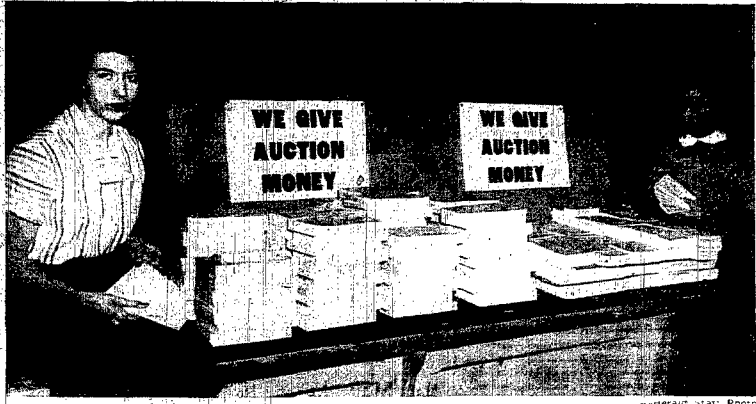


Bank Deposits Jump \$17 Million

Wayne Kiwanis club will elect new officers at its regular meeting Monday noon at Hotel Morrison. Those elected will take office Jan. 1.

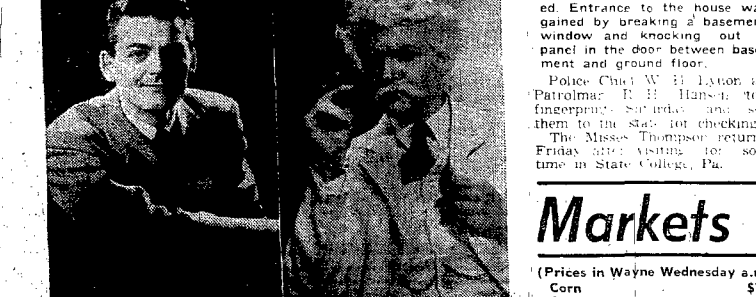

# South Sioux Baffles Wayne 34-20; Schwartzbach Stars

## Cardinals' Early Spurt Brings Win

South Sioux's Cardinals handed Wayne High's Blue Devils their third defeat of the season 34-20 last Wednesday night at the winners' field despite a single-handed offensive performance by Bob Schwartzbach.

South Sioux ground out a 20-6 halftime lead and then managed to battle the Blue Devils evenly throughout the last two periods. Surprisingly, the Cardinals beat Wayne at its own offense, the belly series. Ronnie Bartels averaged over 12 yards in 15 carries as he paced the winners.

Wayne scored first, but the show

was South Sioux's for the rest of the first half. With fourth down and six to go on the Cardinal 49, Schwartzbach daringly called a flat pass to himself. He grabbed Roger Denesia's toss, dodged one tackler at midfield, overtopped two others at the 45 and raced to the end zone. Denny Kern's plunge at right tackle was no good and Wayne left 6-0.

It took South Sioux only four plays to go ahead 7-6. The Cardinals went 85 yards with Dennis Nelson slanting off left tackle for the final 35. Merlyn Haase circled right end for the extra point.

The Cards made it 14-6 at the quarter on a 51-yard drive which covered six plays. Haase skirted left end on the keeper for the last 15. Leland Snyder plunged for the extra point.

Wayne's chances of pulling within one point were spoiled midway in the second quarter when

Gary Vilho recovered Denesia's pitchout on the Cardinal 41. Wayne had marched to the South Sioux 27 after Kenny Dahl's punt had gone out on the Cardinal 2. South Sioux marched for its third touchdown after the recovery with Snyder hitting right tackle on the belly series for the final 16. Bartels was stopped on the extra point try.

A 72-yard march to open the third period put South Sioux in front 27-6. Bartels sparked the march with Haase carrying the final four yards. Snyder hit right tackle for the extra point.

Wayne suddenly came to life with the next kickoff. Schwartzbach squirmed his way to the Cardinal 24 and after Wetars crashed to the 21, the husky halfback plowed through virtually the entire South Sioux team to make it 27-12. He kicked the extra point to make it 27-13.

South Sioux came right back with a matching touchdown four plays later with Bartels racing 39 yards to tally. Haase ran the keeper for the extra point.

