Contributions may be designated for specific agencies or given to the Chest tabulating central office. Those wishing to give to specific agencies must designate on their pledge cards.

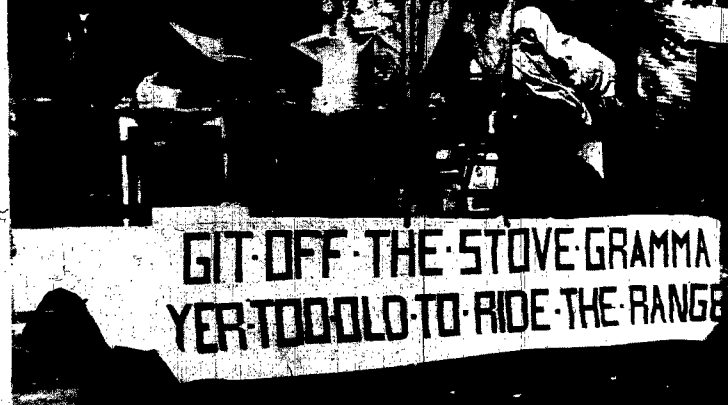

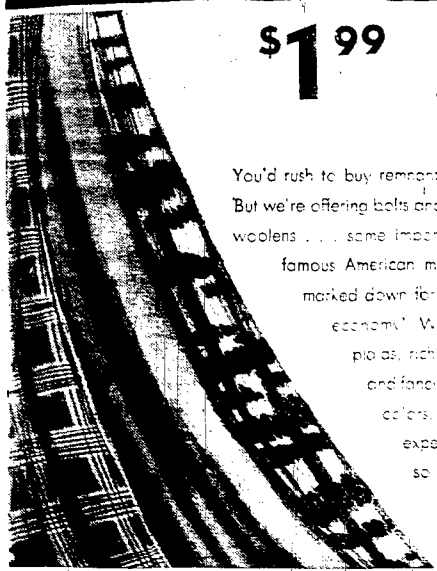

AS OUR FIRST EMERGENCY MEASURE in curtailing service and cutting expenses we are changing our opening hour from 2 to 3 p.m. During the winter months when children are in school, fewer people use the library between two and three than any other hour of the day. Please remember that from now on we will be open from 3-9 p.m. continuously each weekday except Saturday, when we will open at two as usual.

IT HAS COME TO OUR ATTENTION THAT AN erroneous impression was received by some people who read an article in this paper last week regarding the library finances. The article clearly stated that the increased mill levy of .4 of a mill would be made available next year, which means after May 1, 1957, the beginning of the Wayne fiscal year. This will bring the mill levy up to the maxi-

imum amount allowed us by law. This has not been given us for the past two years and accounts for the fact that the library is now short of funds. This situation has become crucial in view of increased costs of books, supplies, and even more vital, the shortage of help to do the work. We are taking this means of explaining the matter because many people who read of the activity by the county board to the conclusion that financial aid would be promptly forthcoming. Instead the matter of making ends meet until taxes come in next fall in sufficient amounts is being debated by the library board. Ways and means of cutting library services with the least inconvenience to the public is their chief concern.

Watson Gives Views on Issues

Editor's Note: Robert Boeckenhauer, Wayne, recently re-elected to the Sixteenth district seat in the State Legislature to state the views on current issues in the coming election. Printed herewith are those of Albert Watson, Wayne, who opposes Peter Clausen, Leigh, for the three-county post.

The Wayne Herald
Dear Sirs:
Some time ago a request was made for the candidates for the State Legislature to state their views on matters of current issue in an open letter to your paper. You generously agreed to publish such a letter. This is a reasonable request since it is impossible for candidates to discuss such matters privately with a very large number of persons.

In talking with people in this district, I find there are three main issues with which they are chiefly concerned. These are: the ton-mile tax, a broader tax base and school consolidation.

The proposed school consolidation is causing much concern to the people than anything else that has been brought before them in recent years. Their pocketbooks, their community life and the welfare of their children are involved.

