and resulted in more exports of soybeans. Corn prices will not go as low this fall as a year ago because supports averaging \$1.25 a bushel are available to corn farmers who exceeded their allotments.

Farmers who will need to buy feed should do so this fall if possible because prices will rise seasonally after the harvest lows. Here in Nebraska the rise will be greater and prices higher as feed will have to be shipped in from states east of us.

Beef Cattle Prospects Improved

The cattle cycle appears to be at a peak but has shown little change during the past year. The number of cattle on farms and ranches on Jan. 1, 1956, was 97.5 million, up 900,000 head from a year earlier but the increase was mostly in young stock being fed for slaughter.

In the first 5 months of 1956 steer slaughter was 800,000 higher than in the same period of 1955. Beef cow



numbers were virtually unchanged but heifer numbers were down 3 percent indicating that the increase in herd size has about stopped. So far this year, there has been no indication that the cattle cycle has turned downward. Cow slaughter has been a little less than in 1955 with an upturn in July because of drought in parts of the range area.

Feeder Cattle Supplies and Prices

With a calf crop of over 43 million this year, one percent above 1955, and with 19 million head of last year's calves on hand Jan. 1, there will be plenty of stockers and feeders available for those who wish to buy this fall. Low profits from cattle feeding last year shook the confidence of Corn Belt feeders. Recent strength in the fat cattle market with prices higher and for a longer period than expected, has stimulated renewed interest especially in short feeding. Some farmers in eastern Nebraska

are sufficiently optimistic to plan on buying considerable grain in order to feed cattle despite the drought.

Price of feeder cattle has been running about 2 cents a pound less than a year ago until slaughter cattle prices increase. This brought higher prices for replacement cattle which is favorable for ranchers but could reduce profits from feeding if Corn Belt feeders try to make up for last year's losses in one season. The big runs of feeder cattle usually come between Sept. 15 and Nov. 1. Buyers should watch for periods of heaviest marketings and for shipments from the dry range areas of Montana, Texas and Colorado. Prices will probably average \$1-2 per cwt. lower than last year which will mean choice grades of steers \$18-19, of heifers \$16-18, and of calves \$19-21.

Slaughter Cattle Price Outlook

The number of cattle on feed July 1 was 10 percent below a year ago but has stepped up sharply since then due to the \$5.7 per cwt. price increase this summer. In Nebraska there were 28 percent fewer on feed than on July 1, 1955. The summer price rise caused an increase in short-feeding and more rapid turnover rather than holding to heavier weights as was common a year ago. This will help prevent heavy marketings this winter.

Feeders who will have cattle for sale before Dec. 1 should make average or better profits on choice grades. After Dec. 1 the prices of the higher grades will decline seasonally as more fat cattle move to market. Those getting into short-feeding of choice cattle from now on are not likely to fare as well because their cattle will be sold on a declining market, although prices will not go so low as last year.

Longer feeding systems such as calves and good quality thin cattle should pay average or better profits because the market will strengthen again after the present supply of short-feds are sold. Prices of lower grades will decline seasonally with peak marketings of grass-fat cattle during the next two months. Common feeder cattle will be fairly profitable if sold next spring. In general, fat cattle prices will average \$2.4 per cwt. higher than during the past feeding-marketing season.

The tight money situation and last year's experience with feeding will make credit somewhat more difficult to obtain. Banks which have regularly financed feeding operations will continue to do so for their regular customers, but will encourage systems such as calves which reduce speculation and investment. Tenant farmers and inexperienced feeders will have the most difficulty in obtaining additional credit.

Hogs: Limited Improvement

The outlook for hog prices is considerably better than a year ago but not sufficiently favorable to call for much expansion. This is especially the case here in Nebraska with another short corn crop. Since the corn price cannot be expected to go below \$1.25 this fall, an average hog price of about \$17 would be needed before an increase in production would be profitable in this state.

The spring pig crop of 53 million was 8 percent less than 1955 but Nebraska farmers cut production by 28

percent from 3.3 to 2.4 million. Reports of fall farrowing intentions indicate 7 percent fewer sows farrowing than a year ago in the nation and 12 percent less in Nebraska.

Although hog slaughter is still ahead of a year ago, it is expected to fall below 1955 some time this fall. The summer high of about \$17 was reached in August. Prices will decline seasonally as the spring pig crop moves to market BUT THEY WILL NOT GO SO LOW AS LAST YEAR. Forecasts range from \$12-14 for the seasonal low this fall.

With price improvement this spring and summer, farmers have been marketing their hogs at heavier weights

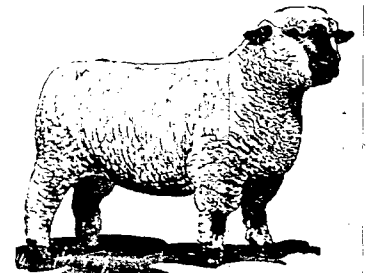


with the best prices being paid for those weighing 220-240 pounds. Heavy hogs will be discounted as marketings increase so feeding beyond 220 pounds does not seem advisable from now until after the first of the year.

Lambs: Little Change

Stock sheep numbers declined slightly in 1955 but the 1956 lamb crop of 20.4 million head was one percent higher than last year. Lamb production and slaughter have thus held up better than breeding flocks because of more lambs saved per 100 ewes. The most important development in sheep raising is the shift from the 13 Western States to farm flock production in the so-called Native States.

Fat lamb prices are closely related to beef prices so the outlook is more favorable during the coming year. Slaughter will be about the same as last year as more ewe lambs will be held for replacement and expansion purposes this year in response to wool incentive payments and better lamb prices.



The supply of feeder lambs will be close to that of a year ago with prices slightly higher.