Bob Louie's recovery of Bartels' fumble on the Cardinal 16 led to Wayne's final touchdown. Schwartzbach carried on four of eight plays and kicked the extra point to make it 34-20.

Schwartzbach's performance drew praise from South City coaches and sports writers, who watched the contest. He carried 15 times and picked up 131 of Wayne's 142 net yards rushing. His 49-yard run with Denesia's pass gave him 180 of Wayne's 191 total yards. He also scored all the Wayne points.

Wayne's other backs were unable to run consistently against the hard-charging Cardinal defense, which consistently raked up the ball carriers. A switch in defense enabled Wayne to partially halt South Sioux in the second half but the stop gap came too late to do any good.

Using the same offense as Wayne, the Cardinals rolled up 374 yards rushing, never resorting to the aerial route.

## FARM REVIEW AND FORECAST



### Guides To Planning Cattle Feeding Operations

Prospects for average profits from cattle feeding in 1956-57 look fairly good. The somewhat unfavorable competitive situation of Nebraska feeders due to drought calls for careful consideration of the important guides to planning cattle feeding operations for maximum profits. The financial outcome of feeding cattle is affected by the price paid for feeder cattle, feed supplies and prices, slaughter cattle prices, and the managerial ability of the farmer-feeder.

#### Sources of Profit

Profits in the cattle feeding business result from (1) price margin, (2) economical feeding and (3) increased productivity of the farm.

Price margin is the difference between the selling price per hundredweight of the fat steer and purchase price per hundredweight of the steer as a feeder. Ordinarily the cattle feeder must depend for some of his profit upon selling the weight purchased in the feeder steer for more than it cost. The amount of margin needed varies with age, sex and weight of cattle fed, and the cost of gain in the feeder.

Yearling and two-year-old cattle usually require wider margins for average profits than calves because calves gain more efficiently. Heavy yearlings and two-year-olds require more margin than similar animals of lighter weight because the weight purchased makes up a greater percentage of the weight sold and feed required per pound of gain increases as cattle becomes heavier. This is particularly true when the cost of feed is high.

A price margin is especially important when feed costs are high in relation to the selling price of cattle. Weight gains in the feedlot often cost more per hundredweight than the selling price of the cattle. In such cases, a wide margin is needed to break even on the feeding venture and is the source of all of the profit. Low cost of feed in relation to price of cattle may reduce the need for margin for profitable cattle production. This occurred during the rise in cattle prices immediately following World War II.

The amount of margin obtained is affected by the time of year the cattle are purchased and sold. For maximum margins feeder cattle usually should be purchased in the fall months when the supply is greater and prices lowest. Fat cattle should be sold during the seasonal high for their slaughter grade. Seasonal highs for slaughter cattle are as follows: Prime, October-January; Choice, August-October; Good and Commercial, May-July; Utility, April-June.

Most economical gains result from the utilization of low-cost feeds properly balanced with a minimum of more expensive feeds or feed additives. Economical gains are most important when calves are being fed or when the feed lot gain makes up a large part of the total weight marketed. Though calves usually gain more efficiently than yearlings and two-year-olds, calf feeders should give even more attention to feeding an economical balanced ration than feeders of older cattle because they must depend on obtaining a larger part of their total profit as the result of economical feeding.

Increased productivity of the farm is an indirect source of profit that occurs when livestock are properly managed. Manure properly handled and crop rotations designed to give a balance of feed for fattening cattle both contribute to greater farm productivity. Though not great in any one year, increased productivity can become a rather important source of profit over a period of years.

#### Purchase Cattle to Fit Your Feed Supply

Farms differ greatly in the amount and kinds of feed available for fattening cattle. Some farms have mostly corn; on others, the need for soil conservation requires that some roughage should be produced. The first objective of most cattle feeders should be to market feed produced on the farm to the best advantage. The feeds produced and available locally should largely determine the type of management that will be followed, the length of feeding period, and the grade, age and weight of cattle fed.

Yearling and two-year-old steers are better than calves for utilizing large amounts of coarse roughages, such as low quality hay, stalk fields, corn cobs and straw. They also utilize fall pasture to better advantage than calves. Because calves must grow as well as fatten they must be fed for longer periods than yearlings.

Calves require a better quality ration than yearlings, including a higher percentage of protein supplement and grain. Calves make more economical gains than older cattle because they chew their feed more thoroughly, consume more feed in relation to body weight, and grow as well as fatten.