There is a feeling that this is being forced upon them by bureaucrats, teachers' associations and other rank outsiders whom it does not concern. The requirements of the state law under which the State Committee for the Reorganization of School Districts operates lends credence to this belief by requiring county com-

mittees to submit reorganization plans within two years of the date of their appointment or face dismissal.

I favor the reorganization of our school districts where needed if done by democratic methods. The state committee and their assistants, receiving pay from public funds, certainly should not try to influence public opinion. Rather they should endeavor to place all facts, good and bad, before the people. I am certain our people still possess sufficient intelligence to decide the matter for themselves.

I now understand that some of the previously mentioned groups are preparing a bill to be placed before the next Legislature which would deprive local folks the right to vote upon the subject and would make consolidation mandatory. I am sorry to hear this; it will make it harder for those level-headed local people who favor some consolidation. If elected, I will do everything possible to defeat this type of legislation.

My personal feeling is that it might be well to consolidate at the high school level, possibly taking in the seventh and eighth grades. Some of the rural schools should also be united.

May I again say that you folks should have the right to decide this. The results of democracy may never be quite perfect, but let's keep those rights.

Republican Caravan
LINCOLN—One thing Nebraska Democrats find difficult to combat in their continual struggle against the Republicans is organizing handshaking. Every election day Republicans gather together in a motorcade, call it the Republican Caravan and set out on a tour of Nebraska. The caravan, composed of Republicans seeking re-election or office, hits more than 100 towns in its tour of four weeks.

And the way the tour is conducted is a vote-getter. The candidates come into a town and every spare minute shake hands and pass out campaign literature. Then, most give a brief speech.

All candidates are introduced. Even if a crowd is small in a town, the benefits of the stop are there. Firstly, there is advance publicity in news media of the impending caravan and after the stop a news release on the fact the caravan was there. In some towns the crowd is a more hand-ful. In others it is sizeable. Some times school is dismissed and the local band greets the caravan.

And the caravan is good for the candidates. They get to meet people they will be serving if elected. For younger members of a party, they get a taste of the hard part of politicking: the whistle stops where a good pair of legs and a strong right hand are vital elements for success.

This week the caravan toured the Fourth district, starting at Lexington. It will complete the trip at Kearney Tuesday.

right to raise the issue of irregularity and misrepresentations in the circulation and signing of the petitions.

But C. E. Beals, secretary of the Better Roads group, had this to say: "To cover their confusion, the national trucking syndicates have issued an utterly ridiculous statement concerning their rebuff in court. The Plain fact is," Beals said "the big trucking companies have resorted to every legal stratagem to keep the people from voting on a proposal for fair highway taxation."

And so the battle grows warmer by the day as the election nears. Both sides have said they will try as best they can to "inform" the voters before they go into the voting booths Nov. 6. That means, in all probability, many more statements and charges, some of which have been bitter from early in the campaign.

Statehouse Club
A lot of statehouse employees are sporting lapel pins. They are a blue elephant upon which is written in white "Vote Republican." They are members of a newly formed Statehouse Republican club, for which memberships are solicited.

State Tax Commissioner Fred Herrington, Insurance Director Thomas Pansing, and Athletic Commissioner Charles Mann announced formation of the club. They made no bones about the purpose of the organization—to increase contributions to the Re-

publican party from state employees. In the past, the three said, contributions have been on a "hit-or-miss" basis.

In a statement the trio said they wanted to make it clear to all persons concerned that no pressure whatever would be used to solicit contributions. They said an employee could refuse to subscribe to a membership and still have no fear whatsoever of any retaliatory action and most certainly a worker would not lose her or his job.

A guide for donations was set up—\$3 for a monthly salary up to \$199, \$5 for a salary up to \$299, \$10 up to \$349 per month and over that figure five percent of the monthly salary. Employees would not contribute monthly just buy one membership.

There was opposition from some employees, both to their being asked to contribute and suggestions as to how much they should give. But this did not appear to be widespread.

Sponsors said the drive went well at the beginning and little or no opposition was encountered.

