### School Addition Near Completion

Completion of two small storage rooms at Wayne High school is expected in the near future with total cost to be about \$2,000, it was announced at the school board meeting Monday night.

The addition, built in a corner

between the furnace room and gymnasium, will have a 34x24 ft. room for storage of lawn and sidewalk tools and machines and an 11x11 ft. room for storage of lunch tables and a refrigerator for school lunches.

The smaller room opens directly into the gym while the other has a grade entrance with large doors for access from the outside.

Much of the work was done by school janitorial help and manual done by contractors.

In other business the board allowed bills of about \$4,000 and approved a trip to the state music clinic at McCook for students. The clinic, for vocal and instrumental music, will be Nov. 15-16.

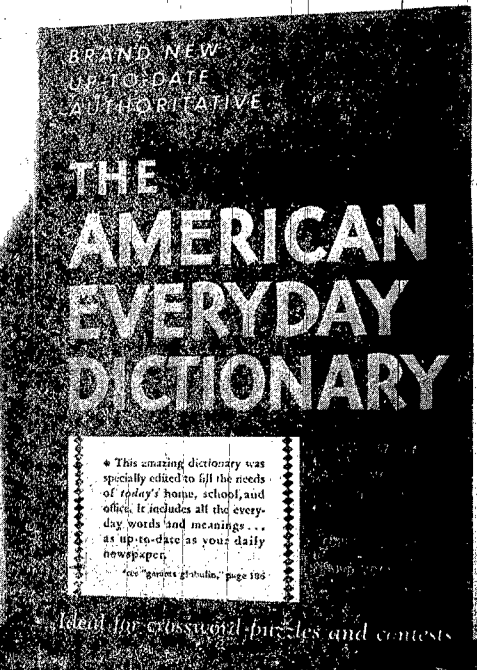
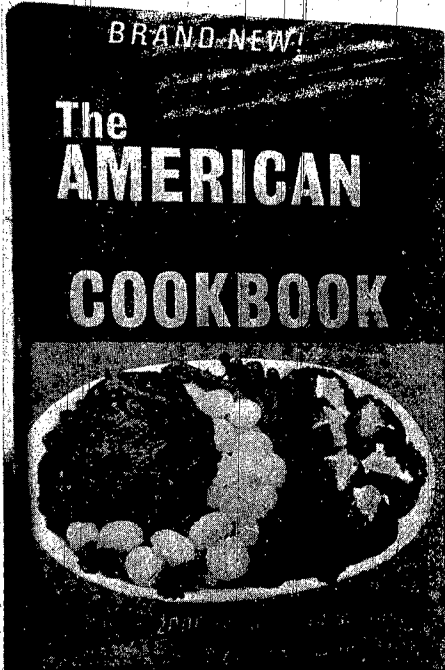

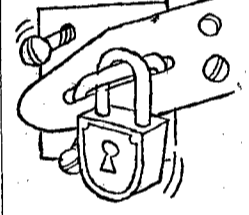
Rural-Urban Fete Held at Hoskins By Rotary Club