The grade of cattle purchased should be influenced by the expected price relationships of the different grades at the time the cattle will be marketed, as well as the feeds that are available. Lower grade feeders, "common" and "medium", can utilize liberal amounts of roughage in their fattening ration. Grain feeding may be necessary for only a short time just before marketing. They should be fed for a comparatively short period and sold when they reach "commercial" or "low good" slaughter grade. Purchase of this grade of feeders should be limited largely

#### BRIEF and IMPORTANT

**Farm Debt:** Nebraska farmers increased their mortgage debt by 14 percent in 1955 and their short-term debt by 5 percent. They obtained \$179 million of the \$202 million of non-real-estate credit from commercial banks and \$16 million from production credit associations. Life insurance companies are the principal source of farm mortgage credit, \$92 million of a total of \$238 million; the federal land bank held \$69 million and individuals \$54 million of such loans. A further increase in farm debt is expected in 1956 because of drought, add-to-land purchases and debt refinancing.

**Drouth:** By Oct. 1, thirty-five Nebraska counties had asked designation as drouth disaster areas. The Secretary of Agriculture makes such designations based on information supplied by county and state drouth committees. Emergency feed and credit programs are available to some farmers in counties declared disaster areas. The feed program applies only to maintaining breeding herds of cattle, sheep and goats, such feed cannot be fed to hogs, feeder cattle or feeder lambs. Eligible farmers can buy surplus feed grains at about \$1.00 per cwt. less than the market price. The credit program provides special FHA loans to eligible farmers at somewhat lower interest rates.

**Livestock:** Feeder cattle prices will be the same or slightly higher than last year; demand has been bolstered by high fat cattle prices and bumper corn crop prospects in Eastern Corn Belt states. Top out cattle on feed as rapidly as they grade "Choice"; prices on better grades of slaughter cattle will weaken about the first of the year. Hog prices will decline \$2-3 per cwt. to a low of about \$13 in December; heavy hogs will be discounted from now on. Poultry and egg prices will be lower than last year through this fall and winter. Broiler production is up one-fifth over 1955; turkey crop is 16 percent higher.

to older cattle and should usually be so timed that they are sold in the spring months. Calves of low feeder grade may not be ready for market before late summer or early fall at which time they must compete with older grass fat cattle that are coming to market at comparable slaughter grade.

The higher grade feeders, "good" and "choice", normally require more grain in their fattening ration or a longer feeding period than low grade feeders. Normally they should be purchased and sold to take advantage of seasonal fluctuation in prices as much as possible.

The sex of cattle fed will not be influenced appreciably by the type of feeds available. The sex purchased should depend primarily on the relationship between purchase and sale price of steers and heifers. Because heifers make slower and more costly gains than steers and some may be with calf, more price margin is required in a heifer feeding operation than when comparable steers are fed. Heifers generally fatten more quickly than steers and are adapted to a shorter feeding period.

Since some yearling feeder heifers are bred and others may soon begin to become "cowy" in appearance, their use should be limited to a short feed on rather liberal amounts of grain. Spayed heifers are a questionable investment. Their gains are slower and more costly than open heifers. On the other hand, the packer-buyer tends to favor spayed heifers slightly because he is assured that none are "calfy".

The farmer who has liberal amounts of grain is likely to be a dry lot feeder of "good" to "choice" cattle. If he prefers a short feeding period he will use heavy steers or heifers, if a long feeding period, light weight yearling steers or calves. The feeder who has a liberal supply of winter roughage and limited grain is more likely to feed heavy cattle of lower grades. Feeding programs utilizing pasture as well as liberal amounts of winter roughage will usually cover an entire year. For such programs most folks prefer to buy light cattle of high quality in the fall. After about 12 months feeding they are fat enough to sell during the peak price season for "choice" slaughter grade.