Fertilized Crop Better
Fertilizers usually pay off even in dry years, says John Pesek, Iowa State college agronomist. Referring to yield studies in drought-stricken areas of Iowa, he points out that moderate amounts of fertilizer corn either gave small increases or had no effect. Some small decreases have been recorded, usually where plants got an extra good start and then were struck with an early drought.

Trials have shown that fertilized corn will produce more bushels per acre for each inch of water than will unfertilized corn. Samples showed that fertilized corn made use of water two feet deeper in the soil than did unfertilized plantings. If subsoil moisture is low at planting time, the available water supply can be stretched by a slight reduction in stand level.

Fertilizer not used by the corn in a dry year is not a complete loss. Up to 60 percent of some fertilizers applied to corn may carry over into the next season.

Sheep, Pigs for Sheep and Lambs
Outlook for sheep and lambs appears fairly good for the next four or five years. That's because the sheep population remains at a low level—little more than half that of the late 1930's and early 1940's.

The wool support program gives sheep and lambs another advantage for the next few years. Under this program, wool prices will be supported at an average level of 62 cents per pound. The wool payment each grower received on his 1955 clip was about 41 percent of the amount he received on the market for the clip.

Sheep and Lamb Prices
Sheep and lamb prices have been affected by the low prices for cattle. The scarcity of lambs, however, has held their price during 1955 to less than half the price drop for cattle.

Dry Floors Aid Storage
When pouring concrete floors for crop storage buildings, place a well-lapped cover of heavy roll roofing over the ground to be covered with the cement mixture. The roofing will seal off moisture from below and keep it from coming to the surface. The drier floor will help prevent spoilage of grain, caking of fertilizers or molding of hay; problems often associated with damp concrete floors in farm structures.