#### Follow a Well Planned Program

The program followed by the cattle feeder should be regulated by a number of other factors in addition to feeds produced and available. Some of these are:

- 1 OUTLOOK.** Variation in business conditions, in supplies of feeds, and in the supply of cattle for feeding alters profit prospects from year to year. Study of the outlook for the year ahead is a "must" for making proper adjustments in feeding operations.
- 2 FINANCIAL SITUATION AND RISK.** Many cattle feeders use borrowed funds to finance their feeding operations. Their ability to obtain and use credit will affect the feeding system followed. Calves are usually fairly low risk as a feeding system because a large share of profit comes from low-cost gain rather than price margin. Heavy cattle on a short-feeding system are regarded as a higher risk system.
- 3 SUPPLEMENTARY LIVESTOCK ENTERPRISES.** The cattle feeding program should be combined with other livestock enterprises. Cattle feeding and hog raising go well together. Cattle feeding makes use of roughage and permits adoption of a flexible program to fit the feed supply and at the same time permits adjustment to fit profit prospects. Hogs on the other hand are usually a dependable source of income, although profits in any one year may not be spectacular. Hogs are more efficient converters of feed into gain and over the past ten years have averaged more return per dollar of feed fed than have cattle.

#### Check Prospects for Profits

Following are examples of some possibilities in livestock feeding enterprises in the year ahead. They are offered as an aid in estimating the profitability of feeding steer calves and yearling steers under different feeding systems. Feed requirements have been based on various experimental trials. None of the budgets show results from using a commercial supplement containing stilbestrol. When such a supplement is fed to cattle over 600 pounds in weight, feed consumption is increased about 5 percent and average daily gain about 15 percent (average).

The following prices have been used to estimate feed costs: corn, \$1.35 per bu.; 40 percent protein supplement, \$80 per ton; alfalfa hay, \$22 per ton; corn silage, \$10 per ton; pasture, \$3 per head per month. Total costs have been estimated by using the rule of thumb that feed costs make up approximately 80 percent of the total cost of feeding. The costs above feed costs include such items as equipment, interest, death loss, selling and buying costs and veterinary fees.

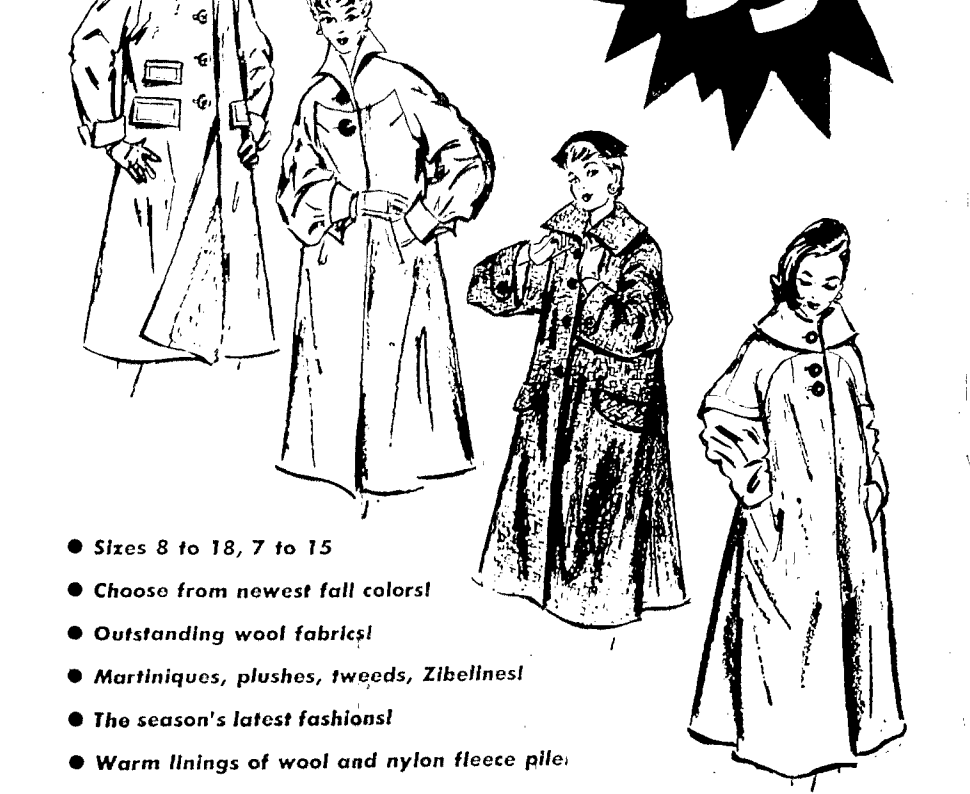