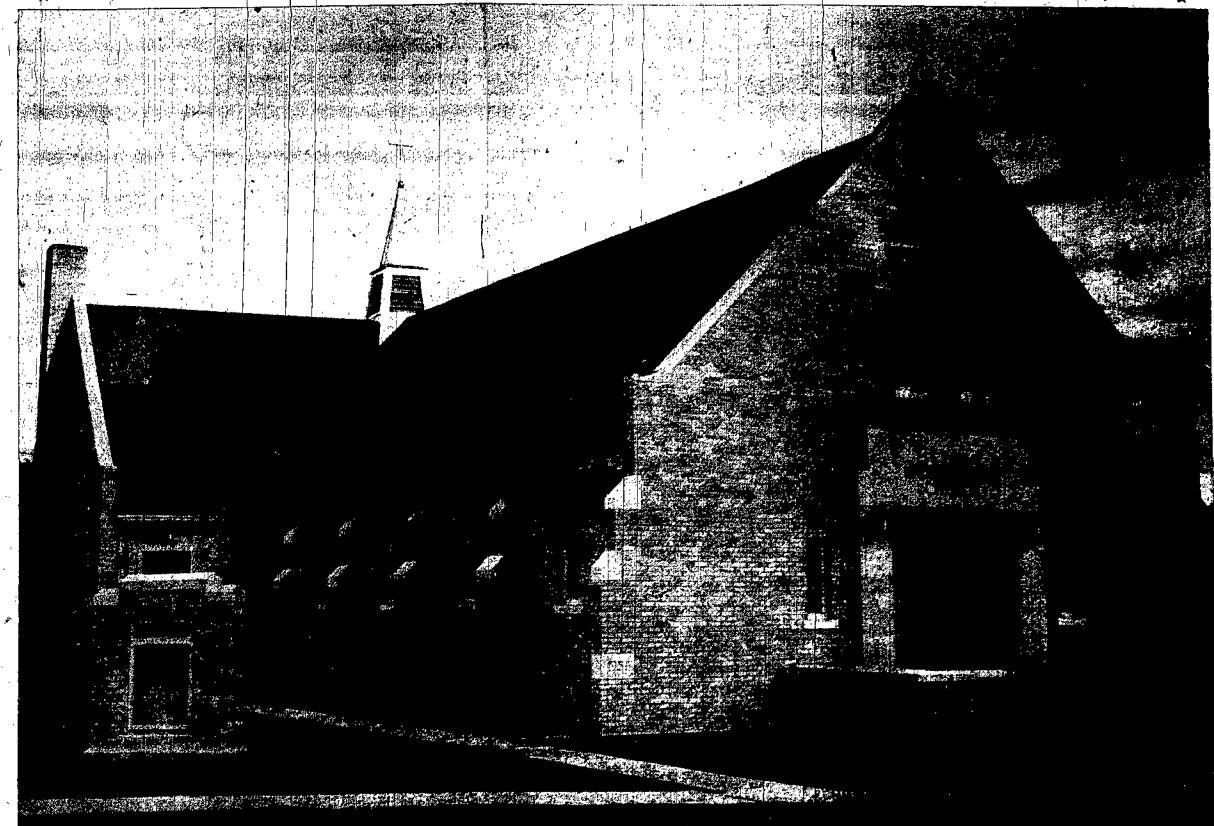


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Two Services Planned at New Edifice

Dedication services for the new \$130,000 St. Paul's Lutheran church building, Winside, will be held Sunday. Rev. H. M. Hilpert announced this week. He extended an invitation to the general public to attend.

Guest speakers at the two services will be Rev. Walter E. Hoffman, Bancroft, North Nebraska district president, Rev. H. A. Hilpert, Norfolk, and Dr. Lawrence Acker, Omaha, former Lutheran Hour speaker.

Ceremonies will open at 10 a.m. with the formal door opening. Rev. H. M. Hilpert will act as dedicatory and liturgist. Rev. Homann and Rev. H. A. Hilpert will give the sermons. The latter is the father of Rev. H. M. Hilpert, St. Paul's pastor.

Ladies of the congregation will serve dinner at the Winside auditorium at noon. Special organ music will be furnished by Karen Ehlers, church organist, and Mrs. L. J. Mallatt. Laurel Mrs. Mallatt will also present an organ recital at the church at 2 p.m.

The second dedication service will start at 2:30 with Dr. Acker delivering the sermon. Rev. H. M. Hilpert will give greetings and Rev. T. H. Buehner, Wakefield, will serve as liturgist. Mrs. Mallatt will be organist.

A tea and coffee hour is planned at the auditorium at 3:30 p.m.

The new structure is of modified Gothic design with exterior walls of buff brick and Indiana limestone trim. It measures 30 feet wide by 100 feet long with two small wings at the rear for classrooms, family funeral room and pastor's study.

Seating capacity of the nave is approximately 340 with another 65 in the balcony. Conversion of other areas bring the total capacity to about 480.

The basement provides a large social room, stage, dressing rooms, kitchen, classrooms, rest rooms and storage and boiler rooms.

Construction of the new edifice began Sept. 29, 1955, after contracts were let a week earlier. The old church, dedicated in 1891, was sold to a Plainview congregation and moved in July.

Ground-breaking ceremonies for the new church were held Oct. 2, 1955. Cornerstone laying rites were held Apr. 1.

St. Paul's congregation was organized in 1890 at the Edward Krause home southwest of Winside. Services were initially held in the Krause home and later in a public school near Winside. A building program was initiated late in 1890 and the church dedicated June 27, 1891.

Charter members were Leopold Behmus, August Nehring, Ludwig Behmus, Ludwig Sonnenberg, August Krause, Christian Krueger, August Brueckner, Gustav Behmus, Carl Bronzovski, Ed Krause and Herman Rehms.

A parsonage was completed in 1899, six years after Rev. Ludwig Rauch was installed as first resident pastor.

Rev. H. M. Hilpert, current pastor, is the ninth minister to serve the congregation. He was called Aug. 17, 1924.

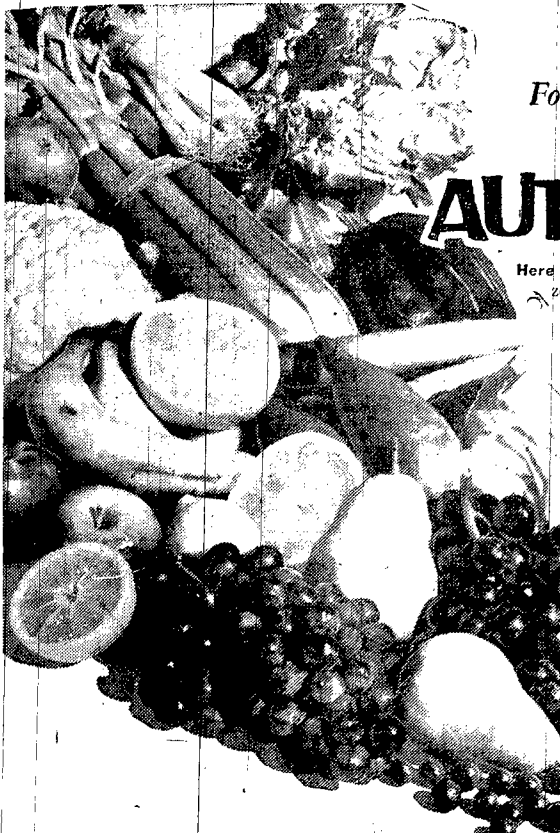

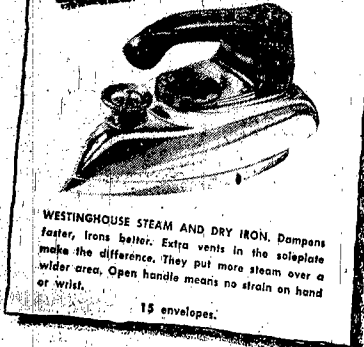

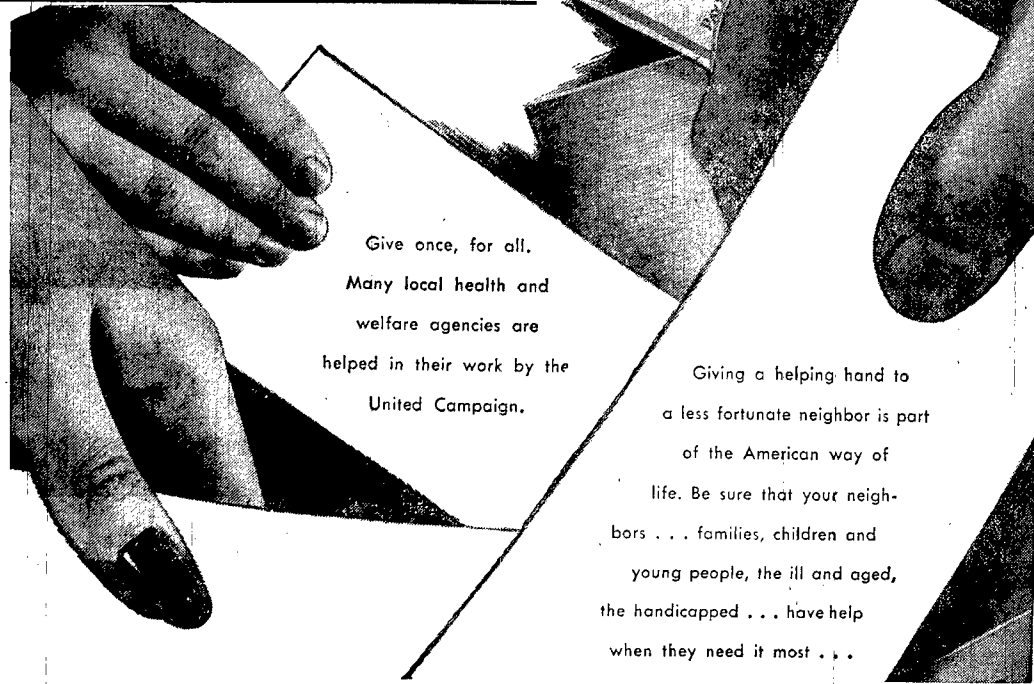
